




My family roots extend through my parents; Alvin DeKalb Norwood and Mae Elizabeth Rauch. My Paternal Norwood ancestry extends from Saxon Germany, England, Norway, Denmark, Sweden, and other European countries. My Norwood ancestors came as the original raiders to England and they enjoyed the territory and decided to make their home there. They migrated to the small island off the coast of England called the Isle of Sheppey. It was here that they became true Englishmen and lived here for several hundred years. My Mother's (Maternal Rauch) ancestry extends primarily from Palatine Germany, England and other European countries. 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


Figure 1.1: Hourglass Tree of Donald Loyd Norwood's Family.

1.1. Introduction – The Origin of the Norwood Family.

I am **Donald Loyd Norwood** and my wife is **Joan Evelyn Brown Norwood**. This is a very exciting time in my life. I have researched and discovered who my ancestors are and from where they originated. I would like to share this exciting information with you.

As you can see in the Hourglass Tree in Figure 1.1 above my family roots extend through my parents; **Alvin DeKalb Norwood** and **Mae Elizabeth Rauch.** My Paternal Norwood ancestry extends from Saxon Germany, England, Norway, Denmark, Sweden, and other European countries. My Maternal Rauch ancestry extends primarily from Palatine Germany, England and other European countries.

After a lifetime of studying Norwood family history I have discovered that my and many other Norwood families are direct line descendants of King Cerdic [470-534] of Wessex, England. King Cerdic, the Saxon chieftain who founded the kingdom of Wessex, was also the virtual founder of British monarchy. It was the one qualification of the early kings of Wessex that they should be descended from King Cerdic as he held the royal bloodline. Otherwise fitness to rule was the only factor taken into consideration. My Norwood ancestry extends back 48 and 49 generations to King Cedric. When tracing my Norwood ancestral line back to Cedric we find that he is my 45, 46, 47 & 48th Great Grandfather.

My Norwood ancestry can be further traced back to King Egbert the first king of all England, his grandson "Alfred the Great", down to King Harold II and William I "the Conqueror". The last recorded Viking battle took place on 25 Sep 1066 when the new and the last Anglo-Saxon king, **King Harold II** (**My 23rd great grandfather**) had to go north to defeat an attack by his brother Tostig and King Harald Haardraada of Norway, whom he defeated at Stamford Bridge. The Norwegian king, Harald Haardraada, invaded England to claim the

throne of King Edward "the Confessor". However, just nineteen days later, King Harold II himself was defeated and killed in battle by the Norman (of Viking decent) William I, "the Conqueror" (**My 27**th **great grandfather**) at the battle of Hastings in the year 1066.

It is almost unbelievable to think that on 14 Oct 1066 two of my great grandfather Viking and English ancestors fought each other on opposite sides in the most famous battle in history, "The Battle of Hastings". It's very difficult to write the accounts of this battle and the stories of their lives without becoming more biased toward one great grandfather or another.

My ancestors were rich men, poor men, good men, bad men, common men, exceptional men, Vikings, Knights, Kings, Queens, Sirs, Barons, Lords, Ladies, Madams, leaders, followers, law-abiding citizens, law violators, church leaders, church attendees, Judges, Sheriff's, etc. All those things that is common to anyone's ancestral line. All Norwood families can be proud of our Norwood ancestors as they were an amalgamation of hardy people who migrated to the American shores. Our Norwood ancestors drew-out and carved a clear trail for us to follow and provided us with a great heritage for which we should be proud.

1.2. Our Norwood Family history originated mainly around and about the Isle of Sheppey.

Our Norwood Family history originated mainly around and about the Isle of Sheppey. The Isle of Sheppey is a small Island off the East Kent coast of England. The Isle of Sheppey is north of Kent, near the mouth of the Thames River and is approximately about ten and one half miles long from east to west and about five miles wide from north to south. It is approximately 40 miles from London, England. It sits in the estuary of the River Medway, and The Swale River completes its isolation from the mainland of England. Sheppey is low lying, just above sea level, very fertile and most of it is treeless. There is a small strip of



timber on the north side. In the north center of the island is an elevation of only about two hundred feet. The River Swale separates the island from the mainland today. The island received its name from the fact that many sheep were raised there as they are today.

When going to the Isle of Sheppey it is necessary to cross the River Swale by the Kings ferry Bridge and look down on the quiet waters where St. Augustine had baptized some 12,000 people on that memorable Christmas Day in 598 A.D. And continuing along the leafy lanes up to the village of Minster, it seemed that the island must have changed but little over the centuries when cattle roamed the marshlands and sheep grazed on the hillsides.

The ancient Abbey and Church at Minster stand on the highest ground on the island. The church is in a wonderful state of preservation and contains some of the oldest monuments in England, among them a pair of "brasses" to Sir Roger de Northwoode and Lady Bona (Their photos are shown on the front cover of this book). We found these after much searching, by rolling back the carpet which has protected them during the centuries from the many feet that have walked up the aisle, for they were engraved in 1286 A.D.




Figure 1.8: Inside view of the Minster Abbey on the Isle of Sheppey in England.

My 19th great grandparents, Lord John de Northwood and Lady Joan de Badlesmere are buried in the floor of the old Minster Abbey Church on the Isle of Sheppey. The church is shown in Figures 1.7 and 1.8.

The Abbey stands on a slightly elevated position above the village, the road plan suggest that the village and church were at one time fortified, probably in Saxon or Roman times when it is thought that a pagan temple dedicated to the God Apollo stood on the current abbey site. Because the ancient abbey played such an important part of the Norwood Family's history a whole section of this book will be dedicated about the Abbey. Please refer to Chapter 10.

My Paternal & Maternal Norwood Ancestry Tables are illustrated in Tables 1.1 & 1.2. The tables show all my direct line ancestors extending from King Cedric [My 45, 46, 47 & 48th Great Grandfather] down to Donald Loyd Norwood [Myself].

These tables are presented for the express purpose of helping other Norwood genealogical researchers to compare and trace their own Norwood ancestral lines and I hope help in their research.

1.3. Our Norwood Family Legendary Beginnings.

The ancient Kings of Scotland claimed a legendary antiquity beginning with Gaythelos, son of a King of Greece who went to Egypt during the time of Moses where he married a daughter of the Pharaoh. Not to be outdone, the Kings of Wessex developed a legendary ancestry beginning with the Biblical Adam and Eve. This legendary genealogy is recorded in the Anglo-Saxon Chronicle, a collection of documents commissioned by **Alfred the Great [My 31, 32, 33 & 34th Great Grandfather]** in the late 9th century.

The entry written in the **Anglo-Saxon Chronicle** for the year A.D. 854 relates the descent of Æthelwulf, Alfred the Great's father:

"And Æthelwulf was the son of Egbert, Egbert of Ealhmund, Ealhmund of Eafa, Eafa of Eoppa, Eoppa of Ingild; Ingild was the brother of Ina, king of the West-Saxons, who held that kingdom thirtyseven winters, and afterwards went to St. Peter, where he died. And they were the sons of Cenred, Cenred of Ceolwald, Ceolwald of Cutha, Cutha of Cuthwin, Cuthwin of Ceawlin, Ceawlin of Cynric, Cynric of Creoda, Creoda of Cerdic, Cerdic of Elesa, Elesa of Esla, Esla of Gewis, Gewis of Wig, Wig of Freawine, Freawine of Frithugar, Frithugar of Brond, Brond of Balday, Balday of Woden, Woden of Frithuwald, Frithuwald of Freawine, Freawine of Frithuwualf, Frithuwulf of Finn, Finn of Godwulf, Godwulf of Great, Great of Taetwa, Taetwa of Beaw, Beaw of Sceldwa, Sceldwa of Heremod, Heremod of Itermon, Itermon of Hathra, Hathra of Hwala, Hwala of Bedwig, Bedwig of Sceaf; that is, the son of Noah, who was born in Noah's ark: Laznech, Methusalem, Enoh, Jared, Malalahel, Cainion, Enos, Seth, Adam the first man, and our Father, that is, Christ. Amen."

"Priam, High King of Troy; Tróán; Thór; Lóridi; Einridi, Vingethor, Vingerner, Móda; Magi; Seskef; Bedwig; . . . " This line then proceeds as for the Anglo-Saxon Chronicle from Bedwig, son of Sceaf who was born in Noah's ark. It is interesting to note that although the Anglo-Saxon Chronicle gave the kings a Christian origin, it includes the Norse god Woden or Odin who married the god Frigg or Frígídá.

However, as with the Scots, history knows nothing of this prior to about 500 AD, at which point the name of Cerdic emerges from the mists of legend as a Saxon invader who established himself as King of Wessex. Thus, it is with Cerdic that we will begin this genealogical record.



1.4. Our Norwood Family history lineage from Jordanus de Sheppey to Adam is proposed.

While researching our Norwood Family Lineage I ran across two proposed lineages from Jordanus de Sheppey back to Adam. These two lineages are shown in Figures 1.13 and 1.14.




Figure 1.15: Map of Southern England, c. 1000 with a superimposed Time Line and Ancestral Chart of some of our Norwood Ancestors during the early history of England.

Centennial History of Arkansas Article about My Father Alvin DeKalb Norwood.

Alvin DeKalb (A. D.) Norwood, a dealer in produce at Lincoln, Arkansas and classed with the enterprising and progressive business men of this section of the county, was born 11 Jun 1881, on a farm in the vicinity of Lincoln, Washington County, Arkansas. His parents were William M. and Sarah Elizabeth (Holt) Norwood.

William M. Norwood and his wife were natives of Arkansas. William formerly lived in Texas. The father had two brothers & one sister: (1) John Norwood, who was killed while serving in the Confederate Army during the Civil war and (2) Thomas W. Norwood. His sister was Margaret R. Norwood. William Norwood came to Washington County, Arkansas about 1875 and was here married. William was one of the early nurserymen of Washington County but is now living retired, enjoying in well-earned ease the fruits of his former toil. He and his wife are residents of Lincoln. William Norwood has always voted with the Democratic Party but has never been an office seeker. Fraternally he is identified with the Masons, while his wife is a devoted and consistent member of the Baptist church. Their family numbered eleven children, ten of whom are yet living: (1) Samuel Vincent Norwood, who is associated with his brother in the produce business and in handling real estate at Lincoln; (2) Alvin DeKalb (A. D.), of this review (3) William Lester, a traveling salesman residing at Lincoln; (4) Fanny Mack, at home; (5) Lucille Myrtle, the wife of Alfred Thornton Kelley, a traveling man residing in Minneapolis, Minnesota; (6) Lemuel (Lem) W., who is engaged in clerking in a store in Minneapolis; (7) Clyde Clayton, a produce dealer of Okmulgee, Oklahoma; (8) Eula Virginia, the wife of Bert West, manager for the Hodges Brothers Mercantile Company at Lincoln; (9) William Bryan, a produce merchant of Okmulgee, Oklahoma; and (10) Lola Grace, at home.

A. D. Norwood was educated in the schools of Washington County, Arkansas and pursued a business course at Springfield, Missouri. The first work in which he engaged in the employ of others was that of farming and later he began clerking in a store. He subsequently conducted a mercantile business on his own account for a period of four years and later he devoted four years to government and state work in connection with the bureau of animal industry. He next engaged in the fruit and produce business at Lincoln in 1911 and in this won a substantial measure of success. He erected a large two-story brick building in Lincoln, seventy-five by ninety feet, and is today one of the leading produce men of this section of the state, annually handling a large amount of fruit and vegetables. He is also the owner of a theater

in the First National Bank building and he has his produce offices upstairs. He is the vice president of the First National Bank of Lincoln and also President of the Lincoln Spray & Supply Company, which manufactures lime and sulfur for spraying fruit. He has developed his entire business through his own efforts, close application, energy and determination being the vital forces that have brought his prosperity.

In 1903 Mr. Norwood was united in marriage to Miss Amanda Holt, who was born in Washington County, a daughter of Benjamin Holt, a pioneer of this county. They are members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and Mr. Norwood belongs also to the Masonic fraternity and the Independent Order of Odd Fellows. He has always voted with the Democratic Party since age conferred upon him the right of franchise and he has served as a member of the town council. Mr. Norwood has spent his entire life in northwestern Arkansas and has contributed in no small measure to the growth and progress of the communities in which he has lived.

My father married his 2nd wife, my mother Mae Elizabeth Rauch on 12 Aug 1926 in Tahlequah, Cherokee County, Oklahoma. My father died when I was 12 years old and I missed a lot of important time with my father as I was growing up. While he was here on this earth only during a short part of my life I have very fond memories of my dad. I remember that he was great produce man, a man of strong character and honesty in all his business dealings. He had great determination and management ability to start his own businesses and to make them successful.

He showed a great ability to begin again as a fire completely destroyed my father's Norwood Produce House. Newspaper stated that Lincoln, Arkansas was startled from its slumbers Tuesday night about 11:30 p.m. by the sound of fire bells ringing. The A. D. Norwood Produce house went up in smoke we are sorry to say, as despite the dry season Mr. Norwood was building up a good business that he understands from "A to Izard"

My dad lost everything nothing was saved. Produce, books and office supplies all went. By heroic measures the real estate office of Mr. Sam Norwood (my uncle) was saved. Had the fire continued it would have been hard work to save Parker garage, Carrington filling station and the Sun office across the street as it was right in line for flying embers and the heat wave that was being driven by the heavy gale of wind that prevailed all evening long. The loss on the building, which had recently been re-roofed and enlarged by half, was \$2,000 and the stock and office fixtures \$1,500. Fred Howard (my uncle) was associated with Mr. Norwood.

Interesting to note, my father was always a gentleman and dressed that way. After the fire was extinguished that night the firemen noticed that in the excitement of the fire that my father actually got up and dressed and put on his tie before running to the fire. He took a lot of kidding over that incident.

My mother, Mae Elizabeth Rauch (Norwood) was the most special person I have ever known. She was one of a family of 17 children. At a very early age she helped my grandmother Rauch (Snodgrass) raise her brothers and sisters. Here she learned her special mothering skills that were not only passed on to her own children but to many other needy children which she came into contact with throughout her life. Many of my friends have expressed how much my mother had impacted and influenced their lives. She was always ready to help those persons who needed her help. She would do without many things she needed for herself to give to others.



I wish I could find all of the thousands of words to describe my loving mother and how special she was to me and the many people who knew her. Those words would fill many volumes! It was a shock to discover that my mother's time and life was over on this earth; I just knew she would live and be with us forever. And you know through her sweet and kind spirit she is here with us forever!




Figure 2.2: William M. Norwood & Sarah Elizabeth Holt's Golden Wedding Anniversary. Photo was taken on Lester Norwood's front porch on 22 Feb 1927. Edith Larue (Rich) Mabry is the grandchild in the middle of the photograph.



William M. Norwood was born 11 Oct 1854 at Norwood Prairie, Benton County, Arkansas. He was married on 22 Feb 1877 to Sarah Elizabeth (Lizzie) Holt who was born 28 Feb 1860 near Rheas Mill, Washington County, Arkansas. Their wedding took place at 6:00 p.m. in the evening at the home of the bride's father, DeKalb Holt near Rheas Mill, Arkansas. Immediately after the marriage vows had been spoken, the bride and groom rode on horseback to their new home near Rock Springs, about 2 1/2 miles north of Lincoln, Arkansas. They begun housekeeping in a new log house that the bridegroom had built. Here they lived for 37 years where 11 children were born, six sons and five daughters, one daughter having died several years ago (Byrdie Norwood who was born 3 Jul 1885 and died 11 Sep 1910).

The surviving ten children are: Samuel Vincent Norwood, Alvin DeKalb Norwood, William Lester Norwood, Lemuel W. Norwood, Lucille Myrtle Norwood, Fanny Mack Norwood, Clyde Clayton Norwood, William Bryan Norwood, Eula Virginia Norwood, and Lola Grace Norwood.

Five of Mr. and Mrs. Norwood's children were present at the dinner, three sons and two daughters, also several grandchildren and the only great grandchild. The sons present were Sam, Lester, and Lemuel (Lem); the daughters were Fanny (Mrs. Roy Miller) and Lola (Mrs. T. Reed Luginbuel), all who live in Lincoln, Arkansas. Three brothers and two daughters could not be present. The sons absent are Alvin DeKalb Norwood who lives in Shamrock, Texas; Bryan Norwood who lives in Muskogee, Oklahoma; and Clyde Norwood who lives in Monroe, Louisiana; the absent daughters were Eula (Mrs. Bert West) who lives in Muskogee, Oklahoma and Lucille (Mrs. Alfred Thompson Kelley) who lives in Little Rock, Arkansas.

Other guests present were Mr. and Mrs. Moredcai Doke (M. D.) Holt, who was also present at Mr. and Mrs. Norwood's wedding 50 years ago. Mr. Holt is the brother of Mrs. Norwood. M. D.'s wife is former Emma D. Vawter. Others present were Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Beaty, Frank Beaty, Mr. and Mrs. Ola Rich and baby daughter, La Rue; Mrs. Amanda Norwood; Mr. and Mrs. Baker Thomason and son, and "Aunt Pop" Holt, 96 years of age, the oldest guest present.

During the social afternoon which followed the wonderful anniversary dinner, many reminiscences were enjoyed on the part of the "bride and groom" of 50 years. Their minds wandered back to the day of the wedding in Rheas Mill. In the fall of 1916 the Norwood's moved to Lincoln, Arkansas. They have lived in Lincoln, Arkansas for the past 13 years.

William M. Norwood was born 11 Oct 1854 at Norwood Prairie, Benton County, Arkansas near Siloam Springs and moved with his parents to Texas and back to Arkansas to Rheas Mill near which place he found his bride. Mrs. Norwood was born 28 Feb 1860 near Rheas Mill residing at the place of her birth until her marriage. Mr. Norwood attended school in Benton County. Mrs. Norwood attended school at Rheas Mill, Arkansas.

Mr. Norwood was one of a family of three boys and one girl, and he is the only surviving member at this time. Mr. Norwood's parents were: His father, Arthur E. Norwood was born about 21 Feb 1822 in Marysville Blount County, Tennessee. His mother was Rebecca Copeland. She was born about 1829 in Tennessee and died in Dec 1901 in Lincoln, Washington County, Arkansas. She is buried in the Old Rock Springs Cemetery.

Mr. Norwood's brothers were (1) John Norwood who was born about 1845 and was executed by the Union Army 29 July 1864 during the Civil War. (2) Thomas W. Norwood who was born in April 1855. His

sister was Margaret R. Norwood who was born 18 Jan 1851 in Benton County, Arkansas and died 26 Apr 1924 in Lincoln, Washington County, Arkansas. She was married Francis Marion Howard. Howard was born 11 Jan 1845 in Illinois.

Sarah Elizabeth Holt, Mrs. Norwood, was one of a family of four boys and three girls. Mrs. Norwood's parents were: Her father, DeKalb "Kerb" Holt was born 18 Jan 1832 at Beaty Mountain, Washington County, Arkansas and died 8 Jul 1909 in Lincoln, Washington County, Arkansas. He is buried in the Beaty Cemetery. Her mother was Susan Barbara Stout who was born 19 Mar 1830 in Tennessee. Barbara died 22 Jan 1898 in Lincoln, Washington County, Arkansas.

Mrs. Norwood's brothers were (1) Jim Holt (b. about 1854), (2) Lon Holt (b. about 1862) (3) Mordecai Doke (M.D.) Holt who was born 27 Jun 1865 in Washington County, Arkansas and (4) Samuel Powell Holt who was born 5 Sep 1866 in Washington County, Arkansas. Their children, grandchildren and friends prepared the dinner for the occasion. The house was gaily decorated with yellow crepe paper in artistic arrangement and yellow calendulas were the flowers used in carrying out the "golden" color scheme. The table was indeed inviting, and the central decoration was a large wedding cake decorated with 50 candles and on the cake also was the inscription, "Father and Mother, February 22, 1877-1927." After the guests were seated, Miss Claudia Armstrong read the poem, "Fifty Years Ago This Very Day." Four generations were present, Mrs. William M. Norwood, and her son, Samuel Vincent Norwood, the latter's daughter Mrs. Zella Norwood (Ola Rich's wife) and Zella Rich's daughter La Rue Rich.

In her opinion, people are trying to live too fast in this modern age, and she says long ago, people were happy with what they had, and it seems to her now they are never satisfied. Still, with 10 living children, 19 grand children and one beautiful little grand daughter, and many of



them all in the same town, both Mr. and Mrs. Norwood find much happiness in the present age, and if they were given the chance to go back to the old days and old customs, would they be willing to do so?

Notes for Emanuel Harvey Rauch:

Emanuel Rauch had accumulated a considerable worth for the period as indicated by the census of 1850, with cash assets of \$5,000. He lived next door to Judge Thornton Smith Talbot in Easton, Missouri and on 16 Jan 1851, he married Judge Talbot's daughter, Sarah Catherine, as recorded in the Buchanan County marriage record book for Marion Township.

Emanuel's brother, Lazarus, had married Dorcus Donaldson and was farming in nearby Parnell, Missouri and their sister, Eliza Rauch, had married William S. White in Buchanan County, on 31 Aug 1852.

When Emanuel Harvey Rauch married Sarah Catherine Talbot, he became associated with a family from a quite different background than the Rauchs. The Rauchs had emigrated from Germany to Pennsylvania and were devout members of the Lutheran Reformed Church. The Rauchs had chosen to be farmers and tradesmen and retained the old German traditions, language, and customs. The Talbots' had come to this country from England, living in Baltimore, Maryland at first, then becoming owners of very large tracts of land in Virginia, later moving west to Kentucky, and then again further west to Missouri. The Rauchs settled in Missouri after first going to Ohio from Pennsylvania.

On 6 Sep 1852, Sarah and Emanuel Rauch's first son, George Rauch, was born much to the delight of the parents and especially to the grandparents, Thornton and Julia Talbot. Sadly, the young boy died at the age of three.

Emanuel Rauch's business prospered and in 1856 he built a mill in Easton, Missouri with Calvin Benight. Emanuel sold his interest in the mill to Calvin in 1861. A second son was born to the Emanuel Rauch's on 14 Feb 1856, but tragedy struck the family for the second time when the baby died on 17 Aug 1857.

Our direct ancestor, John William Rauch was born on 28 Aug 1858. It is understandable that Sarah Catherine was described as a "Very protective mother" to young John William. This was indeed a happy period for Emanuel and his wife, and their new son, John William. The milling business was prospering and Sarah's father was serving as a County Judge, and Isham Talbot, Sarah Catherine's Uncle, became the towns first Doctor an is described in the historical records in the following way:

Dr. Isham Talbot is the son of James W. Talbot, whose birth occurred in Bourbon County, Kentucky, 10 Mar 1796. He in turn is the son of James Smith Talbot and Unity (DeWitt) Talbot, natives of Virginia. The grandfather was a Revolutionary soldier, serving all through that struggle. The maiden name of our subject's mother was Mary Strother, the daughter of the Rev. George and Mary (Duncan) Strother, the father being a prominent minister in the Methodist Episcopal Church South. He began preaching the gospel at the early age of twenty years and continued with great success for sixty-five years.

In 1862 the Civil War was a terrible time for the Rauchs and all their past and future relatives. The Rauchs who lived Pennsylvania and in



Ohio probably supported the North while the Missouri group probably sympathized with the South. The Talbots who had moved to Missouri from Kentucky and had brought slaves with them to work on the farms and the mills no doubt influenced them.

Colonel St. Clair [Sinclair] Norwood was among the most prominent men now living in Bledsoe County who have won an honorable name as a citizen of that county, none is better deserving of representation in a volume of this nature than the gentleman whose name introduces this sketch. Colonel Norwood was born in the town of Maryville, Blount County, Tennessee, February 27, 1822, a son of John and Sarah (Crouch) Norwood.

Colonel Norwood had no educational advantages in early life, the extent of it being comprised in the old Woodback Dilworth spelling book and addition in arithmetic, and what he may have acquired after manhood was by absorption, through a comprehensive, penetrating and discriminating mind upon all questions presented to him. Upon this talent, and enforced by an indomitable energy, he built up an extensive business education or qualification, which gave him character of one of the most enterprising men of his county. But with his better qualities he possesses others less valuable - that of an extremely nervous, sensitive, impulsive, and combative nature, that frequently gives him occasions of great humiliation and pain.

In early life he developed great love for military tactics, and was promoted to command of a militia regiment, from which he derives the title affixed to his name. In the year 1856 he was appointed clerk and master of the chancery court at Pikeville, Tennessee, and served as such until 1865. This was the first field of his business education, where his natural love and talent for the law was rapidly developed and at the close of the war he was licensed to practice at the bar, with a knowledge and fear of his inability as a public speaker to make a success of his profession, hoping that time and labor would overcome his nature defects. But in a short time he became disheartened and surrendered his profession, for a wider field of activity and constant labor. Into this he entered and found a checkered and uncertain field, but indomitable energy and love for excitement gave him much success in business, mixed with many failures, in all of which his legal knowledge served him admirably. In this field he became an extensive stock dealer, and also, of general merchandise, and lastly, has done an extensive business in mineral lands, with a large balance sheet in his favor.

The last and most fatal error of his life was in 1891. He bought twelve thousand dollars of stock in a national bank, whose annual reports showed a prosperous and lucrative business, but in 1893 its discounts and loans proved almost worthless and the bank failed with the loss of the entire capital.

His business principles were always conducted on the faith and conviction that "the earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof"; for God hath said, "It is me that giveth the power to get wealth" that "the Lord buildeth up and he teareth down" that "the Lord giveth and the Lord taketh away. Blessed be the name of the Lord forevermore." And whilst in the frequent success of business beyond that of many men of like intellect, he always attributed the same to the Lord, and tried to thus acknowledge him by unstinted acts of charity without ostentation or pride. And when, in his hasty and impulsive business habits, he made grievous mistakes, he humbly submitted without murmur or complaint, saying, "The Lord chasteneth whom he loveth".



He has been a zealous member of the church since 1848, and for the last eight years has devoted his life to the study of the Bible, more directly to the prophecies and revelations. During this time his notes and comments on these portions of the Good Book have been elaborate. From these, in the year 1895, he prepared an article for the "Chattanooga Times" showing from the Bible, that the world is now in the last days of the gentile dispensations and near the beginning or ushering in of Christ's return for the establishing of his kingdom on earth, and the destruction of all earthly kingdoms or governments. This was to be preceded by a time of trouble such as was never before known or ever will be again. He quoted the words of Christ's declaration of his return, and those of Daniel's prophecies of the same period. He showed that the irrepressible conflict of capital and labor, which is now threatening the disruption and destruction of every intelligent government on earth, was God's immediate agency for the destruction of all nations and governments of earth and for the erection of Christ's peaceable kingdom which shall bless all the nations of the earth and shall be good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. This article, by many Bible readers, was regarded as very timely. Some fifteen years since, Colonel Norwood wrote a long series of reminiscences of the history of Sequatchie Valley since 1838, as he knew it. This was interesting and instructive to the older inhabitants as well as the younger, and he has preserved the only copy of this history known, which should be preserved and held sacred by the younger generations.

About the same time he wrote a minute history of the life of John A. Murrell, the great western land pirate. The history starting after Murrell's discharge from the state prison to the date of his death at Pikeville, Tennessee of his peculiar burial, the disinterring of his body, and his decapitation by two medical students. His head was last seen in a museum in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. These articles have lately been reproduced by the "Fayetteville Observer" Fayetteville, Tennessee.

In the year 1841, Mr. Norwood was married to Catharine J. Hoodenpyle, daughter of Peter Hoodenpyle and granddaughter of Philip Hoodenpyle, born in the city of Amsterdam, Holland. Mr. Norwood and his wife are now in their seventy-seventh year and fifty-sixth of married life, and are living in the house on the farm where his wife was born and which was her patrimony.

Goodspeed, History of Tennessee, Warren County.

The county court of Warren County was organized in March, 1808, at the house of Joseph Westmoreland, half a mile south of Barren Fork, where a log courthouse was afterward erected. Upon the location of the county seat at McMinnville, the court was removed thereto. Though early records of this court were destroyed during the late war, and but little or nothing can be learned of the proceedings or of the officers of the same. The same is true of the other courts. The following is an incomplete list of the officers of this court:

Chairmen - Since 1860 the chairmen of the county court have been in the order given, **Philip Hoodenpyle**, Thomas Mabry, John Smith, Philip Hoodenpyle, Thomas S. Meyers, S. D. Walling, John Smith, John S. Meyers, W. B. Smartt, **S. C. Norwood**, John Smith, John W. Ford, J. L. Miller, J. W. Gales, I. B. Neal, S. J. Walling, John R. Parker and J. C. Meyers, the present incumbent.

The circuit court was organized with the county, but as to the early officers nothing can be learned, save that Pleasant Henderson was probably the first clerk. Since 1865 the clerks have been S. C. Norwood, John J. Lowery and A. J. Curl, the present incumbent. At one time, the Norwood's lived in Knoxville, Tennessee.




Figure 2.5.: Sam Houston, Oo-tse-tee Ar-dee-tah-skee, his Cherokee name. Part of our Norwood History.

John Norwood, was contemporaneous [originating, existing, or happening during the same period of time] with the famous Sam Houston, and was a warm personal friend and accompanied him and fought with him in his campaigns in the Indian wars, and when Sam Houston was badly wounded, John Norwood hauled him back to Maryville, Blount County, Tennessee where they both then lived. It is believed that this early relationship between John and Sam caused the Norwoods to emigrate to Northwest Arkansas with the movement of the Indian tribes.

It is recorded that Rev. Thomas Wilkerson Norwood [our subject John Norwood's grand uncle] was in Northwest Arkansas and Indian Territory in early 1800's. Martha Louise Norwood stated that her uncles, the Norwoods, were in the Claremon [Claremore] Mound Battle with the Osage Indians. Her mother was Louisa Rutherford Norwood born in the Hiwassee Purchase in Tennessee, a Cherokee Indian. Her father was Thomas R. Norwood, a Methodist Preacher, born and raised near the Arkansas and Oklahoma line. Louisa was born 2 July 1860, in Benton County, Arkansas, two miles from the old Cherokee Line Road. Her mother died when she was five days old and she was the oldest of her father's children as he afterward married again. Much of her early days were spent with her grandparents, the Norwoods. Thomas Wilkerson Norwood and his wife, Salinda Pogue [Norwood], her



grandparents, bought four hundred acres when they came here. During the days of Fort Wayne, her grandfather peddled hogs to that place, which was seven or eight miles from their home and my grandmother made "fried peach pies" which she sold at the Fort and earned enough from their sale to buy her an Indian pony.

Samuel "Sam" Houston (1793-1863), a friend of John Norwood, was one of the most illustrious political figures of Texas, was born on March 2, 1793, the fifth child (and fifth son) of Samuel and Elizabeth (Paxton) Houston, on their plantation in sight of Timber Ridge Church, Rockbridge County, Virginia. He was of Scots-Irish ancestry and reared Presbyterian. He acquired rudimentary education during his boyhood by attending a local school for no more than six months. When he was thirteen years old, his father died; some months later, in the spring of 1807, he emigrated with his mother, five brothers, and three sisters to Blount County in Eastern Tennessee, where the family established a farm near Maryville on a tributary of Baker's Creek. Houston went to a nearby academy for a time and reportedly fed his fertile imagination by reading classical literature, especially the Iliad.

Rebelling at his older brothers' attempts to make him work on the farm and in the family's store in Maryville, Houston ran away from home as an adolescent in 1809 to dwell among the Cherokees, who lived across the Tennessee River. Between intermittent visits to Maryville, he sojourned for three years with the band of Chief Oolooteka, who adopted him and gave him the Indian name Colonneh, or "the Raven." Houston viewed Oolooteka as his "Indian Father" and the Cherokees much as a surrogate family. He henceforth maintained great sympathy toward Indians.

At age eighteen he left the Cherokees to set up a school, so that he could earn money to repay debts. After war broke out with the British, he joined the United States Army as a twenty-year-old private, on March 24, 1813. Within four months he received a promotion to ensign of the infantry; in late December he was given a commission as a third lieutenant. As part of Andrew Jackson's army, he fought at the battle of Horseshoe Bend on the Tallapoosa River on March 26, 1814. During the engagement he received three near-fatal wounds. One of them, from a rifle ball in his right shoulder, never completely healed. For his valor at Horseshoe Bend, Houston won the attention of General Andrew Jackson, who thereafter became his benefactor. Houston, in return, revered Jackson and became a staunch Jacksonian Democrat.

In the Battle of Horseshoe Bend, Sam Houston followed Andrew Jackson to Alabama to fight in a war against the Creek Indians. The British supplied the Creeks, and these Indians had attacked settlers. The battle was fought at a place the Indians called To-ho-pe-ka, which means horseshoe, because there is a horseshoe bend in the Tallapoosa River where the Creek Indians had set their defenses. Houston led several courageous charges during the battle and was wounded from an arrow, as well as from bullets to the arm and shoulder. The arrow wound was particularly dramatic because Houston forced a young lieutenant at the point of a sword to pull the arrow out of his leg in the midst of the battle. Andrew Jackson took notice of the bravery of the young officer that day. This was the start of a lifelong friendship between the two men. Sam stayed in the Army until 1818. Originally he had planned on a military career, but John C. Calhoun, the Secretary of War under President Monroe, played politics with the young officer, and Sam Houston resigned in disgust.

While convalescing, he was promoted to second lieutenant and traveled extensively to Washington, New Orleans, New York, and points between. While stationed in Nashville, he was detailed in late 1817 as sub-Indian agent to the Cherokees. In that capacity, he assisted Oolooteka and his clan in their removal to Indian Territory west of the

Mississippi River, as stipulated by the Treaty of 1816. Houston, by then first lieutenant, resigned from the army on 1 March 1818, and shortly thereafter from his position as subagent, following difficulties with Secretary of War John C. Calhoun.

What happened to these men who served during the many battles of bloodshed? Red Eagle is pardoned and as William Weatherford becomes a successful plantation owner. Andrew Jackson becomes the President of the United States and has his portrait on the 20 dollar bill. Sam Houston becomes Governor of Tennessee and President and Governor of Texas. The British and Spanish lose Florida and the Indians lose 23 million acres of land. James Ashley and Simeon Tucker return to the opulence of their plantations. Elisha Fyke, a pioneer of Dallas, has a road in Carrolton, Texas named for him. William Lea becomes a founding Judge of Meigs County, Tennessee, and Newton County, Missouri. Davy Crockett is catapulted into Washington politics and dies in Texas at the Alamo. The battles are seldom mentioned but so profound in our lives, even today.

Rowden, John Norwood, and William Carey) were scheduled to pay the "extreme penalty of the law for murder and violation of the civilized rules of warfare." The men had been tried and convicted by a military commission for the murder of eight Federal troopers of the 1st Arkansas Cavalry (Union) near Prairie Grove, Arkansas, on 7 April 1864. In Company with 20 other partisans, the condemned clad in Union uniforms and pretending to be members of the 14th Kansas had approached their victims. Suddenly opening fire, the guerrillas had gunned down the soldiers. Shortly thereafter, they had murdered John Brown, a well-known Unionist. [Note: Further research revealed that a man from Prairie Grove, Arkansas was shot and was simply a man named John Brown not the well-known Unionist as the Yankees had claimed. The true story is written up in Don L. Norwood's book entitled "John Norwood's Civil War in Northwest **Arkansas''.**] When the sentences of death were first read to the culprits, they seemed to be indifferent, one of them remarking, with an air of bravado, "Well, all right." As the time for the execution approached, however, they began to realize their awful situation, and requested the services of a spiritual adviser. Early on the 29th the prisoners were visited by Chaplain Francis Springer. After religious services, the men's irons were removed. Escorted from the prison, they were placed in wagons, each one seated on his coffin. Chaplain Springer was with two of the condemned in the first wagon and Chaplains Wilson and McAfee with the other two in the second vehicle. The "solemn procession" was then formed. Reaching the place of execution, south of town and just beyond the rifle-pits, the prisoners were placed in a line, each one by the side of his coffin. Three sides of a hollow square of infantry had been previously formed to keep the "multitude of spectators at a proper distance, leaving the side next to the prisoners open." After the Judge advocate had read the charges and findings of the military commission, the prisoners knelt with the chaplains, while Reverend Springer offered a short prayer. At the conclusion of the prayer, the officers and others gathered about the condemned, shook hands with them and bid them farewell, except the judge advocate who remained till their eyes were bandaged and hands tied. At length all the preparations were completed. In another minute, 48 rifle-muskets were aimed at the guerrillas. One moment more and Captain Jeremiah Frankhouse commanded "Fire!" There was a crashing volley and "four lifeless bodies lay stretched on the ground." The whole "terrible scene, from beginning to end, was conducted with the propriety due to a transaction so awful!" Editor Dell informed his readers. Fort Smith New Era, Aug. 6, 1864. On the evening in question, the partisans had approached the mail station at the foot of the mountains near Prairie Grove. As they were wearing Union uniforms, they were permitted to advance to the gate fronting the station. There were ten men of the 1st Arkansas Cavalry (Union) and one citizen at the station. Most of the Federals were in the house. After a few words had been exchanged, the partisans opened fire. Some of the victims were mutilated. News of the barbarous act was at once conveyed to Colonel M. La Rue Harrison at Fayetteville, who sent Major Charles Galloway with a detachment of cavalry in pursuit. The Major's patrol soon struck the guerrillas trail, overtook and killed several, and captured four. Fort Smith New Era, Aug. 6, 1864 District Provost Marshall C. O. Judson of the 6th Kansas and his staff took the lead. The Captain and his party were followed by the band and the firing squad (64 men from the 13th Kansas Cavalry commanded by Captain Frankhouse), the two wagons with the condemned and the chaplains, and then the guard.




Figure 2.6: Thornton Smith Talbot my 2nd great grandfather was instrumental in establishing the first railroad west of the Mississippi River & linking Western Missouri with the Eastern United States in 1858.

When this ground was needed for the new State House, he gave up his lease for "\$300.00, buying the ground where the William H. Block Store now stands for \$300.00 and a fip". He later bought the N.E. corner of Illinois and Washington Streets for \$300.00 and erected his wagon shop there. He was elected councilman several times and in 1846 he was elected City Treasurer. In 1850 he retired from active life, enjoying excellent health until a period just previous to his death which occurred at the home of his grandson, John L. Norwood, N.E. corner Broadway and Vine St. on March 8, 1880. He was a member of the first Board of Trustees of Meridian Street Church and his wife was one of the charter members of that church. George Norwood, one of the oldest citizens of Indianapolis, Indiana was born 21 Jan 1789, in the city of Baltimore, Maryland and in 1793 removed to Washington County, East Tenn. In 1819 he became a resident of Wayne County, Indiana and on 22 Mar 1822, Indianapolis, which at that early day embraced but a few straggling cabins, became his home. Mr. Norwood was by trade a wagon-maker, and for a number of years conducted his business on the present site of the office occupied by his grandson, Frank Bird. He some years previous to his death divided a considerable estate between his children, retaining for himself only a house and lot on Illinois Street. He was married in 1812 to Miss Mary Ann Rooker who died Feb. 28, 1877, in her eighty-fourth year, having enjoyed sixty-five years of married life. Their surviving children are Washington Norwood, Ann Maria (Mrs. Abram Bird), and E. F. Norwood. Mr. Norwood was in his religious predilections a Methodist, and the first trustee of the first Methodist Episcopal Church of Indianapolis. He on successive occasions filled the office of Councilman, and in 1846 was elected city treasurer. He enjoyed a reputation for strict integrity and scrupulous honesty, and was firm in his convictions, especially in discussions



involving a question of right and wrong. Having acquired a competency, Mr. Norwood retired from business in 1850, and during the remainder of his life enjoyed excellent health until a short period before his death, which occurred 8 March 1880 in his ninety-second year.

Old recorded notes about Thomas W., state that: "Thomas was born February 19, 1812 (not sure of the year) and moved to Washington County, Arkansas, where he died". I think that this is incorrect. Upon careful examination of the recorded data, I Don L. Norwood, think that Thomas W. Norwood's real birthday is 1 Sep 1799 rather than 19 Feb 1812 and he died 21 Jun in 1848 in Benton County, Arkansas. He is buried in The Norwood Cemetery. I also think that he was married to Salinda Pogue. Therefore my information will reflect this assumption. If you examine the birth records of John Norwood's children, the 1 Sep 1799 birth date fits along with the other

Notes for John Norwood Jr.

John Norwood (a Lawyer) and Mary Hale moved from Baltimore, Maryland to Tennessee in 1791. John was one of the first magistrates appointed for Washington County, Tennessee by Governor Sevier in 1796. John Norwood was a Revolutionary War Soldier. John and Mary are buried in the Middle Settlement United Methodist Church Campground Cemetery in Blount County, Tennessee.

Data for most of this Norwood line is taken from the "Norwood Family Association Publications", Indianapolis, Indiana in the year 1916. Linda Kay Duncan Roberts provided this information along with her personal additional research into the family.

Will of John Norwood 24 June 1826

In the name of God Amen.

I John Norwood of Blount County in the State of Tennessee being sick and weak in body but of sound mind and disposing memory (for which I thank God) and calling to mind the uncertainty of human life and being desirous to dispose of all such worldly substance. Substance as it



hath pleased God to bless me with. I give and bequeath the same in the manner following. That is to say, 1st I desire that all my personal property be immediately sold after my decease except so much as may be herein after named as the dowry of my Widow. And out of the there from all my last debts and funeral expenses be paid. And the remainder of said monies if any, be appropriated to payment of installments upon my land and if my decease should take place between the first day of May and the first day of January that one third of the crops and one third of the pork if fattened be sold. 2nd I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Ruth (Kilpatrick) Norwood the plantation on which I now live during her natural life or widowhood. I also give and bequeath to her my bed and bedding, Cupboard and furniture, all the household and the kitchen furniture which she brought with her upon our marriage or that she has made since. All my farming utensils also; All the cattle and increase that she brought with her. Also all my sheep and half my hogs. I also give and bequeath her a black horse called Jolly, a bay mare called Dorcus and a sorrel filly between two and three years old. 3rd I give and bequeath to my son John Norwood, \$5. 4th I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary Norwood (Gates), \$5. 5th I give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Norwood (Rudd), \$10. 6th I give and bequeath to my son George Norwood, \$30 and Wesley's notes on the New Testament. 7th I give and bequeath to my son Nicholas Norwood, \$70 and my wearing clothes. 8th I give and bequeath to my son Charles Wesley C. Norwood, \$5 and my large Bible. 9th I give and bequeath to my daughter Henrietta Norwood (Sperry), \$20. 10th I give and bequeath to my son Caleb Merriman Norwood, \$5. 11th I give and bequeath to my daughter Providence Norwood (Mitchell), \$50. 12th I give and bequeath to my daughter Sarah H. Norwood (Mitchell), \$50. 13th I give and bequeath to Thomas W. Norwood, \$45 and Wood's Dictionary of the Bible. 14th I will that the above Legatees be paid out of the sale of my land and the remainder be equally divided among my children. Lastly I do hereby constitute and appoint my friends William Wallace Junior and John Cox Executors of my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 24th day of June in the year of our Lord 1826.

Signed, John Norwood (Seal)

Signed, Sealed published and declared to be the last will and testament of the above named testor John Norwood incan't read the rest.

John Norwood's Obituary.

John Norwood's obituary appeared in the September 26, 1826 edition of the "Knoxville Enquirer" and read as follows:

John Norwood departed this life on 30 August 1826 after illness of several months, John Norwood Esq. in the 67th year of his age. He was formerly a resident of Washington County, Tennessee for many years now of Blount County, Tennessee where he ended his pilgrimage. He was an acceptable member of the Methodist Church for 49 years. He died strong and joyful confidence in hope of an immortal life. He was a soldier of the Revolutionary War.

(Transcriptions of both of these documents were found in the Will E. Parham Papers at the McClung Collection, Lawson McGhee Library, Knoxville, Tennessee.)

The Norwood Inn:

The Norwood Inn was built in 1820 and styled in a type of architecture popular in the early 1800's. It was a large two story main part and another level of one story flanked by porches. It was a pretentious building in its day, containing in the original structure eight rooms.

The Inn was located on the Niles Ferry Road (old) then called the Federal Road and was about 14 miles from Maryville, Tennessee 14 miles from Madisonville, Tennessee and 14 miles from Loudon, Tennessee. Many stagecoaches passed the Inn, stopping for a change of horses, or overnight rest depending upon the time of day and the stagecoach schedule. The Inn was built by John Norwood, who had been an Innkeeper in Maryville, following his service as a soldier of the Revolutionary War.

The original Norwood Inn had two identical entrances and ten windows on the front elevation. Each window contained 15 panes. The two doors led to large rooms that had huge fireplaces and high mantles.

An interesting architectural fact is that the wall between the rooms was made of brick and then plastered while the outside walls of the house were constructed of hand-hewn weatherboard. The two main rooms heated by huge fireplaces had between them a small taproom for the weary traveler to have his nightcap or hot rum, or stronger drink.

Back of the reception rooms was an enormous dining room, 30 feet in length. To the right of this was another dining room with an open fireplace and built in cupboards on either side. Back of these dining rooms was an attached kitchen. The 30-foot room was referred to as the summer dining room because it did not have a fireplace and was only used in cold weather if the Inn had an 'overflow' crowd.

There are faded old records in Blount County's Courthouse which showed that John Norwood purchased in 1819, the furniture for this Inn. He bought 14 beds, ten bureaus (chest of drawers) and ten tables, according to court records. Of course, much other furniture was added and much of it still remains in the families of descendents of the Norwood's.

In 1826, John Norwood died and his son John Norwood the third bought the interests of the other heirs and operated the Inn until his death in 1840. At this time, John's brother Wesley bought the Inn and established himself and his family as owners and keepers of the Norwood Inn. He bought more land and more slaves. The original Inn was now too small for the amount of business it had and so Wesley Norwood added three more large rooms. These were a continuation of the front and in line with the original rooms. These added rooms each had an outside entrance and the front of the Inn now had five front doors

The Inn prospered until the coming of the War Between the States. War put an end to travel; raiders and bushwhackers took their toll from the massive operation of the Inn and the surrounding acreage. After the war, the railroads put an end to the need of Inns along the routes of Stage Coach Travel.

The site is now marked on the New Niles Ferry Highway by a Tennessee Historical Commission marker. (There is an ink drawing of the Inn with the article. The caption reads: The late E. A. Nichols made this beautiful drawing of the Norwood Inn in 1939 from the structure and also many pictures of it. The picture is so accurate that the count of bricks in chimney is correct.) (Note from Terry Depp). I have found the drawings of the building as of April 2001.) (This article appeared in the Maryville, Tennessee Enterprise dated February 31, 1962, page 7, "Tizzy's Corner")




Figure 2.7: Simon Sager Cabin.

Notes for Heinrich Jacob "Henry" Rauch:

The English equivalent of the German "Rauch" seems to be smoke."The surname Rauch appears to be occupational and characteristic in origin, and is believed to be associated with the German's meaning, one who smokes meat, and a hairy man." It is only fitting that the Rauch Coat of Arms as described by the "Rietstafarmorial General" has a blue censer on the Arms or shield with plumes of fire and smoke billowing out, and a blue censer as the crest with arrows of fire surrounding it. It is not surprising, to note that one of the most common occupations, besides the main stay of farming, among the descendants of Henry Rauch was that of a Blacksmith. Two of Henry's sons George and Jacob were listed a Blacksmiths throughout their lives and Philip and Henry Jr., married into the Marsteller family, many of whom were renowned as Blacksmiths.

By 1760 many of the Rauch Ancestors were well settled in the new world and moving forward with their lives. Henry Rauch and his wife Magdalena Lahr Rauch were living in Hereford Township, Berks County, Pennsylvania. Mathew Talbot was a Colonel in the Virginia Militia and living in Bedford County, Virginia with his wife and children. The Phillip Goodbread Family was in North Carolina and James Snodgrass was in Virginia married to Ann Long.

In 1777 Henry Jacob Rauch joined the Continental Army and served as a court martial man in the 1st battalion-Eastern section under the command of Colonel Daniel Hunter of Oley, Pennsylvania. The battalion was mustered into service August 7, 1777, with 365 men and served under General George Washington in the campaign around Philadelphia during which the battles of Brandywine and Germantown were fought. Following his war service, Henry returned to Berks County, Hereford Township, near the town of Huff's Church, Pennsylvania, where he died in 1784. He is buried beside his wife, Magdalena, in the private cemetery on the farm of Phillip Marsteller.

And on their Solemn Affirmation did Severally Declare and Affirm that they were present and Saw and Heard Henry Rauch the Testator therein Named Sign, Seal, pronounce publish and declare the within writing to be his last will and testament and that at the time of doing thereof he was of sound mind, memory and understanding as they [herby] believe, and that the names of the said Affirments Subscribed thereto as witnesses by them Respectively Subscribed are of their own proper hand writing in the presence of each other at the Request and in the presence of the said Testator.

In the name of God Amen!

Whereas I Henry Rauch of Hereford township in the County of Berks in the State of Pennsylvania [Yeoman]. Do find myself very sick and weak in body, but of sound mind understanding and memory. Thanks be to God. So do I on 5 Sep 1783 make publish and ordain this my Last Will and Testament. And first of all I recommend my Soul into the



house of Almighty God that gave it and as founding my worldly estate, I do hereby dispose of the same in the following manner. That is to say; Whereas I am owing yet to pay a certain sum of about 100 Pounds in hard money for my Land and Plantation, which ought to be paid soon. So is it my will and I do hereby empower my hereunto-named Executors, as soon as it will suit them. To sell part of my Land and Plantation and so much thereof, as will be sufficient to pay off the said Debt and I do Hereby give and bequeath to my beloved Wife Magdalena my bed and bedstead and what belongs to it and my chest and one cow and so much of all the kitchen furniture and of all the household goods and tools, what so ever maybe necessary for her use, and as much as she will choose thereof to keep, as for her own. And then it is my will that the remainder of my household goods and personal Estate may be sold by public [venue], for to pay my other Debts and costs [forever], and then it is my will, that my Plantation situated in Hereford Township aforesaid, shall be lent and rented out by my Executors in the best manner as they can, either to any one of my Sons, as it would suit any of them, or to some body else, when it should no more suit my family to live together, and manage the same in common, and when my Plantation is rented out. Then is it my will, that my said Wife shall get and receive all the yearly Rent thereof as for her support and subsistence and that She there by be enabled to keep home of my youngest children with her, and to educate them in the best manner as she can. And I do hereby give to her my said Wife Magdalena, a full Right and Privilege to remain to live on my said Plantation and Land, during all her Life Time, and to receive yearly from my said Plantation for her subsistence, so much and such articles of the Produce thereof as may be judge necessary for her support by my Executors, or by other impartial persons, who may be chosen to settle the same or so much as my said Plantation will bear if she remains my widow. And further is it my will, that my younger sons shall be put out to learn some trade, which they shall choose to learn, by my said Executors, it is also my will, if my said Executors should think fit to sell my said personal Estate in a short time, that my said wife shall keep one fat hog for her use as also of the grain of the flax and wool, and such other articles, as may be necessary for her support until the next harvest time, And further, after my youngest child shall be at his lawful age, then it is my will, that any of my Sons whom it shall suit best, shall have a rig ht, to accept and possess my said Plantation and land as his own, for such a price as they can agree about between themselves, upon condition, that he shall yearly provide and give to my said wife, his mother all such articles for her subsistence as shall be necessary for her as above said, during her life time, if she remains my widow. But if it would not suit any of my sons to accept and keep my said Plantation for his own then I give them the full liberty and power to sell the same to any body for what price they can, Though not without the full consent and approval of my said wife. In which case if she should intend them to acquit and give up her said yearly subsistence then I give and bequeath to her the equal third part of the consideration, of what may be got for my said Plantation for her use and behoove during her life time and I further give devise and bequeath all the residue of my clear [Estate whatsoever to my 11 children and to their heirs and assigns as to my 6 Sons: as George, and Philip, and Henry, and Jacob, and David, and John Rauch. And to my 5 Daughters: as Elizabeth, and Mary, and Barbara, and Margaret, and Magdalena Rauch, as to each of them the equal 11th part and share to hold same to them their heirs and assigns forever. And I do hereby nominate, constitute, and appoint my trusty friend and brother-in-law George Lahr and my eldest son George Rauch to be the Sole Executors of this my Last Will and Testament. And I do hereby fully empower my said Executors to sign, seal execute and deliver Lawful Deeds if conveyance for my said Lands or Plantation as occasion shall require. And I do hereby declare, ratify and confirm this and no other to be my Last Will and Testament. In witness and confirmation whereof I the said Henry Rauch Senior have hereunto set my hand and seal on the day and year as first above written.

Reference to Dorsey et al, "The Dorsey Family," Owings et al, "Owings and Allied Families.

In 1717 Edward Norwood of the Patapsco River, Baltimore County was attorney for Joseph Wheeler of Bristol. (Baltimore County, Deeds I.S. No. G., f. 22). With John Israel he appraised estate of Nicholas Dorsey in 1719.

Norwood's Discovery of 100 acres was surveyed for him in 1720, and on July 6, 1722, Ruth's Lot containing 100 acres was surveyed for Edward Norwood of Baltimore County on the north side of the Patapsco River. (Baltimore County, Rent Rolls)

In 1719 he registered his mark for his cattle. (Baltimore County, Deeds T. E. No. DS, f. 94). He became indebted to Thomas Worthington and on February 20, 1724, Edward Norwood of Baltimore County, planter, sold to Thomas Worthington of Anne Arundel County, merchant two tracts of land originally surveyed for Edward Norwood, 100 acres of Norwood's Discovery and 100 acres of Ruth's Lot. Ruth, wife of Edward, gave her consent. (Baltimore County, Deeds I.S. No. G, f. 411)

On November 1, 1729, Richard Owings made over to his sister, Ruth Norwood, widow, Owings Addition, during her life, and on the 14th of April, 1730, he gave to Ruth Norwood, widow of Edward Norwood, deceased, Owing's Addition and Owing's Adventure, during her natural life. George Scholtze was the assigned Executor. Everything was left to Mary, his wife. Around 1746 she later remarried Martin Sturtzman and the Estate was resettled by David Shultze, the husband of Elizabeth Lahr (daughter of Henry) on the 21 Feb 1759. He married before 1739 96. Anna Margaretha Doerst [4715], born 3 Aug 1725 in Germany; died 18 Oct 1808 in Upper Milford Township, Northampton County, PA. Johann Philipp Hertzog and Anna Margaretha Doerst are the 5th great grandparents of Donald Lovd Norwood.

Notes for Johann Philipp Hertzog:

Johan Philip Hertzog and his wife Anna Margaretha came to Philadelphia on the "Robert and Alice" ship 11 Sep 1738 from Heidelberg, Germany. He settled in the present village of Zionsville, Lehigh County, PA. The Reformed Church is located on the 102 acres he once owned. He fought in the French & Indian War.

Rauch and Talbot Family Connections.

The roots of the Rauch and Talbot families run deep in America. Mathew Talbot I my, Don L. Norwood's 5th great grandfather, the subject of this section, almost certainly was the immigrant but the Talbot name can be found as far back as the 10th Century in England, France, and other European countries. While the European history of the Talbot Family is an interesting and distinguished one, it is not the focus of this book, as the Talbot Family will be covered in more detail in a Talbot book in the future. Although occasional references are made to ancestors of Matthew (I), the principal subjects of this section are Matthew Talbot I, his six children, and their descendants, a family tree that now spans twelve generations in America.

Our Rauch and Talbot families are connected through my great grandparents Emanuel Harvey Rauch and Sarah Catherine Talbot. Emanuel Harvey Rauch who was born 23 Jun 1825 in Reading, Berks



County, Pennsylvania married Sarah Catherine Talbot born 27 Feb 1833 in Carroll County, Kentucky were married in Marion, Buchanan County, Missouri, on 16 Jan 1851. More specifics of this family will be presented in later chapters. However, let us examine Sarah Catherine Talbot's ancestry during the colonial period. Sarah Catherine Talbot's 2nd great grandfather was **Matthew Talbot I.** Matthew Talbot I Esquire is the 3rd great grandfather of John William Rauch (My grandfather), who will be described later. The close ties between the Rauch and Talbot families will become apparent later but for now let us examine the roots of the Talbot family in America.

Mathew Talbot I, Gentleman:

Mathew Talbot I, Gentleman, as he was known in his time, was born on 29 Sep 1699 in Buxton, England. Mathew Talbot, Gentleman came to Maryland about 1720 and married Mary Anne Williston on 6 May 1721 in Virginia (Some sources say Maryland). Mary Williston was born in 1697 in Queen Anne's County, Maryland. His bride was the daughter of James Williston, Esquire, and Ann Belgrave of the Place of Maryland, described as being a large land owner." One infers that the wedding took place in Maryland; although nothing proving this to be so has been found in any of the State or local records studied neither in Maryland nor in any of the few existing church records of the period. This theory is strengthened by the fact that James Williston's last will and testament was probated in Queen Anne's County on the Eastern Shore of Maryland. His will was dated January 9, 1708, and it shows him to have been of Kent Island, Queen Anne's County. By this instrument, James Williston bequeathed to his son George, 119 acres of land "called Lancaster lying on ye S side of Chester R" in Queen Anne's County. In this same document, he left his daughter Mary Anne Williston (then about eleven years old and who later became the wife of Mathew Talbot I, to the care of his wife. Moreover, one finds subsequently that Mary Talbot as administratrix for George Williston, "late of Queens County" swore on "July ye 28th 1726" to the correctness of the Inventory she submitted of her brother's estate.

Finally, we have the words of his Edmund Talbot, who states that Mathew Talbot I settled in Maryland and married Mary Williston, the young couple later moving into Virginia. Thus it may accepted that Mathew Talbot I and Mary Williston were married in the Province of Maryland, despite lack of official record; that theory is further substantiated by the facts that the first child, Charles Talbot was born in 1723.

It is clear that Mathew Talbot I and his wife did not remain long in Maryland however, as the next two children, Mathew Talbot II born November 27, 1729 and James Talbot (2) (born November 7, 1733) first saw the light in Bristol Parish, Prince George's County, Virginia.

While in Maryland, Mathew Talbot I is believed to have been interested in shipping along with his partner, Nicholas Hale (Haile?), Esquire who is said to have come from Buck's County, Pennsylvania and was probably of the distinguished colonial family of that name. This same Mr. Hale presumably went to Virginia with the Mathew Talbot I family for later on his daughter married Mathew Talbot II, the second boy. The best authority yet found by this compiler dealing with this part of the life of Mathew Talbot I, is his grandson Edmund Talbot whose statement was put in writing by the latter's son, Mathew (4). It is from this document that we learn that Mathew Talbot I was involved in shipping and that it was losses at sea which caused him to turn his back on Maryland and strike out for what is now Virginia with his young family.

In Virginia, Mathew Talbot I first made his home in Amelia County, later settling not far from the present-day city of Lynchburg, Virginia where at least two of the direct descendants of Mathew Talbot I and of

his son, Charles Talbot were still living in October, 1949. They were Miss Talbot and her sister Miss Elsie V. Talbot; their home then was at 522 Euclid Avenue, at the corner of Talbot Street. It was there that the "great Bible" which Mathew Talbot I left by his will to his son Charles Talbot, was seen and examined:

1. For example, on Page 108, Volume 10 of the "Virginia Historical Magazine".--RHF $\,$

It will be recalled that at the time that Mathew Talbot I went to the Province of Virginia, it extended northward to the shores of the Great Lakes and westward to the Mississippi. It was not until 1784, after the Revolution, that Virginia ceded the Northwest Territory to the Federal Government of our newborn nation, while Virginia did not give up the region we know as Kentucky until 1792.

Even before the arrival of Mathew Talbot I in Virginia, however, the gradual movement of other pioneers westward away from the shores of the Atlantic, brought about subdivision of great tracts of land. For convenience of control and to obtain proportionate representation in the Virginia House of Burgesses (the first representative assembly in North America and established in 1619), newcomers of the early 18th century demanded and eventually succeeded in having several counties carved out from the older and larger ones. Thus it was that in 1732 Brunswick County was created from Prince George, Surrey, and Isle of Wight. Then, in 1746, Brunswick, in its turn, became the parent county for Lunenburg.

In November 1753 by act of the House of Burgesses effective May 10, 1753, a new county called Bedford, named in honor of John Russell, Duke of Bedford was established on land originally a part of Lunenburg plus a small section of Albemarle County. These facts tend to create confusion in attempting to follow the movements of Mathew Talbot I, for we find records pertaining to him in various counties in different periods of his life in which the locations were probably the same, only the name of the county that embraced them have been changed. After study, however, one concludes that between 1723 and 1729 both inclusive, he moved with his family from Maryland to southern Virginia in the region just south of the present day Richmond (laid out in 1737): and that about 1737 he went to an area south and southwest of Lynchburg (established in 1786) settling near the modern town of Bedford (established 1782) in the county of Bedford where he died (1758) on his plantation.

That the land on which Mathew Talbot I settled permanently was eventually encompassed by Bedford County is evidenced by several deeds recording purchase and sale of lands by him, now (1949) on file in the Bedford County Court House. The original of his last will and testament may also be seen and examined there. Unfortunately, the age of the paper on and the fading of the ink made it impossible to have it satisfactorily photo copied and published as a part of this book.

It is obvious from the numerous existing records pertaining to his activities that Mathew Talbot I became a respected leader in the civic, religious and military affairs of his world. We read that "Mathew Talbot, Gentleman" was one of the justices of the County Court which; incidentally, held its first meeting (5 May 1746) at his house. Even before that by three years, Mathew Talbot I was concerned in administration of the law as is shown by the minutes of a Council held at the Capitol, 6 May 1743:

Present: The Governor, William Byrd, Cole Diggs, John Robinson, John Grymes, John Custis, John Tayloe, Philip Lightfoot.



"Ordered. That a New Commission Issue for Brunswick County and That Mathew Talbot be added."

NOTE: Study of the context anterior shows that this meant a new "Commission of the Peace." -RHF

One infers that the County Court continued to be held at the Talbot homestead in Bedford County until November 1754 when a "rude structure" was erected for county purposes.

Another activity of Mathew Talbot I was participation in defining the boundary line between Lunenburg County and its offshoot, Bedford County. That he took the oath of allegiance to the person and government of His Majesty King George II whose loyal subject he was throughout his adult life is well attested. Another civic service he rendered was to make up the list of tithables from the mouth of Falling River to the mouth of the Otter River. Later on he was again appointed to "list the tithables," this time from Tall River to Goose Creek.

Furthermore, "Mathew Talbot, Gentleman, the elder" was named to collect monies due Lunenburg County as set forth in Section VI of "An Act for Dividing the County of Lunenburg, and parish of Cumberland, and for altering the Court day in the County of Halifax (November 1753 and 27th of George II)":

And whereas the said county of Lunenburg, as it now stands entire and individual, is indebted to sundry persons in divers sums of money: and also there are due and owing to the said county divers sums of money, and quantities of tobacco which have been heretofore, and will be this year levied upon the tithable persons of the said county for paying the debts and defraying the contingent charges thereof; Be it therefore enacted by the authority aforesaid, that John Payne, Mathew Talbot, the elder, gentlemen, of the County of Bedford, and Peter Fontaine the younger, and Lyddal Bacon, gentlemen, of the County of Lunenburg, be hereby authorized and empowered to demand and receive of all and every person and persons indebted to the said county of Lunenburg as it now stands entire and individual, all debts and dues owing to them, and the same when by them received to apply in discharge of the several debts and owing there from: and the over plus, if any, shall pay and satisfy to the justices of the said county of Lunenburg and Bedford, in proportion to the tithables in each of the said counties, to be by them applied toward lessening the levies of the said counties, respectively.

Mathew Talbot I was a professed Church of England man. Moreover, he was a leader among churchmen for he was a vestryman for Cumberland Parish. As is well known, vestries in those days played a more important part in their communities than they do today for, in addition to applying themselves to church business and to the religious life of the parish, vestries were active in building and maintaining bridges and ferries, inspecting crops and, in general, concerned themselves with many aspects of public life. This vestry to which Mathew Talbot I belonged, early took steps to select sites for a chapel and a "reading house" near the Otter River and fork of the Roanoke. The church Mathew Talbot I served was Ferry Chapel. His name often appears as vestryman, the first time being in the minutes of October 15,

The church Mathew Talbot I served was Ferry Chapel. His name often appears as vestryman, the first time being in the minutes of October 15, 1730, "for laying the Parish Leavey," an account in which the value of payments was expressed not in pounds sterling but in pounds of tobacco. The minutes of one year later (October 12, 1731) ordered that "Mathew Talbot be Clerk of the Chapel" that was to be built at or near Flatt Creek. The last entry in the Vestry Book, which mentions the name of Mathew Talbot I was dated October 10, 1735. He served on the vestry much later than that however as his signature along with those of other vestrymen and of the Governor, Sir William Gooch, appears in 1748 on a contract for a new minister.

Aside from his activities in government and in the church, Mathew Talbot I was breadwinner, homebuilder, husband, and a father to a fairsized family. In these most important roles, the shadow of failure in business affairs, which may have darkened his stay in Maryland, does not seem to have attended his life in Virginia. There he was a planter providing not only food and other necessities for his family and his slaves, but cattle and fodder for use when pastures failed in winter months. His principal crop however was doubtless tobacco for that was the commodity on which the Virginia of provincial days depended heavily and which was used as currency in business affairs. The records show too that Mathew Talbot I "the elder" from time to time bought and sold land. For example, under the heading "Natural Conditions in Pittsylvania County as shown by Early Land Grants from an Old Surveyors Book" one finds the entry: "1745 Mathew Talbot 400 acres on South Side Staunton River beginning at the Catamount Shoals". And well before that his name appeared in connection with a grant of 1,037 acres in Raleigh Parish, Amelia County: June 10, 1737 was the date. One tract owned by Mathew Talbot I by its nature remains intact today and, except for timber perhaps, when it was granted to Mathew Talbot I. This was and is an island, 600 acres in extent, in the Staunton River below the mouth of Seneca Creek.

The name of Mathew Talbot I may also be found in the list of early land grants and patents under date of May 4, 1752: "To Mathew Talbot and others" 20,000 acres in Augusta on New River beginning at the mouth of Meadow Creek and running up and down the said New River, the Meadow Creek and the adjacent creek for complement.

Nearer his home in the original Lunenburg County, five deeds of farm properties bought or sold by Mathew Talbot I are recorded. All are fairly large tracts touching on a stream sometimes called "Wards Creek" and sometimes "Wards Fork.

2. Today this island, flat and largely covered with brush but nearly treeless, is entered from the north through the tiny hamlet of Long Island on Route 761 about 28 miles by road south of Lynchburg, Virginia.--RHF

October 6, 1746: "Colonial Samuel Cobbs" sold two tracts to (Mathew Talbot I, Gentleman"

June 1, 1747: David Lee sold to Mathew Talbot.

July 6, 1747: John Turner sold to Mathew Talbot•

April 4, 1748: "Mathew Talbot, Gentleman, of Lunenburg County" sold to Richard Davis.

April 3, 1751: Philip Young sold to Mathew Talbot.

Had all this virgin land been unpopulated as well as uncultivated, life for our colonial ancestors would have been far more pleasant? There were however, the redskins, those aboriginal inhabitants who naturally enough, resented the invasion of the white men. All through these westward reaches of Virginia, plantation owners and small farmers alike had, to maintain constant vigilance lest hostile Indians raid their homes, stealing, burning, and sometimes murdering and worse.

As is well known, protection of the lives of their wives and children, as well as of their property, forced all settlers in the "colonies" to form and maintain a militia for common defense. This need became even more acute when the French, further westward and to the north, sought to make numerous Indian tribes their allies to help them in their avowed purpose of driving the English out. It therefore is not surprising that Mathew Talbot I, a man fifty-five years of age when the French and Indian Wars broke out (1754) and a leader in his community should soon have been commissioned colonel of the militia.



History tells us that most of the fighting of the French and Indian Wars took place along the frontier further to the north. Nevertheless, Virginia as we know the state today suffered much from sporadic raids by bands of hostile Indians who in Bedford County were the Cherokees. Indeed the manning of the string of so-called forts established along the Alleghenies by the then Colonel George Washington, and the safety of the settlers entrusted to his charge, were a constant source of worry to Washington, the young commander-in-chief of the militia, and to his chief, the Royal Lieutenant Governor, Robert Dinwiddie.

Pertaining to the military activities of Colonel Mathew Talbot I in those uneasy times, there are several of his original letters preserved among the "Papers of George Washington," in the Division of Manuscripts of the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C. First in chronological order is the dispatch, headed "Otter River," to one Colonel Clement Read, apparently Colonel Mathew Talbot I's immediate military senior. In this, the writer stated: (I do everything I can to keep a few men out on the frontiers of this County but alas, I fear it will not be long" as all men were needed at this time of year (May) to plant corn for bread: and these men, continued Colonel Talbot, because of the insufficiency of public funds available could not be promised adequate wages to support them and their families at home. His: letter goes on to report news of bands of Indians, to tell of the uneasiness of the white settlers and of the fright of their womenfolk at the hostile attitude of the Indians who apparently were reconnoitering the settlements and the various plantations with an eye to later visits to steal and to kill. In this same communication, Mathew Talbot I writes of "my son James out scouting some 60 miles north of Winchester; and of "my son Matt" who was endeavoring to raise a party of some 25 woodsmen to go out after

A second letter dated May 8, 1758, and received by Colonel Mathew Talbot I, was from William Mead who wrote at James Turner's place on Goose Creek. He tells us of the murder of all of the family of one Thomas Morgan and of the sacking of his home and he begs Colonel Talbot to send reinforcements to his group of only seventeen which was then opposed by at least thirty Indians, so he said.

Colonel Mathew Talbot I in an agony of despair reported these and other matters. He stated to Colonel Read that Bedford County was demoralized by these bands of Cherokees which traveled through daily, robbing homes, stealing horses, murdering people. He urgently requested that men, arms, ammunition, and flints be sent him and, in another letter dispatched a few days later that his son Isham Talbot is returned to him to help.

All these affairs were recounted on May 24, 1758, to Colonel George Washington by the Honorable John Blair, President of the Virginia Council who had succeeded to the direction of the government upon the departure for England of Lieutenant Governor Dinwiddie. To quote him in part: "This provoked the Inhabitants to a great degree: Col. Talbot sent out Militia to Protect them." And he told Colonel Washington that he had ordered a strict inquiry to be made by "Col. Read, Col. Talbot and Col. Maury."

Most of his life in southern Virginia, Mathew Talbot I shared with his second wife, Jane Clayton, for Mary Williston Talbot, the wife of his youth, died 1 Oct 1736, leaving him with four boys. They are Charles Talbot, born 1723, Mathew Talbot II, born November 27, 1729, James Talbot, born November 7, 1733 and John Talbot, born July 13, 1735.

Mathew Talbot I married Jane Clayton in Bedford County, Virginia, on May 23, 1737, when she was about twenty-three years old. Nothing has been learned of her parentage except that her mother had been a Miss Isham and that she herself was a niece of William Randolph.

This union brought to six the total of Mathew Talbot I children, for Jane Clayton Talbot bore him two, another son and his only daughter. These children are: Isham Talbot, born November 3, 1738 and Martha Talbot, born August 25, 1740.

Mathew Talbot I died sometime in 1758 in his fifty-ninth year "sick and weak in Body" as he wrote in his last will and testament although hastening to add "but of Perfect Mind and Memory, thanks be given to Almighty God." This document, the original of which as stated is on file in Bedford County Court House, Bedford, Virginia was written January 4; 1778; and was recorded in Bedford County, 27 Nov 1758.

To his wife, Jane Talbot, he left fifty pounds current money (a goodly sum in those days when tobacco was so often used in place of scarce currency), a certain bay mare, sidesaddle and bridle. His sons John and Isham each also received fifty pounds. A godson, Abraham Chandler, and one Daniel Rains, received various bequests; and his just debts were to be paid. The remainder of the entire estate was to be sold, the Proceeds to be divided equally between "my loving wife, Jane Talbot, my sons Charles Talbot, Mathew Talbot, James Talbot, John Talbot, Isham Talbot, and My Daughter Martha Arthur." Another bequest was "my great Bible" which, as has been said before in this paper he left to Charles Talbot whose descendants possess it to this day.

This brings us to an end of the outline of information found by your compiler concerning Colonel Mathew Talbot I, Gentleman.

There can be no question that there was a connection between the Randolph's and the Ishams (an ancient family which hailed originally from Northamptonshire, England) for William Randolph (b. 1651) who came to Virginia from England about 1669, married Mary Isham of Bermuda Hundred. A son (grandson?), Isham Randolph, wed Jane Rogers; and they had a daughter Jane (who, incidentally, became the wife of Peter Jefferson and had Thomas, the third President of the United States). As far as discovered by the writer', however, these are the only two "Jane's" connected with the Randolph's in those early days; and no Jane Clayton is mentioned in either "The Randolph's of Virginia by Robert Isham Randolph nor in Isham Genealogy by Mary Alien Phinney, the two works on which the statements made in this footnote are chiefly based. —RHF.

The James Talbot Story:

(In 1983, Virgil Talbot completed a major work entitled, "The Talbots: Centuries of Service". Although Virgil Talbot did not copyright his work, it is important to understand that the work that follows is his. We have made no changes except for a few spelling corrections. The serious Talbot scholar will wish to obtain the complete work, available on microfilm from the LDS Church Library. [Thanks to my wife, Joan Brown Norwood, Virgil Talbot's Book was entered into the LDS Library for all to enjoy. This was with Virgil Talbot's permission. The call # is 1035574])

A Talbot and a Smith:

James Talbot was four years old when his mother Mary Anne Williston died in 1736. His step mother Jane Clayton Talbot, no doubt had considerable influence upon him. As we have seen, Matthew and Jane Talbot named their first-born, Isham. It is interesting that James was to name his first-born, Isham M. Talbot. We do not know what Isham M. Talbot's middle name was but we do know one of his sons was given the middle name of Moile (Moyle). It is in these later generations that the name crops up in the family genealogy.



As with his father, his brothers and some of his sons later, James Talbot became a member of the Bedford County, Virginia Militia. He was a lieutenant in 1755, taking the oath of allegiance to the King of England. He served in the French and Indian Wars and was listed as a wagon master when he died in 1777. Like other Talbots, he became a landowner. In 1757 he secured 190 acres on Seneca Creek in Bedford County from his brother Charles. In 1765 he evidently purchased 1,000 acres from Michael Cash in the same area. This may have been where he lived when, in early 1759, he married Elizabeth Smith of Gloucester County, Virginia.

Their first child was Isham M. Talbot, probably born on 3 Dec 1759. Nancy may have been next, for on 26 Aug 1779 she married Rowland Horsley. James Smith Talbot was born 24 May 1763. We do not know the birth dates of John, Martha and Sarah, except we believe Sarah was the youngest since she was under the guardianship of her Uncle John Talbot several years after her father's death. We would say she was quite young when James died. We do know Williston was born on 18 Nov 1770. Thus when her husband died in 1779, Elizabeth Smith Talbot was left with seven children under twenty-one.

James Talbot's death must have come suddenly for he left no will. His brother, John was named administrator of the estate. John had served in a similar capacity with his brother, Charles, in their father's affairs when he died in 1758. Robert Baber was one of the committee to take inventory and oversee the administration of the estate. Others were John Quarles, James Addams and John Anthony. The latter was the father of John Talbot's first wife.

James had a considerable amount of property for that period of time. He must have held property in Bedford and Campbell counties. There were at least seven slaves: Peter, Sue, Rose, Jane, Gloster, Barnabas and Humphrey. James Smith Talbot received Humphrey in the settlement. There were twenty head of cattle, two horses, 26 head of hogs and some sheep. Listed in the inventory were such items as: four beds, four axes, some books, one flax wheel, some Indian corn, a Dutch oven with hooks, looking glass, sugar box, steelyards (cotton scales], cow hides and a rifle gun.

James Smith Talbot may have been too young to remember the stirring speeches that came out of the House of Burgesses during the time of his Uncle's service there, but from that rebellious governing body care three men, who in later years, were described as the penman (Jefferson]; the sword (Washington); and the tongue (Patrick Henry]. By the time James Smith Talbot entered the teens, the winds of revolution were growing strong. Soon he would be marching off to war.

If revolution was the cry of some in the House of Burgesses in 1774, it was not so in 1657. England was the Mother Country and when mother spoke, the child listened. Even children rebel and so did Colonial Virginia. When the governor ordered the House of Burgesses dissolved Speaker John Smith voiced the refusal of the members to accept the governor's orders. In 1676, Nathaniel Bacon compelled John Smith to take an oath supporting Bacon's Rebellion, protesting the policies of Gov. William Berkeley.

John Smith of Purton [John Smith was my, Don L. Norwood's 7th great grandfather], Speaker of the House of Burgesses, was James Smith Talbot's great-great grandfather. Purton was an evolutionized version of Powhatan. This was the home of the Powhatan tribe of Indians. Their chief was Powhatan, the father of Pocahontas, the Indian maiden who, according to legend, saved the great Captain John Smith's life. The Smiths of Purton were not descended from Capt. John Smith, as far as we know, however, they may have been of some kin, John Smith of Purton was the son of the emigrant, Thomas Smith. They were of the Smiths from Walsham, Suffolk and Buckingham Counties and Norfolk, England. A descendant of John Smith, through James Smith Talbot's lineage, now lives in Norfolk, England. Dr. L. Talbot Hood, grandson of Dr. Isham Strother Talbot, bears the family names of his maternal and paternal ancestors.

It is not recorded when John Smith was born. We know that he married Anne Bernard in 1653. She was the daughter of Richard Bernard and Ann Corduroy, Richard Bernard died in 1650, leaving a widow who was to acquire several thousand acres of land granted by Sir William Berkeley. It is possible that the Purton estate came from some of Anne Bernard's holdings. In 1662, John and Anne Bernard Smith had a son,



named John also. This John Smith (II) was instrumental, along with Col. Lawrence Washington and others, in the creation of William and Mary College. The land upon which the college stands was owned by him. He is named as one of the college founders.

On 17 Feb 1680 he married Mary Warner [Mary Warner was the 6th great grandmother of Don L. Norwood], daughter of Colonel Augustine Warner and Mildred Reade. Mary had two sisters, Mildred and Elizabeth. Mildred, the oldest, married Colonel Lawrence Washington and became the grandmother of George Washington. Elizabeth Warner married her cousin, Councilor John Lewis and was the ancestress of Meriwether Lewis of Lewis and Clark fame.

Through their mother, Mildred Reade Warner, the three sisters were lineal descendants of **King Edward II** of England and Phillip of Hainaut, great granddaughter of Philip II of France. Through Edward II, the Warner sisters were descended from Rollo, the Norman leader and ancestor of William the Conqueror and of the Talbots.

On 1 Jun 1695 "at a quarter past two in ye morning, it being a Saturday," Phillip Smith was born to John and Mary Smith. Perhaps named for his distant French ancestor, Phillip was vestryman of Petsworth Parish and inherited "Fleet's Bay" estate in Northumberland County. On 19 Feb 1711 he married Mary Mathews, daughter of Baldwin Mathews, grandson of Gov. Samuel Mathews. Their third child was Elizabeth [**Don L. Norwood's 4th Great grandmother**]. Elizabeth Smith perpetuated her name in her son, James Smith Talbot He in turn named his son, Thornton Smith Talbot, Thornton's son, George, named his son, Thornton Smith Talbot (II). For generations the Smith name was a part of the proud heritage of the Talbot Family.

Philip Smith was born on 1 June 1695 in Gloucester County, Virginia. He married **Mary Mathews**, daughter of Baldwin Mathews, circa 1720. He died on 4 June 1743 in Fleets Bay, Northumberland County, Virginia, at age 48.

Philip Smith left a will on 25 May 1743 in Wiccocomico Parish, Northumberland County, Virginia.

Will of Phillip Smith dated: 25 May 1743 Northumberland County, Virginia.

In the name of God, Amen, I Philip Smith of the Parish of Wiccocomico in the County of Northumberland, Colony of Virginia, Gentleman, being very sick & Weak but of perfect sense & Memory do make & ordain this my Last Will & Testament in manner & form following ---Imprimus, I give my soul to God & my Body to the earth to be decently buried at the Discretion of my Executors hereafter named. Item, I desire that all my just debts be fully paid & satisfied as soon as may be after my decease. Item, I give to my Daughter Mary, the wife of Jesse Ball, Gentleman, five pounds curr.t money & do declare this legacy to be in full her part or portion which she can or may claim to my estate having heretofore given her a sufficient fortune. Item, I give my five daughters, Mildred, Elizabeth, Sarah, Jane, and Susannah each of them two hundred pounds sterling and one feather bed & plain furniture to be paid them as they attain the age of twenty one years or day of marriage which shall first happen & I do declare it to be my true Intent & meaning that in case either of them die before she attains the sd age or marries, her legacy shall be vested in and belong to the survivors of them, my said daughters, Mildred, Elizabeth, Sarah, Jane, and Susannah & to be paid to them as aforesaid. Item, It is my Will that my said five daughters last mentioned be provided for & maintained by my son Baldwin Mathews Smith till they become entitled to their fortunes, suitable to their estate and degree without any deduction or abatement out of their aforesaid legacy for the same. Item, As I have given my son a letter to Mrs. Dickey to let her know that I would make my son worth more than two thousand pounds with his estate at York ___th on Acct of his having Mrs. Fanny Burgis, he will be entitled at my decease and my true intent and meaning is that my son pay my aforesaid daughters the aforesaid mentioned legacy according to my will before mentioned and that my wench Peg be set free. Item, All the rest of my estate of what nature or quality forever whether real, personal or mixt, I give & bequeath to my son Baldwin Mathews Smith and his heirs forever and I desire that my estate may not be appraised. Item, I do appoint my loving brother, Mr. Augustine Smith, my nephew Mr. John Smith, and my son Baldwin Mathews Smith whole & sole execrs of this my last will and testament & I do desire my son in law, Jesse Ball & my friend Mr. Thos. Edwards to be my trustees to be aiding & assisting to my sd execurs in & about the execution of this same to each of which said executors and trustees I give a mourning ring and lastly I do revoke all other wills by me made and acknowledge this to be my last will & testament, in testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal this XXV Day of May 1743.

1743, and was President of that body and acting Governor of the Province when he died in 1750. He was the son of Major Lewis Burwell, who also was a member of the King's Council for a number of years, and who married Abigail Smith, a niece of Nathaniel Bacon.

The wife of Nathaniel Bacon was Elizabeth, daughter of Edward Kingswell, of King's Mill, which name is preserved as the name of a wharf on the site of the original plantation which descended to Bacon, and, he being childless, to his niece, Abigail Smith.

Philip Smith, Youngest son and child of John Smith of "Purton" and Mary Warner, was born 1 Jun 1695 and died in 1743. He married (19 Feb 1711) Mary Mathews, daughter of Baldwin Mathews, Justice of York County, grandson of Governor Samuel Mathews. Philip smith was vestryman, Petsworth Parish, 1714-1722. His brother, Augustine Smith, was vestryman in 1724 until 1733, when he declined reelection. Philip Smith died 4 Jun 1743. He inherited "Fleet's Bay" estate in Northumberland County. He made his brother, Augustine Warner Smith, his nephew, James Smith, and his son, Baldwin Mathews Smith, his executors.

Mary, the eldest daughter and child of Philip Smith and Mary Mathews, married John Lee, of Cabin Point, eldest son of Henry Lee and his wife, Mary Bland (great-aunt of John Randolph, of Roanoke), who were married about 1723-4. She was born, August 21, 1704. Henry Lee was born about 1691; d. between June 23 and August 25, 1747. He was the fifth son of Richard Lee and Letitia Corbin, his wife.

Elizabeth Smith, the third daughter and child of Philip Smith, was married to James Talbot, of Bedford County, Maryland, who died in 1770. He was a lieutenant in the French and Indian War.

Notes for Capt. John Norwood:

Capt. John Norwood Immigrated to Lower Norfolk County, Virginia before 15 August 1645. He then transported to Anne Arundel County, Maryland in 1649.

Capt. John Norwood is referred to in The New England History and Genealogy as "Professor John Norwood who went to Maryland, first as headright of Henry Sewell, orphan, among 20 others in 1645, when the territory was inhabited by Indians." He went first to explore the land and left his wife Anne and three children, Andrew, John, and Susannah in England. He probably had been over as early as 1642 to survey the land preparatory to emigration. He was in Elizabeth County, Virginia, from 1648 to 1649, where he had a quarrel with the Virginian Authorities over the Book of Common Prayer. He left for Maryland in 1650 with his children and one servant, Elizabeth Fletcher and became Sheriff of Arundel County. John had been granted a hundred acres of land for his transportations. He then owned Norwood's Fancy and, in 1665, a big swamp where the town of Annapolis now stands. He died intestate in 1672.

The progenitor of the Norwoods in Maryland, Captain John Norwood arrived in Maryland in 1649 from Virginia with a group of Puritans who refused to submit to the pressure of Governor William Berkeley to use the Anglican Book of Common Prayer in their church services. The group had obtained permission to relocate to Maryland from the Catholic Lord Baltimore, who was seeking to retain control of his colony in the face of the rise of Cromwell in England. These Puritans settled on the banks of the Severn River, in a settlement first called Providence, then Arundeltown, and eventually Annapolis, Maryland.

Captain John Norwood became the first High Sheriff of Anne Arundel County, and received lands (later patented as "Norwood") adjacent to Norwood's Creek (now called "Weems Creek") and featuring Norwood's Point (now called "Horseshoe Point") in what is now the Wardour section of Annapolis. He received his title "Captain" in the Battle of the Severn in March, 1655. The Anglican forces of Governor William Stone attempted to reestablish control over the Puritan areas of Maryland, but were defeated by the well organized Puritans. Captain John Norwood, as High Sheriff, took control of the captured prisoners.

Some sources say that Captain John Norwood (1605-1672) is the son of either Tyringham (1576-9/16/1629) and Anne (Boteler) Norwood, or his brother William and Agnes (Boteler) Norwood (sister of Anne). Tyringham and William were sons of John (d. 1588) and Anne (Tyringham) Norwood. John's father was Thomas Norwood, whose father was Robert, whose father was William (1475-1537), whose parents were Sir John (1440-1509) and Eleanor (Giffard) (1450-bef 1496) Norwood of Leckhampton Court. This last William's brother was Roger, progenitor of the Norwoods of Virginia, who were part of the Leckhampton, Gloucestershire, Norwood family.

History the Sheriff of Anne Arundel County, Maryland:

In England, the King appointed the Sheriff. He was known as the "King's man." In Maryland, the first Sheriff (1634) was the direct representative of the Lord Proprietor. His duties were to collect taxes, to maintain law and order, and to serve as Clerk of the Court. John Norwood, the first Sheriff of Anne Arundel County (1650), was paid in pounds of tobacco. He received ten pounds for serving any Writ, five for taking a bond, ten for imprisoning or releasing, twenty per day for tending a prisoner and ten for collecting public fees. Through the years, the Sheriff's responsibility and term of office have changed. From 1661 to 1669 the Sheriff had the additional duty of coroner. In 1698, he received additional salary for delivering public letters within the county.



Then in 1776, the Maryland Constitution made the office elective. Their terms changed from one year appointments to three year elected terms, then to two year terms, and finally four year terms in 1926. Today each of the counties of Maryland elect sheriffs. Their duties include enforcing the law, providing security for the courtrooms and operating the county jails. This ancient office is now accountable to the public but still has the responsibilities of protecting life and property.

John Norwood the First Sheriff of Anne Arundel County, Maryland:

John Norwood, the first sheriff of Anne Arundel County came to Maryland from Virginia in 1649 with three hundred religious "Independents". They settled near the Severn River in what is now Annapolis. Lord Baltimore appointed William Stone as Governor and Edward Lloyd as Commander of Anne Arundel County. Lloyd had the authority to appoint the sheriff and other offices in the county. Although state law called for yearly selection of sheriff; the same person was often re-appointed as was John Norwood who served from 1650 to 1662. In 1650, John Norwood received a warrant for 200 acres on the south side of the Severn River. He later purchased property on the Bay in Herring Creek Hundred (south county). In 1661, he was commissioned Captain in the State Militia. Norwood had command of all the forces from the head of the Severn on the north side to the south side of the Patapsco River.

In 1663, he was made a justice of the peace. Norwood died by 1664. There was some financial risk in holding the office of Sheriff. He collected fees and fines in pounds of tobacco and had to be wealthy enough to pay the fines for others up front. If the crops were successfully harvested of course, he expected to be repaid with interest. The sheriff took an oath similar to that in England. He promised to treat the rich and the poor "right" and serve lawfully and faithfully. He had many duties. As a court official he was responsible for organizing a smoothly run court. He impaneled the juries and was then responsible for carrying out judgments and sentences including arresting, taking into custody or whipping criminals, serving summons and executions, collecting fees, giving warnings, and building prisons, stocks and pillories. He would also collect fines, give rewards, and serve writs.

John Norwood arrived In Lower Norfolk County, Virginia, some time before August 15, 1645, for on this date a certificate of land was granted Mr. Mathew Phillips on the behalf of Henry Seawell an Orphant for the transportation of twenty persons, among them John Norwood. {New England History. General Register Vol. 47, t.'64)}

He was a member of "the Elizabeth River Church, and on the 10th of August, 1648, was ordered to render an account of the Glebe lands since Parson Harrison had deserted his ministerial office and refused to administer the sacraments with the church of England. So much dissatisfaction had arisen within the church that many members refused to attend, among them John Norwood, Richard Owings, Thomas Marsh, who were presented to the board by the Sheriff. It was partly for freedom of worship that these men left Virginia for the newly-established county of Ann Arundel, Maryland.

In 1650 John Norwood transported his two sons John and Andrew into the Province of Maryland, and in 1756 he brought in his servant Elizabeth Fletcher. For their transportation he received 230 acres of land called Norwood, lying on the west side of Chesapeake Bay, on the south side of the Severn River on Norwood's Cove, November 3, 1658. {Patents Q, f. 396}.

A warrant for 400 acres was granted John Norwood and Edward Dorsey of Ann Arundel County In 1651, {Patents 22, f. 98) and that same year on the 27th of October, a 200-acre tract called Norwood was surveyed for John Norwood in Calvert County adjoining the land of Thomas Mears, its southernmost boundary extending to the tract later known as Theobush Manning owned by Edward Dorsey and Thomas Manning. This land, which was due John Norwood for transporting himself and wife into the province, was patented August 3, 1658. {Patents Q, f. 78} Thus it is seen that these two men had adjoining tracts in both Ann Arundel and Calvert Counties. (See page 1)

In 1659 John Norwood demanded land for bringing in 4 persons, and 20 acres of land due for the transportation of his servant Elizabeth Fletcher in 1657, and a few weeks later "Norwood's Fancy" containing 400 acres, lying on the south side of the Severn River on the west side of Round Bay, and 100 acres called "The Intacke", on the south side of the Severn River and the west side of Darcys Creek, were surveyed for him. (Patents 4, folios 258, 257) (See page 5) On February 15, 1661, he entered rights for transporting 6 persons into the province. {Patents 5, f. 90)

John Norwood was appointed Sheriff of Ann Arundel County in 1655, which office he held for a number of years. In 1661 a commission was granted to Capt. John Norwood to command all the forces from the head of Ann Arundel River on the north side thereof to the south side of the Patapsco River. In 1662 he was Justice of Ann Arundel County. {Archives of Maryland. III, 318, 348, 444, 449}

John Norwood died intestate in 1672. The administration of the estate of Capt. John Norwood was granted to Ann Norwood his widow on June 19, 1672. {Test. Proc. 5, f. 290) His estate was appraised by Thomas Marsh and John Bonnet on November 20, 1672. The inventory Included articles In the Inner Room, Mrs. Norwood's Room, Outer Room, Kitchen, the Outer Room containing Capt. Norwood's wearing apparel. {Invts. & Accts. 5, f. 383)

Ann Norwood, widow of Capt. John, married (2) 1672/3 James Boyd. Ann Boyd, wife of James, died in 1674 Intestate.

In 1673 Andrew Norwood son and heir to John Norwood late of Ann Arundell County, deceased, petitions this court, that whereas his father was in his life time possessed of consider-able land, and his father had left behind him seven children, the said Andrew being the eldest, that the said Andrew's mother Ann Norwood took letters of Administration and afterwards married James Boyd a young man, and the said Boyd and said Ann took over the administration and did order you petitioner out of doors.

The petitioner being loath to go to law with his own mother and thereupon to convey further trouble, he therefore prays that his mother be given her third by the High Sheriff and your petitioner be given the share that belongs to him. (Prov. Ct. Rec. M.M. f. 129).

On November 28, 1674 James Boyd submitted the Inventory of Capt. John Norwood, and on the same day the Inventory of his wife, Ann, was taken by William Jones and John Benson. It included a debt of 130 pounds of tobacco owed by John Dorsey. (Invts. & Accts. folios 142, 145).






Figure 2.11: Map of the Annapolis, Maryland Showing the Approximate Locations of Some of the Norwood Family & Neighbors Land Sites in Anne Arundel County, Maryland. [From Dorsey Book].






Figure 2.12: Norwood's Fancy, 1659, Page 958, 420 acres.

The account of James Boyd of Ann Arundell County, administrator of John Norwood late of said county deceased Intestate, administered by Ann Boyd the relict of said Norwood, was filed December 20, 1674.{Invts. & Accts. 1, f. 159).

In 1674 James Boyd of Ann Arundell County, administrator of the goods and chattels of Ann Boyd his wife, late widow and administrator of John Norwood deceased, came Into Court and Showed that of the 21,751 pounds of tobacco from Capt. John Norwood's estate, Ann's portion of one-third was 7,250 pounds and the two-thirds to which the children were entitled was 14,501 founds. (Test. Proc. 7. f. 58)

In 1675 Andrew Norwood on behalf of himself and the other orphans of Capt. John Norwood again petitioned the court. Andrew contended that the said James Boyd made It appear when he presented the 21,751 pounds of tobacco to the court that he had finished the administration of the estate of John-Norwood, when it should have Included cattle and other things and 9,000 pounds of tobacco obtained in a Judgment against Dr. Neal. Andrew asked for that amount and the cattle and other things, and that he is appointed to make the division.

The, Judge upon search of the records found that Ann Norwood took

administration of the goods and chattels of her husband June 17, 1672 and that the commission was issued to Robert Burle to take bond for 50,000 pounds of tobacco, and that the said Ann the 13th of November following, when the administration of the goods and chattels of Jacob Neal by Thomas Marsh showed the said Norwood's account against Neal was 8,933 pounds of tobacco due the said John Norwood's estate, failed to include this in her Inventory on November 20, 1672, and therefore said Boyd cannot be charged with the bond of Ann Norwood. {Test. Proc. 7, f. 123)

By the year 1648, freedom of worship in Virginia had been prohibited and life there became less attractive. As a result, many settlers turned to the newly erected county of Anne Arundel in Maryland, where alluring inducements to obtain land were being offered, and where; freedom of worship was said to be guaranteed. Among those who went, were Edward Dorsey, John Norwood, Matthew Howard, Thomas Todd, and Nicholas Wyatt. (See pages 190,192,197, 203).

Most of these men, however, maintained a close association with Virginia, and on November 15, 1652, Edward Dorsey and four others who had gone to Maryland, returned to Virginia, where Francis Fleetwood received a grant of land for their transportation. (Patents 3.



State of Virginia, f. 179).

In November 1650, Edward Dorsey of the County of Ann Arundel was granted a warrant for 200 acres of land in Maryland, and in 1651, for 200 acres more, half of a warrant for 400 acres granted John Norwood and the said Dorsey. The omission of the descriptions of these surveys makes it impossible to determine the location of these tracts of land. (Patents 11, f. 98) (See pages 8 and 10).

A tract of land called Norwood, containing 200 acres, was laid but in Calvert County, on October 27, 1651, for John Norwood of Ann Arundel County, planter, on the west side of Chesapeake Bay adjoining the land of Thomas Mears. (Patents A.B. & H, f. 264).

On August 3, 1658, there was laid out for John Norwood of Ann Arundel County, 200 acres of land called Norwood, on the west side of the bay and adjoining the land of Thomas Mears that had been granted him for having transported himself and wife Ann into the Province; and on February 8th of the same year, there was granted the said John Norwood, 230 acres, also called "Norwood", for having transported his sons John and Andrew into the Province in the year 1650, and his servant Elizabeth Fletcher in the year 1657. This land lay on the west side of Chesapeake Bay and on the south side of the Severn River, beginning at Norwood's Cove running northwest up the river to a creek called Norwood's Creek, Bounding on the north by the said creek running south west by west to a marked pine by the creek side, on the west by a line drawn south and by east from said Pine to a marked oak, on the south by a line drawn northeast and by east from said oak unto land formerly laid out unto Nicholas Wyatt of the said county, planter, and by the said land unto Norwood's Cove and on the east by said Cove and River (Patents Q, folios 78, 396) (See page 5).

To the west and north across Darcy's Creek, which no doubt bears the name of the immigrant, were the tracts taken up by Edward Dorsey and Capt. John Norwood, with the land of Nicholas Wyatt lying between.

The Warner Family of Warner Hall:

The first Augustine Warner (1611-1674) arrived in Virginia in 1628 at the age of seventeen, as one of a group of thirty-four brought in by Adam Thoroughgood. It was seven years before Warner accumulated enough assets to make his first land acquisition, patenting two hundred fifty acres in 1635.

He continued the typical pattern of seventeenth-century success in Virginia as a merchant, investor in land, and statesman. He rose through the colonial hierarchy to become a member of the House of Burgesses in 1652 and then in 1659 a member of the Council, the highest office a colonial Virginian could attain. There he continued until his death in 1674. He was prosperous enough by 1657 to send his son to school at the Merchant Taylors School in London. At about this time he moved across the York River to Gloucester County, where he settled and built the first house at Warner Hall.

Augustine Warner died in 1674, at the great age, for a seventeenth-century Virginian, of sixty-three, and was succeeded at Warner Hall by his only son, the second Augustine Warner (1642-1681). After his English education in London and at Cambridge, the younger Augustine Warner returned to Virginia, and soon, by 1666, became a member of the House of Burgesses, and then Speaker of the House in 1676. In 1677 he took his seat on the Council, but his career was cut short by his early death in 1681 at the age of thirty-nine.

A fascinating glimpse of Warner Hall and insight into the Warners' activity as merchants is afforded by the affidavit of their cousin John Townley, who was overseer in charge at Warner Hall in September, 1676, when Bacon's Rebellion took place and Bacon invaded Warner Hall. Townley tells how he had been entrusted with the guidance of the house and family as overseer, and had "also delivered to him by Inventory all the household goods and other merchandizing goods and stores in and belonging to the said Colonel Warner and laid up and stored in his said house and storehouses thereto belonging, the Keyes of which houses and storehouses were demanded and commanded from him by the said Bacon and those with him; which Keyes being afterwards in the hands & keeping of Captain William Bird."

The walled family cemetery of the Warner and Lewis families is located on the Warner Hall property, southeast of Warner Hall. Access to the Graveyard is from the road North of Warner Hall and not from Warner Hall or the Driveway to Warner Hall located West of the Graveyard. The cemetery is the final resting place for many of the Warner and Lewis family members. The family cemetery is also the resting place for such well known ancestors of George Washington, Robert E. Lee, The Queen Mother of England, and Queen Elizabeth II. Queen Elizabeth has visited Gloucester where she placed a wreath upon her ancestor's grave. The cemetery has thirteen graves and plaques in memory of all the family. The cemetery is owned and maintained by the Association for Preservation of Virginia Antiquities (A.P.V.A.). The A.P.V.A. acquired the cemetery at Warner Hall in 1903, since which time the Association's Gloucester Branch, now known as the Joseph Bryan Branch, has zealously maintained it.

According to his report, Captain Bird shortly after coming to Warner Hall took a plate-handled scimitar and black-fringed shoulder belt belonging to Warner and wore them while there, and was still wearing them about a fortnight later when John Townley again saw him at Colonel Warner's house at "Chieskake." He tells how Bird at Warner Hall opened the stores and chests and issued the goods to the armed

men, who carried them away. He took particular notice that when Bird was delivering out the goods and "mett with any ffine goods, as Silke ffine Hollands, or other ffine linnings, silke Stockings Ribband, or the like he sent them into Bacons roome, where he was often called in and was very Conversant."

After the intruders were gone, John Townley, on the understanding that they intended to return, packed of the remainder of the goods and put them on board the ship <u>Lady Frances</u>, taking an inventory so that he knew what was missing and that the true value of the purloined goods was 845 pounds 2 shillings sterling. His deposition, which he sighs, is followed and confirmed by the testimony of William Blackburne and William Sympson, servants, and Richard Scarlett, a freeman and sharer, all living at Warner Hall.

Besides the son Augustine Warner the second, the first Augustine Warner (1611-1674) had at least two daughters. One married David Cant, and the other, Sarah, married Lawrence Townley, and was the ancestor of General Robert E. Lee.

It has always been well recorded and understood that the second Augustine Warner (1642-1681) had three sons, all of whom died unmarried, and three daughters, who inherited the Warner property and left huge progenies. What is less commonly noticed is that at least two, if not all three of the sons survived their father, and were in possession until their deaths, so that only then did the daughters and their husbands come into the bulk of the property. We have exact dates for only one of the sons, Augustine (1666-1687), the third of the name. It seems that George Warner must have survived this brother, and been the last Warner to own Warner Hall, for in a 1728 land grant the heirs of the three sisters are referred to as the heirs of George Warner, suggesting that it was from him the three sisters finally inherited.



The three were, of course, Mary Warner, who married in 1680 **John Smith of Purton**, Mildred Warner, who married about 1690 Lawrence Washington, and Elizabeth Warner, who married about 1691 John Lewis, and kept the Warner Hall house itself in the division of the Warner properties after the brothers' deaths. From Mary descends the present Queen of England. Mildred was the grandmother of George Washington. Elizabeth was the grandmother of Fielding Lewis, who married first George Washington's cousin and second his sister, both ladies also being grandchildren of Mildred Warner.

When it comes to ancestry, there has never been any mystery about Mildred Reade, the wife of the second Augustine Warner. The Reades trace back through Windebank and Dymoke, Champion of England, to the blood royal. However, the ancestry of the Warner family and the identity of Mary, wife of the first Augustine Warner, were completely unknown until comparatively recently. This always seemed odd, because the name Augustine Warner was distinctive, he obviously came from an educated class, he used a coat of arms, and it seemed reasonable to expect to find records.

It remained for a very able scholar, Mrs. Mary Derrickson McCurdy, of Chapel Hill, North Carolina, to notice a clue in Raine's edition (2883) of Dugdale's 1664-5 <u>Visitation of Lancaster</u>. Mrs. McCurdy had been studying the Townley family, and came across a chart in this visitation of a branch of the Townley family which included the marriage of a Mary Townley to an Augustine Warner. Proceeding from here, she developed a magnificent essay in the July, 1973, <u>Virginia Magazine of History and Biography</u>, which gives Augustine Warner's ancestry, identified his wife as Mary Townley, and shows several other connections of the Townleys with the Warners and other early Virginia families. It is from Mrs. McCurdy's article that the account of Bacon's invasion of Warner Hall is copied (<u>supra</u>).

It is interesting to follow the given name Augustine through these families. In the 1400's there was an Augustine Boyce in Norwich, Co. Norfolk. His grandson, Augustine Steward (1491-1571), frequently Mayor of Norwich, in turn had a grandson, Augustine Sotherton (ca1550-1585), an Alderman of Norwich. His daughter Elizabeth Sotherton married Thomas Warner of Hoveton, near Norwich, and they were the parents of our first Augustine Warner (1611-1674) in Virginia. From his granddaughters, of course, the given name of Augustine has continued to this day in the Smith and Washington families, but apparently not in the Lewis family. On the other hand, the name Warner persisted as a given name in the Washington and Lewis families, but not with the Smiths.

Warner Hall stayed in the eldest male line of the Lewis family, through a succession of eldest sons named Warner Lewis, until 1834, when it was finally sold by a daughter of the last of them, Elizabeth Lewis.

He married in 1608 in Leckhampton Court, Leckhampton, England Elizabeth Stuart [9792], daughter of Nicholas Stuart [9791]. Richard Norwood-9479 is the 8th great grand uncle of Donald Loyd Norwood. Their common ancestors are William Norwood-9477 and Elizabeth Lygon-9478. He matriculated from Jesus College, Oxford with his brother William Richard Norwood, Esquire, Lord of Down Hatherley, son and heir of William Norwood and Elizabeth Lygon, was born about 1573. He matriculated on January 1, 1586 at Jesus College, Oxford, with his brother William Norwood at the age of 12. About 1600, he married Elizabeth Stuart, daughter of Nicholas Stuart, LLD. of Hartley Mauduit, Hampshire. Nicholas was the 6th son of Simeon Styward of Lakenheath, Suffolk. Nicholas matriculated as a pensioner at Trinity College, Cambridge in 1560, receiving an LLB in 1568, LLD in 1574. Nicholas purchased Hartley Mauduit manor in 1614. He was an M.P. for Cambridge 160U-11. His will proved in the P.C.C. June 25, 1633. Recorded as Richard Norwood. Gentleman, of Down Hatherley manor, Gloucestershire, in the 1608 census of arms. As such, he was responsible for 1 musket. Richard died 2 years before his father on January 12, 1630, and was buried at St. Peter's, Leckhampton, where a stone in the south chapel records: "Here Lyeth the Body of Richard Norwood the Eldest Son of William



Norwood Esquire, who deceased the 10th day of January, Anno Domini 1630" On 23 March 1648, Elizabeth Norwood, Uphatherley, widow, was on a list of Papists. She had estates having a yearly value of 80 lbs. Uphatherly was probably one of her dower properties, she most likely still living at Leckhampton Court. An Alexander Norwood, of unknown relationship, appears at Uphatherly about this time. On May 11, 1649, Elizabeth was still living at Leckhampton with her son Francis when accused of papacy (see chapter under Francis).

There is a brass (Please refer to Chapter 16) in Saint Peters Church in Cheltenham, England to Elizabeth and William, 2 daughters and 9 sons. Elizabeth was William's cousin. Both were descendants of the famous Berkeley family. There is an unusual brass in memory of Elizabeth Lygon Norwood in St. Peters Church in Cheltenham. In the center are William Norwood and Elizabeth kneeling while above them is a coat of arms, combining the arms of the Norwood and Lygon families. Back of Elizabeth are two little girls, Eleanor and Elizabeth. Back of William are their nine sons. The translation of the Latin inscription reads:

"Elizabeth Norwood, wife of William Norwood, Esquire to whom she bore nine sons, two daughters, having lived fifty years, she piously and peacefully died in Christ, on April 16, 1598.

I who eleven times did multiply myself on earth, cannot in one death die,
Rather my lively spirit both worlds shall roam,
Heaven is my soul's ---earth is my off-springs home,
If I then freely range both spheres of space
I perish not in any resting place."

William Norwood, son and heir of Henry Norwood and Catherine Throckmorton, was born about 1548. Six years old at his father's death, he was 13 and heir to his grandfather when he died in 1561. William was registered as a fellow at New College, Oxford in 1564 at 16 and admitted as a law student at the Middle Temple in London 13 November 1569. He was fined 20sh. for missing Mr. Popham's lecture on 1 November 1568 and Mr. Fleetwood's lecture on 20 May 1569. When William became 21 in 1569, he became Lord of Leckhampton Court and therefore also patron of St. Peter's church. He was recorded as such at the installation of Rev. Ralph Gynes as vicar of St. Peter's Church in 1570.

William Norwood studied law and was a High Sheriff of Gloucester in 1606. He was present at the Coronation of King Charles I in 1625.




Figure 3.5: St. Mary the Virgin's Church, Cheltenham.

William Norwood having come into his inheritance, on the 18 October 1569, he married Elizabeth Lygon at St. Mary's church in Cheltenham. She was the daughter of William Lygon (d.1567) of Madresfield, Worcestershire and his wife, Eleanor Dennis, daughter of Sir William Dennis. Elizabeth was a descendant of King Edward I and Margaret of France. A staunch Catholic, Mr. William Norwood of Leckhampton is listed as a 'recusant' in 1577 in the papers of Richard Cheyney, Bishop of Gloucester.

For several centuries the home of the Norwood Family was Leckhampton Court in Gloucester, England. It was near the town of Cheltenham. William Norwood acquired the original part of the manor in 1589. This ancient manor house was constructed entirely of stone. Even the roof was of rough stone tiles, which were supported by immense, rough-hewn wooden timbers. It was situated among the Cotswold Hills. The main body of the house was built in the 14th century when a grant of 2500 acres in Gloucester was given to a branch of the Norwood Family, John Northwood (1455-1509) who was married



to Eleanor Giffard. Later wings were added on each side, the last one in 1592 was probably built by William.

The rooms were very large and it is said that it was almost a half-mile to go from the end of one wing to the end of the other. King Henry V was entertained there after the Battle of Agincourt and Edward VIII was a guest in latter times.

In 1583 William sold part of the manor of Gilling, Yorkshire, inherited from John de Etton, to William Barton (d.1598). By 27 May 1590, William had leased Cheltenham manor from Queen Elizabeth I, becoming the first resident lord of the manor since King Henry VIII had confiscated it from Syon Abbey in 1539.

William was engaged in many lawsuits over rentals due from this property to the parish church, St. Mary's. However, tithes due from this manor were not the only revenues due to the church. Cranmer's "Book of Common Prayer" and the Act of Uniformity had been accepted in Cheltenham without much opposition. Richard Pate, a neighbor and future in-law was a known Protestant, but we can safely assume William was a Papist, or continued as a practicing catholic, as he was one of only 3 Cheltenham people who failed to attend church regularly.

In a public record office calendar of ancient deeds, without stating why, is a quitclaim in English, dated 28 November 1590, 32nd year of the reign of Elizabeth I, (1590) by William Norwood of Leckhampton, esq. to Sebastian Harvie of Mardice, esquire, of all claims except law costs in respect of an indenture date 24 November. Scaled and signed: Signature

In 1593, William and Elizabeth mortgaged Leckhampton manor to various in-laws. The property consisted of the manor, with 60 messuages and 24 pounds of rent in Leckhampton and Uphatherly manors. It was all mortgaged to William Lygon, esq., George Blount, esq., John Stuart, esq. and Augustine Stuart for 800 pounds. Also in this year, one of his servants, Nicholas Alwicke, registered his will in the Gloucester Consistory Court.

In 1597, Queen Elizabeth leased the Cheltenham manor property to her Lord Chancellor, Francis Bacon, Lord Verulam. He sublet to Mrs. Elizabeth Baghott, who was from a family of cloth merchants, her first husband being Thomas Higgs from nearby Charlton Kings. She was a character who was always in court over neglect of hedges and ditches

and quarrels with her neighbors. John Stubbes, William's understeward, recorded a detailed record of her misdeeds.




Figure 3.8: The Main Door of Leckhampton Manor.

Two years later in 1598, William fought for control of the affairs of the court of Pie Powder against the High Bailiff.

On July 1 1599, Anne Fogge of London, widow, late wife of Richard Fogge, Esquire, leased to Sir Henry Berkeley of Bruton, Somerset, Knight, Anthony Culpeper, George Blount and Thomas Culpeper, Esquire, the manors of Dane

Court and Southcourte, etc. for 21 years for 60 lbs. per year. This was sealed in the presence of Richard Fogge, Thomas Browne, Henry Norwood and Thomas Hawkins.

William remarried shortly thereafter (license dated 8 July 1599) at St. James, Clerkenwell, London, this Anne Sackville Fogge, of Little St. Bartholomew, London and Sadlescombe, Sussex, born 1555, daughter of Christopher Sackville and widow of Richard Fogge of Dane Court, Tilmanstone, Kent, esq. (d. Oct. 1598 age 50). William was at this time High Sheriff of Gloucester in 1606.

William deposed in the Exchequer January 16, and April 16, 1607 at Cheltenham as plaintiff with William Whithorne and Richard Hale versus Thomas and Richard Cartwright, Esquire defendants regarding lands in Charlton Kings (parish next to Leckhampton) held of the manor of Cheltenham.

In 1608, a survey found in Cheltenham 128 people working on farms and fields and 28 as servants in the great houses. In town were 6 tanners, 13 shoemakers, 13 tailors, 12 weavers, 12 maltsters, 1 cooper, 8 carpenters, 6 butchers, 4 bakers, and 1 each chandler, smith, wheelwright and scrivener.

In a bond dated 20 November 1616, Thomas Fogge of Clerkenwell, Middlesex, esquire, to Samuel Peyton of Knolton, Kent, knight & baronet, for 1400 lbs. for fulfilling covenants in an indenture between Thomas Fogge, William Norwood, Esquire and wife Anne, John Sackville, Esquire and Andrew Sackville, Gentleman on the 1 part and Sir Samuel Peyton, Sir Robert Darell and Thomas Hales, Esquire on the other. Also to fulfill an indenture of 1 November 1616, between Thomas Fogge and wife Sibell, William Norwood and wife Anne, Terringham Norwood, Esquire, Richard Lovelace, Esquire, Sir John Shirley, Knight, Thomas Sackville, esq. on the one part and Sir Samuel Peyton on the other.

William Norwood's lease of Cheltenham manor expired in 1617.

In 1618, Charles, Prince of Wales, sold the lordship of the manor for 1200 lbs. to John Dutton of Sherbome, the connection to the crown then ceasing. Even though James I issued a proclamation in 1619 making tobacco cultivation illegal, most of the poor farmers of Cheltenham were now making a good living from its production, passing it off as "Virginian".

At the age of 71, William had his portrait painted in 1619 (Figure 3.10). It was in the possession of a descendant, C.B. Trye in November 1935. It is now on display at the Cheltenham Art Museum.

William was fined 52 lbs. 10 sh. for not accepting a knighthood at the Coronation of King Charles I in 1625.

William died 23 September 1632. He is buried in the south chapel, Leckhampton Church under a flat stone, in the south aisle. Monumental inscription, under the Norwood arms says: "Here lies buried the body of William Norwood, Esquire, who died 23 September 1632"

Colonel Henry Norwood, grandson of William Norwood, born in 1615 and died 14 Sep 1689 was active in the Royalist cause at the outbreak of civil war in England. In 1649, after the beheading of Charles I, Henry fled with friends to Virginia where his cousin, Sir William Berkeley, was governor. Henry was the author of "A Voyage to Virginia", describing their trip. In 1658 Henry returned to Holland, then to England and was active in the efforts to restore the STUARTS. At the Restoration in 1660, Henry took part in the coronation ceremony of Charles II as Esquire of the Body. Henry was made treasurer of Virginia 1661-1673 (apparently an absentee position which consisted mainly in being the recipient of the "Quitrents"). Henry was appointed governor to Tangier - an active post - and lived there for some time. He was never

married; he returned to England and bought Leckhampton from his cousin, Francis Norwood. Henry Norwood is buried in Leckhampton Parish Church with his grandfather, William who died in 1632.

Nicolas Martiau, "Father of Yorktown" my 9th Great Grandfather:

Nicholas Martiau is the 9th great grandfather of Don L. Norwood. My Line of Descent extends as: Don L. Norwood, Mae Elizabeth Rauch, John William Rauch, Sarah Catherine Talbot, Thornton Smith Talbot, James Smith Talbot, Elizabeth Smith, Philip Smith, Mary Warner, Mildred Reade, Elizabeth Martiau, Nicholas Martiau.

This portion of my book is dedicated to the study of Nicolas Martiau (pronounced Mar-ti-o) and his descendants. Nicolas became the earliest American ancestor of both President George Washington and Governor Thomas Nelson. Nicholas "The Adventurous Huguenot" was a Captain in the Jamestown Virginia Militia during the Indian uprisings, a Yorkshire Justice during 1633-1657, a Member of the Colonial Virginia House of Burgess, a Military Engineer, a Justice of the County of York, a Planter, a Wine Maker and he was known as the "Father of Yorktown". In 1635 he was a leader in the thrusting out of Royal Governor Sir John Harvey which was the first opposition to British Colonial Policy. He is the original patentee for Yorktown. He is buried at the Grace Church in Yorktown, Virginia. Presented here are some of the important facts about my ancestor.

Among the descendants of Nicholas Martiau we find - in addition to President George Washington - one Vice President of the United States, two Justices of the Supreme Court, three ministers to foreign countries, three cabinet officers, six governors of states, eight senators, eleven generals involved in the War Between the States, fifteen congressman, forty commissioned officers who served in the American Revolution, and a veritable host of men and women prominent in national life. Such names as General Thomas Nelson, a signer of the Declaration of Independence; Meriwether Lewis, explorer of Lewis and Clark fame; Duff Green; Thomas Nelson Page and Amelia Rives are of special interest.

In the early 20th century the registrar of the Colonial Dames of America in the state of Virginia contains the names of more than four hundred women who could trace their lineage to Nicholas Martiau.

Nicolas Martiau was born in France in 1591 in Ile De Rhe although there is no substantive proof. Perhaps he was an orphan. He entered service and became a Military Engineer. He went or fled to England where he was a "servant" of the 5th Earl of Huntingdon and a member of the established Huguenot Church.

While still quite young, Nicolas Martiau went to England, where he fell under the influence of the powerful Earl of Huntingdon. At the latter's instance, Martian was educated as a military engineer—for it will be remembered that in this era engineering as a profession was still largely confined to military engineering, especially fortification. During his life in England Martiau also became a naturalized Englishman; and as he later held various offices in Virginia, his naturalization was plainly of the special form granted only by royal decree, which form alone permitted the recipient to hold office and enjoy certain other privileges.

The Earl of Huntingdon was one of the members of the Virginia Company, that private corporation which was entirely responsible for the initial colonization and development of Virginia. About the year 1619 the colonists petitioned the Company for an expert to be sent to Virginia to plan and construct fortifications, badly needed for defense against the Indians. Huntingdon, we may be sure, was instrumental in securing the appointment of his young protégé to this position; and in June of 1620 Martiau arrived in Virginia, where he continued to act as representative for the Earl's extensive interests. The Virginia Census of 1624 shows "Capt. Niccolas Martue" as having come to Virginia in the "Francis Bonaventure", sailing from England on May 11, 1620.

Nicolas Martiau was given the rank of Captain in the Virginia Militia and put in charge of the work of planning fortifications. It is interesting to note that three places were selected by him for immediate fortification; and of the three one was Old Point Comfort, now the site of our principal fort for the defense of Chesapeake Bay: Fort Monroe, Virginia. After the disastrous uprising and massacre by the Indians in 1622 he was stationed with a company of the militia at Falling Creek, well up the James River.

Martiau first resided at Elizabeth City, Virginia; and from this community he was elected a member of the House of Burgesses, sitting in the Assembly of 1623-4 (Journals of the House of Burgesses 1619 1658/9, Pp. viii et al.). In 1624 or 1625 he married the young Jane Berkeley, widow of Lieut. Edward Berkeley; the exact date of the marriage is not known, but on December 12, 1625 Martiau wrote to the Earl of Huntingdon: "I am now both a husband and a father". At Elizabeth City, in 1625, was born Elizabeth Martiau, the oldest child of Nicolas and Jane Martiau; and the family continued to reside at Elizabeth City for several years after this event.

Martiau became the possessor of a considerable amount of land in Virginia during the course of his lifetime. About the time of his marriage he acquired a large tract of land which included the present city of Yorktown, Virginia. It is noteworthy that Martiau was the earliest Virginia ancestor of George Washington, among others; and when Washington in 1781 proceeded against Cornwallis at Yorktown he camped his troops on land previously owned by his ancestor-and the surrender of Cornwallis took place also on the old Martiau tract. In 1630 the Martiau family took up its residence permanently on this tract at Yorktown, then called "Kiskyake" or "Cheskiacke". Nicolas Martiau was again elected to the House of Burgesses as the representative of Kiskyake and the Isle of Kent, sitting in the Assemblies of 1631-2, 1632 (beginning Sept. 4th), and 1632-3 (assembled Feb. 1, 1633) (Ibid., Pp. xii, xiii, xiv). He was appointed by Governor Harvey as a Justice of York County, which office he held for more than twenty years; his first appearance as a member of York County Court was on July 12, 1633, and his last appearance on September 24, 1655.

As mentioned previously above, Martiau played an important part in the political life of Virginia in his day. One of his minor appointments in 1639 was as one of the Tobacco Viewers for Charles River County "Men of Experience and in dignity for the Careful Viewing of each Man's crop of Tobacco"-the Viewers being selected by the Assembly (Virginia Magazine of History and Biography, Vol. 5, P. 119). Nor did he fail to increase his land holdings. In March of 1639 "Captain Nicholas" Martiau was granted 1300 acres in the County of Charles River; of this tract 700 acres was granted for the transportation into the colony of fourteen persons, while 600 acres was granted for the migration of himself, his wife and ten persons to Chiskiack in its first year (Ibid., Vol. 14, P. 191). Chiskiack, or Yorktown; was at first a frontier settlement, exposed to attack by Indians, and grants of land were given to those who would settle there; but in 1644 this danger was removed by the migration of the Chiskiack Indians from the York River to the Pianketank, where the tribe died out. Martiau also secured two grants of land in Westmoreland County-one in 1654, and one in the following year-each grant being for two thousand acres (Westmoreland



Deed Book No. 3, Pp. 312, 363).

Undoubtedly the most important part in Virginia history played by Captain Nicolas Martiau was in connection with the ejection of Governor Harvey. Opposition to Harvey's methods and high-handedness became general in the colony during the winter of 1634-5, and meetings were held at various places to voice this opposition. Meetings were at the Martiau home, among others; and this led to the arrest by the governor of Martiau, Captain Francis Pott, and Sheriff William English of York. These three were placed in irons by order of Harvey, who announced his intention of hanging them; but the opposition to him was so strong, even in the Council and House of Burgesses, that he was forced to release them; and Harvey was himself placed under a heavy guard.

Harvey being reduced to ineffectiveness as governor, he was forced to return to England to appeal for the support of the Crown in his struggle with the colonists. He returned for a time to Virginia, bringing with him the young George Reade of whom we shall hear more later; but his views were so arbitrary and unsympathetic that he was soon forced to leave Virginia for a second and final time. George Reade had become acting Secretary of State of the colony in the absence of Richard Kemp, then in England, and upon Harvey's final departure Reade became acting governor. Martiau was one of the outstanding leaders in the movement of the colonists which caused Harvey's deposition.

In going over the early records mentioning Martiau's name, searchers originally believed the spelling of his name to be Martian; and for a number of years he was referred to as Nicholas Martian. However, there have come to light a considerable number of documents bearing his signature-and it is unmistakably "Nicolas Martiau". See figure below for his signature.

Nothing is known of the ancestry of Nicolas Martiau's 1st wife, who was the widow Jane Berkeley at the time of her marriage to him. Her first husband, Lieut. Edward Berkeley, was a member of the Berkeley family which founded the first iron works in the colony at Falling Creek; and he was living at the time of the Muster of 1624 (Feb. 16, 1623/4) (Hotten, P. 184); but no record of his marriage exists, and there is no other evidence of Jane Martian's maiden name or origin. She came to Virginia in the ship "Seaflower" ("Seafloure"), as shown by the Muster of 1624, arriving in February 1621/2. It has been said that she may have been one of the "Doves" who were imported to Virginia to become wives to the colonists; but a thorough survey of the facts shows this to have been impossibility (Virginia Magazine of History and Biography, Vol. 42, P. 145). The minutes of the Council and General Court of Virginia for July 5, 1627 relate that "At this court Mrs. Jane Martiau delivered in an Inventory of the Estate of Lieut. Eduard Bartley, deceased, upon her oath."

The Huguenot Society of London has a record of Nicolas Martiau, age 24, being a sponsor of a young boy of a family for baptism in a Huguenot Church there on 11 May 1615. He sailed on 11 May 1620 for Virginia on the ship Francis Bonaventure. He arrived in Jamestown, Virginia in August 1620 as part of the London Company. He would be 29 years of age but references say he was age 33.

Nicolas' reason for coming to America was that he was the agent for

Lord Henry Hastings, 5th Earl of Huntingdon. He was a naturalized English citizen by Royal decree, and schooled in military engineering. He served as a Captain in the Colonial Militia. He served at the Virginia Iron Works at Falling Creek, with Lt. Edward Berkeley (Barkley or Bartley). The ironworks was the work of Sir John Berkeley who had been in Virginia since 1621.

During 1623 he was member of The House of Burgesses at Kicquotan perhaps while working on building of Fort Aigemon (before Fort Monroe). In 1624 he was at The House of Burgesses at Elizabeth City Borough, this was confirmed by a letter from Earl of Huntingdon on 8 July 1625. He married Jane Berkeley the widow of Edward Berkeley at Elizabeth City. She had a child named Jane. A daughter Elizabeth was born in 1626.

Nicolas received a grant (for transportation of persons) for 1,300 acres on the York River on 8 Oct 1630. He built a home on the bluff overlooking the York River. Yorke Village was located on Wormeley Creek. The new Town of Yorke was built on his property in 1691. His heirs, Benjamin and Lucy Reed sold this land, for 10,000 lbs. of tobacco w/cask 34 years after Martiau died.

In 1631 he was with the Burgess at Isle of Kent for interests of a friend William Claiborne. In 1633 he was at The House of Burgesses at Kiskyack Parish. During 1633-1657 the York County Justice Court was held in rotation in various Justice's homes, including Martiau's. The first time was in April 1635. In 1635 Nicolas participated in a "mutiny" against the Royal Governor Sir John Harvey.

During 1636-1637 he was possibly in England for a year. On 14 March 1639 he gets 1300 acres in Charles River County (later York) for transportation of 14 people.

In 1652 he is listed among Colonial Justices and Commissioners. His last public reference of an appearance was on 24 Sep 1655. Nicolas' wife dies and his will was made on 1 Mar 1656. A copy of his will is presented in this chapter of this book.

Nicolas died in 1657 and his will was proved 24 Apr 1657. He divides his estate between daughters Elizabeth. Mary and Sarah, and frees two of his Negroes giving each of them a cow and clothes, and a legacy to Hugh Roy, his servant of recent time.

Nicolas' daughter Mary Martiau married Col. John Sca(r)sbrook, who led troops in Bacon's Rebellion. Nicolas' daughter Sarah Martiau married Capt. William Fuller the Puritan governor of Maryland. His son Nicolas Martiau Jr. died at age 9. A small casket was found at the Nelson graveyard and re-interred at Grace Episcopal Church graveyard in York. The remains of Nicolas and his immediate family are buried in the Grace Episcopal Church graveyard.

Martiau's name was copied by a York clerk as Martin, causing some confusion. There was a St. Martin, the largest and fortified city on Ile de Rhe (Re, today). The Tower of St. Nicolas dominates the waterfront of La Rochelle easily seen from Ile de Re'. Both areas were Huguenot. Ile de Re still exports its wine today.

La Rochelle and Ile de Re' had heavy concentrations of French Protestants the Huguenots. There was persecution and killings in August 1572 Paris until the Edict of Nantes in 1598 granted religious liberty to all. Cardinal Richelieu of the French Court wanted the law revoked and pressed the battle and the fortified LaRochelle, France fell in 1628 after a four year war, causing many to leave for America, where they lived with other refugees in towns such as Manakin near Richmond, Virginia and some in Yorktown, Virginia.



On October 31, 1931 a large granite monument was dedicated to Nicolas Martiau by General John J. Pershing. The monument was placed near where the Martiau home was believed to have stood in Yorktown, Virginia, circa 1620. A subsequent structure burned down during the great fire of 1814. The current house, now occupied by Gin Tail Antiques, was built by Eugene Slaight in 1927. Gin Tail Antiques specializes in primitive period pieces from Virginia.




Figure 3.12: Yorktown, Virginia Tour Map.




Figure 3.14: Pictured Left is the Nicolas Martiau Home Site Memorial looking north down to the York River.




Figure 3.16: Grace Episcopal Church, Yorktown, Virginia.

A Martiau grave marker was completed and set in the Grace Church Cemetery. This slab has the official Huguenot emblem embedded. The slab is flush-to-ground in accordance to rules of the National Park Services and the Grace Church officials. (The remains of the Martiau Family were moved from another location.)

George Read, the son of Robert Read of London and his wife Mildred Windebank, was one of the about one hundred colonists, who emigrated to the colonies from England and Wales before the end of the 17th century, known to have legitimate descent from a Plantagenet King of

England. He was a member of the Colonial Council, Secretary of the Colony, and served as an Acting Governor.




Figure 3.19: Tombstone of Colonel George Reade, Oct. 25, 1608 - 1671.

"Adventurers of Purse and Person 1607 - 1624/5 and Their Families" published by the Order of First Families of Virginia, indicates in a footnote (pp. 419-420) the discrepancy between the dates inscribed on the Grace Church tablets (shown above) and the filing of the wills for George Read and his wife Elizabeth as follows: "His and his wife's gravestones were discovered during street excavations in Yorktown in 1931. The inscriptions on both stones were re-cut with errors. George Reade's stone now states he died Oct. 1674, "he being in the 66th yr of his age." Since the date should be 1671 (per his will), either the age shown, or his year of birth, is in error as well. The gravestone of Elizabeth (Martiau) Read now states she was born in 1625 and died in 1696, "being in ye 71st yeare of her age." Since the year of death should be 1686 (per her will), again the age or year of birth is in error. Since Nicholas Martiau claimed...his daughter Elizabeth as headrights...it would appear Elizabeth was born prior to his arrival in



Virginia in 1620...and that Elizabeth's birth occurred in 1615 rather than 1625."

Will of Nicolas Martian March 1656

In the name of God Amen. I Nicolas Martiau, of the County and Parrish of York gent. being very sick and weak in body But of sound and perfect memorie blessed be God Doe make ordained constitute and appoint this my last Will and Testament in manner and forme following Revoaking annulling and disclaiming all & all manner of former and other Will or Wills written or nuncupative all codicils legacyes and bequeaths whatsoever by me at any time before the ensealing of this my last Will made signed and sealed or otherwise by word of mouth or made and delivered; And appoint this only to stand & be my last Will and Testament, as followeth: ffirst I bequeath my Soule unto the hands of God my maker hopeing and assuredly believeing that when this life shall end I shall through the meritts of Jesus Chrst my redeemer to in joy everlasting Rest and happiness. And my body to the earth from whence it came to be decently buried.

Item: for that Estate which almighty God hath been pleased to lend me in this world I hereby bequeath and dispose thereof in manner and forme following:

Item: I give and bequeath to my oldest Daughter Elizabeth wife of George Read Esq. and the heires of her body begotten or to be begotten forever all that my Divydent of land scituate lying and being in the sd. Parrish and county of York (Except as hereunder excepted) with all houses and appurtenances.

Item: I give and bequeath to my Daughter, Mary Scarsbrook, wife of John Scarsbrook soe much of my sd. Divydent of Land in York Parrish as is scituate and lying beyond the Swamp (vitz.) on the Southward side of that Swamp called commonly Broccas Swamp upon part of which the said John is now seated to be held by the sd. Mary and her heirs lawfully begotten & to be begotten forever with appurtenances.

Item: I Live and bequeath to my Daughter Elizabeth Read and her heires forever my old mare with her whole increase male and female to her and her heires Except the first mare foal shoe shall bring after my decease which I hereby give and bequeath with the whole increase thereof to my Daughter Sarah wife of Capt. Fuller and her heires forever.

Item: I give and bequeath to my loveing Daughter Mary Scarsbrook and her heires forever the mare ffoale now runeing with my mare with whole increase male and female.

Item: I give and bequeath to my loveing Daughter E1izabeth Read my Watch.

Item: I give to my said Daughter Elizabeth Read her heires my Grey Gelding but my sonn John Scarsbrook to mke use of him for his occasions. Two years after my decease when he shall desyre the same.

Item: I give and bequeath to my Daughter Sarah Fuller wife of Capt. William Ffuller above named and for her lieires forever all that my Divydent of land lying in Potomack and contyning two thousand Acres But in case itt shall not be seated by some of them (vitz.) Capt. Ffuller or his said wife or heires att least one month before expiration of time limitted by the Pattent for seating then the same to be made Sale of Executrix as hereunder named and the produce thereof to be equally dyvyded between my said three loveing Daughters for the good of them and their children.

Item: My Will is that within one yeare after my decease all cattle now in my possession marked with my Daughter Ffueers mark shall be delivered for the good of her and her children and I doe also give and bequeath to her and her heires forever Tenn cowes more out of my stock or to be gought out of my Estate with their whole increase male and female and also a Bull to be delivered within a yeare as above said.

Item: I give to my loveing sonn, George Read, Esq. all my weareing apparel except my stuff suite and coate and new Dimity caster which I hereby bequeath to my sonn John Scarsbrook and alsoe will that ffive pounds ready money now lying by me to be equally divyded between my said Two son in lawes.

Item: My will that at finishing the next crop after my debts are satisfied my Two Negroes Phill and Nicholas shall be free and that each of them have them delivered by my Executxes, one Cow and Three Barrells of Corne, cloathes, and also nayles to build them a house but they or either of then shall hire themselves after their said ffreodom or before or shall remove from the land hereunder appointed them then they or he soe doeing to returne to my executrixes for the good of them and their Children. And my will is that they have land sufficent for themselves to plant in the ffeild where William Leigh lived for their lives of the \\life of the longer Liver of them.

Item: I give and bequeath to my above named Two loveing Daughters Elizabeth Read and Mary Searsbrook for the good of themselves and their Children All the rest of my Estate whatsoevor in Virginia or else where to be equally divyded between them but this divysyon not to be made untill all my Debts and Legacyes be satisfied which said severall Debts are to be paid out of the part of my Estate as is given to my said Two Daughters and their Children without any Charge to my Daughter Sarah or her heires.

Henry Norwood, Gentleman of Feckenham, Worcester, son and heir apparent of Ralph Norwood and Jane Knight, of Leckhampton Court, was born about 1523. Henry married about 1547 to Catherine Throckmorton Williams, daughter of Sir Robert Throckmorton (1512-1581) of Coughton Court. Worcester and his first wife Muriel Berkeley of Yate, Gloucestershire. Her father, grandfather George and greatgrandfather Robert were all members of the Holy Cross Guild of Stratford-on-Ayon.

Although several references show her married previously to John Williams, this had to be her first marriage as she was born about 1532. The 'visitations' she that she and John had 7 children - Robert, Ludovic, William, Richard, Lucy, Eleanda and Anne, but it is possible that the Robert and William were Norwood's.

Henry died between 1554 and 156l, his will is registered at Worcester on 27 October 1554.

Notes for Raffe (Ralph) Norwood:

On the first of January, 1515, Richard, Bishop of Hereford, granted to Henry Knight, the wardship of Ralph, son and heir of Roger Norwood, of Leckhampton, during his minority.



He was married about 1522 to Jane Knight of Shrewsbury, Shropshire, daughter of or niece of step-father Henry Knight of London and Shrewsbury. Henry's will was written 12 May 1520, and proved on 27 April 1526. On the Patent Rolls for 25 February 1519, we find a grant to: "Henry Knight, of Leckhampton, Gloucestershire Lease of the manor of Purybarre, Staff., parcel of the lands of the late earl of Warwick, for 21 years, at the annual rent of 20 1bs., and 13s. 4d. of increase."

The Coventry connection still held in 1524 as seen in the printed "Letters and Papers of the Reign of Henry VIII". What appears to be abstracts of Coventry city council meetings of 1524; contain the following:

"Wednesday after the feast of St. Matthew: The mayor, Mr. Frey, and others being present. ... that Henry Knyght, Esq., and Rauff Norwod, gent., should pay their murage after the rate of the rent of their tenements."

In the inquisition on November 9, 1532 upon the death of Richard Caxton of Tuxford, Notts, among other land, he held 50 acres of pasture and 4 acres of land in Egmanton, Notts of yearly value 2sh. 8d. held from Ralph Norwood, Esq. by fealty and a rent of 2d. for all services by the year.

Sir Thomas Chamberlayne, was lord ambassador in Spain and Flanders until he died in 1580. In 1535 he leased Prestbury manor, which became his principal residence. In 1552 he was granted the manors of Oddington, Church Down, Hucklecot, Compton-Abdale, Bishop's Norton, Great Shurdington, Uphatherley and Witcomb, formerly belonging to the Archbishop of York.

On 18 June 1537, Ralph Norwood, Sir Edward Wadham, Ric. Rede, Ric. Tracy and Ric. Brayne were appointed a commission to make inquisition upon the lands and heir of Thomas, Lord Berkeley.

Instructions preserved in the public record office detail the reception of Anne of Cleeves at Calais, France (then English), her trip to Dover, Canterbury, etc. Peers, knights and esquires of the realm and their wives, all were assigned specific parts to play. Kent esquires to receive her at Dover with the Duke of Suffolk included ---- Sir William Fynche, Sir Edward Wotton, William Roper, Thomas Digges, Thomas Roydon, Reynold Scott, James Hales, John Norton, Thomas Kemp, Nicholas Clifford of Sutton, Thomas Green of Bobbing, John Norton of Halsham, and with the duchess of Suffolk, the ladies Cobham, Hart, Hault, Fynche and Hales.

The squires from Gloucestershire & Warwick that were to attend the reception for Anna of Cleeves in November 1539 included --- Thomas Whitington, James Clifford, George Baynham, Arthur Porter, Richard Tracy, Ralph Norwood, Edmund Bridges and John Palmer, Fulk Grevell, John Grevell & Robert Throckmorton.

The inquisition after the death of Sir Hugh Hastings, who died December 29, 1540, found that he held a messuage, land and tenements from Ralph Norwood of his manor of Egmanton by rent of 9d. per year. Any other services the jurors knew not. The property was worth clear 6 lbs., his heir being his son John.

The inquisition after the death of Sir William Hollys, Knight, who died October 20 1542, was held on February 8, 1543. It found that he was seized of Egmanton manor and Egmanton parke which are held from Ralph Norwood by fealty only and are worth, clear 17/6/4 yearly. Son and heir Thomas Hollys, aged 30 and more.

Ralph held Taynton Court, Oxford, in 1539-41 as deeds and manor court records still exist. Taynton manor was a small estate near Burford, Oxford which belonged Tewksbury Abbey. At the court held 7 May 31 Henry VIII (1540), the tenants acknowledged themselves as tenants of the farmer, Ralph Norwood, esquire.

Ralph was appointed a Gloucestershire Commissioner of the Peace on May 16, 1547 and as Gloucestershire Escheator on 12 November 1549. He was patron of St. Peter's, Leckhampton at installation of Rev. Rhees Jones in 1549. Appointed Commissioner to collect payment of relief 16 Dec 1550.

In 1553, a "Rich'd Norwood, arm'.", which obviously should have been Ralph, paid 100 sh. to avoid knighthood.

A lawsuit was filed in chancery in 1553 between Ralph, "Joan" his wife, William Tauty the elder, William Tauty the younger, who were Ralph's tenants, and John [Brydges] lord Chandos over tenements connected to Leckhampton manor.

Jane died by 1560 as Ralph married secondly at Ledbury, Hereford, on May 15, 1560 to Ann Morion, daughter of Rowland Morion, Knight of Gloucester and wife Elizabeth Pembridge of Mansell Gamage, Hereford.

Ralph's will is dated 3 Nov 1560, recorded in Canterbury Perogative Court, and proved 10 February 1561 by Ann [Morion] Norwood. His grandson William being declared his heir. The will mentions his granddaughter Jane, daughter of son Henry. He wished to be buried in Leckhampton church.

His widow Ann married secondly to Edmund Shaa, presumably related to the Shaa's of Homdon, Essex and London. Edmund was recorded in chancery proceedings of 1574.

Notes for Thomas de Berkeley:

Thomas de Berkeley, dejure (apparently) Lord Berkeley [1421], brother and heir, who "may bee called Thomas the Sheepmaster," he "living a kind of grazier's life, having his flocks of sheep sommering in one place and wintering in other places as hee observed the feilds and pastures to bee sound and could bargaine best cheape." He was b. 1472, probably at



Thornbury, and on 9 September 1513 held a command at the battle of Flodden, receiving Knighthood the same day from the Earl of Surrey. Constable of Berkeley Castle 15 May 1514. Sheriff of county Gloucester November 1522 to November 1523. On 9 July 1528 Thomas, Duke of Norfolk, became a trustee for his cousin Thomas Berkeley, who is then described as "Lord Berkeley, Mowbray and Segrave. On 9 August 1529 was summoned to Parliament by writ directed Thomas Berkley de Berkley. He married, 1stly, 1504-05, Eleanor, widow of John Ingleby, of Ripley county York, daughter of Sir Marmaduke Constable, of Flamborough, County, York, by his 2nd wife Joyce, daughter of Sir Humphrey Stafford, of Grafton. Notes for Esquire John Norwood II:

John Norwood, son of John and Elizabeth Elton Norwood, went to Gloucestershire. John Norwood courted and married Eleanor Gifford, died ca 1496, daughter of Sir John and Ann Gifford, a powerful family of Gloucestershire. Eleanor brought Leckhampton Manor to the Norwood family. Leckhampton was built in the fourteenth century; the unique Tudor chimneys and the fine perpendicular porch were added by John Norwood. For more than 300 years, the Norwood family lived here in great splendor, and although they suffered with the Royalists in the Civil Wars, they again came into their own at the restoration of Charles II. For generations this branch of the Norwood family continued to make successful marriages that connected them to the Nobility and the Royalty of England. Among these families are the Lygons of Madresfield Court in Worcestershire, the Throckmortons of Caughton Court in Worcestershire, the Berkeleys of Berkeley Castle in Gloucestershire and John, Duke of Lancaster, son of Edward III, King of England.

His Will was dated 9 Sept. 1498 and proved 12 Dec. 1498

It was during this marriage that ownership of Leckhampton passed from the Giffords to the Norwoods. The Gifford families were Lords of the Manor from 1330 to 1486 when Sir John Gifford died leaving no male heir, and through the marriage of his daughter, Eleanor to John Norwood, the property passed to the Norwoods, a family who came from Northwood on the Isle of Sheppey. [Index 260, Effie Norwood Jones CD].

John Norwood, Esquire was born by 1440, possibly by 1433, son of John Norwood, junior, and wife Elizabeth Etton of Gilling Castle, Yorkshire.

In 1461 Lord Warwick requested a 40 lb. loan from Coventry citizens for the wages of 40 men to be used to resist the King and Queen Margaret, of the 166 contributors, 6 men paid 13sh. 4d. John, now at least 21, was one of a group of those who contributed 10 shillings. As amount of payment was based upon wealth, John was already one of the 19 wealthiest men in Coventry.

Even though the family still had much influence, John apparently took no part in city or guild affairs as his father and grandfather had. His marriage and property acquisitions show that he, as many other opportunists during the 'War of the Roses', was moving up the social ladder to become part of the landed gentry.

By 1469 John had married Eleanor Gifford, coheir of Sir John Gifford of Leckhampton Court near Cheltenham, Gloucestershire. The Coventry city records confirm his leaving the city as there is no Norwood in the grant list of 1469 or taxed for soldiers 1471, 1481 or later. When first married, John and Eleanor had moved to Snitterfield outside Stratford-on-Avon. This placed them 30 miles north of her home at Leckhampton and 15 miles south of Coventry. At this time 1468-9, the registers of the Holy Cross Gild of Stratford-on-Avon show on adjacent lines; "John Norwode, of Snyterfeld, esq. & Elinor his wife.



13s. 4d. Richard Grevill of Lemyngton, gent. & Elena his wife. 13s. 4d."

Other Greville's and Throckmorton's were Gild members in the 1490-1510 period. Richard's grandson Judge William Greville married a Cheltenham heiress thereby acquiring Arle Court, 2 miles from Leckhampton. Perhaps Elena was the other Gifford coheiress? John and Joan Shakespeare of Snitterfield (c.1520), great-grandparents of William Shakespeare, were members of the St. Anne Guild of Knoll.

It is an interesting coincidence that the last Norton heiress of Kent, Elizabeth Norton and her husband Sir James Hales, moved from Kent to Snitterfield in the l660's,

John and Eleanor had inherited Leckhampton Court by 1483 as John is mentioned in the will of Lady Margaret Chocke. He was to sell her sheep then at 'Leghampton' and give half the proceeds each to her cousin Thomas Straunge and Leonard Middleton. Also, the steward of Leckhampton was to sell the oxen and wheat and half the proceeds each to John and Nicholas Baringer for which they were to pray for her. She was born Margaret Morris, and at her death, second wife of Sir Richard Choke, of Ashton, Somerset, Justice of Common Pleas.

John still maintained the Coventry properties for investment as is shown in the following city roll still extant. His son William continued to hold all these properties in 1532 and 1534.

Notes for Sir John Norwood:

Sir John Norwood, son of James and Jane Clynton Norwood, married Elizabeth Elton, daughter of Miles Elton, who was the son of Sir John of Elton. John Norwood died in 1489 and is buried at Milton Church. John Norwood left a will in Kent. The will is recorded in the Public Records Office in London. His birth date in this research is very unsettled with a wide range of dates being found. 107

James Dempsey has written a detailed paper on the question: "Who was the father of John Norwood who married Elizabeth Etton and whose descendants lived at Leckhampton Court?" [Source 176]. He discusses the theory held by Gertrude Marion Norwood Callam and his own theory which differs significantly. He stresses that there is no known documentation to prove either theory and that it will be up to future researchers to prove or disprove Marion Callam or Jim Dempsey's suggested ancestry for John Norwood who married Elizabeth Etton of Gilling Castle.

According to William Otis Sawtelle, Notes on the Norwood Family, published 1925, "After two centuries in Kent the Norwoods took root in Gloucestershire. Captain Tyre writing from The Grotto, Leckhampton, Cheltenham, to Dr. Norwood under date of February 22, 1923 says: 'I have been able to trace the Norwoods of Leckhampton back to Myles Norwood and I believe this man is the actual connecting link, but I am not certain. I am supported in my view by the fact that the Arms of the Norwoods of Kent, without any difference, were confirmed by the Herald's College to the Norwoods of Leckhampton.' "

While the situation is very confusing, particularly in light of the fact that I cannot locate any 'Myles Norwood', I have chosen to accept the theory that Sir John Norwood married Elinor Gifford and eventually inherited Leckhampton when the Gifford family had no heirs other than John and Elinor.

Henry FitzHugh, 5th baron, b. 1430, summoned to parliament from 26 May, 1455, to 15 October, 1470. His lordship obtained, in 38th Henry VI [1460], a grant of the stewardship of the honor of Richmond, and also of the office of chief forester of the new forest of Arkilgarth-Dale, and Le Hoppe, then escheated to the king by the forfeiture of Richard, Earl of Salisbury, to hold for life. During the reign of King Henry VI, Lord Fitz-Hugh remained firmly attached to the Lancastrian interest, but he seems nevertheless to have successfully cultivated the good opinion of King Edward IV, the champion of York, for we find his lordship, soon after the accession of that monarch [1547], employed in his military capacity, and as a diplomatist. In 1468 he made a pilgrimage to the Holy Sepulchre, and upon his return founded a chantry for two priests in his castle at Ravenswath, there to celebrate divine service for himself and Alice during their lives, and for the health of their souls after their decease. His lordship married Lady Alice Neville, daughter of Richard, Earl of Salisbury, and had issue, I. Richard his successor; II. Thomas, d. s. p.; III. John, d. s. p.; IV. George, d. s. p.; V. Edward, d. s. p.; I. Alice, married to Sir John Fienes, Knight, and was mother of Thomas, Lord Dacre; II. Elizabeth, married 1st to Sir William Parr, Knight, and had (with William, created Lord Parr, of Horton), Sir Thomas Paar, who married Maud, daughter and co-heir of Sir Thomas Green, Knight, of Horton, and had one son and two days, viz. 1. William Parr, Marquess of Northampton, d. s. p.; 1. Anne Parr, married to William Herbert, Earl of Pembroke; 2. Catherine Parr, married 1st to Edward Borough; 2ndly to John Neville, Lord Latimer; 3rdly, to King



Henry VIII; and 4thly, to Thomas, Lord Seymour, of Sudley, but d. s. p. Elizabeth FitzHugh married 2ndly, Nicholas, Lord Vaux. Henry, 5th Baron Fitz-Hugh, died in 1472, as was s. by his only son, Richard Fitz-Hugh, 6th baron. Alice died after Agnes Shuckburgh, about 1410-14, whereupon Harrietsham descended to her son John.

Notes for Sir John de Northwood:

Sir John de Northwode was born 1321, he was the son of Lord Roger and Juliana de Northwode, he served in France in 1355 and 1359. Sir John was summoned to Parliament from June 1363 to 28 Dec 1375 by King Edward III. In 1369 Sir John was a joint commissioner to muster all men-at-arms to serve for the defense of Sheppey. Sir John de Northwode, Lord Northwode, died 27 Feb 1378/9. No further summonses to Parliament were issued to this family. In 1350, Sir John married Joan, daughter of Robert Here (Hare/Hart) of Faversham.

Sir John de Northwood, son of Roger de Northwood and wife Juliane de Say, was born in 1321. At 21, he was granted a rent of 10 marks by his father in 1342 from the manors of Bykenore and Wychling, Kent. In the feudal aid of 1346, John was listed as tenant under his father, at Norwood-in-Sheppey, Harrietsham, East Farbourne, Thornham, Eynton, Bengebury and Shorne (See previous chapter).

He married Joan Hert in 1350 against his father's will as we have from the Northwood Genealogical Roll; "for which he thought to disinherit him, it being a manifest disparagement in blood".

Through the mediation of neighbor Sir Arnold Savage, he was not disinherited. Joan was a daughter of Robert Hart (Here, Hert) of Faversham, Kent. Her sister Elizabeth was married to Sir Ralph Spigumell. After his marriage, his father granted him Northwood Chastiners manor.

At his father's death in December 136l, he received a writ for delivery of his inheritance. Then the family squabbles really began. Starting in 1364, his step-mother Agnes sued him for 600 lbs. rent due from Northwood Chasteners. This suit was settled out of court by Sir Arnold Savage at the house of 'fratres Minores' (minor brothers) in Canterbury. He countersued Agnes and Richard Blore for 200 marks arrears from Bykenore manor. Sir John Barri mediated at Canterbury, this suit also being settled out of court.

He was summoned to consecutive Parliaments except one; from June 1, 1363 to December 28, 1375. No further summons to Parliament were issued to this family.

In 1369 he was a joint commissioner to muster men-at-arms, etc. to serve for defense of the Isle of Sheppey. Again 8 years later to prepare and abide there for coastal defense in 1377.

On 1 July 1377 Richard atte Leese and John de Northwood were commanded to hasten to the Isle of Shepeye and put it in a state of



defense to resist the trench invasion.

On 16 August 1377, a general order was issued to the men of Middleton hundred that they were responsible for the defense of the Isle of Sheppey except for Yentelee [?] which the men of Hoo, Shamele and Tollyng hundreds were responsible.

His will on parchment in Archbishop Sudbury's register folio 100 b, now at the Archbishop's library at Lambeth, requests burial at Minster in Sheppey. "Volo corpus meum sepeliendum in Ecclesia Monasterii Sancte Sexburge de Menstrye in Scapeya"

John died on February 27, 1379, aged 58. A writ was issued l4 March, 2 Rich I: that an inquisition be held in Kent and Gloucester. The inquisition in Kent was held before the king's escheator, John Brode, at 'Sydngbourne' on the Wednesday after St. George, 2 Richard II (1379).

Notes for Ralph De Neville [Earl of Westmorland]:

The "Kingmaker's" grandfather, the 1st Earl of Westmorland settled about half the original Neville estates on the children of his second marriage, whereas the subsequent Earls of Westmorland were the product of his first. It thus came about that the 2nd-6th Earls of Westmorland were actually less well-endowed territorially than their ancestors who had been mere barons. The pre-eminence of that branch of the family represented by the Earls of Salisbury/Warwick, who stemmed from the second marriage, was made correspondingly easier.

The 1st Earl of Westmorland had multiplicity of children: nine by the first wife, fourteen by his second. Of his 23 in all, four were peers, three were duchesses and another four daughters the wives of lesser peers; moreover of those three duchesses one was mother of two kings. Between 1450 and 1455 no fewer than 13 members of the family had seats in the House of Lords. This very fecundity like that of Edward III, engendered quarrels. There was rivalry between the two branches of_the family, which grew from a dispute about family estates into a difference as to dynastic loyalties. It thus served as an overture to the Wars of the Roses, one which was made even more ominous by a dispute between the Nevilles, represented by the 1st Marquess of Montagu and the Percys. [Burke's Peerage]

Sir Ralph de Neville, KG, b. c 1346, d. Raby 21 Oct 1425, created 1st Earl of Westmorland 1397; m. (1) Margaret Stafford, d. 9 June 1396; m. (2) before 29 Nov 1396 Joan Beaufort, d. Howden 13 Nov 1440, widow of Robert Ferrers, daughter of John, Duke of Lancaster and Katharine (Roet) Swynford. [Magna Charta Sureties]

Sixth Baron Neville of Raby, became a Knight of the Garter and 1st Earl Westmoreland September 29, 1397. As a Lancasterian, he opposed Richard II in 1399 and conveyed Richard's resignation to the convention. He assisted in the coronation of Henry IV and was a member of the council of regency appointed to rule in the infancy of King Henry V. With his second marriage to Joan Beaufort, a widowed daughter of John of Gaunt, fourth son of Edward III, this favorably affected Joan and Ralph's wealth and social prestige, making possible brilliant marriages for their children. In 1450, five of Ralph's sons, five sons-in-law and several grandsons were in Parliament.

Held many offices, among them Constable of the Tower of London and in 1399, Marshall of England the year he was created Earl of Richmond. He was a member of Richards II's privy council, saw service at Agincourt on October 25, 1415 where Henry won a victory over the superior numbers of French owing to his superior generalship.

He married his first wife Margaret, daughter of Hugh, Earl of Stafford by special dispensation from Pope Urban V, because of their close relationship. The marriage to Joan, his second wife, was a much more distinguished one as the line now descends through the royal house of England. He was summoned to Parliament from December 6, 1389 to November 30, 1396. Some say he is the son of Elizabeth Latimer. He was created Earl of Westmorland by Richard II on 9-29-1397.

Ralph de Nevill, 4th baron, summoned to parliament from 6 December, 1389, to 30 November, 1396. This nobleman took a leading part in the political drama of his day and sustained it with more than ordinary ability. In the lifetime of his father (9th Richard II), he was joined with Thomas Clifford, son of Lord Clifford, and was appointed a commissionership for the guardianship of the West Marches. In three vears after this he succeeded to the title and in two years subsequently he was one of the commissioners appointed to treat with the Kings of France and Scotland, touching a truce made by them with the King of England. In the 21st Richard II [1378], he was made constable of the Tower of London and shortly afterwards advanced in full parliament to the dignity of Earl of Westmoreland. His lordship was of the privy council to King Richard and had much favor from that monarch, yet he was one of the most active in raising Henry, of Lancaster, to the throne as Henry IV, and was rewarded by the new king in the first year of his reign with a grant of the county and honor of Richmond for his life, and with the great office of Earl Marshal of England. Soon after this, he stoutly resisted the Earl of Northumberland in his rebellion and forced the Percies, who had advanced as far as Durham, to fall back upon Prudhoe, when the battle of Shrewsbury ensued, in which the gallant Hotspur sustained so signal a defeat, and closed his impetuous career. The earl was afterwards governor of the town and castle of Carlisle, warden of the West Marches towards Scotland, and governor of Roxborough. He was also a knight of the Garter. His lordship married 1st, Lady Margaret Stafford, daughter of Hugh, Earl Stafford, K.G., for which marriage a dispensation was obtained from Pope Urban V, the earl and his bride being within the third and fourth degrees of consanguinity; by this lady he had issue, John, Lord Nevill; Ralph; Maud; Phillippa; Alice; Margaret; Anne; Margery; and Elizabeth. The earl married 2ndly, Joan de Beaufort, daughter of John of Gaunt, by Katherine Swynford, and widow of Robert, Lord Ferrers, of Wem, by whom he had issue, Richard; William; George; Edward; Cuthbert; Henry: Thomas: Catherine: Eleanor: Anne: Jane: and Cicely. This great earl d. in 1425 and was s. by his grandson, Ralph Nevill, 5th Baron Nevill, of Raby. He was summoned to Parliament 14 Aug 1362 to 24 Feb 1367/8. He married in Aug 1338 (when aged about 8) Elizabeth, daughter of Hugh Despenser, the younger, (Lord le Despenser) by Eleanor, 1st sister of the whole blood and coheir of Gilbert de Clare, Earl of Gloucester and Hertford, [daughter of Gilbert de Clare, of same], "but though thus married at 8, yet had he no issue by her till about 12 or 13 years after." He died at Berkeley Castle, "never thoroughly cured of the wounds he received at Poytiers", 8 June 1368, aged 37 and upwards, and was buried with his mother at St. Augustine's, Bristol. Notes for Sir Roger de Northwode:

Roger de Northwode was born 26 Mar 1307. He was one of the most interesting of our early ancestors, son of Sir John and Agnes de Northwode. The Norwood family was very prominent and was held in high regard. Lady Idonia de Leyburne de Say, widow of Geoffrey de Say, wanted to make sure that her daughter Juliana de Say married Roger de Northwode; Idonia gained control of Roger's guardianship and the marriage took place before he was 14 years of age. He was a father about the time he was 14 years old.

It is through the marriage of Roger de Northwode and Juliana de Say that their descendants claim descent from an earlier Geoffrey de Saye, who was a Magna Charta Baron. Geoffrey de Saye, 11th Magna Charta Surety was born ca 1155, son of Geoffrey de Saye I. It was a Geoffrey



de Saye, three generations later, who married Idonia de Layburn, and heiress of the Bigood family who brought the estate of Knoll, Kent into the de Saye family. Knoll house is one of the show places of England at the present day. The de Leyburn family was an outstanding and well-connected family. Thomas de Leyburn, brother of Idonia de Leyburn de Say, married Alice de Toni, daughter of Ralph de Toni and Lady Alice de Bohun. After the death of Sir Thomas de Leyburn, his widow, Lady Alice de Toni Leyburn, married Guy Beauchamp, 2nd Earl of Warwick, as his second wife. Sir Geoffrey de Say, son of Lady Idonia de Leyburn de Say, married Maud de Beauchamp, daughter of Guy de Beauchamp, Earl of Warwick, by his first wife.

Juliana de Say de Northwode died 20 Feb 1329. In all, Roger de Northwode married five times. Each marriage was a very profitable one. Roger de Northwode received his inheritance on 26 Apr 1327. In 1334 he was sent to Scotland. He held several public offices and on 3 Apr 1360, he was summoned to Parliament by King Edward III. After Juliana's death, Roger married Elizabeth, widow of Richard Foliot, and daughter of John de Segrave on 25 Jun 1331. She died 11 Dec 1335 at Canterbury and is buried in Sheppey.

His third marriage was to Margaret, widow of Sir Nicholas Halgton. Lady Margaret and her husband, Sir Nicholas, had two daughters; Beatrice married Sir Ralph St. Leger and Margaret married Sir Roger de Northwode, son of Lord Roger de Northwode and his first wife, Juliana de Say. These two marriages have caused confusion of the two Margarets and the two Rogers. Lady Margaret, wife of Lord Roger de Norwode, died after an accident on 31 Dec 1340. She was watching persons digging into a fox hole to get a fox. The dirt caved in on her and she was buried. It took some time to rescue her. She did not die then but later died of injuries that she had received. Soon after Easter in 1342, Lord Northwode married a fouth wife, Joan, widow of Thomas de Faversham. Joan died May 1356. On 1 Aug 1356 Lord Northwode married for the fifth time to Agnes, daughter of Robert de Stone of Dartforth and widow of Sir John de Cobham. Lord Roger de Northwode died 5 Nov 1361. He held the Title of 2nd Baron.

Sir Roger de Northwode. Lord Northwode, son and heir of Sir John de Northwood, junior, and Agnes de Grandison, was born at Easter, March 26, 1307.

From a plea made at Hilary term in 1319, it would appear that Harrietsham manor came to the Northwoods as Juliane de Saye's dowry. Her mother, widow of William de Leybume. claimed 1/3 of the manor of Harrietsham against John de Northwode [senior], who had called Richard son of Roger Loveday to warrant, John lost the 1/3 part by default. What connection Richard was I do not know, but the sheriff reported that Richard was dead, and his sister and coheirs were ordered to appear. Two months later at Easter term, the sisters appeared but, John did not [as he was ill?]. This was confirmed three months later in the inquisition after John's death.

A year after his father's death, on June 20, 1320, King Edward II sold Roger's wardship and marriage for 700 marks to Sir Bartholomew de Badlesmere On July 14 and 20, the grant was recorded on the close rolls specifying the wardship of Shorne, Herietsham. Thomham, and Bengebury manors worth 50 lbs. 21sh. 5d. per year. Then Sir Bartholomew sold the marriage to Lady Idonea de Saye, daughter of Sir William de Leyboume and wife of Sir Geoffrey de Say, the elder. Roger's first marriage was contracted when he was only 12 to Juliane or Julienne, daughter and coheiress of Geoffrey and Idonea.

On August 20, 1321 Bartholomew de Badlesmere was pardoned by the king for certain pains and forfeitures which he had incurred. But on October 166 a summons was issued to the men of Essex, Sussex,

Hampshire and Surrey to assemble before heeds Castle in County, Kent to which entrance had been refused to Queen Isabella by Bartholomew's wife Margaret. Also general proclamations were made in Kent as to the causes which induced the king to lay siege to Leeds castle. On 19 November 1321, while at Ongar, Essex, the king ordered his yeoman. Gilbert de Ryshton, to (take possession of all the lands, goods and chattels in Kent and Sussex held by Bartholomew.

Thus the wardship of Roger's inheritance again returned to the crown. On the same day, the king's yeoman, Simon de Knotyngele, was ordered to keep all the lands late of John de Northwode by reason of minority of the heir and to answer for the income in the king's chamber.

On 14 April 1322 Bartholomew de Badlesmere was hung for treason.

It would appear that just as Roger turned 21 and before he could get official grant of his inheritance, Simon de Knottyngele and several friends, including John Botoun and Henry Wrenk, took advantage of his stewardship. On March 28, 1327, a commission was granted to Roger de Hegham, Thomas de Faversham and William de Cotes, on complaint by Roger de Northwode, of Shepeye, that Simon and others imprisoned and mistreated him at Syddyngboum, and carried away 2 cows and 3 swine worth 50 sh. and other goods. A final note on Simon. On February 6, 1333 a pardon was granted to Henry, son of Jordan de Knottyngele, for killing Simon in self-defense.

Roger did homage and had writ of livery of his lands April 28, 1327, about the feast of the translation of St. Thomas. Roger's first wife, Juliane de Say, died February 10, 1329.

Roger married secondly a little before the feast of St. Peter ad Vincula, shortly after June 25, 1331, to Elizabeth de Seagrave, widow of Richard Foliot, esq., daughter of John de Segrave ('le Oncle'), lord of Folkestone, Kent, by Julienne, daughter and heir of Sir John de Sandwich. She died without further issue on December 11, 1335, at Canterbury, and was buried at Minster-in-Sheppey, nearly at the head of Sir Roger de Northwode (d.1285). On her stone in 1385 was:

"Icy gist Elizabeth Seagrave file monsr Johan Seagrave, iad y sz femme Richard fFoliot, et a Roger de Norwode le secunde, q transpass a le xi jor de Decembr Ian de grace mill cc xxxv."

On 26 June 1333 Roger was granted an exemption from taking the order of knighthood because he had a broken arm and other grievous injuries.

Roger was summoned for military service in Scotland December 1334 and knighted by September 1338. He was first summoned to Parliament July 24, 1335 at Westminster. Writ for his travel expenses dated September 23, 1335.

Roger married thirdly on 13 January 1340 to Margery, widow of Sir Nicholas de Halglton, kt. (d.1338) of Wokyndon, Essex. Nicholas and Margery's first daughter Margaret was married to her stepson Roger de Northwood, son of Julian Say, the second daughter to Sir Ralph de St. Leger.

A little before the feast of the Nativity 14 Edward III (1340), Margery was smothered in a cave-in near Bengebury while digging out a fox. Gravely injured, she made her will on the Thursday after the feast of Holy Innocents 1340, dying on December 31, 1340 without further issue.

In 1340, Roger went to Flanders in the retinue of William de Clinton, Earl of Huntington, and again in 1342 in the retinue of Robert de Ufford, Earl of Suffolk.



Roger married fourthly, shortly after Easter 1342, to Joan _____, widow of Thomas de Faversham, lord of Graveney, Kent. She died without further issue in May 1356. Joan was rated as holding 1 fee in Graveney in the 1346 Feudal aids.

Roger married fifthly, on the feast of St. Peter ad Vincula, August 1, 1356, to Lady Agnes, daughter of Richard de Stone of Dartford, and widow of Sir John de Cobham (Lord Cobham, died 1354/5). Roger and Agnes's chaplain was Sir Richard Shene, vicar of Eastchurch, Kent. Roger was summoned on April 3, 1360 to a Parliament to be at Westminster.

Roger died on the vigil of St. Leonard, November 6, 1361, age 54. The executors of his estate to be his wife Agnes, Richard Blore and Fulk Peyforer.

Agnes then married thirdly Christopher Shuckburgh of Warwickshire. Lady Agnes de Northwood, as patroness, instituted John Colyn as rector of Wycheling April 15, 1368. 1371 Agnes and Christopher held tenements in St. Antoine parish, London.

She granted the reversion of Harrietsham to step-grandson William Norwood on March 5, 1397. She died May 27, 1405, having held control of many Northwood lands in dower for 44 years.

By a writ issued November 14, 1361 to the escheators in Kent and Surrey, an inquisition found that Roger had held:

Surrey: Southwark; tenements worth 13sh. 4d. in St. Olave parish held jointly with widow Agnes by gift of John de Scholden, parson of Coulynge and John Barry, Kent. Held of Earl of Arundel for 6d. yearly.

Kent: Shome Manor; plus 5 ac. salt meadow, by carrying a white standard to Scotland for king war's for 40 days.

Harrietsham Manor; held of Nicholas Loveyn as of his manor of Ospring, formerly of John de Pulteney, by attending Michaelmas court and by rent of 19s. 11.5d. yearly to Christ church priory, Canterbury.

Thomham & Bengbury Manors; held of William de Say by knight's service.

Yoke Manor in Frenstede; held of the king of Leeds Castle by doing suit at castle gate monthly.

Wychelying Manor by Lenham; held of king by rendering 10s. every 10 weeks for ward of Dover Castle.

Northwode Manor; in Sheppey and 200 ac. of fresh marsh worth 3/6/8 held of Milton manor and Queen Philippa for 6 lbs. yearly and 600 ac. of salt marsh held in gavelkind worth 7 lbs. 10sh.

Horton Manor; held jointly with widow Agnes Northwode by gift of Richard Schorne, clerk & Peter Hadland. Held of Chilham Castle held by lady de Roos for service of part of 1 knight's fee.

Notes for John Neville [Lord Neville]:

5th Baron of Raby, third Baron Neville, First Earl of Westmorland, died on the 42nd anniversary of the Battle of Neville's Cross. He was summoned to Parliament in 1368. In 1369, he was created a Knight of the Garter and Admiral of Fleet. He gave Durham Cathedral a beautiful



stone and an alabaster screen known to this day as the "Neville Screen". John is buried at Durham Cathedral with his wife Maude. He was summoned to parliament as Lord Nevill of Raby from February 24, 1368 to July 28, 1388. He was carried by his father at the age of five years to witness the battle of Durham. During the remainder of King Edwards reign he was in active service either in France or Scotland. He was constituted lieutenant of Aquitaine under Richard II and was seneschal of Bordeaux. He was employed against the Turks and won and had surrendered to him, 83 walled towns, castles and forts. He died at Newcastle on October 17, 1388 and is buried in the Neville chantry, in the south asile of the nave of Durham Cathedral, near his father and his first wife. In 1386 he was appointed commander of all forces against the Scots. He took the place of Henry Percy, earl of Northumberland as military leader in the north.

Sir John de Nevill, 3rd baron, summoned to parliament as Lord Nevill, of Raby, from 24 February 1368, to 28 July 1388. This nobleman was carried by his father to witness the battle of Durham, being then scarcely five years old, and received the honour of knighthood some years afterwards when in arms before the barriers of Paris. In the 44th of the same reign [Edward III, 1371], he was again in the wars with France, and then constituted admiral of the king's fleet from the mouth of the Thames northwards. During the remainder of King Edward's reign, he was constantly in active service either in France or Scotland. In the 2nd Richard II [1379], he was constituted lieutenant of Aquitaine and he was, likewise, seneschal of Bordeaux. It is reported of this nobleman that he was some time employed against the Turks, and that, being lieutenant of Aquitaine, he reduced that province to tranquility, and that, in his service in those parts, he won and had rendered to him 83 walled towns, castles, and forts. His lordship was a knight of the Garter. He m. 1st, Maud, daughter of Henry, Lord Percy, by whom he had issue, Ralph, Thomas, Maud, Alice, and Eleanor. His lordship married 2ndly, Elizabeth, daughter and heir of William, Lord Latimer, K.G., and had by her (who married 2ndly, Sir Robert de Willoughby) had issue, John, Elizabeth, and Margaret. He died at Newcastle, 17 October, 1388, and was buried in the south side of the nave of Durham Cathedral, and was s. by his eldest son, Ralph de Nevill. The latter conflict continued to provide the Beaufort Earls of Somerset with opportunities; the 3rd Earl [John Beaufort], one of John's younger sons, was promoted Duke of Somerset in 1443 following various military operations in Normandy, Anjou, and Maine, though these were competently executed rather than conspicuously triumphant. Probably his close kinship with Henry VI was the chief cause of his leap in the peerage, for his mother Margaret was daughter of Thomas Earl of Kent, a descendant of Edward I. It is this Duke of Somerset's daughter who was mother of Henry VII. The Dukedom of Somerset created in 1443 expired with the death of the grantee [John Beaufort] in 1444.

John of Gaunt, Earl of Richmond, 4th son of King Edward III, was b. 1340, styled of Gaunt from the place of his birth, who had been created Earl of Richmond in 1342, was advanced to the Dukedom of Lancaster by his father, Edward III, in the 36th year of his reign. After the death of his 1st wife Blanch, the great heiress of the Duke of Lancaster, he m. Constance, elder daughter and co-heiress of Peter, King of Castile, and in her right assumed the title of King of Castile and Leon, in which regal dignity, as well as in those of Duke of Lancaster, Earl of Richmond, Derby, Lincoln, and Leicester, he had summons to parliament; he was likewise Duke of Aquitaine and a knight of the Garter. On the decease of Edward III, this prince was joined in the administration of affairs during the minority of his nephew, Richard II. He subsequently attempted the conquest of Spain at the head of a fine army, and landing at the Groyne, advanced to Compostella, where he was met by John, King of Portugal, between whom and his eldest daughter, the Lady Philippa, a marriage was concluded. Thence he marched into Castile and there ratified a treaty of peace, by which he abandoned his claim to the throne of Castile and Leon in consideration of a large sum of money and the marriage of Henry, Prince of Asturias, with his only daughter by his 2nd wife, the Lady Katherine Plantagenet. In the latter part of his life he dwelt in retirement, having incurred the displeasure of King Richard by a motion which he had made in parliament that his son, Henry of Bolingbroke, should be declared heir to the crown. He died at Ely House, Holborn, in 1399.

John of Gaunt married 1st, in 1359, Lady Blanche Plantagenet, the eventual heiress of the Duke of Lancaster, and had by her, Henry, Philippa, and Elizabeth. He m. 2ndly, Constance, elder daughter and coheir of Peter, King of Castile, and by her had an only daughter, Katherine. The duke m. 3rdly, in 1396, Catherine, daughter of Sir Payn Roet, Guyenne King of Arms, and widow of Sir Otho de Swynford, Knt., by whom, before marriage, he had issue, John, Henry, Thomas, and Joan. These [last] children were legitimated by act of parliament for

all purposes, save succession to the throne, in the 20th Richard II and derived their surname from the castle of Beaufort, the place of their birth. John of Gaunt, was s. by his eldest son, Henry Plantagenet, born 1366, surnamed of Bolingbroke, Earl of Hereford, who, upon the deposition of Richard II, was called to the throne as King Henry IV, when his great inheritance, with the Dukedom of Lancaster, and the Earldoms of Hereford, Derby, Lincoln, and Leicester, merged in the crown. John of Gaunt, Duke of Lancaster, also called (1342-62) Earl of Richmond, or (from 1390) DUC (duke) D'Aquitaine (born March 1340, Ghent--died Feb. 3, 1399, London), English prince, fourth but third surviving son of the English king Edward III and Philippa of Hainaut; he exercised a moderating influence in the political and constitutional struggles of the reign of his nephew Richard II. He was the immediate ancestor of the three 15th-century Lancastrian monarchs, Henry IV, V, and VI. The term Gaunt, a corruption of the name of his birthplace, Ghent, was never employed after he was three years old; it became the popularly accepted form of his name through its use in Shakespeare's play Richard II.

Through his first wife, Blanche (d. 1369), John, in 1362, acquired the duchy of Lancaster and the vast Lancastrian estates in England and Wales. From 1367 to 1374 he served as a commander in the Hundred Years' War (1337-1453) against France. On his return he obtained the chief influence with his father, but he had serious opponents among a group of powerful prelates who aspired to hold state offices. He countered their hostility by forming a curious alliance with the religious reformer John Wycliffe. Despite John's extreme unpopularity, he maintained his position after the accession of his ten-year-old nephew, Richard II, in 1377, and from 1381 to 1386 he mediated between the King's party and the opposition group led_by John's younger brother, Thomas of Woodstock, earl of Gloucester.

In 1386 John departed for Spain to pursue his claim to the kingship of Castile and Leon based upon his marriage to Constance of Castile in 1371. The expedition was a military failure. John renounced his claim in 1388, but he married his daughter, Catherine, to the young nobleman who eventually became King Henry III of Castile and Leon.

Meanwhile, in England, war had nearly broken out between the followers of King Richard II and the followers of Gloucester. John returned in 1389 and resumed his role as peacemaker.

His wife Constance died in 1394, and two years later he married his mistress, Catherine Swynford. In 1397 he obtained legitimization of the four children born to her before their marriage. This family, the Beauforts, played an important part in 15th-century politics. When John died in 1399, Richard II confiscated the Lancastrian estates, thereby preventing them from passing to John's son, Henry Bolingbroke. Henry then deposed Richard and in September 1399 ascended the throne as King Henry IV. [Encyclopedia Britannica CD '97]

Thomas de Berkeley, age 30+ at father's death, died 27 Oct 1361, Lord Berkeley, Marshal in France 1340, Captain of the Scottish Marches 1342; married (1) 1320, Margaret de Mortimer, died 5 May 1337, daughter of Sir Roger de Mortimer, Earl of March and Joan de Geneville; married (2) 30 May 1347, Katherine, died 13 Mar 1385, widow of Sir Piers le Veel, daughter and heir of Sir John Clivedon, of Charfield, county Gloucester, by Emma his wife. [Magna Charta Sureties].

Thomas de Berkeley, 3rd Baron Berkeley; knighted before 1322, joined with his father in Lancaster's insurrection, imprisoned until 16 Oct 1326, later Custodian of Edward II 4 April 1327 but guessing what was in store for the deposed king left Berkeley Castle before the actual regicide, tried by jury of 12 knights 1330/1 as accessory to Edward's murder but acquitted, Chief Warden Glos, Worcs, and Herefs, Marshal English Army in France 1342, Capt Scottish Marches, Warden and Chief Justice in Eyre South of Trent 1345-48. [Burke's Peerage]

Thomas de Berkeley, Lord Berkeley, son and heir by 1st wife, who "may bee called Thomas the Rich." Knighted before 1322, and aged 30 and upwards at his father's death. He fought at Boroughbridge, 16 Mar 1321/2, and was taken prisoner. He was released from imprisonment in Pevensey Castle on 16 Oct 1326, and on 4 Apr 1327, was made Joint Custodian of the deposed King Edward II, whom he "curteously received" the next day at Berkeley Castle, but being commanded to deliver over the government thereof to his fellow custodian, departed there from to Bradley, "with heavy cheer perceiving what violence was intended." He was tried by a jury of 12 Knights (without protest) in 1330-1 as an accessory to the murder (g) of the deposed King, but was acquitted. In 1328 he was in the expedition against Scotland. From 14 June 1329 to 20 Nov 1360, he was summoned to Parliament, the last two writs have the addition of "Senior" thereto. In 1336 he was Chief Warden of cos. Gloucester, Worcester, and Hereford: in 1340, Marshal of the English army in France; in 1342, Capt. of the Scottish Marches; Warden and Chief Justice in Eyre south of Trent 1345-48; he is stated (apparently in error) to have been, in 1346, Commander of the English forces at the battle of Crecy, and in 1361, was on an Embassy to Pope Innocent VI.

He married 1stly, in or shortly before 25 July 1320 (Papal disposition to remain married with legitimization of past issue dated Sep 1329), Margaret, daughter of Roger Mortimer, Earl of March, by Joan, de jure suo jure (according to modern doctrine) Baroness Geneville, daughter and heir of Sir Piers de Geneville (2nd but 1st surviving son and heir apparent of Geoffrey, 1st Lord Geneville). She died 5 May 1337, being under 30, and was buried at St. Augustine's, Bristol. He married 2ndly, 30 May 1347, at Charfield, county Gloucester, Katharine, widow of Sir Piers le Veel, of Tortworth, in that county, and daughter and heir of Sir John Clivedon, of Charfield aforesaid, by Emma, his wife. He died 27 Oct 1361, in his 69th year, and was buried in Berkeley Church. M.I. His widow died 13 Mar 1385, and is also buried there. [Complete Peerage II:129-30, XIV:87]

Note: This was perpetrated with horrible barbarity by Sir John Mautravers and Sir Thomas Gurnay, the then custodians of the castle. See a detailed account in Smyth's "Berkeleys", vol i, p. 291, confirming the allusion in Gray's "Bard" to "The shrieks of death thro' Berkeley's roof that ring-- Shrieks of an agonizing King."

Thomas, 3rd baron, married 1st, Margaret, daughter of Roger Mortimer, Earl of March, and 2ndly, in 1347, Catherine, daughter of Sir John Clyvedon, widow of Sir Peter le Veel. This lord having adhered to the interest of the Queen, Mortimer, and Prince Edward, afterwards the third of that name, furnished "the only precedent," says Smith, "of a

peer being tried by knights, as the peers would have been both judges and jurors." He first assumed a mitre for his crest. He was summoned to parliament from 1329 to 1360. He had issue by his 1st wife, besides his heir, three sons, who d. s. p., and one daughter, Joan, wife of Sir Reginald Cobham; by his 2nd wife, had had, with three sons, who d. s. p., a 4th, John, ancestor of the Berkeleys of Beverstone. He died 1361 and was survived by his son, Maurice, 4th baron. [Sir Bernard Burke, Dormant, Abeyant, Forfeited, and Extinct Peerages, Burke's Peerage, Ltd., London, 1883, p. 44, Berkeley, Viscount Berkeley, Earl of Nottingham, and Marquess of Berkeley]

Edmund Beaufort, Marquis of Dorset, Duke of Somerset, Lieut. General of France, Normandy and Guienne. [Ancestral Roots] Sir Edmund Beaufort, 4th Earl of Somerset and 1st Duke of Somerset, as which created 31 March 1448, as also earlier 28 Aug 1442 Earl of Dorset and 24 June 1443 Marquess of Dorset, KG (1436); born c1406; Constable of England 1450; married by 1436 Lady Eleanor Beauchamp, daughter of Richard, Earl of Warwick and widow of 8th Lord (Baron) de Ros of Helmsley, and was killed fighting on the Lancastrian side at the Yorkist Victory of St. Albans 22 May 1455. Notes for John "Fairborn" Beaufort:

Occupation: High Admiral of England/Somerset & Dorset. Sir John Beaufort (Beaufort being the name of a castle in Champagne belonging to his father), KG (c1397); created 10 Feb 1396/7 Earl of Somerset and 29 Sep 1397 Marquess of Dorset and Marquess of Somerset (he was degraded from both marquessates 1399 following accession of Henry IV), Constable of England 1404. [Burke's Peerage]

John Beaufort, Earl of Somerset, Marquis of Dorset, KG, b. c 1372, died 16 Mar 1410. He was legitimated with the 3 other children of Katharine by Act of Parliament 20 Richard II (1397) for all purposes except the royal succession. He married as her 1st husband, c 1399, Margaret, died c 30 Dec 1439, 3rd daughter and eventual coheir of Thomas Holand, 2nd Earl of Kent, KG. She married (2) 1411 Thomas, Duke of Clarence, KG, 2nd son of Henry IV. [Magna Charta Sureties]

Two and a half centuries later Richard II created the eldest of John of Gaunt's bastards by Catherine Swynford, John Beaufort, Earl of Somerset. He was later promoted Marquess of Somerset, though degraded from the rank in the early part of Henry IV's reign. Both before and after the deposition of Richard he was a prominent military figure, chiefly in France during the Hundred Years War. The latter conflict continued to provide the Beafort Earls of Somerset with opportunities; the 3rd Earl [John Beaufort], one of John's younger sons, was promoted Duke of Somerset in 1443 following various military operations in Normandy, Anjou, and Maine, though these were

competently executed rather than conspicuously triumphant. Probably his close kinship with Henry VI was the chief cause of his leap in the peerage, for his mother Margaret was daughter of Thomas Earl of Kent, a descendant of Edward I. It is this Duke of Somerset's daughter who was mother of Henry VII.

The Dukedom of Somerset created in 1443 expired with the death of the grantee [John Beaufort] in 1444. His brother [Edmund Beaufort] inherited as 4th Earl of Somerset, however, and in 1448 was promoted Duke of Somerset, despite a military career of relative failure during the last phase of the Hundred Years War. He died fighting on the Lancastrian side at the 1st Battle of St. Albans in 1455.

He was a English statesman and general. He fought in France in the Hundred Years War, receiving his first command in 1431, recapturing Harfleur in 1440, and relieving Calais in 1442. For this last feat he was made (1442) earl of Dorset. In 1444 he succeeded his brother John as earl of Somerset. He became lieutenant of France in 1447 and was created duke of Somerset in 1448. After the war in France was resumed in 1449, Somerset's army was consistently defeated, and by 1453 all of England's French possessions except Calais had been lost. Since the murder (1450) of William de la Pole, 1st duke of Suffolk, Somerset had been the head of the court faction and was protected by Henry VI against popular resentment and the attacks of the Yorkists. He was imprisoned by Richard, duke of York, during Henry's first period of insanity (1453/55) but returned to power when the king recovered. Somerset was killed at St. Albans in the first battle of the Wars of the Roses.

Sir John de Northwood and Lady Agnes de Grandison are the 18th great grandparents of Donald Loyd Norwood.

ii John²⁰ **de Northwood** [9537], born 1309/19; died 11 Oct 1360 in Lambeth Palace. Notes: 24 Bishop of Sheppey, Bishop of Rochester became a Benedictine Monk Sir John de Northwode, born about 1310, "of tender age", and coheir of his father's share of his grandfather's Kent gavelkind lands in 1319. Under 15 years old in June 1325 at the death of Lora Peyforer. In December 1327 John Norwode was granted the prebend of Stoke by the Archbishop of York. John Grandison, his uncle, had held the prebend of Stoke, Lincoln diocese, from 1322 to 1327 before he was consecrated the Bishop of Exeter. Confirmation from the Pope, at Avignon 19 January 1327 [28], "To John son of the late John de Northwode, Knight, provision of a canonry and prebend of Lincoln" Two letters dated 9 December 1328 and 12 December 1328 to John from his uncle are recorded in the bishop's register. John studied in Oxford and Paris in 1328-29, received a M.A. by 1334, and a Doctor of Theology. Allowance was given to John, Bishop of Exeter, to grant to his nephew John de Northwood, Canon of Lincoln, a canonry in his church and a reservation of a prebend in the same on 5 October 1331. Pope John XXII in October 1332 granted John, Bishop of Exeter, the right to assign a canonry of Exeter to his nephew John de Northwode, then a canon of Lincoln. Pope Benedict XII in January 1335 granted John the prebend of Boseham and on 2 April 1335 granted John, canon of Lincoln, a reservation of a benefice, value 30 marks with cure of souls or 20 without, of the gift of the prior and convent of Lenton. John was made Archdeacon of Totnes, Exeter diocese, on 13 June 1338. Pope Benedict XII in January 1340 issued a mandate to John de Northwode, canon of Lincoln, to carry out apostates in regard to Roger de Worfeld, monk. On the patent rolls for 9 September 1341 is the assignment of master David Maynard to the church of Marteleye, Worcester, which was released by the resignation of master John de Northwode. John de Northwode became Chancellor of Oxford University in 1345. Pope Clement VI at Avignon, on 2 March 1346, granted dispensation at the request of Queen Philippa, to hold Ilfardicombe church Exeter diocese for John de Northwode, Master of Arts and Theology, Chancellor of Oxford University, in addition to canonries and prebends in Lincoln, Exeter, Wells and Boseham. John died shortly before 4 May 1349, as on that day by petition from the Prince of Wales, Pope Clement VI, granted Peter de Gildesburgh the archdeaconry of Totnes, a canonry and prebend of Exeter, void by the death of John de Northwode. In July 1349 Pope Clement VI granted to John de Holand the canonry and prebend of St. Carantoce, Cornwall, held by John de Northwode deceased.

iii William ²⁰ de Northwood [9539], born about 1311. Notes: Knight of St. John of Jerusalem. Sir William de Northwode was born about 1312, "of tender age" and coheir of his father's share of his grandfather's Kent gavelkind land in June 1319. He was under 15 years old in June 1325 at death of Lora Peyforer. On 29 March 1343 at Westminster, King Edward III had a letter written to the prior of Baroli, Berengar de Aurosio, commissary of the Grand Master of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem. King Edward requested that Berengar admit William de Northwode, Queen's page and cousin of the Earl of Salisbury, to knighthood in the order. He also issued a request to Peter de S. Marcello to speak to the Pope in favor of William. Thereafter, William assumed religious habit and orders at Clerkenwell.

iv Magister Thomas 20 de Northwood [9540], born about 1313; died before 6 May 1354. Notes: Magister Thomas de Northwode was born about 1314, of "tender age" and coheir of his father's share of his grandfather's Kent gavelkind lands in 1319. Under 15 years old in June 1325 at the death of Lora Peyforer. Thomas was subdean of Weldon Paynshall (Westhall), Lincoln from 14 June 1327 to 1329. On 18 May 1329, he exchanged Welton Paynshall for the prebend of Norton Episcopi, Lincoln diocese. He held Norton until shortly before his death in 1354. He was made Archdeacon of Stow on 14 April 1328, but was succeeded by Walter Maidstone in 1329. While archdeacon of Stow, he became subdean of Lincoln, 14 June 1328. He resigned to become treasurer of Lincoln 18 April 1329 and 18 May 1329. He was a archdeacon of Lincoln from 26 May 1331 until his death. Orders from Pope John 22, at Avignon, 3 February 1333, to Thomas de Northwode, professor of Theology, to provide at the king's request, a canonry and prebend of Chichester, not withstanding he has a canonry, prebend and archdeaconry of Lincoln. He was granted a prebend in Bishophurst in 1339 and 1349. He occurs as Archdeacon of Leicester in 1344 and Chancellor of Cambridge University. He was about to resign his archdeaconry on 1 June 1352, but apparently did not. He died shortly before 14 May 1354.

v Robert ²⁰ de Northwood [9541], born about 1314 in Sydenham, Kent, England; died before May 1325. Notes: Robert de Northwode was born about 1315 "of tender age" and coheir of his father's share of his grandfather's gavelkind land in June 1319. He appears to have died by June 1325 as he is not mentioned as an heir at the death of Lora Peyforer. Confirmed as he nor any heir of his was a party to the lawsuit in 1373.

vi Otto²⁰ de Northwood [9538], born about 1318; died 8 Nov 1360. Notes: Ortho was born ca 1319 (after his father's death). He was named after his great uncle, Sir. Otho Grandison, the famous knight, diplomat and confidant of several English kings. Otho de Northwode presumably born posthumously in the summer of 1319 after his father and grandfather's death as not mentioned as an heir. Under 15 years of age in June 1325 at death of Lora Peyforer. He was named after his greatuncle, the famous knight, diplomat and confidant of several English kings. Sir Otho de Gradison. Incredibly at the age of 12, orders from Pope John 22, at Avignon, 16 January 1331, to Otto, son of John de Northwode, provision of a canonry of Chichester with reservation of a prebend. Four years later, at 16, we find a grant by Pope Benedict XII at Avignon, 2 June 1335, to Otho de Northwode, a canonry of Chichester, with reservation of a prebend, not withstanding he has a portion without cure of souls in St. Tethe church, Exeter dicoese. Also granted a prebend of Bracklesham on 2 February 1338 and in 1345. From the papal records: confirmation of a prebend on 4 October 1349 and confirmation by Pope Clement VI on 6 April 1350 to Otho de Northwode, nephew of Bishop of Exeter, bachelor, the archdeaconry, canonry and prebend of Exeter, canonries and prebends of Chichester,



Cotton, Walton [-in-] Bosheam, St. Theth, St. Thomas the Martyr at the Collegiate church of Glasney and St. Mary Ottery. Four months later, grant by Pope Clement VI at Avignon 2 August 1350, to Otho de Northwode, bachelor of civil and canon law, canon of Exeter. Dispensation, at request of his uncle, John, Bishop of Exeter, to hold 2 benefices with cure of souls and one without. He occurs in church records on Easter 1351 and 29 October 1356. He resigned the Collegiate Church of St. Mary Ottery on 23 July 1356. He was dead by 16 November 1360.

Notes for Sir John de Northwood:

Sir John de Northwode was born ca 1276 and died 1318, son of Lord John and Lady Joan de Northwode. He married in 1306 Agnes Grandison who died 4 Dec 1348 the daughter of Lord William Grandison and his wife Sibyl Tregoz. On 3 Feb 1308, Sir John and his wife were summoned to the coronation of Edward II. Sir John died before 8 Sep 1318, which was before his father's death. John de Northwode was named after his great uncle, Sir Otho Grandison, the famous knight, diplomat and confidant of several English kings.

Sir John was first summoned as "Johannes de Northwode, junior" of county Kent, to perform military service in person against the Scots on 25 May 1298, but not again until 15 August 1314. In 1311 he and William de Valoignes were to lead the foot-soldiers raised in Kent to Roxburgh. He was summoned to a Parliament, with his father on 29 July 1314 to appear at York on 9 September 1314. Again with his father on 16 October 1315 he was summoned to appear at Lincoln on 27 January 1316. Orders were given on 8 August 1316 to pay his expenses for the special service of perambulation of forest. He was again summoned with his father in 1317 to appear at a Parliament at Lincoln on 27 January 1318.

The so-called "Parliamentary Roll" records John as bearing "De ermyne a une crois engrele de goules a un label de azure" (Ermine, a red engrailed cross and a blue label). The "Stepney Roll" indicates "Arg. a cross engrailed gu. a label of 3 points azure". Argent, or silver, is sometimes portrayed as white and therefore probably the scribes mistake for the correct Ermine.

On 13 June 1317, he and his father were among seven Kent men ordered to proceed to Dover as quickly as possible to receive the two Cardinals, Sir Luke de Flisco, deacon of St. Mary in Via Lata and Sir Gauselin Johannis, priest of SS. Marcellus and Peter, coming to work for peace between England and Scotland.

John died before his father, between 10 November 1317 and 8 September 1318, when Agnes, referred to as his widow, was granted the manor of Norwood Chastiners by his father.

Agnes paid taxes of 13sh. 4d. for her dower land in Milton hundred, Kent, in the 1334 lay subsidy [for Northwood Chasteners]. At an inquest held 15 July 1335 on her father's estate, Agnes was found holding Lydiard Tregoz manor, Wiltshire, for her life, of the barony of Ewyas, rendering to the heirs of William and Sibyl Tregoz, 1 rose yearly. This manor had descended to Agnes and her sister as heirs of her mother, Sibyl Tregoz. Agnes was one of her father's executors.

Agnes died 4 December 1348. A writ was issued on 15 December 1348 to inquire into her estate. The inquisition held on 23 December 1348 in Wiltshire found that she died holding:

Lydiard Tregoz manor; and 40ac. in Parkwode and part of Bradene forest for life for 1 rose yearly of Peter de Grandison. The reversion

was granted to Roger and Sibyl Beauchamp [Agnes's niece].

Notes for Ralph Neville [Baron De Neville]:

Ralph de Neville, Lord Neville of Raby, age 40+ at father's death, born c 1291, d. 5 Aug 1367; married license 14 Jan 1326/7 Alice de Audley, died 12 Jan 1373/4. [Magna Charta Sureties].

Ralph, educated at Oxford, captured with his elder brother Robert, and his 2 younger brothers Alexander and John at the Scots victory at the Battle of Bannockburn 24 June 1314, was ransomed at crippling cost to his father. Witnessed his elder brother "The Peacock of the North" Robert's death in June 1319 at the hands of Sir James Douglas (known as "The Good" by the Scots, but also, especially by the English, as the "Black Douglas" from his dark complexion) outside the walls of Berwick Castle in single combat, a contest arranged in revenge for the killing by Neville and his brothers the previous Dec of Richard FitzMarmaduke. [Burke's Peerage]

Fourth Baron of Raby, second Baron Neville. Ralph was captured in a battle with the Scots in 1318. He was ransomed and lived to command a division of English that soundly defeated the Scots at the Battle of Neville's Cross on 17 October 1346, when the Scots were defeated and King David captured. The battle was fought one-half mile west of Durham on the Brancepeth road near the old cross. After the battle, lord Neville replaced it with a much grander monument. It stood for 240 years in good condition until 1589 when it was vandalized. These remains still stand.

Constable of Warkworth Castle, keeper of peace in Yorkshire and Raby, assisted in truce with Robert Bruce, named warded on marches in Northumberland, Cumberland and Westmorland, named superior warden, steward of Kings household. Note: 1350-with English fleet in battle with Spaniards off Calais. Note: 1355-in France with battle of Poitiers Note: He was buried in the church of Durham, on the south side thereof, being the first layman that had sepulture there.

Ralph de Neville, 2nd baron, was summoned to parliament from 20 November, 1331, to 20 January, 1336. This nobleman, in the time of his father, was retained by indenture to serve the Lord Henry de Percy for life, in peace and war, against all men except the king, with twenty men-at-arms, whereof five to be knights receiving £100 sterling per annum.

In the 7th Edward III [1314], Lord Neville was one of the commissioners sent into Scotland, there to see that the covenants between Edward de Baliol, King of Scots, and his royal master were ratified by the parliament of that kingdom; and the next year he was joined with Henry de Percy in the wardenship of the marches of Northumberland, Cumberland, and Westmoreland. He had,

subsequently, other high and confidential employments and was constantly engaged in the wars of Scotland and France. His lordship married Alice, daughter of Sir Hugh de Audley, and by her (who m 2ndly, Ralph, Lord Greystoke, and died 1374) had issue, John, Thomas, Robert, Alexander, Ralph, Euphemia, Catherine, Margaret, Isabel, and Fleanor

He died in 1367 and was buried in the church of Durham, on the south side thereof, being the first layman that had sepulture there, which favor he obtained from the prior and convent for a vestment of red velvet, richly embroidered with gold silk, great pearls, and images of the saints standing in tabernacles by him given to St. Cuthbert. His body being brought in a chariot drawn by seven horses to the boundary of the churchyard and thence conveyed upon the shoulders of knights into the middle of the church where the abbot of St. Mary's in York (by reason of the bishop's absence and impotency of the dean), performed the office of the dead, and celebrated the morrow mass, at which were offered eight horses, viz., four for the war, with four men armed, and all their harness and habiliments; and four others for peace; as also three cloths of gold, of blue color, interwoven with flowers. Four of those horses were redeemed after the funeral by Sir John, his son and heir, for 100 marks. His lordship was son by his eldest son, Sir John de Neville. Notes for Alice Audley [Baroness Neville]:

He [Ralph de Greystoke] married, after 25 November 1317, [f] Alice, sister of Hugh, Earl of Gloucester, and daughter of Hugh (Audley), Lord Audley, by Iseude, widow of Sir Walter DE BALUN, of Much Marcle, co. Hereford, and daughter of Sir Edmund DE MORTIMER, of Wigmore, co. Hereford. He died at Gateshead, being poisoned, 14 July 1323, aged nearly 24, and was buried in Newminster Abbey. His widow had livery of her dower, 12 August and 27 September 1323, and of the knights' fees, cornages, and advowsons of her dower, 18 and 26 December following, all of which had been assigned to her by the King. Notes for Maurice (the Magnanimous) de Berkeley:

Sir Maurice de Berkeley, 1st/2nd Baron Berkeley; Lord de Berkeley, son and heir, who "may bee called Maurice the Magnanimous," distinguished himself in Scottish Wars 1295-1318; at Siege of Carlaverock July 1300. He was summoned to Parliament v.p., from 16 August 1308 to 15 May 1321 in his father's lifetime by a series of writs worded to him as "Maurice de Berkeley", whereby he may be held to have become Lord Berkeley, though there is no actual record of his having sat in Parliament. In which by a later interpretation would have meant that he was made Lord (Baron) Berkeley in a separate creation to that of his father.

He held several important posts, v.p., being Warden Gloucester 1312, Capt. Berwick 1315, Commissioner to Scotland 1316, Chief Justiciar of South Wales 1316, and Seneschal of Aquitaine 1320, Shortly afterwards he joined the Earl of Lancaster's insurrection against King Edward II



and his favorites the Despenser Family, and within 6 months of his father's death was sent prisoner to Wallingford Castle, 20 Jan 1321/2, where he died about a year afterwards.

Sir Maurice de Berkeley, married (1) 1289, neither being over eight years of age, Eva la Zouche. Eve, sister of William la Zouche, (Lord Zouche of Haryngworth), and daughter of Eudo la Zouche, by Millicent, sister and coheir of George de Cauntelo, Lord of Abergavenny, daughter of William de Cauntelo, of Calne, county. Wilts and Aston Cantlow, County Warwick. She died 6 Dec 1314, and was buried in Portbury Church, Somerset.

He married 2ndly, about 1316, Isabel, daughter of Gilbert de Clare, Earl of Gloucester and Hertford, by his 1st wife Alice, daughter of Hugh XI, called le Brun, Sire de Lusignan, Count of la Marche and Angouleme (uterine brother of Henry III). He died as aforesaid, 31 May 1326, and was buried at Wallingford, but removed to St. Augustine's, Bristol (c). Inq. p.m. Feb 1326/7. His widow was born 10 Mar 1262/3, dsp 1333. [Complete Peerage II:128-9, XIV:87]

Note: This makes him a father at the age of 14, for which Smyth quotes the Biblical precedents of Solomon and Ahaz, each a father at 11 and of King Josiah at 14, and adds that his own "small reading could parallel more than a dozen other parents which have been Fathers and Mothers at 14 years". The date of birth appears to rest on his being found to be 40 years old in 1321 in two inquisitions on his father's death, "and" says Smyth "he best knew his own age that sett it down." It is however now recognized that the age of men in middle life being a matter of little practical importance, is seldom given with any degree of accuracy in the inquisitions. His birth (as the elder son of his parents) would more probably be in 1271 than in 1281, ie. after some 4, rather than some 14, years of their marriage.

Lord John²² de Northwood [9531], born 17 Jun 1254 in Norwood, Addington, Kent, England; died 18 May 1319 in Isle of Sheppey, Kent, England, son of 479 Sir Roger de Northwode [9544] and 480 Lady Bona Fitz Bernard [9546]. He married before 1273 448 Lady Joan de Badlesmere [9532], born about 1255 in Horton Kirby, Dartford, Kent, England; died 25 May 1319 in Kent, England, daughter of 481 Bartholomew de Badlesmere [9754]. Note see front cover of this book. Lord John de Northwood and Lady Joan de Badlesmere are the 19th great grandparents of Donald Loyd Norwood.

Children of Lord John de Northwood and Lady Joan de Badlesmere were as follows:

- **i Sir James** ²¹ **de Northwood** [9533], died before 1372. Notes: (8) Sir James de Northwode. Sir James was knighted in 1306 with Edward, Prince of Wales. He was dead without issue before 1319 as he was not recorded then as an heir.
- ii Master Thomas²¹ de Northwood [9534], born about 1286; died 20 Feb 1317. Notes: (9) Master Thomas de Northwode was born about 1287. He was ordained September 21, 1303, at Chartham church by Robert Winchelsey, Archbishop of Canterbury. As rector of Cudenne, Rochester diocese, Thomas was ordained subdeacon by the Archbishop on September 18, 1305, at the collegiate church of Wingham, Kent. Thomas de Northwood, priest, was instituted to Wormsell church on June 17, 1312 by his father and patron, Sir John de Northwood, replacing his brother Richard who had gone to Patching church. On February 28, 1317 Thomas, Bishop of Rochester died. Hamo, born about 1280 at Hythe, was prior of Rochester at this time. Archbishop Reynolds was in favor of his chancellor, John de Bruytone, while Lady Badlesmere, an important local magnate, was in favor of Thomas de Northwode. However, on March 22, the monks chose their prior Hamo to be the next Bishop. He was one of the heirs of his father and mother's gavelkind lands in 1319. Possibly the Thomas who granted land in Cranbrook in 1324. Whether this was Cranbrook in Newington or Cranbrook parish is unclear. Two fines he engaged in have survived.



One made at York, in the quindene of Trinity, 2 Edward III (1328), the other at Westminster, octave of St. Martin, 5 Edward III [Nov. 11, 1331], between Michael, son of Michael de Ponynges, complainant and Master Thomas de Northwode, deforicant. They concerned a rent of 9 quarters of barley in Tenham, Kent, which Agnes, widow of John de Northwode, held for her life. Master Thomas granted that the rental should revert to Michael after her death. Nothing further is known of Thomas.

Richard de Northwood, subdeacon, was collated April 24, 1311 to Patching, Sussex, church. He was a coheir to his father and mother's gavelkind lands in 1319. Because there was no Bishop of Lincoln at the time, on June 16, 1320, the king granted to "Master Richard de Northwode, king's clerk", the archdeaconry of Stowe. A Sir Richard de Northwode, priest, acted as proxy for a Sir Symon de Northwode, priest, (of unknown relationship) at Symon's installation to the church at Houghton-Conquest on December 2, 1339. Although unlikely, it is possible that Richard left the church and married by 1330 as in a Kent fine of September 1330, a Richard de Northwood and wife Matilda [of Boughton] granted a messuage and 64 acres of land in Bilsyntone to John Tannere of Apuldre [.feld?].

Notes for Lord John de Northwood:

1st Lord Sir John de Northwode, son of Sir Roger and Bona de Northwode was born 24 Jun 1254 and died 26 May 1319. He is buried in the Minster Abbey. He was Sheriff of Kent from 1292 to 1300. He married Lady Joan Badlesmere who died 2 Jun 1391 and is also buried in Minster Abbey. This marriage added a great deal to the family fortune for she owned the manors of Horton near Canterbury and Beausfelde near Dover in the county of Kent. She also possessed certain tenements in Southwarke in the County of Surry and Rents in the City of London. Joan Badlesmere was probably the daughter of Giles de Badlesmere and therefore the sister of the infamous Bartholomew de Badlesmere who was hung for treason 14 Apr 1322.

Sir John de Northwode was summoned 8 Jun 1294 with about sixty others to advise the king on urgent affairs. He was summoned for military service abroad in 1297 and 1298 in Scotland. He was sent to Scotland on military service. He was knighted at Carlaverock in 1300 by King Edward I. In 1308, he and his wife were summoned to the coronation of King Edward II. He was summoned to Parliament 8 January 1312/3 to 20 March 1318/9 where he was given the title Lord Northwode. In Jun 1317, with his son, John, and six other Kentish notables, he went to Dover to meet the cardinals, Sir Luke deFlisco, Deacon of St. Mary in Via Lata and Sir Gauselin Johannis, Priest of SS. Marcellus and Peter, who were sent to England at the king's request to work for peace between England and Scotland. (5) 1st Baron

Sir John de Northwood 1254 - 1319:

On the so-called "Parliamentary Roll", Sir John de Northwode of Kent "bore arms: "De Ermyne a une crois engrele de goules" (Ermine, a red engrailed cross).

He married by 1274, Joan de Badlesmere, lady of the manors of Horton near Canterbury and Beausfield [Whitfield] near Dover.

In Kirkby's inquest about 1285, John is recorded as being tenant of 1/8 part of 1 knights fee in Chartham [Horton manor] of Leeds barony in Felbergh hundred. As this was just before his father died, he and Joan were probably living there.

By December 10, 1285, at the age of 31, a month after his father's death, he did homage to the king for livery of his inheritance, and orders were issued to deliver his father's land to him.

On May 26 1286 at Newynton, the sheriff of Kent held an inquisition. Bartholomew de Beriteghe and others had entered the warren (woodlands) of John de Northwode at Thomham and taken game; Hamon de Strutton of Detling and others had also taken trees from John's woods.

The following summer, 18 June 1290, John was referred to as the chamberlain of Middleton. Then he was given orders to deliver the 12 oldest, leafless beech-stumps (robora de fago folia non portancia), in the kings Chastiner woods to Stephen de Penecestre, constable of Dover castle, for castle fires. Another order for John to give 6 good oak trees from Paysell wood, fit for timber, to Roger de Tilmanstone.

In 1294 he and several others were summoned to advise the king. Shortly thereafter, he was to outfit himself with horse and arms, and to be at Portsmouth on September 1 and thence to France. Therefore John's recorded military service began when he was 40.

On March 24 1300, order was given to the king's chamberlain of Middelton to give wood to John de Northwode, sheriff of Kent and constable of Leeds castle. Six Oaks from Merdene woods, fit for timber to repair the castle's mill. Information supplied by William, bishop of Coventry and Lichfield. Mandate to John to see that the repairs are made.

Being sheriff was an onerous and possibly costly office. In the 1306 term, when John was 52, the Bishop of Rochester was instructed that his property be seized if John refused the appointment.

On February 8, 1308 he and his wife were summoned to be in the train of the King and Queen at the coronation of King Edward II. A month later, on March 17 he was made a justice of Gaol delivery at Canterbury Castle in Kent.

Even though John was now 55 years old, on 30 July 1309 be received a summons to appear in person at Newcastle-upon-Tyne to fight in Scotland. He had returned home by December 18th as then he, Henry de Cobham and Roger de Tokton were appointed judges in Kent to receive complaints of prises.

At the age of 59, on January 8, 1313, by writs directed "Johannei de Northwode", he received his first summons to a Parliament to be held at Westminster on March 18, 1313, whereupon he, and therefore his heirs, became **Lord Northwode**. On May 23 he was summoned as a Baron and to appear again at a Parliament at Westminster on July 8, 1313. Thereafter he was summoned to all Parliaments until his death.



It would appear that John junior died in the summer of 1318 as on September 8, John senior paid 5 marks to the king for a license to grant Northwode Chastmers to his daughter-in-law Agnes, late the wife of John junior, for her life.

Apparently just before he died John sold Bokhurste manor, a part of the honor of 1'Aigle, to Joan, widow of Andrew de Sakeville. She was pardoned on 17 Aug 1319 as it had been sold without the king's license. From a plea made at Hilary term in 1319, it appears that Harrietsham came to the Northwodes as Juliane's dowry. Juliane de Saye married grandson Roger. Juliane, widow of William de Leyboume, claimed 1/3 of the manor of Harrietsham against John de Northwode, who had called Richard son of Roger Loveday to warrant. John lost the 1/3 part by default. What connection Richard was I don't know, but the sheriff reported that Richard was dead, and his sister and coheirs were ordered to appear. Two months later at Easter term, the sisters appeared, but John did not (probably now deathly ill). This was confirmed three months later in the inquisition after John s death.

At Easter term 1319, John and Joan granted Shalford manor, Essex, to Sir Humphrey Northwood [their son] and his heirs, to hold of Joan and heirs of Joan by paying 10 lbs. sterling at Michaelmas and at Easter. Perhaps anticipating their deaths and or maybe to better guarantee their title, at Easter term 1319, younger brother Henry was summoned to the court of common pleas. Henry was required to make answer to John and wife Joan for observance of a covenant concerning the manor of Northwode in the Isle of Shepeye. A concord was made by license. As evidence John produced a charter of King Edward [1?] licensing him to enfeoff Master Henry of the said manor and Master Henry to re-enfeoff said John and Joan. This was a perfect example of how property ownership was guaranteed in the middle ages. Because of the chance of loss and change in kings, apparently it was wise to grant-regrant your property every generation.

John continued to receive military summonses up to his death, being at this time in the retinue of Bartholomew de Badlesmere. On June 10, 1318 he was to appear in person at York on July 26th to again fight the Scots. His last summons was dated March 20, 1319 to appear at Newcastle on June 10, 1319. After 22 Years of service, he was not to make his last call, having died on the vigil of Pentecost, May 26, 1319. His wife Joan died on the vigil of the Holy Trinity, June 2, 1319.

Both are said to be buried in the church of Minster-in-Sheppey where memorial brasses to their memory have been the subject of much attention over the last 200 years, the knight being 5'-8", the lady 5'-2". The brasses were last reset and restored in 1881 by Rev. Curteis Norwood. A very thorough and detailed article on them is in Archaelogica Cantiana, volume 36, p.43-7.

After John died, the crown, through a writ dated June 6, 1319, ordered that "Inquisitions Post Mortem" (our modern Probate) be held to determine the extent of the estates of John de Northwode, knight, the elder.

Notes for 1st Baron Robert de Holand:

Robert de Holland, 1st Baron Holand was born in Lancashire, England in 1270. At some point before 1312 he married Maude la Zouche. She was daughter of Lord Alan de la Zouche of Ashby and Eleanor de Segrave. In 1328 he was beheaded in Essex. His body was sent to Lancashire to be buried.

He was a favorite of Thomas Plantagenet, 2nd Earl of Lancaster and knighted in 1307. He served him by suppressing the rising of Adam Banastre. From 1314 to 1321 he was called to Parliament. After that his part in the Battle of Boroughbridge was deemed cowardly and led to his disfavor. Although King Edward III of England would later pardon him the partisans of the Earl of Lancaster considered him a traitor and had him executed.[1][2]

He was something of a small player in this era and so might be more noted for being of genealogical interest. This is because he's apparently an ancestor to George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Madison, William Henry Harrison, Benjamin Harrison, Ulysses S. Grant, Louis XVI, and Winston Churchill. He also has connections to the royal line of Medieval Scotland. There is actually some information on his ancestors going back to Mathew de Holland [3], but before then little is known.

Notes for Thomas (The Wise) de Berkeley:

1st Baron of Berkeley, Thomas De Berkeley, feudal Lord of Berkeley, 2nd, but 1st surviving son and heir (c), who "may bee called Thomas the Wise." He was born at Berkeley 1245, was at the battle of Evesham when under age, and was for nearly every year for the last 50 years of his life "employed either against the Welsh, the Scots, or the French." He was summoned to attend the King at Shrewsbury 28 June 1283 by writ directed 'Thome de Berkel', which writ was actually treated in the Mowbray case (1877) as one which created a hereditary Peerage. On 24 June 1295, he was summoned to Parliament by writ directed Thome de Berkelegh', whereby he may be held to have become Lord Berkeley. He continued to be so summoned till 15 May 1321. He was made Vice-Constable of England in 1297, was at the bloody battle and defeat of the Scots at Falkirk 22 July 1298, the siege of Carlaverock in July 1300, and was taken prisoner at the battle of Bannockburn, 24 June 1314, paying a large sum for his ransom. He was likewise on the Commission to examine the claims to the Crown of Scotland, June 1292; was on an Embassy to France, January 1296, and to Pope Clement V, in July 1307.

Thomas de Berkeley, this nobleman was of great eminence in the reigns of Edward I and Edward II, being in the French, Welsh, and Scottish wars of those periods, particularly at the celebrated siege of Carlaverock. He was involved, however, at the close of his life in the treason of Thomas, Earl of Lancaster.

Note: (c) Maurice, his elder brother, was killed in a tournament at Kenilworth, vp in 1279.

Sir Roger²³ **de Northwode** [9544], born about 1189/1245 in Isle Of Sheppey, Kent, England; died 2 Nov 1286 in Kent, England, son of 496 Sir Stephen de Northwoode [9545] and 497 Fedive de Landries (---) [9549]. He married before 1247 in Thurnham, Kent, England 480 **Lady Bona FitzBernard** [9546], born 1215 in Shorne, Kent, England; died 1285, daughter of 498 Henry De Waltham, [10195].

Notes: (6) Known as Henry of Hoo and Stone Castle, Kent and was Rector of Staplehurst 1284-1288. Canterbury Cathedral Priory borrowed large sums of money without interest from local Kent landowners such as his father Roger. For this the priory was willing to grant favors to members of the lender's family. The priory paid Henry 50 sh. in 1275 and 100sh. per year from 1276 to 1289. On June 27, 1287, at Canterbury, an inquisition was held before the sheriff, Sirs Henry de Apoldrefeud and Robert de Sevanz, and others. On Thursday evening before St. Barnabas, John FitzJohn de Pysinge and others came with nets to John de Pysinge's Cheperegge manor and fished in his preserves all night, taking fish of 100s. value. They carried it away in a boat and a cart to the court of Westwelle parsonage, which belongs to Master Henry de Northwode, without his knowledge. On April 3, 1288, Nicholas de Waleton, priest, was instituted to the Staplehurst, Kent, church by patron John de Somery, vacated by the resignation of Master Henry de Northwood. On 4 Dec 1289 protection with clause "volumus" for master Henry de Northwode, going over seas with master John de Lascy on the king's service for 1 year. Enrolled on the close rolls for 30 January 1292, William de Valoignes, John de Cobbeham, Richard de Grovenhal and Master Henry de Northwode acknowledge they owe William de Valence 200 marks. Collateral to be their land and chattels in Kent -- marked later cancelled as paid off. On 19 Nov 1298 Robert Winchelsey, Archbishop of Canterbury, issued a commission to the dean of South Mailing to install Robert de Ros to the prebend of South Mailing church, vacated by the resignation of Master Henry de Northwode. In 1303, the abbot of St. Augustine sent a commission of men to negotiate peace between the abbey and the Archbishop of Canterbury. The members were Aymer de Valence, Earl of Pembroke, Sir Richard de Inkepenne, Sir Henry de Apoldrefeld, and Sir John Tavy. Master Henry Norwood, clerk, and James Synobaldi of Florence, clerk, and Brothers Richard and Ralph, monks. Henry and James were among 14 "pensioners" of St. Augustine for sums varying from 40 sh. to 10 lbs. Henry was granted a license on March 10, 1303 to alienate (sell) lands to pay for a chaplain to pray for the souls of his father. Sir Roger and his mother Bone, forever. He sold to the Priory of Minster-in-Sheppey lands and a marsh called Blakenhall in Iwade, Kent. In 1309 at Westminster, on the octave of St. John the Baptist, his brother John granted to him, for life, 1 messuage, 100 acres land, 10 acres meadow, 40 acres pasture, 10 acres osier, 8 lbs 5sh. rent and other rents of 30 hens, and 2 capons, with appurtenances in Lytlebrook, Stone, Derteford, and Der[e]nte by service of a rose at the nativity of St. John the Baptist.

Notes for Sir Roger de Northwode:

Sir Roger de Northwode was a minor at his father's death; he was of age in 1247. In Sep 1275, he was knighted; he was commissioned for many public services. He was in charge of Dover Castle prior to 8 Jan 1259. In Sep 1265 he was a knight commissioned in Kent to take the lands of the rebels into the king's hands; served as steward of Archbishop of Canterbury. From 1275 or 1276 until his death he was Baron of the Exchequer. Sir Roger took an interest in the old monastery of St. Sexburge for it had been long neglected. He made many repairs and donated to the monastery, "wherefore among the servants of God, he is to this day called the restorer of that house." Sir Roger died 9 Nov 1286 and is buried at Minster. Sir Roger Norwood married Bona FitzBernard, aka Bona de Waltham. Adding to his wealth, Bona brought to her husband the Manors of Shorne and Thornham.

Roger, according to a plaque on the wall in the keep of Dover Castle (1979), was listed as the 32nd Constable of Dover Castle for the period 1255-1258. For a translation of the Charter from King Henry III to Roger de Northwood in which the King grants to Roger over 500 acres of land in various size parcels, refer to James G. Dempsey's "Norwood Northwood families of Kent Warwickshire and Gloucestershire. The Charter is dated January 18, 1257 at Westminster.

Sir Roger de Northwood, Baron of the Exchequer:

Roger de Northwood, son and heir of Sir Stephen de Northwood, who died in April, 1231. Since Roger was still a minor in 1231, he could not have been born before 1210. Since his father Stephen had married Fedive de Berges between 1200 and 1206, and she was still alive in 1213, it is likely that Roger's mother was his father's second wife, Joan. If we assume that his charter to St. Bartholomew's hospital occurred shortly after he became 21, he would have been born in 1225. Since he was under age at his father's death, and his property was held from the king. King Henry III appointed Richard de St. John as his guardian.

He was of age by May 20, 1246, when at Rochester, Roger granted a charter to the prior and the brothers and sisters of the hospital of lepers of St. Bartholomew at Chatham by Rochester, of a livery (payment) of 40 shillings a year from land called 'Northwude' in 'Audeltune' [mideltune?] hundred, plus .5 acre lying by Middeltun [Milton] market and the use of the king's pasture for 1 horse and 2 cows. This charter was reconfirmed on March 5, 1449 and July 22, 1475 at Westminster.

He married by 1246 Bone, alias Bonnefille or Bonafilia, ('good daughter') sister and heir of John de Waltham (in 1265), and daughter of Henry de Waltham or Wautham. Bona was possibly a granddaughter of Ralph FitzBernard and Alianora de Thurnham, heiress of Binbury and Thumham Court.

Roger was known to have great affection for the Nunnery founded by Saint Sexburga in 675 AD next to Minster-in-Sheppey church on land given her by her son, King Egbert, King of Kent from 664 to 675. Prior to Roger's time it had fallen to ruin, but he caused it to be revived at his own cost. As late as 1400, he was still regarded as the restorer of that house

Much of Roger's inheritance was subject to the ancient Kent law of 'Gavelkind' which led to the partition of property amongst all the sons of a family. To avoid the fragmentation that would occur, Roger was able to get King Henry III to convert his estates from Gavelkind tenure to that of military service. He was the first Kent baron to receive a charter from an English king for this purpose. Since Northwood Chasteners had been created for his father Stephen out of property of the ancient royal manor of Milton, the king was his direct liege lord. This is fortunate, for after this time, royal inquisitions would be taken upon Northwood family deaths and then preserved in the crown records at the tower of London. The charter he received on January 18, 1257 was copied into the charter rolls. This gave Roger license to hold by knight service, not only lands inherited from his father, but any he had acquired in any other way in Sheppey, Iwade, Bobbing, Milton and Newington.

In 1257 Reynold de Cobham was sheriff of Kent and died in office. Sir Roger de Northwood was appointed chief executor and as such was put in charge of Dover Castle and returned the sheriff's accounts for the first half of 1257-8. The last patent issued for Reynold was on November 4, 1257. All merchants and importers of wine and the bailiffs of Sandwich and Winchelsea were not to sell wines until the sheriff, Reynold, had purchased 100 tons of wine for the king, both this year and the next.



Presumably Roger took over seeing to these purchases during December 1257. A plaque on the wall in the keep of Dover Castle (1979) lists Roger as the 32nd Constable of Dover Castle, for the period 1255-58. On January 8, 1258, he was to receive his successor, Nicholas de Molis, at Dover Castle and to deliver to him the Castle and its arms.

The "Dering Roll" of arms shows Roger bearing "ermine, a cross engrailed Gules". On the so-called Planche Roll of Arms, created about 1270, #219 is "Roger de Northwood, Ermine a cross engrailed Gu."

By 1275, his financial, judicial and diplomatic skills lead him to be appointed a Baron of the exchequer, a post he held until his death in 1285.

He was commissioned to scrutinize the chests of Jewish chirographers at Canterbury on November 24, 1275. He was to go in person and have the chests lately sealed with his seal, to be opened and all the charters transcribed, and those which have been acquitted by Christians to be delivered to them June 10, 1277. A copy of all charters and debts were to be sent to the King under Roger's seal. The chests were to be resealed and left in the condition found.

Canterbury Cathedral Priory borrowed large sums of money without interest from local Kent landowners. Henry de Sandwich lent 495/6/8 over a period of 30 years. Gregory de Rokesley lent 66/13/4 in 1279, 150/0/0 in 1281 and 33/6/8 in 1283. For this the Priory was willing to grant favors to members of the lender's family. John de Cobham lent 100/0/0 in 1276, 20/0/0 in 1281 and 66/33/4 in 1284. Thomas de Cobham served as one of the priory's legal advisors from 1284 to 1292, receiving 5 marks per year. Roger de Northwood loaned them 100 marks in 1274 and 200 lbs. in 1278. The Priory paid his son Henry de Northwode 50 sh. in 1275 and 100 sh. per year from 1276 to 1289.

For the years 1279-81, 83 and 1285, Roger de Northwood, John de Cobham, and Philip de Wyleghby, were commissioned Barons of the Exchequer, at a fee of 40 lbs/year.

On 16 May 1285, an early example of an environmental impact statement is recorded. A commission was given to Salomon of Rochester and Roger de Northwode to enquire into whose land would be affected by a proposed trench and to assess the damages. The barons of Sandwich had been granted a license by the king to construct a trench from Gestlyng to Stonflete and from Stonflete to Sandwich so as to relocate the course of Northbrok to flow to Sandwich instead of Gestlyng.

Four days later, an air pollution complaint was to be investigated. Roger de Northwode, John de Cobham and Henry le Galeys [Waleys?] were commissioned to enquire into the current operation of limekilns in London and Southwark. Formerly the lime was burnt with wood, but it is now burnt with sea-coal with the result that the air is "infected and corrupted to the peril of those frequenting and dwelling in those parts". They are to work with the mayor and sheriffs of London and the bailiffs of Southwark.

Roger died 9 November 1285. His obit kept on that day at Davington Priory, Faversham -- "Sir Roger de Northwode, our brother and benefactor". The Northwood Genealogical Roll says that Roger and Bona were buried before the altar in Minster church. An inscription still extant in 1659, "but now gone, is supposed to have said: "Hie iacent Rogerus de Northwood miles et Boon vxor eius sepuiti ante conquestum"

Many writers have discussed this epitaph, assuming either a piece missing, a transcription error, a mistake when cut or it was meant to imply the family's presence on Sheppey predated the conquest in 1066. The antiquarian John Weever questioned the inscriptions antiquity in 1631.

On November 15, 1285 the escheator south of the river Trent was ordered to take into the king's hand the lands late of Roger de Northwood, deceased, tenant-in-chief. A writ was issued requesting an inquisition be held regarding properties that he had held. But, by December 10, the escheator was ordered to release Roger's lands to John, son and heir, John having done homage to the king.

Joan (of Acre), Countess of Gloucester and Hertford, born at Acre in Palestine probably in 1272, was 2nd daughter of Edward I, by Eleanor of Castile. She was first betrothed to Herman, son of the King of Germany, who died in 1282, before the marriage could take place. She married 1stly, at the beginning of May 1290, in Westminster Abbey, by dispensation granted 16 Nov 1289, Gilbert de Clare, Earl of Gloucester and Hertford, above named, who d. 7 Dec 1295. She married 2ndly, clandestinely, to her father's great displeasure, presumably early in 1297, Ralph de Monthermer, a member of the late Earl's household. On 29 Jan 1296/7 the escheator was ordered to take into this hand all the lands, goods, and chattels of Joan, Countess of Gloucester, from which it might be inferred that the King, suspecting her intentions with regard to Monthermer, sought to coerce her to abandon the marriage by degradation and loss of estates. On 16 Mar, the King gave his assent to her marriage with Amadeus of Savoy, and therefore must have been ignorant of her marriage, if it had already taken place, and on 12 May it was ordered that Joan should have reasonable allowance for herself and children. It would seem that by 3 July the King had discovered Joan's marriage with Monthermer, for he took her lands into his own had, but by 31 July, when he certainly knew of her marriage, he appears to have been partly mollified, for her lands were restored (except Tonbridge); in ordering her to provide 100 men to serve in France, however, the special proviso was made that they might be commanded by anyone except Ralph de Monthermer, her husband. She was pardoned two days later, 2 Aug 1297. She d. 23, and was buried 26 Apr 1307, in the Austin Friar's church at Clare in Suffolk, aged 35. [Complete Peerage V: 708-

Note: Gilbert de Clare was not young when he married the fiery-spirited, sloe-eyed Joanna and took her to live at his country retreat in Clerkenwell not far from the Tower, where the king and queen were again in residence. She left for her new home with great fanfare, laden with royal gifts. After being a widow a year, she secretly married a completely unknown squire in her husband's retinue, Ralph de Monthermer. Through this marriage he became possessed in his own right of the earldoms of Gloucester & Hertford. The fact that a royal princess had dared to marry this obscure fellow became a cause celebré which for a time separated her from the affection of her father. It proved to be a marriage, however, leading ultimately to a firm friendship between the new son-in-law and Edward.

Notes for Sir Stephen de Northwoode:

James Gregg Dempsey says he occurred 1198 and died 21 April 1231. According to Complete Peerage Vol IX, p. 753. Stephen de Northwode son of Jordanus de Sheppey died shortly after 21 Apr 1231, not 1196.

The Norwood family built two manor houses, the manor on the Isle of Sheppey was known as "Norwood Manor" within Sheppey. Stephen de Northwode built a manor in the Parish of Milton. It was known as "Norwood without Sheppey" and also known as "Norwood Chasteners."

Stephen, son of Jordan de Sheppey, who lived in the reigns of Richard I and King John, obtained a grant from the crown and built a mansion here, which he built a moat round and encompassed with a park, well wooded and stored with abundance of deer and wild boars. Hence he assumed the name of Northwode, which was borne by all his descendants. [Marlene's Page, the Norwood Family, Internet, December 1998].

Stephen, the son of Jordan de Sheppey and Cicely, married (1) Fedive de Berges, widow of John de Landriesand he also married (2) Joan ______.

"The first time the surname Norwood occurs is in a court case in the year 1206. At this time, Stephen is also recorded as Stephen, son of Jordan of Sheppey or Stephen son of Cecily. The earliest dated occurrence of Stephen is in the tax rolls for the years 1198-1202 still existing in the public record office in Chancery Lane, London. He occurs with his mother, Cecily, and his brother William. Since Jordan is not mentioned, he is assumed to be dead by this time." Stephen's approximate birth date of 1165 is based on the fact that he paid to have King John reconfirm his grants that he received from King Richard I around the year 1185. He would have had to be of age at that time so his birth date is guessed to be the near 1165 figure. [James Dempsey, "Norwood - Northwood families of Kent Warwickshire and Gloucestershire", 1987]

Stephen's name can be found in a variety of ways because before the year 1200, the use of surnames or spelling had not been rigidly adopted. In tax rolls for the years 1214 and 1219, Northwood Manor has become well known enough for Stephen to identify himself as "Stephen of Norwood".

According to "Notes on the Norwood Family" by William Otis Sawtelle, privately published 1925 [Source 295]: "The name Norwood was originally Northwood having been assumed by Sir Stephen de Sheppey, son of John, to whom King Henry II, of England, gave the manor of Northwood Chasteners, in Kent. Stephen de Sheppey then



became known as Sir Stephen de Northwood and built a large mansion which for many years remained in the possession of his descendants. It is obvious how the name became contracted to Norwood.

That records of the family are traced back to the thirteenth century requires a word of explanation. In an English work of antiquarian and historical interest, Archaelogica Cantiana, volume II, pages 9 to 43, is a description of an ancient parchment scroll found in an iron bound oak desk among the rubbish in the lumber room of a castle in Kent. This parchment, minutely described in the article to which I have referred, happens to be a Norwood family written in a fourteenth century land. Other material of later date is found in the Visitations of Gloucester, 1623, William Berry's County Genealogies; numerous publications of the British Records Society, and in various English parish records." Mr. Sawtelle then goes on to list a table in abbreviated form showing the line of descent from Stephen de Northwood (I).

The Norwood family can trace their ancestors back to the ancient territories of England between the 11th and 12th centuries. The Norwood family traces their ancestral roots back to Anglo Saxon origin, and first appeared in ancient medieval records in Oxfordshire. That from very early on the Norwood family not only held lands and estates in England but were also actively allied with other influential families. They also branched out into other territories and holdings, before taking the long voyage to the new world.

Notes from James Gregg Dempsey.

The first time the surname Norwood occurs is in a court case in the year 1206. At this time, Stephen is also recorded as Stephen, son of Jordan of Sheppey or Stephen son of Cecily. The earliest dated occurrence of Stephen is in the tax rolls for the years 1198-1202 still existing in the public record office in Chancery Lane, London. He occurs with his mother, Cecily, and his brother William. Since Jordan is not mentioned, he is assumed to be dead by this time.

The tax rolls also record that four months after the succession of King John, in the year 1199, Stephen wisely had his grants from King Richard I reconfirmed by King John. He paid 100 shillings in September 1200 for the reconfirmation. If we assume that Stephen's service and grants from Richard I were around the year 1185 when he would have been at least 21, plus the fact that he died in 1231, a guess that he was born around the year 1165 should not be too far wrong.

The primary grant was that of the manor of Northwood Chestnuts, or as was later often recorded, Northwood Chasteners, in Milton Regis parish. This new manor and land had been part of the Royal manor of Milton, inherited from the Kings of Kent 500 years earlier. Northwood manor was carved out of the king's chestnut woods, southwest of Milton village. As this manor was to be held directly from the royal family, it was made a part of the parish of Milton, even though it would be physically separated from it by Bobbing parish.

The Norwood genealogical roll used in a lawsuit about the year 1385 says: "In the first place, Sir Stephen de Northwode, Knight, was seized of [held] 310 acres of land, 500 acres of marsh in the Isle of Sheppey, and four score and ten acres of marsh with their pertinences in Upcherche, and of other manors, lands, and tenements in the county of Kent."

After his second marriage and possibly just before his death in 1231, he gave to the Abbey of St. Augustine's in Canterbury, 12.5 acres of land in Milton for the construction of a chapel and maintenance of a priest. This was to honor the souls of his patrons, King Richard I and King

John, along with the souls of his two wives, Fedive and Joan, his father Jordan, mother Cecily and his brother William.

His first wife was Fedive, as first noted in Bracton's "Note Book" of legal precedents and the Curia Regis (King's Court) for the year 1206. Fedive is an extremely unusual name, I have not found any other occurrences anywhere in England or elsewhere. She was the widow of John de Landries, (of London) son of Gilbert of London and sister-in-law of Osbert, the priest. From this marriage she held dower properties in the parish of Banstead, county Surrey; one parcel in Berehes manor and 3 parcels in Preston manor, the tenant being Robert de Chetwood. The court cases indicate that Fedive was still alive in the years 1213-1214. As these are amongst the earliest English court cases on record and occur at the time now defined as the start of "legal memory", I have included one of the transcripts in full, in Latin and in English.

Before the year 1200 or so, the use of surnames or spelling had not been rigidly adopted. Depending upon type of document, "son of", "previous spouse", "of place", forms are found. Extracts from the same court case, but on different dates show:

"Fedive de Berges wife of Stephen"

"Stephanus de Scipeie versus Osbert clerk per Richard de Norwode"

"Feidiua wife of Stephani de Sapeia per Robert de Standon"

"Feidiu wife of Stephani de Scapeia versus Osbertum Capellanum ... per William de Scapeia"

Stephen also granted some property or the profits from its use to St. Bartholomew's Hospital, near Rochester. In two surviving tax rolls for the years 12l4 and 1219, we find that Northwood manor has become well known enough for Stephen to identify himself as "Stephen of Norwood".

In the tax roll or "pipe roll" for 1214 is recorded: Rochester Hospital 0/14/5 in 'servitio Stephano de Nordwude' in 1219: Rochester Hospital 4/2/10 in 'servitio Stephani de Norwood'. A copy of a lease contract still in the record office indicates that Stephen de Northwude and Wulvina le Franceis, daughter of Walter le Franceis, on April 19, 1220 came to agreement on 24 acres in Upchurch parish for the rent of 12 d. (pence) per year.

Sometime between the years 1214 and 1224, Stephen had married again to a Joan. Her family name is not known, but as we have no known marriages between the Northwoods and the Cobhams, Peyforers or Shirlands, she might have "been from one of those families. Stephen died shortly before the 21st of April 1231 as is recorded in the close rolls.

The grant of the Lesser Tithes of the land of Northwood to Jordan son of Stephen*[sic]. * Evidently error of the scribe, 'Stephano filio Jordan!' being intended

Be it known to all men, whether present or future, that I Roger, by the grace of God Abbot of Saint Augustine of Canterbury, and the community of the same place, have granted etc. to Stephen son of Jordan and his heirs all the Lesser Tithes of all the land which the same Stephen has in Norwood by the charter of our lord the King of England; to hold of us, yielding therefore annually to the Abbot and community of Saint Augustine 2 shillings sterling before the octave of Saint John the Baptist; provided that the tithes of all the wheat and the sheaves of all that above mentioned land, shall be for the Abbot and community of Saint Augustine for their own use; and provided that from each house



that shall be on the said land, in which there shall be customarily be a hearth of a family, the master and mistress of the house, if there be any, shall visit the mother church of Milton each year on the day of the Nativity of the Blessed Mary with their offerings according to their means, and according as God shall inspire them, and their bodies shall be buried there when they die. And the church of Milton shall not be bound to perform any divine service for the said Stephen or his heirs, beyond what was usual when that land lay uncultivated. And concerning all these things, the said Stephen has sworn to us in Chapter, putting his hands on our most holy Gospels, that he will keep faith. These being the witnesses: Master Ralph the Vice-archdeacon, Laurence the son of Hugh Soldanc, Roger** the Steward, and many others. ** Roger mentioned in a deed of 1188. About 1220-1231.

The Charter of Stephen son of Jordan of Sheppey, concerning 12 acres of land in Northwood, for the maintenance of a chapel and a chaplain.

To all the faithful people of Christ to whom this present writing shall come, Stephen son of Jordan of Sheppey sends eternal greeting in the Lord.

You are all to know, that I have given and granted, and by this my present charter have confirmed, to God and the Abbot of Saint Augustine of Canterbury and the brethren serving God there, 2 acres of my land in Northwood for the building of a chapel, and 10 acres for the maintenance of a chaplain who should hold services in the said chapel for the souls of the kings, namely Richard and John who gave and confirmed the said land to me for my service, and for the souls of my wives, namely Fediva and Joan, and of Jordan my father and Cecily my mother and William my brother, and the souls of their parents and ancestors and successors, for ever. And the said 2 acres lie, toward the north, upon the King's highway which extends from Halstow to Milton; and the 12 acres before mentioned lie adjoining beyond a certain watercourse next to the land of the heirs of Humphrey de Northewode, and the land of Geoffrey Bubulci in length toward the south.

And lest by chance these alms of the said kings and of myself should fail in course of time for lack of reasonable maintenance, to the said intent, namely, for the souls of the aforesaid kings and of me and of my wives, I have assigned to the said chapel all the Lesser Tithes of me and of all my tenements, and the windmill and the half acre of land on which the windmill is situate. The aforesaid Abbot and community shall therefore hold the said 12.5 acres and the mill freely etc., yielding yearly to us for the same 14 pence at two terms, namely, 7 pence at Easter and 7 pence at Michaelmas, for all service.

And I, Stephen, and my heirs, will warrant the aforesaid 12.5 acres and the mill to the church of Saint Augustine against all men and women. And so that my gift and grant etc. These being the witnesses: Henry de Cobeham, Stephen de Hecham, Robert de Sirlande, John de Sirlande, and many others.

Pleas before the Justices of the Bench at Westminster. Michaelmas Term, 8 John (1206) Curia Regis Roll 43a m.9d Justices October 1206: Geoffrey FitzPeter, Simon of Pattishall, Eustace de Faucunberg, Henry Archdeacon of Stafford, John of Guestling, Walter of Creeping & possibly James of Potterne. Pleas 3 week after feast of St. Michael (20 Oct. 1206)

Surrey. Osbert the Chaplain claims against Stephen de Norwood and Fediva his wife 3 virgates of land with the appurtenances in Preston and 1 hide of land with the appurtenances in Burgh as his right; and they defended their right; and said that the land is the dower of the same Fediva, and that the same Osbert on another occasion brought her before the court of our lord the King in a plea concerning the same land;

and then she vouched to warranty the heirs of her first husband; and they came into court, and when he claimed against them, they answered him, so that by the judgment of the court they departed quit thereof as against him; and she asks for the record of the court of our lord King in respect of this; and they said those things without prejudice to the right of the warrantors of the same Fediva and their warranty.

Therefore the court of our lord the King records that the same Osbert brought action another time against the same Fediva; and she vouched to warranty the heirs of her first husband, who came and said that John, formerly the husband of the same Fediva, obtained judgment for the whole of the aforesaid land in the court of the Archbishop of Canterbury by compromise of battle, so that the court of the Arch-bishop was summoned to bear record thereof; and 4 knights namely William of Ciriton. Hugh of Dodington, William Poinant and Ansfrid de Dene came and made record for the court that John de Berges brought a writ of right in the court of John of St. Clair, and claimed 1 hide of land with the appurtenances in Burgh against Gilbert of Preston and afterwards he came to the county court and said that the court of the said John had made default of justice to him; and then the steward of our lord of Canterbury namely of St. Thomas [a Becket], came and claimed the court of the lord Archbishop in respect of it, and had it;

And in the court of the same [Archbishop] battle was waged and armed between them of that hide of land and of another hide that he claimed against him in the court of our lord) of Canterbury; and then by leave of the court they came to an agreement, so that the same Gilbert recognized to the aforesaid John, by compromise of battle, that the afore-said hide was the right and inheritance of the aforesaid John, and the other hide likewise, that the same John claimed against him in the village of Preston; and the same John leased it to the aforesaid Gilbert and granted it to him to hold that hide of land, with the appurtenances in Burgh, for all the life of the aforesaid Gilbert, so that after the decease of the aforesaid Gilbert that hide should revert to the aforesaid John and his heirs quit of the inheritance of the aforesaid Gilbert; and the aforesaid John gave to the same Gilbert 20 marks in respect thereof And therefore it is adjudged that the same Stephen and Fediva may depart quit thereof; and Osbert is in mercy.

Name: *Stephen de Northwode Sex: M Birth: before 1178 in Isle of Sheppey, Kent, England. Death: before 21 APR 1231 in Norwood, Addington, Kent, England.

Note: Stephen de Northwode of Jordan of Sheppey (de Scapeia), by Cicely his wife, held, by grant of Richard I and confirmation of John, the manor of Northwood, in Milton. He married, 1stly, Fedive, widow of John, son of Gilbert DE LANDRIES, from whom she had dower in Surrey. She was living 1213-14. He married, 2ndly, Joan (----), and died shortly before 21 April 1231.

Notes for Fedive de Landries:

She was the widow of John de Landries of London. Court cases indicate that she was still alive in the years 1213-14. Some of these are amongst the earliest English court cases on record and occur at the time now defined as the start of "legal memory". Full transcripts of some are included in the book "Norwood - Northwood families of Kent Warwickshire and Gloucestershire" by James G. Dempsey. Also in the same book is a mention that "before the year 1200 or so, the use of surnames or spelling had not been rigidly adopted." For this reason, there is variation in the names and spelling of some of these ancestors.

Henry III ruled ineffectively from 1216 to 1272. Henry's son, Edward I, ruled from 1272 to 1307. Henry III was of the Earlier Angevin Kings,

1134-1272 and the beginning of the Later Angevins, or The Plantagenet's, 1272-1390.

A minor when he took the throne he did not take the reigns of Government himself until 1234. Baronian discontent simmered, boiling over in 1258 when Henry facing financial disaster attempted to raise large sums from his magnates. Reforms were agreed upon but then renounced by Henry. Simon de Montford lead a rebellion against the King (the Barons Wars) which was defeated after initial success, thereafter Henry ceded much of his power to his son. Burke say he was born 10 Oct 1206 and married 14 Jan, crowned 1216.

Henry III was born in 1207 and succeeded his father John on the throne of England in 1216. It was a ravaged inheritance, the scene of civil war and anarchy, and much of the east and south eastern England was under the control of the French Dauphin Louis. But Henry had two great protectors---his liege lord the Pope, and the aged William Marshal.

The Marshal, by a combination of military skill and diplomatic ability, saw off the Dauphin by September, 1217, but less than two years later he was dead, and a triumvirate ruled in his place: the papal legal Pandulf; the Poitevin Bishop of Winchester Peter des Roches; and the Justiciar Hubert de Burgh. The legate departed in 1221; two years later Henry became of age and, rejecting Peter, chose Hubert to be his chief counselor.

Trouble soon came, as Hubert attempted to reassert royal authority. Barons, who had kept their castles undisturbed and exercised their powers without supervision, were now called to account to the haughty justifier, and the party of Peter des Roches did not fail to underline the annoyances involved. The years 1223-4 were taken up with quelling rebellions.

Meanwhile the situation abroad was even more disturbing: the French king Philip Augustus was eating up English lands in Gascony, and Henry's mother Isabella made a bad situation worse by her marriage with Count Hugh of Lusignan. It was only in 1230 that a badly prepared English force set out for France and, after much squabbling; all it was able to do was make a demonstration march through Gascony.

Hubert had already had one dismal failure in Wales in 1228, and his arrogant attempts to build up a personal base in the Marches provoked a Welsh raid in 1231 which did more harm to his good name. Hubert was thrust out of power, to be replaced by Peter des Roches' Poitevins. But by 1234 they had upset the baronage of England, who had never taken kindly to foreigners other than the Normans, and Richard Marshal combined with Edmund of Abington, Archbishop of Canterbury, to force the King to replace them.

Henry now began his period of personal rule, and the world was to see what sort of king he would make. He was a simple, direct man, trustful on first impression, but bearing a life-long grudge when people let him down. At times lavish and life-loving, he could show another side of his nature, that wicked Angevin temper and streak of vindictive cruelty. He had a very refined taste, and enjoyed building and restoration work more than anything else. Surrounded by barons who had been proved in the hardest schools of war, the King had the spirit of an interior decorator; the nation could have born the expense of his artistic tastes, could have forgiven the eccentricity of it all, but Henry showed time and again that he was timorous as well as artistic. He feared thunderstorms, and battle was beyond him.

The Crown had some 60 castles in England, and these were in a bad state after the troubles of John's reign and the minority. Henry traveled about tirelessly rebuilding them and making them more comfortable,



spending at least ten per cent of his income on building works. He personally instructed his architects in great detail, and could not wait for them to finish---it must be ready for his return 'even if a thousand workmen are required every day' and the job must be 'properly done, beautiful and fine.' In addition he built or restored twenty royal houses, decorating them sumptuously. The painted chamber at Westminster was 80 ft. long, 26 ft. wide and 31 ft. high. The walls were all wainscoted (at Winchester even the pantry and cellar were wainscoted) and painted with pictures and proverbs. The subjects of the pictures varied according to the royal moods---in May 1250 the Queen borrowed a book about the crusades, and a year later the walls at Clarendon showed Richard the Lion heart dueling with Saladin. Wherever there were no pictures, there was the King's favorite decor---green curtains spangled with gold stars. The floors were tiled, the windows glazed (and barred after 1238 when an attempted assassination scared Henry out of his wits---he even had the vent of the royal privy into the Thames barred over) and fireplaces provided the ultimate in luxury. Special rooms sprouted everywhere, including the room where the royal head was

If his private comfort bulked large in Henry's mind, his public display of piety came in a close second: these were neatly combined in the royal bedroom where a window was fitted to look into the chapel. His greatest project was the rebuilding of Westminster Abbey, on which he spent nearly £50,000---the equivalent of £4,000,000 today. He had been so thrilled with St. Louis' Sainte Chapelle that he had wanted to put it on a cart and roll it back to England. That was impossible, so he had to build his own. He finished it in 1269, and proudly put up the inscription 'As the rose is the flower of all flowers, so this is the house of houses.'

For a while Henry had reason for pride: he married Eleanor, daughter of the Count of Savoy, and sister of the Queen of France, the finest match in Europe; his sister Isabella was married to the Emperor Frederick II, and his son Edward to Eleanor of Castille. He persuaded the Germans to elect his brother, Richard of Cornwall, King of the Romans.

On the other hand, his foreign policy was leading him into dangers. In 1242 he foolishly allowed himself to be led into supporting his mother's ambitions in Poitou, and the enmity with France was to continue needlessly until the settlement of 1259. Louis IX had no desire to be his enemy---in 1254 all England was amazed at the French King's generous gift of an elephant, which the historian Matthew Paris went to draw in the Tower of London.

In 1246 Henry's mother died (to almost universal relief) and he generously invited his four Lusignan half-brothers to live out their orphanage under his roof. He gave them large incomes, but they took more, milking the land as hard as they could in the last moments before bankruptcy. The English hated them for their avarice, price, and foreign-ness.

In ecclesiastical affairs Henry's hands were hopelessly tied---the Pope had always been his chief prop, and the King could not afford to lose his aid. There was a strong movement for reform, but the papacy's desperate need for money to prosecute its war against the Hohenstauffen made reform a secondary consideration, and indeed frequently blocked it. But Henry may justly be criticized for his foolishness in accepting the papal offer of the crown of Sicily for his son Edmund in 1250. The payment was to meet the astronomical debts of the Pope, and Richard of Cornwall had already wisely turned down this bad bargain, commenting that he had been offered the moon, if he could reach it.

Henry's need for money dominated most of his domestic policy. During the period of his personal government he obtained what he needed by getting legalists and professional civil servants to manipulate the complex chaos of the feudal government he had inherited. Government became a secret and centralized affair, excluding the barons, great and small. There are many comparisons here with the tyranny of Charles I.

In 1258 came the explosion: Parliament refused a grant unless Henry should exile his grasping half-brothers, and allow a commission of enquiry. A committee was set up to control the appointment of Crown officials, examine and reform local government, and supervise the affairs of the realm in general.

This was a revolt, but it had many obscure roots. One cannot assess how deeply felt were the demands for just and equal government voiced by Simon de Montfort, but certainly there were other elements in the baronial party which were reactionary rather than revolutionary, wanting to return to baronial government for its own sake. On this issue the reformers spilt, Gloucester leading the conservatives, and de Montfort the radicals. Henry saw his chance, and deftly using the ever valuable support of the Pope, shook off the Committee's control.

Now came the war and the stunning defeat of the royal party at Lewes in 1264. From this point onwards Henry was very much a broken man, though prone to bouts of vicious anger. The initiative was passed to his son, the Lord Edward, who defeated de Montfort at Evesham, where Henry was rescued, scratched and shouting 'Do not hurt me.'

Henry longed for revenge, and disinherited the rebels, who fled to hideouts in the fens to continue the war. The papal legate Ottobono persuaded the King to go so far, in the Dictum of Kenilworth of 1266, as to allow the rebels to buy back their estates. Still not satisfied, the disinherited, under Gloucester's leadership, took London, and Richard of Cornwall negotiated an easier peace. In 1267 the Statute of Marlborough embodied much of what de Montfort had fought for, and the long years of trouble were over.

Henry had at least survived, and his last years were happy in that he finished building his patron saint's Abbey of Westminster. The wheel of fortune that decorated so many of his palaces' walls had come round, and all the rage and terror were done with. Henry died in 1272. [Source: Who's Who in the Middle Ages, John Fines, Barnes & Noble Books, New York, 1995]

Eleanor died 1291, queen consort of Henry III of England. The daughter of Raymond Berengar, count of Provence, she was married to Henry in 1236. She was a vigorous and incisive woman and had much influence on her husband, as did her unpopular relatives and other foreign courtiers who followed her to England. During the ascendancy of Simon de Montfort in 1264;65, Eleanor raised mercenaries in France for her husband's cause. She was dispatched to a convent in 1286 but was sometimes consulted by her son, Edward I.

i William ²⁴ **de Northwoode** [9559]. William de Northwood taxed 10 marks in 1198. This occurs in 1211 with Adam de Berkesore in a Christ Church Canterbury inquisition about land in Berkesore (Lower Halstow). Presumably the William de Sheppey mentioned with Stephen de Northwode in a fine of 19 April 1220 with Wulvina le Franceis over 24 acres of land in Upchurch.

496 ii Sir Stephen²⁴ **de Northwoode** [9545], born 1119 in Isle Of Sheppy, Kent, England; died 1195 in Northwood Chasteners, Isle Of Sheppey, Kent, England. He married **Fedive de Landries** (---) [9549].

Notes for Jordanus de Sheppey of Northwood:

He was named Eadnoth (Alnod), Alnod Cilt of Northwood within Sheppey before baptized in the Jordan River while on a Crusade. He was also named Ulf.

Jordanus de Sheppey was also known as Alnod Cilt. He was "....buried in Minster Church where his tomb remains without any inscription or memorial though it at one period the coat of armor which the family afterward bore..."

He reportedly married Cicely Wlmar, daughter of Wlmar. Jordanus had at least two sons: William de Northwode and Stephen de Northwode.

Alnod Cilt (aka Jordanus de Scapeia), of Swedish and Danish descent, the reputed oldest son of King Harold and Edith, took refuge with his mother at Minster Abbey on the Isle of Sheppey during the reign of William the Conqueror. [So goes the story but the death of Harold Godwinson in 1066 and the supposed birth of Jordan de Sheppey in 1125 leaves a 69 year gap meaning it is very likely that Jordan de Sheppey was not the son of King Harold.] The name Jordanus, or Jordan, is thought to have been assumed after a pilgrimage to the Holy Land where he bathed in the River Jordan. Jordanus De Sheppey, also known as Alnod Cilt is buried in Minster Church where his tomb remains without any inscription or memorial though it, at one time, did bear the coat of armor which the family afterward bore. [Marlene's Page - The Norwood Family, Internet, Dec 1998] [It is believed that most of this material came from the writing of Gertrude Marion Norwood Callam and John Cheesman Norwood]

According to James Greg Dempsey, "Norwood - Northwood families of Kent, Warwickshire and Gloucestershire" 1987: There are no known records of Jordan's or references to him during his lifetime. Since a charter from his son Stephen about the year 1190 does not refer to him as being alive, we can only guess that he lived in the period of 1135 to 1190. Some writers suggest that his name infers that he changed his name after having gone on a crusade, but Jordan is not an uncommon name anywhere in England at this time. Mr. Dempsey is convincing in his detailed research of this time period of the Norwoods.

According to our Norwood Historians the son of King Harold II and Edith Swannaschells his handfast wife, was Alnod, frequently referred to in the Domesday Book as "Alnod Cilt". That his, a father in a position of power placed him - probably Sheriff - at an early age is obvious by references to him as "satrap" and "Alnod and his peers". He is also named at various times Wulfnoth, Vlnod, Wulfnoth, Agelnoth, Ulf and Adhelolphus.

Before the Norman Conquest Alnod Cilt held twenty Kentish Manors, but at the time of the Domesday survey, none, almost all of them having been conveyed to King William I "The Conquers" brother Odo, Bishop of Bayeux, Normandy. In the famous lawsuit tried on Penenden Heath, Kent, in 1076 between Bishop Odo and the Archbishop of Canterbury, Alnod Cilt's name is cited as a recent sub-tenant of Manors which Odo had since assumed, but at the time of the Domesday Book Alnod Cilt was held prisoner by William I "The Conqueror" under the ward ship of Wadard, who had been given the King's Wood at Milton on the Isle of Sheppey. The area covered by this holding stretched from the hilltop on the Isle of Sheppey, across what is now fiat grazing marsh-land, over the River Swale to the mainland beyond Milton. This land was of particular interest to Alnod Cilt for had he not held this of King Edward I? (Translation. Domesday Book for Kent by L. B. Larkin pp. 98, 99 and 104).

After the death of William the Conqueror in 1087, his successor and son William Rufus, having no more to fear from the sons of King Harold II, released Alnod (Ulf). George Slocombe, in his book Sons of the Conqueror writes (pp 27, 28), "Ulf, the son of King Harold II and Edith of the Swanneck and Duncan of Scotland fell into the hands of Robert Curthose, who treated them with characteristic generosity. He set them at liberty and knighted them".

The Domesday Book Information about Alnod Cilt's Property is shown in Table 4.1. Alnod Cilt's Property Holdings in the Time of King Edward III "the Confessor" as Extracted from the Domesday Book for Kent, England are shown in the table.

Alnod Cilt Gets Some of His Property Back.

Alnod Cilt had seized by force two parts of the King's Wood at Milton, which he was later permitted to hold, as before the Conquest, not by



feudal but by custumal tenure, and it was high on the Sheppey hilltop that he lived under the name of Jordanus de Sheppey. The Christian name "Jordanus" was unusual at this early period, and would be adopted only by one who had taken a religious pilgrimage to the Holy Land, and received baptism in the River Jordan. These same lands held by Alnod, alias Jordanus passed from father to son for over 300 years in one direct line of descent.

NOTES ON ENTRIES IN DOMESDAY BOOK

<u>Hundred</u> The hundred was a union of townships, for the purpose of judicial administration, for peace and derange. The head or convener of this body was called "the hundred man".

<u>Hide</u> Generally supposed to be about 120 acres of land. The whole land belonging to a community was portioned off in hides, and each free man according to his rank possessed so many hides. A hide was as much land as would maintain a family. Some call it sixty some eighty. Others one hundred acres.

Homagers Homage is the form, that binds the vassal to the-lord (in most cases the king) whose man he becomes and of whom, he holds the land for which he performs the ceremony on his knees, and with his hands in his lord's hands. All land was held from the King, and all landowners had to do him homage French "homme"

<u>Villeins</u> Villeins were divided into two classes; villeins pure, and the villeins privileged. The first class were bound to do any work that was sel them, and knew not in the evening what they were going to do in the morning, being occupiers of the land at the lord's will.

<u>Bordars</u> Those who had a bord, or cottage, with a small parcel of land on condition they supplied the lord with poultry, eggs and other small provisions, for his board and entertainment.

<u>Curdcote</u> As much arable land as could be tilled in a year with one plough. (See Knight's Fee).

<u>Demesne</u> Demesne land was the direct property of the King, either fanned out or managed immediately by the Crown.

Knight's Fee A Knight's Fee, says Sir H. Ellis, contained no certain number of acres, but varied in different places. It has been described as "as much land as was sufficient to the cultivation of one plough" - whence our term "plough lands".

Banneret A superior form of knighthood.

<u>Bull</u> From *Bulla*, a seal.

Answers for Assessed.

Sullings Plough land.

Saca Men skilful in causes and pleas.

Soca Lordship enfranchised by the King with the liberty of holding or keeping a court.

<u>Child</u> Cilt or Cild. A title almost synonymous with Aetheling. This was given to younger branches of royalty and also to those of the highest families.

<u>T.R.E.</u> *Tempore Regis Edward* i – In the time of King Edward III, "the Confessor".

John Cheesman Norwood quotes the historian Bracton, a contemporary of Roger de Northwood in the reign of King Henry III, as his authority for this. Describing "the singular force of inheritance of these lands from Adhelolphus (Alnod) to his descendant Roger de Northwood" he writes, "the felony of an ancestor does not impede the seysine nor the succession of an heir"- (Complete Peerage of England, Scotland, Ireland, Great Britain and the United Kingdom, by G. E Cokayne, Sutton Publishing Ltd, 2000. De Legibus, section Mortdancester Vol. IV, p- 299).

This claim is further supported by the seventeenth century Somerset Herald Philipott who states that Roger de Northwood changed the holding of his lands from gavelkind to the more active tenure of Knight's Service "still reserving to himself by that License by which he obtained a Grant of the first, to reserve the Ancient Rent whereby his Lands held even in the time of the Conqueror".

Note:

Stephen, son of Jordan of Sheppey (de Scapeia), by Cicely his wife (c), held, by grant of Richard I and confirmation of John, the manor of Northwood, in Milton. He married, 1stly, Fedive, widow of John, son of Gilbert de Landries, from whom she had dower in Surrey. She was living 1213-14. He married, 2ndly, Joan (----), and died shortly before



21 April 1231. [Complete Peerage: 9:753]

Note:

(c) Cicely gave to the church of Rochester a window to the altar of St. Peter, etc., and, with consent of her sons William and Stephen, confirmed a rent of 12d. given by her father Wimar. She was living in 1198, when assessed to the tallage of the vill of Milton (next Sittingbourne) 40 marks; Stephen her son, 5 marks; William his brother, 10 marks.

Notes for Cecily Wlmar:

It is obvious how much the church dominated the lives and thoughts of the people of this age. Osbert of Sheppey, prior of St. Andrews after the fire in 1179, recorded in the Rochester Archives, significant gifts by Cecily.

"Osbem of Sheppey, afterwards prior, created a history of Peter, and the burned chapel. He also made the great psalter which is in the choir with a chain, and by his counsel the lady Cecily of Sheppey gave a silver and gilt chalice and a set of white vestments with its amice embroidered with gold fringe and a window for the altar of St. Peter and 12 pence rent. He obtained part of the rent in Dartford at the anniversary [date of their death] of her father and mother. And he made for himself a room next to the infirmary.

In those same records she is listed as owing 12d, yearly for marsh in Upchurch. "Cecily of Sheppey gave 12 pence for a certain marsh in Upchurch."

At a later date, probably around 1200, Cecily had a confirmation charter made to the church, confirming her father's grant, with the consent of her sons, William and Stephen. From the copy in the Rochester archives:

Charter of Cecily of Sheppey.

Know all men present and future that I, Cecily of Sheppey, with the consent and will of William and Stephen my sons and heirs, by divine inspiration and for the salvation of my soul and my ancestors and my successors have granted and confirmed by my present charter to the church of St. Andrew of Rochester and the monks serving god there in pure and perpetual alms the rent of 12 pence which my father Wlmar gave to them when he received their fellowship, giving to them each year on the day of St. Andrew the Apostle and bound from my inheritance of my marsh of Upchurch which is called Grenewrthe. And I, Cecily, and my aforesaid sons and heirs William and Stephen will that the aforesaid monks shall have and hold the aforesaid rent freely and quietly for ever. And we warrant the same rent to the same monks against all men and women. And so that this, our grant shall remain firm and secure for ever we have confirmed that by the placing of our seals. These being witnesses - Robert of Silam, etc."

The earliest surviving English court records begin about the year 1200. Two of these cases relate to Cecily and Stephen. Apparently by November 1202, Cecily had remarried to Roger, the Butler (pincema). At which time she filed suit with Stephen of Cossington over 6+ acres in Sheppey that her brother, Elias de Kiveli, had held before he had gone on crusade to Jerusalem. This case went on for years. Cecily was also referred to as "of Greatness". Whether this was a now forgotten place in Sheppey, like Sheness and Shellness, or a reference to Greatness manor in Otford, is not yet known. If the various parties are related is speculative, however, because the property, variously given at 6+, 12, 21 or 22 acres is so small, it is probably a situation of argument over division of paternal property by many brothers or nephews. Only in Kent was family land divided equally among all the sons, or if no sons, all the daughters. This tenure of "Gavelkind" quickly produced a patchwork of small, uneconomic plots.

King Harold II, Godwinson, King of England (My 23rd great grandfather) was born in 1022 in Wessex, England. He died on 14 Oct 1066 in Senlac, Sussex, England (Died in Battle) and was buried in Waltham Abby, Essex, England. Harold married Lady Edith Swannaschels (Swan-Neck) (My 23rd great grandmother), daughter of Alfwine (Elfwin), Abbot of Minster & Winchester and Wulfgyth, about 1045 in York, England. Edith was born about 1025 in Wessex, England. She died after 1070.

Godwineson, Harold II, King of England, brother-in-law to King Edward III, "the Confessor", was born about 1022. He acceded to king on 6 Jan 1066 in St. Paul's Cathedral, London, England. King Harold II was the last Anglo-Saxon King of England. He was reputedly designated heir by the dying King Edward III, "The Confessor". After becoming King, he crushed the forces of his brother Tosig and Harold III Hardraade of Norway, who claimed the throne, at Stamford Bridge in 1066. Harold was killed in the battle of Hastings by the army of another successful claimant to the throne, William the Conqueror.



Harold was also Earl of East Anglia in 1045, Earl of Wessex in 15 April 1053, and Earl of Hereford in 1058.

King Harold II, King of England, rival of William I (William the Conqueror). Harold was the son of Godwin, earl of Wessex. He belonged to the most powerful noble family of England in the reign of King Edward III, "The Confessor". Through Godwin's rise, Harold was made earl of a part of East Anglia. The fall of Godwin in 1051 however, involved the family and all went into exile. Harold went to Ireland where he recruited a strong force and brought it to the English coast. In 1053 he joined his father and brothers in the expedition against England.

Godwin recovered power and Harold was restored to his old earldom. He was not as high in the favor of the king as was his brother, Tostig, but his succession in the earldom of Wessex and to great estates at his father's death made Harold the most powerful figure in England except the king, and Harold aspired to become heir to the throne. Harold gained some glory by a great campaign against the Welsh leader, Gruffyd Ap Llywelyn in 1062-63. About this time Harold, on a ship in the English Channel was driven by an adverse wind to the coast of Ponthieu. The Count of Ponthieu seized him but was, as William's vassal, forced to surrender Harold to William of Normandy.

Harold was compelled to take an oath to support William's candidacy to the English throne, and also agreed to marry William's daughter. Returning to England, Harold renounced his oath as one of coercion. When the Northumbrians revolted against Harold's brother Tostig (made earl of Northumbria in 1055), and chose Morkere in his place as Earl of Northumbria, Harold took Morkere's part.

The family was thus divided when King Edward III, "The Confessor" died, naming Harold as heir instead of Edgar Atheling. Harold succeeded to the throne also as the choice of the council. William of Normandy immediately undertook an invasion. At the same time, Tostig, with Harold III of Normandy, invaded England from the north. Harold went north and soundly defeated them on 25 Sep 1066 at the Battle of Stamford Bridge, in which both Tostig and Harold III were slain. The harassed king hurried south to oppose William who had landed at Pevensey. Harold established his forces in hastily built earthworks near Hastings. They fought valiantly but were finally put to rout and Harold himself was killed.

The recorded Norwood history begins at the time of William The Conqueror. The romance of King Harold of England and Edith Swannaschells lasted all their lives. When King Harold was killed by William in the Battle of Hastings on 14 Oct 1066, it was Edith who recognized him among the dead. Alnod Cilt (aka Jordanus de Scapeia), of Swedish and Danish descent, the reputed oldest son of King Harold and Edith, took refuge with his mother at Minster Abbey on the Isle of Sheppey during the reign of William.

Notes for Lady Edith Swannaschels (Swan-Neck):

Edith was also known as Eadgyth Swan-neck. Reference: G. Marion Norwood Callam Book, Chapter # 2. After the Battle of Hastings, Edith went first into the nunnery at Minster in Sheppey, and later to Chaise Diew, Abbey of St. Etienne, Loire, France where she died and is buried.

King Harold II still in his early twenties met and fell in love with his cousin Edith Swan Neck, who he met in Nazeing in Essex. Edith was the daughter of Alfwine, Abbot of Minster and Winchester, and his wife Wulfgyth, sister of Godwin, but according to English law he could not marry one so closely related. He was betrothed to her according to

Danish custom and she became his hand-fast-wife.

Harold suffered paralysis soon after their meeting, but managed to recover. To give thanks to God, he built an abbey at Waltham Cross. He would later be laid to rest there after his final battle. Edith Harold's wife was also known as Eadgyth Swan-neck. Reference: G. Marion Norwood Callam Book, Chapter # 2.

Wulfgyth's Will (AD 1046 A.S. Cad. Dip 1V No. 782) names Edith as one of the Testatrix's three daughters, and the manors of Ashford and Chart Sutton are bequeathed to her, while to "Godwine eorle and Harald eorle Frithtunes" land to the south of Chart Sutton now known as Frittenden. The Will also names Edith's father Elfwin (Alfwine), who was later made Abbot of New Minster in 1063 and fell at Hastings in 1066.

After the Battle of Hastings, Edith went first into the nunnery at Minster in Sheppey, and later to Chaise Diew, Abbey of St. Etienne, Loire, France where she died and is buried.

Because of the position Alfwine held in the church, he strongly denounced his daughter's union with Harold II his nephew, and this is depicted in a scene Ubi unus clericus et Aelfgyva in the Bayeux Tapestry. In the tapestry, Aelfgya (Edith or Ealgyth as named in the Will), is being deprived of the recognition of her legal status - on account of the possibility of legal claim to the throne by her children. But, as John Cheesman Norwood points out in Freedom's Romance, although historians for safety's sake persisted in calling Edith Harold's "concubine", and Freeman in his translation of the Doomsday Book entry for Canterbury uses this term, yet: "having in view the social rank of Edith disclosed by the Will, and forty years later, her civic status in the archiepiscopal metropolis, it may safely be taken that she was no concubine"

Despite the church's refusal to recognize the marriage, the love of Harold and Edith remains one of the great romances of history. They lived at the manor of Nazeing, a few miles north of Waltham in Hertfordshire, and there, in Harold's Park, their children Alnod, Godwin, Gytha (who married Vladimar II, Prince of Kiev, from whom Edward III is descended), Edmund, Gunhilda and Magnus played in the thickets and groves, chased the deer, and fished in the river Lee.

Earl Godwin, Earl of Wessex and Kent (My 24th great grandfather) was born about 0987 and he died of Apoplexy (Paralysis due to a stroke) on 15 Apr 1053 in Winchester Castle, Hampshire, London, England. Godwin is a son of Wulfnoth of Sussex, Cyld of Sussex, who was a son of Ethelmer who was a son of Ethelric. He married Gytha (Githa) Thorgilson (My 24th great grandmother) about 1019 and she was the daughter of Thorkils Sprakalegg. Godwin's wife Gytha was from the Royal house of Demark (probably another shrewd move by Godwin). She was the grandniece of Sweyn. Harold Godwinson was himself half English and half Danish, his mother being a kinswoman of King Canute.

Earl Godwin was an Anglo-Danish Noble, he rose to power under Canute, after whose death Godwin supported the accession of King Edward III, the Confessor and became a dominate figure in royal government. In 1045 his daughter Edith married King Edward III. He

was overthrown in 1051 but regained his position by force in 1052. He was succeeded by his son King Harold II.

Godwin became chief adviser to King Canute; was made earl of Wessex, and was given great wealth and lands. After Canute's death, Godwin and King Canute's widow, Queen Emma (of Normandy), supported the claims of the throne of her son by Canute, Harthacanute, against those of Harold Harefoot, Canute's son by AElgifu of Northampton. Godwin apparently permitted the murder of another claimant to the throne, Alfred AEtheling, son of Queen Emma by her first husband, AEthelred II, and brother of Edward (later Edward the Confessor). This brutality seems to have earned him the enmity of Harthacanute and of Edward, who succeeded Harthacanute. The king married Godwin's daughter in 1045 and Godwin was the most powerful Earl in England.

During the reign of Edward the Confessor he was head of the English party in opposition to the party which favored the Normans. He was long the real ruler of the greater part of England. In 1019 he accompanied King Canute in an expedition against Sweden, where he behaved with such valor as to receive a relative of that monarch in marriage, and large grants of land. On the death of Canute, the Earl sided with Hardicanute against Harold, but afterwards he espoused the cause of the latter. He was charged with murdering Alfred, one of the sons of Ethelred II from which he vindicated himself by oath. On the death of Hardicanute he joined Edward the Confessor, who married his daughter but afterwards he rebelled against Edward and, being unsuccessful fled to Flanders. Having gathered fresh forces he sailed up the Thames and appeared before London, which threw the country into such confusion, that the King was obliged to negotiate peace with Godwin, and to restore him to his estates. He died suddenly while dining with the King at Winchester in 1053. His son, Sweyn, ravaged Wales in 1046, and carried off an abbess forfeited his possessions by fleeing to Bruges; served in the English fleet against the Count of Flanders, murdered his kinsman Biorn, was restored to his estates (1050); and soon after went on a pilgrimage to Jerusalem. He died at Constantinople on his way home.

One source says that Godwin is buried in the Old Minster, Sheppey, Kent, England.

Geoffrey IV, also called Geoffrey Plantagenet, byname Geoffrey The Fair, French GEOFFROI PLANTAGENET, or GEOFFROI le BEL (born Aug. 24, 1113--d. Sept. 7, 1151, Le Mans, Maine [France]), count of Anjou (1131-51), Maine, and Touraine and ancestor of the Plantagenet kings of England through his marriage, in June 1128, to Matilda (q.v.), daughter of Henry I of England. On Henry's death (1135), Geoffrey claimed the duchy of Normandy; he finally conquered it in 1144 and ruled there as duke until he gave it to his son Henry (later King Henry II of England) in 1150.

Geoffrey was popular with the Normans, but he had to suppress a rebellion of malcontent Angevin nobles. After a short war with Louis VII of France, Geoffrey signed a treaty (August 1151) by which he surrendered the whole of Norman Vexin (the border area between Normandy and Île-de-France) to Louis. [Encyclopedia Britannica CD '97]

The Plantagenet family name was originally just a nickname for Geoffrey. He many times wore a sprig with yellow flowers in his hat. The flower was named "genet" or "genistae" in the French of the timesthus his nickname was "Plant-a-Genet". Genet was supposedly a traditional flower of the Anjou family dating back to the time of Fulk, The Great, Count of Anjou 898-941 who was scourged (in order to atone for past sins) with broom twigs of the Genet while on pilgrimage in Jerusalem.

Most people of the times had personal nicknames such as "Beauclerc", "Curtmantle", "Longshanks", and "Lackland", but Geoffrey's stuck and eventually (many generations later) became the family name. Geoffrey's immediate descendants were probably not known as the Plantagenet family at the time they lived, it was only later that the Plantagenet family name was applied to all descendants of Geoffrey.

important legal and administrative reforms, and for the final resolution of the investiture controversy. Abroad, he waged several campaigns in order to consolidate and expand his continental possessions. He was so hated by his brothers that they vowed to disinherit him. In 1106 he captured Robert and held him until he died. He proved to be a hard but just ruler. He apparently died from over eating Lampreys!

Henry I was born in the year 1068---a factor he himself regarded as highly significant, for he was the only son of the Conqueror born after the conquest of England, and to Henry this meant he was heir to the throne. He was not an attractive proposition: he was dissolute to a degree, producing at least a score of bastards; but far worse he was prone to sadistic cruelty---on one occasion, for example, personally punishing a rebellious burgher by throwing him from the walls of his town.

At the death of William the Conqueror, Henry was left no lands, merely 5,000 pounds of silver. With these he bought lands from his elder brother Robert Curthose, Duke of Normandy, only to see them taken back again a few years later by Robert, in unholy alliance with his brother William Rufus.

Henry could do little to avenge such treatment, but in England he found numerous barons who were tired of the exactions and ambitions of their king. He formed alliances with some of these, notably with the important de Clare family. He and some of the de Clares were with William Rufus on his last hunting expedition, and it is thought that the king's death was the result of Henry's plotting.

Certainly he moved fast to take advantage of it; leaving Rufus's body unattended in the woods, he swooped down on Winchester to take control of the treasury. Two days later he was in Westminster, being crowned by the Bishop of London. His speed is understandable when one realizes that his elder brother, Robert [Curthose], was returning from the crusade, and claimed, with good reason, to be the true heir.

Henry showed great good sense in his first actions as King. He arrested Ranulph Flambard, William's tax-gatherer, and recalled Anselm, the exiled Archbishop. Furthermore, he issued a Charter of Liberties which promised speedy redress of grievances, and a return to the good government of the Conqueror. Putting aside for the moment his many mistresses, he married the sister of the King of Scots, who was descended from the royal line of Wessex; and lest the Norman barons should think him too pro-English in this action, he changed her name from Edith to Matilda. No one could claim that he did not aim to please.

In 1101 Robert Curthose invaded, but Henry met him at Alton, and persuaded him to go away again by promising him an annuity of £2,000. He had no intention of keeping up the payments, but the problem was temporarily solved.



He now felt strong enough to move against dissident barons who might give trouble in the future. Chief amongst these was the vicious Robert of Bellême, Earl of Shrewsbury, whom Henry had known for many years as a dangerous troublemaker. He set up a number of charges against him in the king's court, making it plain that if he appeared for trial he would be convicted and imprisoned. Thus Robert and his colleagues were forced into rebellion at a time not of their own choosing, were easily defeated and sent scuttling back to Normandy.

In Normandy Robert Curthose began to wreak his wrath on all connected with his brother, thus giving Henry an excellent chance to retaliate with charges of misgovernment and invade. He made two expeditions in 1104-5, before the great expedition of 1106 on which Robert was defeated at the hour-long battle of Tinchebrai, on the anniversary of Hastings. No one had expected such an easy victory, but Henry took advantage of the state of shock resulting from the battle to annex Normandy. Robert was imprisoned (in some comfort, it be said); he lived on for 28 more years, ending up in Cardiff castle whiling away the long hours learning Welsh. His son William Clito remained a free agent, to plague Henry for most of the rest of his reign.

In England the struggle with Anselm over the homage of bishops ran its course until the settlement of 1107. In matters of secular government life was more simple. Henry had found a brilliant administrator, Roger of Salisbury, to act as Justiciar for him. Roger had an inventive mind, a keen grasp of affairs, and the ability to single out young men of promise. He quickly built up a highly efficient team of administrators, and established new routines and forms of organization within which they could work. To him we owe the Exchequer and its recording system of the Pipe Rolls, the circuits of royal justiciars spreading the king's peace, and the attempts at codification of law. Henry's good relationships with his barons and with the burgeoning new towns owed much to skilful administration. Certainly he was able to gain a larger and more reliable revenue this way than by the crude extortion his brother had used.

In 1120 came the tragedy of the White Ship. The court was returning to England, and the finest ship in the land was filled with its young men, including Henry's son and heir William. Riotously drunk, they tried to go faster and faster, when suddenly the ship foundered. All hands except a butcher of Rouen were lost, and England was without an heir.

Henry's only legitimate child was Matilda, but she was married to the Emperor Henry V of Germany, and so could not succeed. But in 1125 her husband died, and Henry brought her home and forced the barons to swear fealty to her---though they did not like the prospect of a woman ruler. Henry then married her to Geoffrey of Anjou, the Normans' traditional enemy, and the barons were less happy---especially when the newly-weds had a terrible row, and Geoffrey ordered her out of his lands. In 1131 Henry, absolutely determined, forced the barons to swear fealty once more, and the fact that they did so is testimony of his controlling power. Matilda and Geoffrey were reunited, and in 1133 she produced a son whom she named for his grandfather. If only Henry could live on until his grandson was old enough to rule, all would be well.

But in 1135, against doctor's orders, he ate a hearty meal of lampreys, got acute indigestion, which turned into fever, and died. He was buried at his abbey in Reading---some said in a silver coffin, for which there was an unsuccessful search at the Dissolution. Reigned 1066-1087. Duke of Normandy 1035-1087. Invaded England defeated and killed his rival Harold at the Battle of Hastings and became King. The Norman conquest of England was completed by 1072 aided by the establishment of feudalism under which his followers were granted land in return for pledges of service and loyalty. King William was noted for his efficient if harsh rule. His administration relied upon Norman and other foreign personnel especially Lanfranc Archbishop of Canterbury. In 1085 he started the Domesday Book.

William, the illegitimate son of Robert, Duke of Normandy and Herleva of Falaise, was born in 1027. Instead of marrying Herleva, Robert persuaded her to marry his friend, Herluin of Conteville. After marriage, Herleva had two more sons, Odo of Bayeux and Robert of Mortain

In 1035, Robert, Duke of Normandy died. Although William was illegitimate, he was Robert's only living son, and so inherited the father's title. Gilbert, Count of Brionne, became William's guardian. A number of Norman barons would not accept an illegitimate son as their leader and in 1040 an attempt was made to kill William. The plot failed but they did manage to kill Gilbert.

William began to govern Normandy in 1045. Two years later, the lords of the western region of the duchy rebelled, but William successfully defeated them at Val-es-dunes. Four years later, William visited Edward the Confessor, the king of England. Later, William claimed that Edward promised him that he would become his heir.

In 1053 William married Matilda of Flanders, the daughter of Count Baldwin of Flanders. Over the next sixteen years the couple had nine children. Seven of these survived: Robert, Richard (killed in a hunting accident in 1075), Cecily, William, Agatha, Henry and Adela.

William's power in Normandy was constantly under threat. After repulsing two French invasions, William managed to capture Maine in 1063. The following year, Harold Godwinson journeyed to Normandy. Later, William claimed that during the visit, Harold promised he would support his claim to the English throne.

William of the House of Normandy; The first Norman King; On 28 Sep 1066 William secured the sanction of Pope Alexander II for a Norman invasion of England. By 1070 the Norman conquest of England was complete. William introduced the Continental system of feudalism; by the Oath of Salisbury of 1086 all landlords swore allegiance to William, thus establishing the precedent that a vassal's loyalty to the king overrode his fealty to his immediate lord. During a campaign against



King Philip I of France, William fell from a horse and was fatally injured. William was the illegitimate son of Robert I, duke of Normandy and Arletta, a tanner's daughter. He is sometimes called "William the Bastard".

The son of King Duncan I (reigned 1034-40), Malcolm lived in exile in England during part of the reign of his father's murderer, Macbeth (reigned 1040-57). Malcolm killed Macbeth in battle in 1057 and then ascended the throne. After the conquest of England by William the Conqueror, in 1066, Malcolm gave refuge to the Anglo-Saxon prince Edgar the Aetheling and his sisters, one of whom, Margaret (later St. Margaret), became his second wife.

Malcolm acknowledged the overlordship of William in 1072 but nevertheless soon violated his feudal obligations and made five raids into England. During the last of these invasions he was killed by the forces of King William II Rufus (reigned 1087-1100). Except for a brief interval after Malcolm's death, the Scottish throne remained in his family until the death of Queen Margaret, the Maid of Norway, in 1290. Of Malcolm's six sons by Margaret, three succeeded to the throne: Edgar (reigned 1097-1107), Alexander I (1107-24), and David I (1124-53). [Encyclopedia Britannica CD '97]

MARGARET OF SCOTLAND, SAINT (born c. 1045, probably Hungary-died Nov. 16, 1093, Edinburgh; canonized 1250; feast day November 16, Scottish feast day June 16), queen consort of Malcolm III Canmore and patroness of Scotland.

Margaret was brought up at the Hungarian court, where her father, Edward, was in exile. After the Battle of Hastings, Edward's widow and children fled for safety to Scotland. Her brother Edgar the Aetheling, defeated claimant to the English throne, joined her there. In spite of her leanings toward a religious life, Margaret married (c. 1070) Malcolm III Canmore, king of Scotland from 1057 or 1058 to 1093. Through her influence over her husband and his court, she promoted, in conformity with the Gregorian reform, the interests of the church and of the English population conquered by the Scots in the previous century. He was proclaimed king by the witan (Witenagemot) following the death of Harold II Godwinson in the Battle of Hastings on 14 October 1066. Edgar was never crowned and submitted to William I (the Conquer) of England some eight weeks later. He was only about thirteen or fourteen years old. Edgar was the only son of Edward the Exile, heir to the English throne, and grandson of King Edmund Ironsides. Upon his father's death in 1057, Edgar was nominated as Heir Apparent by the king Edward the Confessor. Edgar was brought up at Edward's court, together with his sisters, Margaret (Margaret of Scotland) and Christina. However he was too young at the time of the king's death in January 1066 to defend the country against impending invasion, and his election as king after Harold's death was no more than a symbolic token of defiance against the invading Norman forces. Edgar relied largely for his support upon Archbishop Stigand and upon Earls Edwin of Mercia and Earl Morcar of Northumbria and, when this weakened, (within a matter of days of the witan), Edgar was forced inevitably to submit to William at Berkhamstead in either late November or early December 1066. William treated Edgar well. Seeing political advantage, he kept him in his custody and eventually took him back to his court in Normandy. However, Edgar joined in the rebellion of the earls Edwin and Morcar in 1068 and, though defeated, he fled to the court of Malcolm III of Scotland. The next year Malcolm married Edgar's sister Margaret, and agreed to support Edgar in his attempt to claim the English crown. In exchange, Edgar married Malcolm's sister, another Margaret. Edgar now made common cause with Sweyn Estridson, the king of Denmark and nephew of Canute, who believed he was the rightful king of England. Their combined forces invaded England in 1069. They captured York, but did not proclaim the independence of Northumbria. William marched on the north, devastating the land as he went. He paid the Danes to leave, whilst Edgar fled to Scotland. He remained in refuge there until 1072 when William successfully enforced a peace treaty on Malcolm, the terms of which included the exile of Edgar. Edgar eventually made his peace with William in 1074 but he never fully gave up his dreams of regaining the throne of England. He supported Robert Curthose, Duke of Normandy, against William II in 1091 and again found himself seeking refuge in Scotland. He also supported his nephew, Edgar, in gaining the Scottish throne, overthrowing Donald III of Scotland. Around 1098 he went to Constantinople, where he may have joined the Varangian Guard of the Byzantine Empire. Later that year he was given a fleet by Emperor Alexius I to assist in the First Crusade, and brought reinforcements to the crusaders at the Siege of Antioch. He was taken prisoner at the Battle of Tinchebrai in 1106 fighting for Duke Robert



against Henry I of England. He returned to England where Henry pardoned him, and he retired to his country estate in Hertfordshire. His niece Edith (renamed Matilda) had married Henry I in 1100. Edgar is believed to have traveled to Scotland late in life, perhaps around the year 1120, and was still alive in 1125, but may have died soon after, in his early seventies. By then he was forgotten by most and is remembered now only as the "lost king" of England.

Edmund then launched a series of offensives against his rival. He recovered Wessex and relieved London of a siege before being decisively defeated by Canute at Ashington, Essex on October 18. In the ensuing peace settlement, Edmund retained Wessex, while Canute held the lands north of the River Thames. After Edmund died (probably of natural causes), Canute became sole ruler of England. Notes for AEthelred II "the Unready" England:

Aethelred, one of the most hated kings of England, inherited the throne when he was ten years old. His name comes from the Anglo Saxon name for him, "Unread," which means "evil-counseled," or "uncounseled," and was a pun on his name. Later generations, after the language had changed, produced the pun we have here. He was supposed to be licentious and mean.

He was not ready for the Danes to renew their attack. They had been pretty docile since Alfred, the Great. He lost all of England. His son Edmund II Ironside, briefly recovered some of it, but then King Canute (and 2 other Danish kings) took over until Aethelred's other son, Edward the Confessor, regained the throne--only to lose it (for the Saxons anyway) in the next generation to William the Conqueror.

Ethelred II, also spelled Aethelred, byname Ethelred the Unready, or Aethelred Unraed was born 968? and died 23 April 1016, in London, king of the English from 978 to 1013 and from 1014 to 1016. He was an ineffectual ruler who failed to prevent the Danes from overrunning England. The epithet "unready" is derived from unraed, meaning "evil counsel."

The son of King Edgar (ruled 959-975), Ethelred ascended the throne upon the assassination of his half brother King Edward the Martyr in March 978. Widespread suspicion that Ethelred may have had a part in the murder created much of the distrust and disloyalty that undermined his authority. Hence, there was no unified defense when the Danish invasions resumed in 980.

Nearly all of the country was ravaged, and Ethelred's efforts to buy peace only made the invaders more rapacious. When they did begin to settle down in towns, Ethelred provoked further invasions by launching a massacre of Danish settlers (13 Nov 1002). By the end of 1013 the Danish king Sweyn I had been accepted as king in England, and Ethelred had fled to Normandy.

After Sweyn died in Feb 1014, Ethelred's council of advisers invited him to return to the throne on condition that he agreed to satisfy their grievances. At the time of Ethelred's death in 1016, Sweyn's son Canute was ravaging England. Ethelred was succeeded by his son Edmund II Ironside (ruled 1016); one of his other sons ruled England as Edward the Confessor from 1042 to 1066. [Encyclopedia Britannica]

Acceded: 4 Apr 978, Kingston-upon-Thames, Surrey. Reigned 979-1013(deposed) and 1014-1016. In the face of Danish raids, he was

forced to pay huge tributes (Danegeld) to the enemy. He was driven into exile by Sweyn but returned after his death. He died during Canute's invasion of England. Burke says he died 1010. His tomb was lost when the old St Pauls was destroyed in the great fire of London.

Notes for Emma Normandy Queen of England.

Emma, daughter of Richard, Duke of Normandy, married Ethelred the Unready in 1002 and the couple later had a son, Edward the Confessor. In 1013 Emma and Ethelred were forced to flee to Normandy after the country was invaded by Sevin Haralsson, the King of Norway.

In 1017 Emma was summoned to England to marry Ethelred's successor, Canute, by whom she had a son, Hardicanute. These marriages created a dynastic link between the royal families in England and Normandy. Emma of Normandy died in 1052.

Edmund II, byname EDMUND IRONSIDE (b. c 993 - d. 30 Nov 1016), king of the English from 30 April to 30 Nov 1016, surnamed "Ironside" for his staunch resistance to a massive invasion led by the Danish king Canute.

The son of King Ethelred II the Unready (reigned 978-1016), Edmund defied his father's orders by marrying (1015) the widow of one of the Danish lords then occupying English territory. Nevertheless, when Canute invaded England later in 1015, Edmund raised an army in northern England and ravaged regions that would not rally to his cause.

Upon Edthelred's death (April 1016), a small number of councillors and citizens of London proclaimed Edmund as their ruler, but a larger body of nobles at Southampton declared for Canute. Edmund then launched a series of offensives against his rival. He recovered Wessex and relieved London of a siege before being decisively defeated by Canute at Ashington, Essex on October 18. In the ensuing peace settlement, Edmund retained Wessex, while Canute held the lands north of the River Thames. After Edmund died (probably of natural causes), Canute became sole ruler of England. Edgar (born 943/44 - died 8 July 975), king of the Mercians and Northumbrians from 957 who became king of the West Saxons, or Wessex, in 959 and is reckoned as king of all England from that year. He was efficient and tolerant of local customs, and his reign was peaceful. He was most important as a patron of the English monastic revival.

The younger son of Edmund I, king of the English, Edgar was made king of the Mercians and Northumbrians in place of Eadwig, his brother, who was deposed. On Eadwig's death (1 Oct 959), Edgar succeeded to the West Saxon throne. His ecclesiastical policy was also that of the archbishop of Canterbury, St. Dunstan, who insisted on strict observance of the Benedictine Rule. He was stabbed to death by a robber, while attempting to defend his steward from the attack. Edmund I, byname Edmund, The Deed-Doer, Edmundus Magnificus (born 921 - d. 26 May 946, Pucklechurch, England), king of the English (939-946), who recaptured areas of northern England that had been occupied by the Vikings.

He was the son of the West Saxon king Edward the Elder (reigned 899-924) and the half brother of King Athelstan (reigned

924-939), under whom the political unification of England had been accomplished. On Athelstan's death (939), Olaf Guthfrithson, the Norse king of Dublin, occupied Northumbria and raided the Midlands.

Edmund recovered the Midlands after Olaf died in 942, and in 944 he regained Northumbria, driving out the Norse kings Olaf Sihtricson and Raegnald. He capture Strathclyde in 945 and entrusted it to Malcolm I, king of Scots, in return for a promise of military support. Thus, Edmund inaugurated a policy of establishing a secure frontier and peaceful relations with Scotland. In addition, his reign marks the beginning of the 10th-century monastic revival in England. Edward, byname Edward The Elder (died 17 July 924, Farndon on Dee, England), Anglo Saxon king in England, the son of Alfred the Great. As ruler of the West Saxons, or Wessex, from 899 to 924, Edward extended his authority over almost all of England by conquering areas that previously had been held by Danish invaders.

Edward ascended the throne upon his father's death in October 899, and in battle in 902 his forces killed a rival claimant, Aethelwald, who had allied with the Danes. After defeating the Northumbrian Danes at Tettenhall, he set out in August 912 to subdue the Danes of the eastern



Midlands and East Anglia. From 910 to 916 he constructed a series of fortified enclosures around his Kingdom of Wessex.

At the same time, his sister, the Mercian ruler Aethelflaed, constructed a complementary series of fortresses in the northwest Midlands. In 917 Edward and Aethelflaed launched a massive offensive, quickly overwhelming the entire Danish army of East Anglia. Upon Aethelflaed's death in June 918, Edward assumed control of Mercia, and by the end of the year the last Danish armies in the Midlands had submitted. By that time Edward's kingdom included all the lands south of the Humber estuary; in 920 he pacified Northumbria. Complete political unification of England was achieved during the reign of his son and successor, Athelstan (reigned 924-939). [Encyclopaedia Britannica]

Well-trained by Alfred, his son Edward 'the Elder' (reigned 899-924) was a bold soldier who defeated the Danes in Northumbria at Tettenhall in 910 and was acknowledged by the Viking kingdom of York. The kings of Strathclyde and the Scots submitted to Edward in 921. By military success and patient planning, Edward spread English influence and control. Much of this was due to his alliance with his formidable sister Aethelflaed, who was married to the ruler of Mercia and seems to have governed that kingdom after her husband's death.

Edward was able to establish an administration for the kingdom of England, whilst obtaining the allegiance of Danes, Scots and Britons. Edward died in 924, and he was buried in the New Minster which he had had completed at Winchester. Edward was twice married, but it is possible that his eldest son Athelstan was the son of a mistress.

He encouraged the production of copies of "The Anglo Saxon Chronicles." Alfred was one of the greatest men in history. He was crowned king at Winchester 871; founded the British Navy, organized the militia, compiled a code of laws, built schools and monasteries, and invited scholars to live at his court. He was a good scholar and translated many books. From the late 8th century, attacks by Vikings from Scandinavia increased. After a major invasion in 865, the kingdoms of Northumbria and Mercia were rapidly overrun, and in 871 the Danish army attacked Wessex. The Wessex forces under the command of Alfred (reigned 871-99), then aged 21, defeated the Danes at the Battle of Edington in 878. The Danes withdrew to an area north of a frontier running from London to Chester and known as 'Danelaw'. This victory did not finish the Danish threat, and Alfred reorganized the Wessex defenses by organizing his army on a rota basis, so he could raise a 'rapid reaction force' to deal with raiders whilst still enabling his thegns and peasants to tend their farms. Second, Alfred started a building programme of well-defended settlements across southern England as a defense in depth against Danish raiders. Alfred also ordered the building of a navy of new fast ships to patrol the coasts and meet invaders before they penetrated inland. Other reforms included establishing a legal code (assembled from the laws of his predecessors and of the kingdoms of Mercia and Kent), and reforming the coinage. Notes for Aethelwulf Wessex King of England:

Aethelwulf, also spelled Ethelwulf (died 858), Anglo-Saxon king in England, the father of King Alfred the Great. As ruler of the West Saxons from 839 to 856, he allied his kingdom of Wessex with Mercia and thereby withstood invasions by Danish Vikings.



The son of the great West Saxon king Egbert (ruled 802-839), Aethelwulf ascended the throne four years after the Danes had begun large-scale raids on the English coast. In 851 he scored a major victory over a large Danish army at a place called Aclea in Surrey. Aethelwulf then married his daughter to the Mercian king Burgred (853), and in 856 he himself married the daughter of Charles II the Bald, king of the West Franks. Aethelwulf was deposed by a rival faction upon his return from a pilgrimage to Rome in 856, but he continued to rule Kent and several other eastern provinces until his death. In addition to Alfred the Great (ruled 871-899), three of Aethelwulf's other sons became kings of Wessex. [Encyclopaedia Britannica]

Ethelwulf was the son of Egbert. He succeeded his father in 839. At Ethelwulf's request, his four sons each became king in turn rather than risk weakness in the kingdom by allowing young children to inherit the mantle of leadership.

Notes for Judith Franks:

By 855, Aethelwulf was in his fifties and feeling his age. He decided to go on a pilgrimage to Rome, possibly with the intention of retiring there like other monarchs had done before him. He left Wessex in the safe hands of his eldest surviving son, Aethelbald, and the south-east in those of his third son, Aethelbert.

The old King did return home, however, stopping at the court of King Charles the Bald of the Franks on the way. The two must have talked extensively of their common troubles caused by the marauding Vikings: a bond which led agree upon a formal alliance by which Aethelwulf's married Charles's fourteen-year-old daughter, Judith. The King of Wessex even accepted the condition that his new wife be actually crowned as queen, despite this being contrary to West Saxon tradition.

Notes for Alfred "The Great":

Alfred is the only English king to bear the title "The Great." He fought the Danes, with whom he divided up England, eventually taking Mercia and Northumberland from them, along with Wessex, Kent, and London, he had almost all of England at the end. He encouraged the production of copies of "The Anglo Saxon Chronicles."

Alfred was one of the greatest men in history. He was crowned king at Winchester 871; founded the British Navy, organized the militia, compiled a code of laws, built schools and monasteries, and invited scholars to live at his court. He was a good scholar and translated many books

From the late 8th century, attacks by Vikings from Scandinavia increased. After a major invasion in 865, the kingdoms of Northumbria and Mercia were rapidly overrun, and in 871 the Danish army attacked Wessex. The Wessex forces under the command of Alfred (reigned 871-99), then aged 21, defeated the Danes at the Battle of Edington in 878. The Danes withdrew to an area north of a frontier running from London to Chester and known as 'Danelaw'.

This victory did not finish the Danish threat, and Alfred reorganized the Wessex defenses by organizing his army on a rota basis, so he could raise a 'rapid reaction force' to deal with raiders whilst still enabling his thegns and peasants to tend their farms. Second, Alfred started a building program of well-defended settlements across southern England as a defense in depth against Danish raiders. Alfred also ordered the building of a navy of new fast ships to patrol the coasts and meet invaders before they penetrated inland.

Other reforms included establishing a legal code (assembled from the laws of his predecessors and of the kingdoms of Mercia and Kent), and reforming the coinage. Our Norwood Family Legendary Beginnings.

The ancient Kings of Scotland claimed a legendary antiquity beginning with Gaythelos, son of a King of Greece who went to Egypt during the time of Moses where he married a daughter of the Pharaoh. Not to be outdone, the Kings of Wessex developed a legendary ancestry beginning with the Biblical Adam and Eve. This legendary genealogy is recorded in the Anglo-Saxon Chronicle, a collection of documents commissioned by Alfred the Great [My 31, 32, 33 & 34th Great **Grandfather**] in the late 9th century.

The entry written in the Anglo-Saxon Chronicle for the year A.D. 854 relates the descent of Æthelwulf, Alfred the Great's father:

Anglo-Saxon Chronicle, A.D. 854

"And Æthelwulf was the son of Egbert, Egbert of Ealhmund, Ealhmund of Eafa, Eafa of Eoppa, Eoppa of Ingild; Ingild was the brother of Ina, king of the West-Saxons, who held that kingdom thirty-seven winters, and afterwards went to St. Peter, where he died. And they were the sons of Cenred, Cenred of Ceolwald, Ceolwald of Cutha, Cutha of Cuthwin, Cuthwin of Ceawlin, Ceawlin of Cynric, Cynric of Creoda, Creoda of Cerdic, Cerdic of Elesa, Elesa of Esla, Esla of Gewis, Gewis of Wig, Wig of Freawine, Freawine of Frithugar, Frithugar of Brond, Brond of Balday, Balday of Woden, Woden of Frithuwald, Frithuwald of Freawine, Freawine of Frithuwualf, Frithuwulf of Finn, Finn of Godwulf, Godwulf of Great, Great of Taetwa, Taetwa of Beaw, Beaw of Sceldwa, Sceldwa of Heremod, Heremod of Itermon, Itermon of Hathra, Hathra of Hwala, Hwala of Bedwig, Bedwig of Sceaf; that is, the son of Noah, who was born in Noah's ark: Laznech, Methusalem, Enoh, Jared, Malalahel, Cainion, Enos, Seth, Adam the first man, and our Father, that is, Christ. Amen."

King Cerdic, the Saxon chieftain who founded the kingdom of Wessex, was also the virtual founder of British monarchy. A chart showing "The House of Cerdic" is presented in Figures 1.5. The pedigree shown on the left in Figure 1.5 is the genealogy of Cerdic, which should be regarded as legendary.

It was the one qualification of the early kings of Wessex that they should be descended from King Cerdic. Otherwise fitness to rule was the only factor taken into consideration. The strongest kings were Ceawlin, Cedwalla, Ine and Egbert. Cynegils was the first Christian king. Cedwalla and Ine both abdicated their thrones to make pilgrimages to Rome. The five kings (726-802) between Ine and Egbert were eclipsed by the kings of Mercia and Northumbria, but Egbert achieved lasting supremacy for Wessex, and was styled in a charter "Rex Anglorun" (King of the English).

Cerdic (kûr'dk, sûr'¿) was the traditional founder of the kingdom of Wessex. A Saxon, he and his son Cynric landed on the southern coast of



England in 495. Little is certain about him except that later West Saxon kings traced their descent from him through his son Cynric and his grandson Ceawlin.

Cerdic was born before 495 and died in 534. He was king of the West Saxons from 519 thru 534 and was a Saxon ealdorman who founded a settlement on the coast of Hampshire, England in 495. Cedric assumed the title of King of the West Saxons in 519 and became ancestor of the English royal line.

In AD 495, came two leaders into Britain, Cerdic and Cynric, his son, with five ships. In 519, Cerdic and Cynric undertook the government of the West Saxons; the same year they fought with the Britons at a place called Charford. From that day they have reigned as the children of the West Saxon kings.

In 530, they conquered the Isle of Wight. In 532 Cedric was Crowned at Winchester Cathedral. In 534 King Cerdic died, the first king of the West Saxons. Cynric his son succeeded to the government, and reigned afterwards twenty six winters." (Anglo-Saxon Chronicles).

King Cerdic the founder of the West Saxon Kingdom, is described as an ealdorman who in 495 landed with his son Cynric in Hampshire, where he was attacked at once by the Britons. Nothing more is heard of him until 508, when he defeated the Britons with great slaughter. Strengthened by fresh arrivals of Saxons, he gained another victory in 519 at Certicesford, a spot which has been identified with the modern Charford, and in this year took the title of king. Turning westward, Cerdic appears to have been defeated by the Britons in 520 at Badbury or Mount Badon, in Dorset, and in 527 yet another fight with the Britons is recorded. His last work was the conquest of the Isle of Wight, probably in the interest of some Jutish allies. All the sovereigns of England, except Canute, Hardicanute, the two Harolds and William the Conqueror, are said to be descended from Cerdic.

No sooner had England been unified under the supremacy of the kings of Wessex than the Danes landed with increasing intensity, conquering vast territories in eastern England. Alfred the Great succeeded only to the kingdom of Wessex. His successors strongly held the Danes in check, but Ethelred the Unready was forced to flee the country at Christmas, 1013, leaving King Sweyn of Denmark in possession.

Sweyn died the following February, however, and Ethelred was restored. After the death of Edmund Ironside, who reigned only seven months, Sweyn's son, Canute, ruled the whole country, but the English royal family was restored in 1042 with Edward the Confessor. On his death in January, 1066, the Witan (Parliament) elected his brother-in-law Harold, as king. William, Duke of Normandy, the Confessor's maternal cousin, however, claimed that the Crown had been promised to him. William invaded England in October, 1066, killing Harold at the Battle of Hastings. Edgar Atheling, the English heir, was immediately elected king, but was never crowned. In December he renounced succession in favor of William, who then occupied London and ascended the throne as William the Conqueror, the first sovereign of the House of Normandy.




Figure 7.1: Donald Loyd Norwood's linage to William Norwood his 9th Great Grandfather.






Figure 7.2: William Norwood [my 9^{th} GGF] to Roger de Northwode my 20^{th} Great Grandfather.






Figure 7.3: Roger de Northwode [My 20th Great Grandfather] to Eadric of Wessex [My 28th Great Grandfather].






Figure 7.4: Donald Loyd Norwood [Myself] to John Talbot my 8th Great Grandfather.






Figure 7.5: Colonel Augustine Warner III [My 7th Great Grandfather] to John "Fairborn" Beaufort [My 17th Great Grandfather.






Figure 7.6: Colonel Augustine Warner & Mary (Cant) Townley [My 7th Great Grandparents]. Their ancestors are shown above them, namely King James IV & Jane Kennedy my 13th Great Grand parents. Their descendants are shown below them, namely Meriwether Lewis, Mildred Portis, Robert Hodson.







Figure 7.7: Continued from Mildred Portis & Robert Hodson to Queen Elizabeth, Charles, Diana, William & Henry.








Figure 7.8: Continued from Alice Townley & John Grymes to General Robert E. Lee.






Figure 7.9: Hourglass Tree of Don L. Norwood to Johan George Rauch.




Figure 7.10: Hourglass Tree of Johan George Rauch to Wendel Rauch.






Figure 7.11: Hourglass Tree of Don L. Norwood to Augustine Warner & Nicholas Martiau, "The Father of Yorktown."






Figure 7.12: Hourglass Tree of Augustine Warner to the Kings of England.






Figure 7.13: Hourglass Tree of King Edward III, William "The Conquer" & Kings of England, France & Scotland.






Figure 7.14: Hourglass Trees of George Washington & Robert E. Lee and Augustine Warner.




Figure 8.1: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 1.






Figure 8.2: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 2.






Figure 8.3: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 3.






Figure 8.4: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 4.






Figure 8.5: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 5.






Figure 8.6: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 6.






Figure 8.7: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 7.






Figure 8.8: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 8.






Figure 8.9: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 9.






Figure 8.10: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 10.






Figure 8.11: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 11.






Figure 8.12: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 12.






Figure 8.13: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 13.






Figure 8.14: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 14.






Figure 8.15: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 15.






Figure 8.16: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 16.






Figure 8.17: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 17.






Figure 8.18: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 18.






Figure 8.19: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 19.






Figure 8.20: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 20.






Figure 8.21: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 21.






Figure 8.22: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 22.






Figure 8.23: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 23.






Figure 8.24: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 24.






Figure 8.25: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 25.




Figure 8.26: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 26.




Figure 8.27: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 27.




Figure 8.28: Norwood Family Pedigree Chart Number 28 [Kings of France].






Figure 9.1: The House of King Cedric of Wessex.






Figure 9.2: The House of King Egbert, Godwin & Denmark.






Figure 9.3: The Kings of Scotland.






Figure 9.4: The Houses of Normandy, Blois & Anjou.






Figure 9.5: The House of Anjou.






Figure 9.6: The House of Tudor.






Figure 9.7: Chart A, The Main Norwood Line. [From Dempsey Book].






Figure 9.8: Chart B, Sir John de Northwood and Bona FitzBernard & Tregoz. [From Dempsey Book].






Figure 9.9: Chart C, Sir Roger de Northwood and Juliane de Saye. [From Dempsey Book].






Figure 9.10: Etton, of Etton and Gilling. [From Dempsey Book].






Figure 9.11: Chart E, Etton, and of Gilling. [From Dempsey Book].






Figure 9.12: Chart F, Birkin. [From Dempsey Book].






Figure 9.13: Chart G, Everingham. [From Dempsey Book].






Figure 9.14: Chart H, Sir John de Etton and Katherine Everingham.






Figure 9.15: Chart I, Giffard and Butler. [From Dempsey Book].






Figure 9.16: Chart J, Berkeley, Vaux and Throckmorton. [From Dempsey Book].






Figure 9.17: Chart K, Lygon, Beauchamp and Dennis. [From Dempsey Book].






Figure 9.18: Chart L. [From Dempsey Book].






Figure 9.19: Chart M. [From Dempsey Book].






Figure 9.20: [From Dempsey Book].






Figure 9.21: [From Dempsey Book].






Figure 9.22. Chart of Descent of the Main Norwood Lines. [From Callam Book I].






Figure 9.23: Pedigree 1 of the Main Norwood Lines. [From Callam Book II].






Figure 9.24: Pedigree 2, The Stilstead Line of the Norwood Family. [From Callam Book II].






Figure 9.25: Norwood Chart. [From McSwain Book].






Figure 9.26: Berkeley Chart. [From McSwain Book].






Figure 9.27: King Henry III Chart. [From McSwain Book].

10.1. The ancient Minister Abbey Church and Healing Well on the Isle of Sheppey, Kent, England.

Just imagine an ancient Minister Abbey, Britain's oldest Nunnery, set atop a broad green hill on an island overlooking the sea that carried Viking raiders to the shores of England. In this place stands an ancient holy healing well, on a site recently scheduled as an 'Ancient Monument of National Importance'. A stained glass window located in the ancient abbey is shown in **Figure 10.1** on the left.

10.2. Minster Abbey.

Minister Abbey was founded as a Benedictine Nunnery on the Isle of Sheppey more than 1,300 years ago by the widowed Anglo-Saxon Queen Sexburga (Seaxburh - Queen of Kent A.D. 664 - A.D. 670, and also Queen of Wessex A.D. 672 - A.D. 673). The Nunnery became one of the most important centers of Christian worship in early medieval England,

whilst the well had already been in use for well over 2,000 years when the Queen Abbess blessed it and adopted it as her own, and built her religious settlement 'for nuns of high and noble birth' around it.

The Abbess was reputed to have had a vast knowledge of healing waters, and the water from this holy well was used to baptize new converts to Christianity and help heal the sick and injured. Legend has it that the waters were also used to refresh medieval knights returning from the Crusades, and bathe their wounds. The Abbess Queen was later canonized as Saint Sexburga for her life-long work in healing the sick and injured, as were her daughter and grand-daughter, the Saints Erminhilda and Werburga (who both succeeded her as Royal Abbesses and custodians of the Abbey and holy well), and her sister, Saint Etheldreda. Indeed, her direct lineal descendant, King Egbert, of the Wessex dynasty, provided the first king of all England in a succeeding reign in the 9th century.

Archaeological evidence indicates that the well was been in use long before the birth of Christ, and the waters were almost certainly taken and blessed by Saint Augustine during his preaching's on the Isle of Sheppey in A.D. 596. On Christmas day A.D. 598 he conducted a mass baptism of some 12,000 converts in the River Swale below the site of the well, near to Canterbury where he laid the foundations of Christianity in England (Ref: Venerable Bede's Ecclesiastical History of the Angles' - A.D. 731). Indeed, the well itself has been virtually untouched since being re-lined with Kentish rag stone in circa A.D. 1130 by the then Archbishop of Canterbury, William de Corbeil, whilst renovating the original Abbey buildings.




Figure 10.3: The Minster Abbey located on a hill top on the Isle of Sheppey. (Painted in 1876 from the Mill Hill.)

Even at the time of the Reformation in A.D.1539 when King Henry VIII suppressed Minster Abbey, and even though many of the holy wells in England were in-filled or destroyed, the Abbess's well survived and thrived, reputedly because of the reverence in which it was held locally at the time. The well has never been known to fail, even in the severest drought, and it's source, thought to be an underground spring deep under the Abbey itself, has remained a mystery throughout the centuries, producing water of great clarity and purity - given by the earth and blessed by history. Today, in order to comply with health regulations, water is drawn direct from the holy well through approved filtration, to ensure its purity without altering its unique properties in any way.




Figure 10.5: Another Old painting of the Old Minster Abbey on the Isle of Sheppey. (Painted in 1884.)

10.3. Minister Abbey History.

Queen Sexburga, daughter of King Annas of East Anglia, married Ercombert (Earconbert), King of Kent, in AD 640, the first year of his reign, thus helping to consolidate the Saxon Heptarchy (7 kingdoms). Ercombert died soon after, and Queen Sexburga built and endowed Mynstyre (Minster) Abbey during her widowhood, having taken the veil from Archbishop Theodoric, and became the first Abbess of what is now England's oldest Minster.

A direct lineal descendent, King Egbert, born in the 9th century at Cyningburg (Minster), settled the Saxon tribal differences and was proclaimed the first King of all England. Later succeeded by her daughter, Princess Erminhilda, she then became the Lady Abbess of Ely, where she died in AD 699. She was canonized Saint Sexburga in A.D 709 (her day in the Roman Calendar being 3rd February).

Princess Erminhilda married Wulfhare, King of Mercia, and their daughter, Princess Werburga, gave Minster Abbey yet another royal Abbess, who was said to have died and been buried there.

Some 70 years before Queen Sexburga established Minster Abbey, King Æthelberht I was the pagan '5th King of Kent', living on the Isle of Sheppey in the year AD 590. When he later married Bertha, daughter of Claribert the Christian King of France, Pope Gregory seized the opportunity to convert her husband, a very powerful Saxon King, to Christianity, together with all his subjects. Gregory sent a learned and eloquent monk to England, later canonized as St. Augustine, to preach the Gospel of Christ in this then benighted pagan land. Augustine arrived off the Kentish shore at Ebbsfleet in AD 596, and, in spite of initial opposition, was eventually rewarded with unexpected success.

Not only did the pagan Saxon monarch receive him kindly, but Augustine proved so persuasive that Æthelberht was soon received into the Christian faith, with the holy rite of baptism being publicly solemnized on Whitsunday, the 2nd June, AD 597 in the River Swale, below Minster. The Kentish men soon followed their royal master's pious example. On Christmas day, AD 598, Augustine is said to have baptized more than 10,000 people in the same historic Swale.

After his conversion, Æthelberht lost no time in demolishing the heathen temples, originally built to honor the Roman gods Diana and Apollo, and then the Saxon idols, Woden Thunor, Frey and Nerthus.

Augustine subsequently consecrated these places to the worship of the only true God, and 'the ancient emblems of idolatry and gross superstition were shattered and cast out for ever'. Some historians believe that the same fate awaited a pre-existing temple destined to become the most ancient abbey church in this country, Minster Abbey, on the Isle of Sheppey. Anciently called Monasterium Sexburga in honor of Saint Sexburga, Minster Abbey is now one of the oldest places of Christian ownership in England.

English Heritage have reported that this Benedictine nunnery of 'St. Mary and St. Sexburga', as it became re-named in the 12th century, was at one time a large, and probably wealthy foundation with 77 nuns, and that at the time of it's dissolution in the early 16th century, an inventory was taken, showing that it included the church, Lady chapel, dorter, 15 various chambers, frater, bathroom, two floors of kitchen, five chambers within the gatehouse, porter's lodge, cheese house, bake house, brew house, milk house, granary and belfry. Other remains found include a probable iron bloomery, metallic surface (possible courtyard), and a number of other burials. Built to sustain a community of religious women its main buildings were constructed for worship, accommodation and subsistence.

The church and domestic buildings were arranged around a central enclosure, or cloister (probably the site of the Abbess's Well), with an outer court & gatehouse, the whole being bounded by a precinct wall, earthworks or moat. Fishponds, mills, field systems, stock enclosures & barns were probably located outside. The whole nunnery complex was approx. 152 acres, with just the central part now remaining.

According to an Abbey Church handbill by Rev. MacKenzie-Walcott in 1926, foundation trenches for the new vicarage (adjoining the site of the Abbess's Well) revealed the "foundations of the Palace of the Abbess", which was confirmed in Hartley Wither's 1929 publication 'Canterbury & Rochester with Minster in Sheppey', The Rev. Bramston's book 'A History of the Abbey Church of Minster' in 1896 states "The Palace of the Lady Prioress was a noble structure, and was built in freestone." Sadly, King Henry VIII suppressed Minster Abbey in 1536, and all that now survives above ground is the Abbey Church and Abbey Gatehouse.

Sexburger's Seal (now kept in vault at Canterbury Cathedral) Items excavated by Sheppey Archaeological Society have been confirmed to include broken remains of 7th to green-blue Anglo-Saxon century glassware. Brian Slade wrote in 1995 'In the context of their being anciently broken around a nunnery's holy well, Sexburger's well, the Abbess's Well, the most significant, most image provoking, most personal, poignant & emotionally stimulating objects found were the fragments of palm-cups, beakers and pouch bottles, in dull natural blue-green smooth free-blown glass, and re-inflated high relief ribbed glass, all decorated with red streaking'. He then continued 'Based on

archaeological evidence, throughout the 6th to 9th centuries, Anglo-Saxon nuns would have been seen on hot summer days, beakers and palm-cups cradled in their hands, sitting and standing around the Abbess's Well, (Saint Sexburgers's well, near the Abbess's Palace), quietly sipping water freshly drawn from the well's deliciously cool depths. Other nuns would be coming and going, filling glass pouch bottles, either to keep about their person to drink from later as required, or to take to other nuns whose duties or state of health prevented them from coming to the Abbess's Well themselves. Inevitably, over the centuries, every now and then, one of the nuns would accidentally drop her own beloved (and probably inherited) green-blue decorativelyribbed glass palm-cup, beaker or pouch bottle onto the ground around the well, where the delicate glass would smash into many pieces, and then be gradually trodden into the soft ground. There they would remain, hidden and progressively covered with layers of soil, until finally being uncovered by archaeologists more than 1000 years later, when they would be examined, identified and dated.

The Abbess's Well at Minster Abbey has been hailed archaeologically as the most authenticated monastic holy well in private ownership in the British Isles'

In July 1999, a team of archaeologists from Queen's University, Belfast, led by Dr Mark Gardiner, a leading authority on the Anglo-Saxon period, found the remains of an 8th to 9th century timber building near the Abbess's Well, constructed of vertical split-planks (a



known Anglo-Saxon technique). It is considered probably the best of only three similar examples from that period in Britain, the others being in Essex and near Oxford.

The size of the building indicates that the owner was very rich and powerful. Also unearthed was a mid 8th century 'Offa' silver penny, a bronze dress pin, various 'Ipswich-ware' pottery, and a rolled-up bronze tube containing a pin (all Anglo-Saxon).

Archaeological excavations in and around the well in 1991 produced evidence of habitation dating back to the very dawn of English history.

Pottery finds from late Bronze-Age circa 1400-1000 B.C., Iron-Age and Norman-ware, 10 varieties of Roman-ware, and, remarkably, more imported Ipswich-ware (AD 650-850) than was discovered during all excavations at England's Cathedral City of Canterbury.

Metal finds included 7 Anglo-Saxon bronze dress pins with decorated heads (as worn by St. Sexburga nuns over 1,000 years ago), and a delicate chain with small candle-shears, as would have hung from a nun's girdle.

Also found was a Cresset lamp-base circa A.D. 650-850, a Croix (cross) as carried by Anglo-Saxon nuns, a silver sceatta coin from the time of Egbert Archbishop of York, A.D.732-766, & 4 Henry III silver coins, A.D.1216-1272. The sheer density & richness of the Anglo-Saxon finds unearthed around the well reflects the wealth of the Queen Sexburga nuns of royal and high birth.

An abrupt reduction in pottery finds around the well for the period circa A.D. 850-1100 bears witness to a period of diminished habitation following many well-documented Viking raids on Monasterium Sexburga. Sheppey Archaeologists, aware of Minster Abbey's documented history, expected the Anglo-Saxon pottery evidence surrounding the well to begin circa A.D. 670, when Saint Sexburga nunnery was built, but instead unearthed much from circa A.D.450. This certainly means that the substantial settlement around the well site

certainly pre-dated Monasterium Sexburga by more than 200 years, thus confirming that Saint Sexburga introduced her nunnery into what was already an existing Anglo-Saxon settlement. A report by English Heritage (May 1994), based on their own inspection of the well, concluded that the present stones forming the well-shaft 'are consistent with a date in the 12th century', which would agree with earlier Archaeologists' findings, but some objects found down the well dated back to the 3rd century Roman occupation of the site, as well as shards of even earlier bronze-age pottery. This suggests that when Archbishop William de Corbeuil had stone shipped to Sheppey in circa A.D.1130, to rebuild the predominantly timber framed Abbey buildings, he also had the timber lined shaft of the Abbess's Well replaced with the same stone, which is still there and in very good condition today.




Figure 10.13: Section through the Abbess's Well.

The Abbess's Well was also found to contain a 400-year-old size 5 ladies' shoe with a leather upper, wooden sole and metal pattern ring (for raising ladies' clothing out of the mud thoroughfares of the day). This shoe was identified by Dr. Francis Grew of the Museum of London as a particularly fine 17th century specimen, now displayed in the museum. Notices in church porches still survive today in England asking ladies to "please remove your patens before entering". 200 years ago Lady Newdigate-Newdgate wrote, "The way to the well was almost impassable. We had been forced to get high pattens, and with them do vastly well." Although the metal rings are sometimes discovered, a complete shoe is a rarity, but this one probably survived intact through being waterlogged and protected in the sand and silt at the bottom of the Abbess's Well.



Lower down in the well archaeologists found 5 medieval gold pins and 2 Roman coins; an Antoninianus of Victorianus from A.D.269-271, and an Antoninianus of Gallienus from A.D.253-268 (inscribed with the name of the goddess Diana on one side and her stag symbol on the other). Significantly, Augustus Daly's book 'A History of the Isle of Sheppey' published in 1904, asserts that a pagan temple dedicated to the Roman God Apollo and Goddess Diana originally stood on the site where Minster Abbey was later built. Local historian Brian Slade has suggested that Queen Sexburga inherited and 'Christianized a very ancient pagan well, blessing it in the name of Christ and adopting it as her own.

Archaeologists also unearthed fragments of green and amber glass from around the Abbess's Well, similar to that of a circa A.D.550 glass flagon found at Herpes, near Loire in France (see 'Early Anglo-Saxon Art and Archaeology' by E.T. Leeds). From an age when water transport was the easiest form of travel, it is not surprising that such objects should be found on the site of Monasterium Sexburga, which would have been an important medieval trading center.

Anglo-Saxon table glass was very beautiful; not clear or white, but in ambers, blues and greens, and probably imported from northern Europe, which was more accessible by sea than many places in England were by land. Indeed, some of the stone used to build Minster Abbey was shipped over from Caen in northern France.

The Church of St. Mary with St. Sexburga, or Minister Abbey as it is usually called, stands high up on a hill in Minster. Although it is one of the oldest churches in England, visitors will find an historic building which is also the focus of a living and growing church family. Minster Abbey was founded in 664, and part of the original nuns' chapel built with Kentish rag stone, containing flints and Roman tiles which can be seen in the north-east corner of the present church. For over 1300 years, people have worshipped God on this site, during which time the Saxons, Danes and Normans have come and gone. All have left their mark, together with succeeding generations to the present day. In the Abbey you will find monuments to great people in Isle of Sheppey's past, such as the stone effigies to Sir Robert de Shurland and his faithful horse, Grey Dolphin; the **Northwode brasses** (13th century) and the tomb of Sir Thomas Cheyney, treasurer to Henry VIII.

The magnificent roof over the south aisle built by local carpenters and shipwrights of the 19th century should also be seen. Visitors are welcome daily including Sundays, although during summer there can be several weddings on Saturdays. From mid-May to early September there is a team of Abbey Watchers available 10am - noon and 2pm - 5pm to show you around and answer questions. At other times you may be able to collect a key from the nearby Vicarage. Parties are welcome and cream teas can be organized by arrangement. Standing close by the Abbey is the Gatehouse Museum - a building of great age, full of interesting Sheppey artifacts and well worth a visit.

The priory was destroyed by the Viking invaders in the ninth century, and further harmed by the depredations of Earl Godwin's (my 24th great grandfather) family in the eleventh century.

William I "the Conqueror" my 27th great grandfather partly rebuilt the church and priory, and installed the nuns from Newington there, but the foundation remained impoverished until Archbishop de Corbeuil (1123-1139) rebuilt the church and priory. He is also credited with building the parish church adjoining the nuns' chapel, although that exhibits much thirteenth century work.

The priory continued until the Dissolution in 1536. Sir Thomas Cheyne then acquired all the property and the manorial rights. All the original monastic buildings were demolished with the exception of the imposing Abbey Gatehouse that was used for many years as living accommodation, and is now a well-stocked local history museum. When he died in 1559, Sir Thomas requested burial in the Chapel of Saint Katherine at the Abbey Church at Minster. His estates were inherited by Sir Henry Cheyne, the son of his second marriage, who rapidly disposed of his father's properties in Sheppey.

Sir Henry obtained permission from the church authorities to demolish the Chapel of Saint Katherine and the tombs of his father and 'divers ancestors' were moved into the Abbey Church.

By 1623, the estate had become the property of Sir John Hayward and the income from it was used for charitable purposes. After the charity was dissolved in 1800, repairs to the Abbey were neglected and by 1877 it was in a ruinous state and without a vicar. The Reverend William Bramston was then appointed and he worked tirelessly to restore the Abbey, which was reopened for worship in 1881.

10.4. A Tour of the Abbey Church.

The Abbey is entered through the large south porch, which has massive outer doors and a heavy, imposing inner doorway, considered to have been the original main doorway of the nuns' chapel. The interior of the Abbey has the appearance of two churches; pointed arches supported on ornamented piers separate two parallel aisles. When it was built, the south church was constructed against the south wall of the earlier nuns' chapel, which was later pierced by arches. The parish church (i.e. that to the south) is spacious and displays the 'chosen sentences' last relettered in the eighteenth century.

There is no chancel arch separating the sanctuary from the nave. In the east wall are three lancet windows of great beauty (Early English). On either side of the windows are large vertical niches. On the back wall of the south niche is a faded wall painting of Saint Nicholas; the other is unpainted and below it is an ancient blocked doorway. Beneath the south niche is an aumbry - originally a cupboard for keeping sacred vessels - and in the wall near to it a restored piscina, a small stone basin where the sacred vessels would have been washed after Mass. All the windows are of modern stained glass. The north aisle, or nuns' chapel, shows traces of the original building. Remains of Saxon windows, with Roman tiles incorporated, are visible high in the south wall, and traces of Saxon windows are evident in the north wall. A graceful arch separates the nave from the chancel, with evidence of a former rood loft. A carved oak screen is placed across the archway opening; the chancel now forms the Chapel of Saint Sexburga. In the east wall may be seen three recessed arches, which suggests that the chapel once extended further and that the arches were placed in their present position when alterations were carried out. This may have been the site of the demolished Saint Katherine's Chapel. The arches are carved and contain some small heads of some beauty.

To the left of the arches is a priest's door, and to the right of them is a piscina. The sedilia – seats for the clergy - still remain on the south wall. At the west end of the nuns' chapel is the belfry arch, below which is the vestry and the entrance to the tower and the belfry. Below the Willis organ, on the north wall, at the rear of the war memorial chapel, are full-size reproductions of **the de Northwood (Norwood) brasses**.






Figure 10.14: Floor plan of the Minister Abbey.

10.5. The Norwood Brasses.

It is exciting to know that our Norwood ancestors came from the Isle of Sheppey but I could have known in my wildest dreams that actual 14th century brasses of my 19th great grandparents are buried in the floor of the Minister Abbey. **Sir John de Northwode and Lady Joan de Badlesmere Northwode** are life-sized flat memorial engravings! The originals are mounted in the floor and covered by carpet to preserve them. Two duplicates are framed under glass and hung on the walls of the abbey. A second pair of copies is mounted on thick planks of wood and available for tourists (and relatives) who want to do crayon rubbings, etc.

A Norwood ancestor quickly learned that the rubbings were out of the question for them. (The pastor of the abbey had seen an experienced person spend the whole day on just one rubbing.)

Connie Baesman a Norwood ancestor stated that on her families trip to Sheppey in 1994 that her husband and son were allowed to cart these brasses outside into the sunlight for photographing. The church historian gave them some history behind the symbolism on the brasses of that period. The crossed legs as seen on Sir John meant that the person had fought in the crusades.

The animals behind the feet were symbolic, too. A dog (as found behind Lady Joan's feet) meant that the person had died a peaceful, natural death. The small lion, as found behind Sir John's feet symbolized a violent death as in battle. According to notes taken by her Great Aunt Alice Hubbard from "The History of the Isle of Sheppey from Roman Occupation to King Edward VII" by Augustus A. Daly, "Sir John de Northwode received his knighthood from King Edward I for his

gallantry in the Siege of Caeverlock (the same as his neighbor Lord Shurland.) The date on the brasses is about 1330. The whipple or headdress which forms part of the costume of the lady was allowed to be worn only by ladies of title, and the way it was put on indicated the rank of the wearer. As represented on the engraving on the brasses, it shows that Sir John de Northwode's wife was a nobleman's daughter and a lady in her own right. If she had been a princess, it would have been worn high enough to hide her lips. If she were merely a knight's wife it would have reached her chin." There is a full account of these brasses with some bibliographical references in Marion Norwood Callam's book; "The Norwoods II, Heraldry and Brasses", pp. 59-68.

10.6. Famous Monuments.

The Abbey possesses some famous monuments that provide examples of the different types of armor worn in the Middle Ages. The best known is that of Baron Robert de Shurland, who died in 1327. The effigy (on an altar tomb against the south wall of the parish church, behind the choir stalls) is of a tall, robust knight in full armor, complete with helmet, shield and lance. His page, also in armor, lies at his feet; and behind him his horse's head is shown, rising from the waves.

The tomb (Figure 10.17) that has an imposing decorated canopy is of a later date than the effigy of Sir Robert de Shurland.

Under the eastern arch of the wall, which divides the two churches, stands the altar tomb of Sir Thomas Cheyne, (pronounced: Chainey) a descendant of Baron de Shurland. He wears sixteenth-century attire, with all the insignia of the Order of the Garter (Figure 10.18). Carved on all four sides of the tomb are coats of arms, crests and badges of his family and of the great families with whom he was in some way connected.

In the northeast corner of the nuns' chapel, where the Easter sepulcher would once have stood, lies an unknown warrior (Figure 10.19) in fifteenth century armor, wearing the Yorkist collar. It has been suggested that he may be Sir Hugh de Badlesmere or George Plantagenet, Duke of Clarence, who was executed for high treason, and chose to be drowned in a butt of Malmsey wine, a beverage of which he was particularly fond!

Several interesting stone coffin lids lie around on the floor nearby, as well as some carved stone heads.






Figure 10.16: The Norwood Brasses.

Against the north wall is an effigy of a knight in early fifteenth century armor; this was dug up from the churchyard in 1833. He is remarkable for the small egg-shaped image clasped in his hands, which supposedly represents his soul.

The **famous de Northwood brasses** lie in the chancel of the parish church (and are covered for protection); they date from about 1330 and are noted for their details of armor and female dress of the period. As already stated, full-size replicas can be seen on the north wall, directly facing the main door.

10.7. Brief notes on the History of Holy Trinity Church.

Holy Trinity Church dates from c610-50. It sits on traditionally religious ground. The large stone outside the front porch is said to be a pagan alter-stone. A Roman villa also stood near the site. The original church (c610-50) includes in its walls a high proportion of roman tiles from the villa ruins.

Ancient records say that St. Sexburga, dowager Queen of Kent, first Abbess of Minster-in-Sheppey (and now co-patroness of the Abbey Church there), second Abbess (after her sister Etheldreda) of Ely, died in the porch of this church in the 690s. That porch would have stood



where the tower now is, with a small room above it, reached by rope ladder, for the priest. The door high on the west wall, which now looks out from the ringing chamber, enabled him to keep an eye on the church.

The title 'Regis' attached to Milton as a royal manor goes back at least to Alfred the Great my 31, 32, 33 & 34th great grandfather (871-900). As a royal manor Earl Godwin attacked it when he rebelled against Edward the Confessor in 1052. He burned the church roof and the village (then to the east of the present Kemsley village). The village was then moved to its present location near the head of Milton Creek. The church walls were heightened and a chancel and south transept added — the restored building was re-dedicated in 1070, presumable receiving then the dedication 'Holy Trinity'.

The priest's vestry and room above it was originally an anchorite's cell. (A license from Henry III authorizing the parish to maintain an anchorite, dated 1255, is in the library of Merton College, Oxford.) Our anchorite was a priest and had his own chapel in the lower room so there was no need for a 'squint'. The piscina and mural paintings in the vestry date from his occupation, though the altar step reflects renewed use of the room as a chapel in the 19th century. The anchorite would have been walled up into his cell, living in the upper room then reached by a rope ladder and preaching through the large window there to people below, on whom he relied for gifts of food on which to survive.

In the early 1300's Milton lost its royal patronage (the honorary 'Regis' was restored early in the present century) when the Norwood family became lords of the manor. They take credit for the substantial restoration and new building of the 14th century.

The tower was built between 1320 and 1340, the porch and southwest section of the church from about the same date. The porch door, the chequer board gate now at the back of the church and most of the woodwork in the ceiling of both nave and chancel (apart from a few obviously machine cut beams) belong to this period. The tower - a lifetime's work for one master mason - is the most massive in Kent (3rd largest in England) measuring 25' X 25' internally at ringing chamber level, with walls 4'6" thick. It is 78' high - nothing unusual but the highest in the area and an Ordnance Survey Reference point. It now holds 6 bells.

The chapel in the southeast corner of the building was built in the early 1400s as a chantry chapel where requiem masses were said for the souls of deceased Norwoods - hence it is not a Lady Chapel nor has it any other dedication. In the fashion of that day there was a rood loft - a raised platform with a rood (crucifix) in the middle - where the gospel was read for greater ease of hearing in days before amplifier systems. The stairs now blocked by the window ledge in the south wall led to the loft and the two spaces from which Scout flags now hang supported its main beam.

The Norwood Chapel sanctuary has fine sedilia. The left arch contains fragments of a brass to Thomas and Margaret Ayleff, owners of Coleshall in the early 1500s; in the right arch now hangs a board with brasses (original site unknown) to **Sir John and Lady Norwood** (c.1500, so presumably the second of three successive Sir Johns). On the wall tomb north of the sanctuary is the brass to a young knight in the Norwood household (c1480). The armorial bearings were pilfered in the 18th century so it is impossible to identify him. (The light on the north wall of this sanctuary is over the ambry where the sacrament of Holy Communion is reserved for the Sick.) The metal skeleton high above it once held the gauntlets and jousting helm of Sir John Norton,

High Sheriff of Kent and brother-in-law of Sir John Norwood. Sir John Norton's altar-tomb stands nearby. The gauntlets have long since perished. The helm is on extended loan to H.M. Armories in the Tower of London, where it may be seen on display. **The Norwood communion rail** is said to be Tudor.

The Vicar's stall in choir (apart from the top which is modern) is of Jacobean construction, but the carved wood is much older, being parts of the medieval rood screen.

The East window is a memorial to a parishioner killed in the South African War (1899-1901). The only sentimentalities are the face of the knight in armor (said to be that of the man commemorated) and the man's pet dog, which is said to have followed him everywhere.

There are various mural paintings - the teaching aids of an illiterate age. There is a St. Christopher over the inner porch door, a vine by the Vicar's stall, and, most important, the north wall is covered with a two-tier 'Life of St. Paul' of which one panel, above the pulpit, has been reexposed (the whole wall was whitewashed to protect the paintings from Cromwellian vandalism.) This last is one of the oldest murals in England - it was painted about the time King John was signing Magna Carta.




Figure 10.25: Another inside view of the Minster Abbey.




Figure 10.31: Another inside view of the Minster Abbey.




Figure 10.37: Chancel with the old window (before 1890 restoration).






Figure 10.38: Floor Plan of the Minster Abbey (New Configuration in 1972).



11.1. My 21st Generation Norwood Family, William I "the Conqueror", King of England, my 24, 25, 26 & 27th Great Grandfather depending on my various ancestral lines.

King William I of England -- known alternatively as William of Normandy, William the Bastard and better known as William the Conqueror -- was born 14 Oct 1024 in Falaise, Calvados, Normandy, France; and died 4 Sep 1087 in Hermentruvilleby, Rouen, Seine-Maritime, France. He was the illegitimate son of his father, Duke Robert I of Normandy, known as "Robert the Devil" and "Robert the Magnificent." William was born of a liaison between the devilish duke and a tanner's daughter named Herleve or Herleva and popularly remembered as Arlette or Arletta.

Interestingly enough no authentic portrait of William exists. In the patriotic print (illustration, above) he is wearing plate armor that was invented generations after his death.

11.2. Duke William's Parents.

According to legend, Robert and Arlette met when they were both in their late teens. Robert was riding his horse one day when he saw the lovely Arlette washing her clothes in a river. (According to another story, Arlette was dancing beside a road when Robert first spied her.) Instantly smitten, the duke sent one of his servants to summon Arlette to his castle. She agreed to become Robert's mistress, but insisted on living with him openly rather than conducting the affair in secrecy. Their son William was born within a year of their first meeting. Arlette later had a daughter, Adelaide, who may also have been Robert's child.

After her relationship with Robert ended, Robert persuaded Arlette to marry his friend, Herluin of Conteville a viscount with whom she had four children, including a son called Odo of Bayeux who would become one of William's most trusted advisors. William's sister Adelaide grew up to marry three counts.

11.4. Duke William's Early Life.

William's illegitimacy shaped his career when he was young. Although illegitimate, William was, nevertheless, a direct descendant of Rolf the Viking and had a good claim to the throne. William was recognized by his family as the heir - an exception to the general rule that illegitimacy barred succession. His great uncle looked after the Duchy during William's minority, and his overlord, King Henry I of France, knighted him at the age of 15.

William succeeded to his father's Duchy of Normandy at the young age of 7 in 1035 and was known as Duke William II of Normandy. He lost three guardians to plots to usurp his place. King Henri I of France knighted him at the age of 15. By the time he turned 19 he was himself successfully dealing with threats of rebellion and invasion. With the assistance of King Henri I of France, William finally secured control of Normandy by defeating the rebel Norman barons at Caen in the battle of Val-ès-Dunes in 1047.

When William was about eight years old his father decided to go on a pilgrimage to Jerusalem. Before leaving, Robert called his vassals together and ordered them to swear fealty to William. Reluctantly the men obeyed. Perhaps Robert did not expect to return from the Holy Land; if so, he was right. He died on his journey, and his illegitimate son became the new Duke of Normandy.

Robert's barons quickly forgot their vow of loyalty to William. When they weren't fighting amongst themselves, they were plotting to do away with the young duke in order to seize his power. First one of William's guardians, Gilbert of Brionne, was murdered; then William's uncle Osbern, Arlette's brother, was killed while protecting William from kidnappers who had invaded the boy's bedroom. William's tutor was also murdered. Not surprisingly, William's supporters decided to send him away from home for his own protection. William's uncle Walter -- brother of Arlette and Osbern -- frequently woke William in the dead of night and smuggled him to a new hiding place under cover of darkness.

Like most children of that time, William grew up fast. At around age fifteen he was knighted, and when he was nineteen or twenty he went to war against his cousin Guy of Burgundy to defend his inheritance. With the help of French king Henri I, he defeated Guy and forced the rebels to swear allegiance to him. But the battles of "William the Bastard," as his enemies called him were far from over. He was always fighting someone -- even his erstwhile ally, Henri I. The beleaguered boy became a ruthless, powerful, and greatly feared conqueror.

11.6. Duke William's Wife.

When William was in his early twenties he asked Count Baldwin V of Flanders for his daughter Matilda's hand in marriage. But Matilda was already in love with an Englishman named Brihtric. She supposedly proclaimed that she would rather become a nun than the wife of a bastard, which made William so angry that he attacked her in the street as she left church one day. He slapped her, tore her clothes, threw her to the ground, and rode off.

Not an auspicious start to a marriage, yet William and Matilda did eventually marry, and they seem to have been quite happy together. They must have been an odd couple to behold, since William was tall and reportedly grew very fat later in life, while Matilda was short -- almost a dwarf -- and slender. They had at least four sons and five daughters. The pope objected to William and Matilda's marriage






Figure 11.2: The Houses of Normandy, Blois & Anjou.



because they were distant cousins. For a while they (and everyone else in Normandy) were excommunicated, but after several years they were admitted back into the Church in return for building two abbeys.

William married Matilda of Flanders in 1050 or 1051 at the Cathedral of Notre Dame at Eu, Normandy (now in Seine-, Maritime). He was 23, she was 21. Their marriage produced four sons and six daughters (see list below). Queen Matilda, was only 4 ft. 2 in. in height, making her the shortest monarch England has ever had.

11.7. Duke William's Adulthood.

William's early adult years were filled with wars and rebellions, including a war with King Henry of France, and with his neighbors in Brittany, Maine and Anjou. In 1049, William married Matilda, daughter of Count Baldwin V of Flanders, forging an alliance between two of the most powerful northern territories.

By 1060 William had a considerable reputation as a warrior, for he was generally successful in his wars. He was a tenacious opponent, brutal at times. Many of the wars were fought against great odds, increasing both his reputation and his confidence in the field.

One result of these wars was a very large scale transfer of land, either in the form of conquered territory, or in confiscations from rebellious vassals. The duke gave these back out to those loyal to him, transforming his barons into an aristocracy that was loyal to him.

During these years William was able to make himself the arbiter of disputes, the fount of favors, and the ultimate authority in the duchy. So the barons increasingly served rather than challenged him.

Similarly, the duke ruled the Church. The nobles founded many monasteries and the archbishopric of Rouen was coterminous with the duchy. The powerful families controlled the ecclesiastical positions, and all served the duke.

11.8. Duke William Visits England.

In 1051 William paid a visit to the king of England, Edward the Confessor. Edward had been raised in Normandy, and he and William were cousins. The "Confessor" was a highly religious man who purportedly had the power to heal. His servants saved his bath water and gave it to sick people to drink, or put it in the eyes of the blind to restore their sight. A hundred years after his death Edward was made a Catholic saint.

Although he had a young wife, Edward was celibate and therefore childless. So he promised to make William his heir -- or at least, that's what William claimed.

Edward's brother-in-law Harold Godwinson visited Normandy in 1063 or 1064. According to some accounts Edward had sent Harold to see William; by other accounts, Harold only ended up in Normandy because his ship had been blown off course. Apparently he was not permitted to leave the country until he had sworn on holy relics that he would uphold William's claim to the English throne. He also promised to marry William's daughter Agatha, who was then just a child.

But Harold broke both of these promises, thereby setting the stage for the Norman invasion of England.

11.9. The Conquest.

In January of 1066 the dying King Edward named Harold as his successor, thereby breaking his promise to leave the throne to William. Edward didn't really have the right to choose the next king; that right belonged to a royal council called the witan. The witan, too, chose Harold. He was crowned the day after Edward's death.

Outraged, William sent messages to Harold, reminding him that he had sworn to support William's claim to the throne and marry William's daughter Agatha. But Harold was already king, and he soon married another woman. It was not long before William had his revenge. In September of 1066 he invaded England, and on October 14 he defeated Harold at the Battle of Hastings. Harold was killed by an arrow through the eye, and William became England's king. His coronation took place on Christmas Day.

The conqueror ruthlessly put down all opponents and subjugated the English people. Among those who suffered his wrath was the man who had been his wife Matilda's first love, the unfortunate Brihtric. He was thrown into a dungeon, where he died. Some people believe Matilda herself was responsible for Brihtric's sad fate; it is said he had rejected her marriage proposal years before, and after becoming queen she took her revenge by having him imprisoned, with or without William's consent

11.10. Aftermath: The Domesday Book.

After the conquest, William decided on another ambitious undertaking--nothing less than a general inventory of his new realm. He appointed surveyors, inspectors who were empowered to visit every fief and village in England, there to record in detail the wealth and legal obligations of each.

The resulting collection of records is known as the Domesday Book, a veritable treasure for historians. It records how much land a knight held, how many villages were there, how many buildings in the village, even the number of cattle and yield of grain. Historians have long used this source to understand the social and economic structure of 11th century England. William used it to assess nicely the wealth and military strength he had at his command as king of England.



The Domesday Book is unique in the middle Ages. No other king attempted such an inventory. No other king possessed the great authority needed to force reluctant vassals to divulge such information. The Book shows William's keen mind and powerful will at work. The fact that there were no others shows how little medieval monarchs knew of their own power.

11.11. Aftermath: The Salisbury Oath.

The rebellion that brought William back to England was a serious one, in which the rebels cooperated with Viking forces. It cost William considerable effort to suppress it, and in its wake he made a new arrangement with his barons. William ordered his nobility to the Salisbury plain where they swore an oath of fealty directly to him. This relationship was unique in Europe at the time. Usually, a minor knight might hold a few acres from a baron, who in turn held the land from a count or earl, who in turn held large tracts of the king. But in 1086 William forced all his vassals to swear service directly to him for their fiefs.

Here again we see William's clear-mindedness and pragmatism. It is likely that other kings thought of doing what William did, or longed for it, but no French or German king ever had the remarkable authority and power that the Conqueror did. Indeed, even later English kings found their authority fragmented and attenuated by divided loyalties among the baronage. The Salisbury Oath was possible not only because William could conceive of it, but because he was king of a conquered people and could achieve it.

11.12. Duke William's Later Years.

William's family life was often turbulent. His most troublesome child was his eldest son, Robert Curthose, presumably so called because he had short legs (taking after the tiny Queen Matilda). When William refused to allow Robert to govern Normandy, his son allied with William's enemies. In 1079 the two actually met in one-on-one combat and Robert wounded William in the hand. William's favorite son, William Rufus, was also wounded in the battle. Yet the king and Robert later reconciled, and when William died he left Normandy to Robert. William Rufus inherited the throne of England.

The king also fell out with his half-brother Odo, who had fought by his side at Hastings and whom William had made a bishop. Odo committed some crime -- exactly what is not known -- and William sent him to prison for five years.

Another unfortunate member of William's family was his daughter Agatha, who had once expected to marry King Harold. It is said that she always loved Harold, and never wanted to another husband. In her teens she was betrothed to the king of Castile, but she died on her way to the wedding.

11.13. Duke William's Death.

William returned to Normandy after Salisbury, for he was at war with the King of France again. He was still frequenting battlefields in his early sixties. While fighting the French at the Battle of Mantes, he was thrown against the pommel of his saddle so violently that his intestines burst. He fell ill while campaigning, and was taken to a monastery at Saint-Gervais. He died on 9 September 1087. The great lords with him quickly departed, including his son, William Rufus,

hurrying back to their castles and estates, the better to guard their interests.

What happened to William after his death provides an interesting example of the vagaries of fortune.




Figure 11.4: Falaise Castle in Normandy.

The quick flight of the nobility left only the lesser attendants with the body, and when the servants looked around and saw no great lords about, they lost all discipline. The chronicler Orderic Vitalis says," Observing that their masters had disappeared, [they] laid hands on the arms, the plate, the linen, and the royal furniture, and hastened away, leaving the corpse almost naked on the floor of the cell."

A kind-hearted knight arranged a funeral for him at the abbey of St. Stephen in Caen. His body was brought to Caen. The funeral procession was interrupted when a fire broke out in the town. Those carrying the coffin put it down, rushed off to fight the fire, and then returned when the fire was out to continue the procession.

The procession finally arrived at the abbey church. A lovely service was held. The eulogies were disrupted, however, when Ascelin, a local man, rose to protest that he was the owner of the ground in which the king was to be buried. He complained that he had not been paid and loudly demanded his rights. Someone came and settled him down, paid him, and the services resumed.

As the body was being placed in the stone coffin, the attendants accidentally broke one of the limbs when they tried to cram the king's bloated corpse into a too-small sarcophagus. The body exploded releasing such a foul stench that the priests had to hurry the service to an undignified close. The cathedral quickly emptied.

William's memorial was beautiful, at least. Chroniclers tell us this, for it has not survived. In 1562, Calvinists completely ruined it, looting the tomb. The body disappeared at this time. Eighty years later, a new monument was built, likewise beautiful. In it was re-buried what was left of William: a thigh bone that a priest claimed had been rescued from the Calvinist sack.

The new monument was destroyed in its turn during the revolutionary riots of 1793. Today, William has only a stone slab to commemorate him. Local tradition asserts that the thigh bone is still under the slab. But it is a sorry survival for the Conqueror.



11.14. Effects of the Conquest.

The effects of the Conquest were numerous and ran deep. One of the most immediate and most serious was the almost complete transfer of power at the top of society from Saxon to Norman hands.

William consistently sought ways and excuses to remove Saxons from power, but the Saxons themselves were most obliging. Many went into exile. Many were killed in the invasion and later rebellions. Many more were simply dispossessed. By 1086, 80% of the fiefs were in Norman hands (some held by Flemings and Bretons).

William brought with him the centralizing tendencies and techniques he had followed in Normandy. William as king held one- fifth of all land in England; this was a far greater estate than held by any French king. A quarter was held by the Church. Half the fiefs belonged to Norman lords, but their holdings were scattered rather than concentrated, so they could never become rivals to royal power. William was quite careful about this--he did not want to create another Earl of Wessex to rival the king.

One element in William's control of England was a military innovation he brought with him from France: stone castles. England had few, if any, stone castles before the Conqueror. After him, the landscape was transformed: 84 built by 1100. These castles were always given to Norman lords and many were built in areas prone to rebellion. The castles were all but impregnable and served as Norman anchors in a Saxon sea.

A long-term change was the change of language. The Normans spoke French, and French now became the language of government and the nobility. It remained so until the 15th century. Henry II, Richard the Lion-Hearted, even Edward Longshanks, all spoke French. Language was a barrier and a divide between the Norman lords and their Saxon subjects.

The Robin Hood legend has strong echoes of the division. Remember, all the bad guys in the legend are Normans, while all the good guys are Saxons. Never mind that the ultimate hero is Richard Lion-Hearted, whose father was born in Anjou; the legend is filled with anachronisms, like any good legend. But the antagonism between Norman and Saxon in the Robin Hood stories reflected a real one that lasted long after the death of the Conqueror.

11.15. Effects of the Conquest, Part 2.

The Norman Conquest brought profound changes in landholding and in politics. Prior to the invasion, there were freeholders in England-nobles who held title to their own lands. William brought that to an end. The formula was *nullus terre sans seigneur*, a lovely phrase that combines Latin with French. **It means: no land without a lord.**

When he granted lands to his Norman lords, it was granted in exchange for service. When he confirmed Saxon lords in their holdings, he brought them under the same obligations. And he imposed heavy demands on his vassals, requiring of them the service of many more knights than he was able to require in Normandy, where tradition placed limits on the rights of the duke.

To illustrate: in England, 11 lords owed 60 or more knights each; 27 lords owed 25 or more; 6 bishoprics and 3 abbeys owed 40 or more. In Normandy, in contrast, only a handful of lords owed even more than 10 knights. This, too, survived for a long time. This is why, even though England was a much less populous country than France, the English king was able to field armies of comparable size. He simply had direct command of more knights.

William instituted a great expansion of the royal forest, at the expense of the nobility. He introduced the King's Council, the curia regis, which gave advice to the king and sat in judgment on nobles accused of serious crimes.

William also brought with him the Norman church, with its Romanesque church architecture and its reforming spirit. The old English church was still centered on the monastery. The new church drew its strength from the cathedrals in the towns. And he continued his Norman practice of appointing bishops as he saw fit, granting sees as rewards to selected families.

Harder to define, but no less important, the Conquest oriented England away from Scandinavia and towards France. Because of the strong Danish influence, England had had much to do with Denmark and Norway and rather little to do with France. Now, England's fate was bound up with that of France, and the consequences of this would reverberate for centuries.

Through all these changes, local government remained untouched: the shires and their reeves, the shire court, the Danegeld, the national militia. There was a gradual loss of freedom for the peasants, but also an end to slavery (which was still practiced in Saxon England). Saxon tradition therefore survived at the local level and among the peasantry, further perpetuating the rift between conquerors and conquered.

In 1035, Robert, Duke of Normandy died. Although William was illegitimate, he was Robert's only living son, and so inherited the father's title. Gilbert, Count of Brionne, became William's guardian. A number of Norman barons would not accept an illegitimate son as their leader and in 1040 an attempt was made to kill William. The plot failed by they did manage to kill Gilbert.

William began to govern Normandy in 1045. Two years later, the lords of the western region of the duchy rebelled, but William successfully defeated them at Val-es-dunes. Four years later, William visited Edward the Confessor, the king of England. Later, William claimed that Edward promised him that he would become his heir.

In 1053 William married Matilda of Flanders, the daughter of Count Baldwin of Flanders. Over the next sixteen years the couple had nine children. Seven of these survived: Robert, Richard (killed in a hunting accident in 1075), Cecily, William, Agatha, Henry and Adela.

William's power in Normandy was constantly under threat. After repulsing two French invasions, William managed to capture Maine in 1063. The following year, Harold Godwinson journeyed to Normandy. Later, William claimed that during the visit, Harold promised he would support his claim to the English throne.

William of the House of Normandy; The first Norman King; On 28 Sep 1066 William secured the sanction of Pope Alexander II for a Norman invasion of England. By 1070 the Norman conquest of England was complete. William introduced the Continental system of feudalism; by the Oath of Salisbury of 1086 all landlords swore allegiance to William, thus establishing the precedent that a vassal's loyalty to the king overrode his fealty to his immediate lord. During a campaign against King Philip I of France, William fell from a horse and was fatally injured. William was the illegitimate son of Robert I, duke of Normandy and Arletta, a tanner's daughter. He is sometimes called "William the Bastard".

William the Conqueror died in 1087 when he burst open his bowels after being thrown on the pommel of his saddle.

Queen Matilda, was only 4 ft. 2 in. in height, making her the shortest monarch England has ever had.

Sections of this chapter have been taken from Gertrude Marion Norwood Callam's Norwood Book II, Book Number 469. This chapter was most affectionately dedicated to Gertrude's beloved husband, Edward Callam (Eddie), her life-long companion in work and play, who accompanied her in her research and assisted her in making all the brass rubbings. Eddie made the finished heraldic drawings from Gertrude roughs. He also took all the photographs and typo-graphically prepared her series of Norwood books. Gertrude stated that without whose Eddies help, patience and technical knowledge, she could never have undertaken this work.

This chapter is designed to give a simple guide to the practical study of heraldry. In this second book dealing with the Norwood Family, Gertrude endeavored to present a simple outline of heraldry in general, and its application to the Norwoods and associated families in particular, so that, given a correct description of a coat of arms, the reader can portray it pictorially.

Anyone whose family history goes back to the Magna Charta Barons may find links with their own families in this book. Those who desire to trace their Heraldry history or to make their own collection of brass rubbings, will find in these pages encouragement and practical guidance.

Gertrude has endeavored to check the accuracy of every statement and date used, giving references where possible, but if any inaccuracies occur, she offers sincere apologies. She would like to express her thanks for help received from works of reference quoted, and to all those who have in any way contributed to the findings recorded in this book.

12.1. The Development of Heraldry in Britain.

Heraldry is a Science that includes the duties of the office of the Heralds and the art of armory, displayed in armorial bearings, or coats of arms.

As we are going to follow the development of heraldry from the time of King Harold II, it is necessary at the outset to show the connection between this Saxon King and the Norwoods. Gertrude based her proof on historical data and in particular on the writings and notes of the able historian, John Cheesman Norwood.

The eldest son of King Harold II and Edith Swannaschells his handfast wife, was Alnod, frequently referred to in the Domesday Book as Alnod Cilt

That his, father in a position of power placed him - probably Sheriff - at an early age is obvious by references to him as "satrap" and "Alnod and his peers". He is also named at various times Wulfnoth, Vlnod, Wolnoth, Agelnoth, Ulf and Adhelolphus.

Before the Conquest Alnod held twenty Kentish Manors, but at the time of the Domesday survey, none, almost all of them having been conveyed to King William "the Conquer's" brother Odo, Bishop of Bayeux. In the famous lawsuit tried on Penenden Heath, Kent, England in 1076 between Odo and the Archbishop of Canterbury, Alnod's name is cited as a recent sub-tenant of Manors which Odo had since assumed, but at the time of the Domesday Book Alnod was held prisoner by William I "The Conqueror" under the ward ship of Wadard, who had been given the King's Wood at Milton. The area covered by this holding stretched from the hilltop on the Isle of Sheppey, across what is now fiat grazing marsh-land, over the River Swale to the mainland beyond

Milton. This land was of particular interest to Alnod for had he not held this of King Edward I? (**Translation. "Domesday Book for Kent"** by L. B. Larkin pp. 98, 99 and 104).

After the death of William the Conqueror in 1087, his successor William Rufus, having no more to fear from the sons of Harold, released Alnod (Ulf). George Slocombe, in his book "Sons of the Conqueror" writes (pp 27, 28), "Ulf, the son of Harold and Edith of the Swanneck and Duncan of Scotland fell into the hands of Robert Curthose, who treated them with characteristic generosity. He set them at liberty and knighted them".

Alnod had seized by force two parts of the King's Wood at Milton, which he was later permitted to hold, as before the Conquest, not by feudal but by custumal tenure, and it was high on the Sheppey hilltop that he lived under the name of Jordanus de Sheppey. These same lands held by Alnod, alias Jordanus passed from father to son for over 300 years in one direct line of descent.

John Cheesman Norwood quotes the historian Bracton, a contemporary of Roger de Northwood in the reign of King Henry III, as his authority for this. Describing "the singular force of inheritance of these lands from Adhelolphus (Alnod) to his descendant Roger de Northwood" he writes, "the felony of an ancestor does not impede the seysine nor the succession of an heir"- (CF. *De Legibus*, section *Mortdancester* Vol. IV, p- 299).

This claim is further supported by the seventeenth century Somerset Herald Philipott who states that Roger de Northwood changed the holding of his lands from gavelkind to the more active tenure of Knight's Service "still reserving to himself by that License by which he obtained a Grant of the first, to reserve the Ancient Rent whereby his Lands held *even in the time of the Conqueror"*.

In following the descent of the Norwood family from King Harold, we

can, at the same time, follow the story of heraldry.


Prior to the reign of King Harold's brother-in-law, Edward the Confessor, isolated distinguishing symbols were sometimes used to enable a leader to be picked out from those around him. For example, the white horse was the emblem of the Saxon invaders "Hengist and Horsa". (Figure 12.

1.) Both the names "Hengist" and "Horsa" mean "a horse", and it is interesting that the white horse has survived to this day as the County sign for Kent, upon its red shield, with the motto "Invicta". In like manner the Danish raven, which came from Odin, survives in the crest of Lerwick, capital of the Shetlands (Figure 12.2).

Up to the time of the Norman invasion, however, coats of arms were not in use, or they would certainly have been shown in the Bayeux Tapestry, that remarkable piece of embroidery into which is woven the story of Harold, skillfully embellished with hundreds of representations of birds, animals, ships and men. These devices may be said to be forerunners of those symbols which, being handed down from father to son, became the hereditary emblems consistently used in armory.




Figure 12.3: King Harold II and the Golden Dragon of Wessex (Bayeux Tapestry).

In the Bayeux Tapestry, Harold's men can be seen around him under his personal standard, the golden dragon of Wessex (Figure 12.3), the emblem handed down from Egbert, under which he felt at Senlac. But the dragon appeared later on the standards of the kings who followed, William the Conqueror, William Rufus, Henry I and Stephen.

Again turning to the Bayeux Tapestry, it is interesting to see, in the first scene, that Harold has a young man with him discreetly described in the Latin translation "Edward instructs Harold and his friend". This young man must have been UIf (Alnod or Wulfnoth) who was later held prisoner by William--see The Norman Conquest Vol. IV p.

It is further significant that, after Harold and Alnod arrive at William's Palace, the next scene "Aelfgyva and the Clerk" shows the denunciation of Alnod's mother Aelfgyva (Edith Swannaschells) by the church for her marriage to her cousin Harold, a blood relative. In her mother's Will, Edith is inscribed as Ealgyth or Aelfgyva, as used in the Bayeux Tapestry (Will of Wulfgyth A.D. 1046 el. A.S. Cod. Dip. IV, 106; no. 782).

After such denunciation by the church, it is understandable that most historians preferred to treat warily any reference to Alnod as Harold's heir, and in some instances he has emerged diplomatically as "Wulfnoth, son (or grandson) of Godwin". *Freedom's Romance--John Cheesman Norwood*.


Even after William was crowned King, he considered Alnod important enough to hold as hostage while he established himself securely on the English throne. (See Florence of Worcester who described Alnod in the list of hostages as *Nobilem satrapam Agelnothum Cantuariensem*.).

One of the values of the Domesday Book was that King William could quickly rally an army around him, for he now had a full list of knights and their tenants who were bound to serve him in tournament or battle. Thus the need arose for knights to be able to distinguish one another, and for their followers to recognize their leaders, when they all looked so much alike on the

field. And so knights began to blazon distinctive colorful devices on their surcoats worn over their coats of mail. This gave rise to the term "coats of arms".

Three years after King William's death in 1087, the First Crusade to recover the Holy Land from the Turks engaged the attention of Europe, and it was natural that the cross in various forms should be used on the dress of the Crusaders. English knights took the red cross of St. George.

Although Alnod himself did not take part in the Crusades, it was through the influence of these holy pilgrimages that he changed his name to Jordanus. His son, Sir Stephen de Northwood joined the Third Crusade, and emblazoned on his shield *a cross-engrailed gules* his



motto sub cruce vinces - under the cross you will conquer. Figure 12.4.

Stephen took the name Northwood from the position of the wooded lands he held in the parish of Milton, and thereafter his manor was known as Northwood without Sheppey to distinguish it from that of his father known as Northwood

within Sheppey.

It is often recorded that it was Stephen's son Roger who went with Richard I to Acre, but this could not have been so, as Roger was born about this time. It must have been Stephen who was knighted by Richard I. He was certainly an eminent man, having built the chapel of Newington Church, according to the framed inscription in that church. He "resided at Northwood now called Norwood in Bobbing, where he had a mansion with a moat, the remains of the moat being still visible. He also owned some land in the eastern part of the parish of Newington, his coat of arms being formerly in the windows of Newington Church".

The earliest lists of those entitled to bear arms were known as Rolls of Arms. The first of these Rolls was inscribed on a long narrow parchment in 1240, now preserved in the British Museum, the name of Stephen's son Sir Roger de Northwood being among those listed.

The Roll of Caerlaverock dated 1300 registers those knights and nobles present with King Edward I at the Siege of Caerlaverock Castle in Dumfries, Scotland, together with their coats of arms. On this Roll is the name of Sir Roger's son, Sir John de Northwood, who married Lady Joan de Badlesmere, who was knighted by Edward after the battle.

By the Middle Ages, the right to the use of a coat of arms had to be granted by the Sovereign, and in 1413 the Heralds' Visitations were established to give authority to those legally entitled to bear arms. It is from these sources, the Rolls of Arms and Heralds' Visitations, that we have the early coats of arms of the Norwood family.

The Surrenden Roll, prepared by Sir Edward Dering, which is published in *Archaeologia Cantiana*, Vol. II pp. 9-42, gives seven generations of descendants from Sir Stephen de Northwood "with undeniable authority for most of its statements, many of them to this day of easy reference, being still among the records of the different courts. Other facts are quoted from the lips of then living witnesses".




Figure 12.5: The Seal used by Sir Roger de Northwood 1390. Reproduced from Archaeologia Cantiana Vol. II p. 41.

These generations will be further dealt with in under *Marshalling of Arms*, but two seals are of importance as examples of coats of arms affixed to early documents, and should be mentioned in connection with *The Surrenden Roll* which they conclude. The first relates to the great great grandson of the last named Sir John de Northwood, namely Sir Roger, husband of Alice. This seal is affixed to his release and quitclaim to his mother, Joan de Northwood, her heirs and assigns, of all her right in the manor of Thurnham, and is dated 20th August 14 Ric. 1390. The Legend round the shield reads *SIGILLUM ROGERI NORTHWODE* (Figure 12.5).

The second seal is that of Joan de Northwood, daughter of Robert Hart, dated 28 Jan. 21 Ric II 1397-8, which shows the arms of *Hart, 3 harts heads tripping or* (Figure 12.6). The arms of Hart of Grincourt Manor are shown in stained glass in the east window of a chapel in Ospring Church near Faversham, Kent, and illustrated in Philipot's *Church Notes* p. 54. The two shields are reproduced from illustrations in Cantiana Vol. II opposite page 40, to whose publishers the author is indebted.

12.2. The Make-up of Coats of Arms.

To state correctly a full coat of arms as illustrated above (Figure 12.7), is to "blazon an achievement". This achievement is divided into seven parts:

Part 1. The Shield, Part 2. The Helmet, Part 3. The Wreath, Part 4. The Crest, Part 5. The Mantling, Part 6. The Motto, Part 7. The Supporters (added in 15th Century and not shown in Norwood the achievements).

12.2.1 Part I. The Shield.

The shield is the main and most important part of the achievement. Its shape can be varied, but for the illustrations in this book I have used a simple style, maintaining it throughout. The various differences in the make-up of shields are described in the following six sections A to F.




Figure 12.8: Divisions of the Shield into eight points.

12.2.1.1. Divisions of the Shield. (Figure 12.8). The shield is divided into eight points:

12.2.1.2. Tinctures or colors.




Figure 12.9: The Tinctures or colors.

The seven colors or tinctures most commonly used in heraldry, and the two furs, are denoted by lines and dots, so that colors can be interpreted from an uncolored drawing (Figure 12.9). An older method is shown in Figures 12.47 and 12.48 where the drawings are outlined and colors represented by letters only.

12.2.1.3 Ordinaries.




Figure 12.10: Ordinaries.

The lines which partition the shield are termed ordinaries, the most commonly used of which are (Figure 12.10):

12.2.1.4. Ornamentations.

To create further variation, the lines of the ordinaries may be further varied by ornamentation (Figure 12.11).

12.2.1.5. Charges.




Figure 12.12: Charges—the Lion.

The various figures of animals, birds, fishes, flowers, people, etc., seen on heraldic shields are known as charges. They are so numerous that they cannot all be illustrated here, but the lion being the most popular, is shown in its five most frequently used positions (Figure 12.12). 1. Couchant. 2. Passant. 3. Rampant. 4. Sejant. 5. Statant.

These charges became necessary as the uses of heraldry increased, to provide "differences" between those using similar devices, or between various branches of the same family.

For example, to the simple shield with its cross engrailed gules of Sir Stephen de Northwood, his grandson Sir John added in the dexter chief a boar's head (Figure 12.13) for a difference, as he was knighted in the lifetime of his father, Sir Roger.

12.2.1.6. Cadency.




Figure 12.14: The Labels of Cadency.

Where there were several sons of one parent a "difference for cadency" was used, the emblems

being (Figure 12.14): 1. First son, the heir: the label*; 2. Second son: the crescent; 3. Third son: the mullet; 4. Fourth son: the martlet; 5. Fifth son: the annulet; 6. Sixth son: the fleur-de-lis; 7. Seventh son: the rose; 8. Eighth son: the cross moline; and 9. Ninth son: the double quatrefoil.

* Sir John de Northwood, as the eldest son of the last named Sir John used the label. "Sir John de Northwood bore arms at the first Dunstable Tournament 1308, a cross engrailed gules, a label (3) azure"—the (3) stands for the three points of the label.

12.2.2. Part 2. The Helmet.

The Helmet is placed above the shield, and it is usually shown about three-quarters the length of the shield. Its shape and position indicates the rank of the user. The four helmets are shown in ascending scale (Figure 12.15).

12.2.3. Part 3. The Wreath.

Between the helmet and the crest, a wreath of two colored silks formed from the livery colors of the shield was used. This had a functional purpose allowing the crest above and the helmet below to be attached to it when worn (Figure 12.16).

12.2.4. Part 4. The Crest.

Long before heraldry came into use, the crest was used surmounting the helmet, as a practical aid in warding off blows aimed at the head. In showing this pictorially in a heraldic achievement, it is also placed above the helmet, although it is sometimes mistakenly spoken of as if it were the actual coat of arms.

The crest represents a very decorative part of the armorial bearings, allowing great scope for variety and beauty. We have illustrated the Norwood crests and those of families who have intermarried with them. This list, however, can be extended still further, and it is one of the great pleasures of this work that fresh developments are constantly adding to its interest.

The earliest Norwood crest was used by Stephen's son. Sir Roger de Northwood, out of a ducal coronet a boar's head and neck all or (Figure 12.17).

Roger's son Sir John de Northwood married, Lady Joan de Badlesmere of Chilham Castle, whose crest was, a lion's gamb erased sa, holding a laurel branch vert (Figure 12.18).

John's Son, also Sir John de Northwood used the boar's head, and his wife. Lady Agnes de Grandison of Ottery St. Mary used as her crest, a female, supporting a portcullis ppr. (Figure 12.19).

John's eldest son, Sir Roger de Northwood married five times, first Juliana de Say, whose crest was, out of a ducal coronet, or, a bull's head, sa., armed or (Figure 12.20).

From the last-named Richard came the Stilstead Norwoods to continue this line, while from no. 11, William of Nash Court descended my own Thanet line, my grand-father being Thomas David Norwood who married Elizabeth Paramor, from the Paramor family of Eastry and Worth whose crest was, a cubit arm erect, in and ppr. an etoile or (Figure 12.35).

The main Norwood line is perpetuated from No. 8 (Sir John and Joan Hart) through their third son James Norwood, down to William Norwood of Leckhampton, whose crest was, on waves of the sea ppr., a lion sejant holding between the paws an anchor, flukes upward (Figure 12-36). This crest also applied to the Ashford, Kent, Norwoods, descended from William's brother Edward.

William Norwood married Elizabeth Lygon, daughter of the Earl of Beauchamp, whose crest was, a savage's head affronte, couped at shoulders (Figure 12.37).




Figure 12.38: Wykeham Norwood Crest.

The Tyringham or Wykeham Norwoods descended from John Norwood and Eleanor Giffard through their second son, William, whose great-grandson John Norwood married Anne Tyringham daughter of Sir Thomas Tyringham. This Sir John Norwood had his crest and coat of arms granted in 1585 by Robert Cook, Clarenceux Herald, the crest being, a demi-lion rampant erased argent, ducally crowned or, holding in the gambs a palm branch proper (Figure 12.38). 


Figure 12.39: Norwood Lion Crest.

From John Norwood and Elizabeth Frogenall, either via Leckhampton or the collateral Tyringham lines, most of the American Norwoods have descended. As the Anglo-American ties in our family are so great, it is interesting to record that both the lion (Figure 12.39) and the eagle (Figure 12.40) represent crests of the Norwood family—they also symbolize our two great countries—Britain and America.

12.2.5. Part 5. The Mantling.

The Mantling is the beautiful curved drapery flowing from the crest. Its original purpose was to protect the wearer against the heat of the sun. In battle, the edges of the mantle became ragged, and heraldically the mantling is shown scalloped. The colors used are those of the shield—for Norwood gules and argent doubled.

12.2.6. Part 6. The Motto.

The Motto originated from early war cries. The Norwood motto in Latin Sub cruce vinces is translated, under the cross you will conquer.

12.2.7. Part 7. The Supporters.




Figure 12.41: The Berkeley Coat of Arms over the Berkeley Hotel showing supporters.

The Supporters the two figures sometimes used on either side of the shield, as the lion and unicorn on the royal coat of arms, were added in the fifteenth century. While supporters are not shown in Norwood arms, they are added to the Berkeley arms, from which family the Leckhampton Norwoods have descended. Anne Berkeley (b. 1470) wife of Sir William Dennis and daughter of Maurice de Berkeley 3rd Baron, was the grandmother of Elizabeth Lygon who married William Norwood (Figure 12.41).

12.3. The Marshalling of Arms.

The act of marshalling is the assembling of the coats of arms of two or more persons into one escutcheon, thus making plain their family connections. The right to bear arms is claimed by those lineally descended from the original armiger.

The following is a simple, brief outline of marshalling the arms of the Norwood family with those of some of the families into which they have married.

1. Sir Stephen de Northwood, armiger, was the first to bear arms. He took the Crusaders' cross, which he ornamented by engrailing gules. This first coat of arms is termed the pronominal coat (Figure 12.4).




Figure 12.42: The Norwood and Norton Tomb at Milton Regis, Kent, England.




Figure 12.43: The Tomb of the Black Prince Canterbury Cathedral.




Figure 12.44: Norwood and FitzBernard Crest.

2. His son, Sir Roger de Northwood, took an ermine field on which to emblazon his cross engrailed gules. Upon his marriage to Bona de Wautham, heiress of Ralph FitzBernard, from which she was known as Bona FitzBernard, he was entitled to impale her arms vair on a chief gules, 2 mullets of the field (Arch. Cant. Vol. XV. p. 19) with those of his own (ibid p.


7). To impale two coats the shield is divided in two vertically, the

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husband's arms being placed in the dexter half and his wife's in the sinister half (Figure 12.44).

- **3.** Their son Sir John de Northwood, upon his marriage to the Lady Joan de Badlesmere, daughter and heir of Sir Bartholomew de Badlesmere of Chilham Castle, Kent, could quarter his arms by placing Norwood in the first and last quarters, FitzBernard in the top sinister and Badlesmere in the dexter bottom quarter, the latter being argent, afesse between 2 bars gemelles gules (ibid p. 6) (Figure 12.45).
- **4.** The next generation. Sir John de Northwood, as the eldest son used a label of three azure points on his pronominal coat of arms. He was entitled to divide his escutcheon into six quarters (Figure 12.46), adding those of his wife, Agnes de Grandison paly wavy of six argent and vert, on a bend gu. 3 eagles displayed or. Agnes de Grandison was co-heiress of Sir William de Grandison and Sibilla Tregoz, the latter being co-heiress of Lord Tregoz who came over with William the Conqueror. Therefore she was entitled to the arms of Tregoz azure, a bars gemelles, in chief a lion passant or. See Some Fuedal Coats of Arms p. 149-Norwood, Dunstable 1308.

Every quartering exhibited denotes the representation in blood of some person entitled to use arms. Quartering can only be inherited from females if they themselves are entitled to arms, either as an heiress or co-heiress. If a wife is an heiress, she transmits after her death to all her children the arms, quartering, to which she herself was entitled, and these they may add to their paternal arms.

It is not, however, necessary for a man to use in his coat of arms all the quartering to which he is entitled—he can make a selection, as in this present case.


Figures 12.47 and 12.48 show the older method of denoting colours by letters: Gold Or; Red G or Gu.; Green Vert V,; Purple P.; Silver Argent A.; Blue Azure Az.; Black Sable S.

In the cathedral-like church of Ottery St. Mary in Devonshire, in the east window, the arms of Sir John de Northwood are shown impaled with those of Grandison. The College at Ottery was founded by Bishop Grandison in the fourteenth century (Figure. 12.47).

5. In a case where there is more than one marriage, either the husband's arms are placed in the centre, with the first wife's arms on the dexter side and the second wife's on the sinister side; or else the husband's arms are placed in the dexter side and the sinister side is divided by a fess, where the arms of the first wife are placed in the chief and those of the second wife in the base quarter.

The eldest son of Sir John de Northwood and Agnes de Grandison namely Sir Roger de Northwood married five times:

1st to Juliana de Say (daughter of Geoffrey de Say and Idonia de Leyborne, daughter of Sir Williamm. de Leyborne) by whom he had four children.

2nd to Elizabeth, daughter of Sir John Segrave, late Lord of Folkestone, Kent

3rd to Margery, relict of Sir Nicholas de Halglton. In this there were great complications as Margery's daughter Margaret had married Sir Roger de Northwood's son Roger. Margaret therefore became Sir Roger's step-daughter, as well as being his daughter-in-law by her marriage to Sir Roger's son Roger by his first wife, Juliana de Say. By his marriage to Margery, Sir Roger had a son Thomas, from whom the Thanet Norwood line descends.

4th to Joan, relict of Thomas de Faversham, Lord of Graveney.

5th to Agnes, relict of Sir John de Cobham, by whom he had two children.

Sir Roger could have emerged with a complicated coat of arms, but as far as we have found from records, he used only ermine a cross engrailed gules, adding for a difference in the dexter quarter a boar's head (Figure 12.48).

6. Extensive quarterings.

The primary Norwood line terminates in the marriage of Joan de Northwood with Sir John Norton, and in the Norton coat of arms we have a fine example of sixteen quarterings, including those of Norwood and several related families. See Berry's Kent Pedigrees.




Figure 12.49: Norwood of Leckhampton with nine quarters, showing use of tinctures (as in Figure 12. 9).

- **7.** The main Norwood line descended through the Norwoods of Leckhampton, and is an example of extensive quarterings, having nine quarters. To show the practical method of indicating heraldic tinctures by dots and lines as Figure 12.9, we have illustrated this Leckhampton coat of arms Figure 12.49. (See A *Collection of Coats of Anns borne by the Nobility and Gentry of the County of Gloucester p, 40, extracted from Rudders History of Gloucester*).

12.4. Research and its Rewards.

One of the most rewarding things that can happen in tracing a family history is to come across the actual tangible evidence of one's search in a Cathedral, a manor house, or perhaps in a remote village church.

Having read in Freedom's Romance by John Cheesman Norwood of the Norwood Chancel in Milton Regis Church, one day I found myself standing by the large stone tomb. I could not help feeling a great sense of awe, for this represented the end of the primary main line of the Northwoods. Here was buried Sir John Norton and his wife Joan de Northwood, born 1491, to whom her father gave Norwood Chasteners (Norwood without Sheppey) by a license of entry 11 Feb. 1508 for her wedding dowry.

Their son, who became Sir John Norton de Northwood, was knighted in 1546, and was one of the knights present at the funeral of Henry VIII. His wife, Alice Cobb, was the daughter of Edward Cobb of Cobb's Place, Kent.




Figure 12.50: The quartered shield of Norton, Norwood, Cobb, Norton.

Around this tomb in Milton Regis church are the various coats of arms relating to the Norwood and Norton families (Figure 12.42), including quarterly Norton, Norwood, Cobb and Norton (Figure 12.50).

The Norton arms as illustrated are Gules, a cross potent ermine, and those of Cobb Argent, a chevron between three cocks passant gules.

Sir John Norton and Alice Cobb had a son, also Sir John Norton. He sold the 991 acres of the Northwood estates at Milton Regis to Sir William Tufton who, before 1631 sold 310 acres of it, as well as the inherited seat of Norwood Chasteners, to a Norwood kinsman, Manassas Norwood, Armiger, of Dane Court in Thanet, which in turn passed to his son Richard and grandson Alexander. (Arch. Cant. XII. P. 384)

My father descended from the Thanet Norwoods, and as I stood by this Milton Regis tomb, I remembered being taken by my father, as quite a small child, to see a tomb which seemed to me to look rather like this

one, and which I felt sure must be in St. Peters in Thanet. So to prove this, and to see for myself what connections there were between these two tombs, I next visited St. Peters, Broadstairs, Thanet. I knew at once as I stood beside it that this was the place, almost passed out of my memory, to which my father had taken me. Here was the tomb of Manassas Norwood (1565-1636), almost identical with the one at Milton, except that during repairs, the coats of arms had been transposed to a panel on top. The complete tomb had been removed to the Children's Chapel.

What then, is the connection between the Thanet and Milton Norwoods? How far back had I proof of the Thanet line?

From the Herald's Visitation of 1619 I knew that William Norwood of Nash Court and his uncle Richard Norwood of Dane Court (1450-1538) had descended from Richard (1420-1485) the eldest of four brothers, the others being, George, Thomas and William. Also I knew that "in 1441 no less than four of this family held lands in Thanet under St. Augustine's Abbey. Thomas Northwoode senior, Thomas Northwoode, heirs of Henry Northwoode, and Thomas Northwoode of Fleete."



(Lewis's History of Tenet Appendix pp. 29, 30). Thomas Northwoode must have been the father of the four brothers Richard, George, Thomas and William, because at that time, 1441, the number of households was very small. Even by 1563 there were only 186 in the Dane Court Parish of St. Peters and 107 in the Nash Court parish of St. Johns, with a total of 532 households in the whole of Thanet. (Irelands History of Kent vol. i. p. 459). The Herald's Visitations name twelve distinguished families which include Cleybroke, Petit, Northwode of Dane Court and Paramor of St. Nicholas. With so few families in Kent, it is obvious that those bearing the same coats of arms must have stemmed from the original Northwoods of Sheppey and Milton. While I have not an authentic document to prove the connecting link, we have proof that Sir Roger had by Juliana de Say a son Sir John and a second son Sir Roger who married Margaret de Halglton, and they had a son Thomas. (Arch. Cant. lip. 37.) The connecting link is that this Thomas had a son Richard, father of Henry and Thomas de Northwood Senior, head of the Thanet line in 1444. (See pedigree pages 112-113).






Figure 12.54: The East window of St. Andrews in Shalford.

The shields on Mannasses' tomb support this connection (see Figure 12.54).

- 1. Northwoode of Milton impaling Valence or Valoines paly wavy of six: south west
- 2. Northwoode of Milton, a label for eldest son, impaling Grandison paly of six on a bend three eagles displayed or; north west.
- 3. Northwoode impaling a fesse ermine between six annulets (this family unknown); centre south.
- 4. Northwoode, impaling a lion rampant, over which a saltire engrailed is superimposed (this family unknown); centre north.
- 5. Norwood of Dane Court, impaling Kempe three garbs with a bordure semee of annulets; south east.
- 6. Norwood of Dane Court, in the dexter chief a wolf's head, erased, for a difference, impaling Badcock, a chevron between 3 buckles; north
- 7. In the centre the arms of Norton gules a cross potent ermine.

Numbers 1 to 4 are common to the Milton and Thanet families, and 5 to 6 use the original arms of the Northwoods impaled with those of Kempe, representing the marriage of Manasses* father Alexander Norwood with Joanna Kempe, and those of Badcock, representing Manasses* marriage to Elizabeth Badcock.

A reference in Roll of the de Northwoodes: 6 Ric II, Roll 508-Kent Archaeological Society, stated that Humphrey de Northwoode was the first possessor of the Manor of Shalford. This piece of information impelled us to set out in search of Shalford, which we found to be a village five miles to the north-west of Braintree in the county of Essex. The church lay right off the beaten track in grasslands approached by a little-used farm road, at the end of which we discovered a large square building, almost opposite to the church. Obviously the Manor house, as the lady who stood by the gate confirmed. This was Shalford Hall where Sir Humphrey de Northwoode, sixth son of Sir John de Northwoode and Lady Joan de Badlesmere, had lived just after the end of the thirteenth century. The present owner kindly escorted us through the grounds, some-what neglected owing to labor difficulties, to a point where we could view the manor to advantage. We gathered that the present building, large as it is, represents only one wing of the original structure, the remainder having been destroyed by fire.

We entered the church, and were surprised to be greeted by the Vicar, the Rev. Vaizey, who appeared to be expecting us, although we had told no one of our visit. But apparently it had coincided with that of a historical society—a rare event for this rather isolated church—but one which gave us the unique opportunity of enjoying the talk the Vicar had prepared.

We learned that at the time of Edward the Confessor this Parish was held by Algar, Earl of Mercia, and at the time of the Domesday Survey it was held by the King under the care of Otto, Master of the King's Royal Mint. The church was founded in 1174 and we felt greatly rewarded to find the tomb of Sir Humphrey de Northwoode "Lord of the Manor of Shalford in 1316, of a family of great antiquity settled originally in the Isle of Sheppey in Kent, under an arch of ancient appearance and singular masonry in Norwood's Chapel in the south wall of the chancel". The Parish Church of St. Andrews Shalford, by Florence F. Law.




Figure 12.55: FitzBernard, Northwood, Poynings & Sackville.






Figure 12.56: FitzBernard Arms is located in the main window behind the altar, not in the east window of the south aisle.






Figure 12.57: The shields of arms on the tomb of Manasses Norwood, St. Peters-in-Thanet.

Round the tomb were the carved coats of arms which represented:

- 1. Northwood of Shalford
- 2. Valoines (or Valence)
- 3. Northwood of Shalford
- 4. Valoines (or Valence)

The tomb, in common with those of Milton and St. Peters, had the arms of Valoines (or Valence).

Near to this we found a second stone tomb where Humphrey's son Sir John de Northwood and his wife Catherine Picot are buried. Sir John succeeded his father as Lord of the Manor of Shalford, and he died in 1362 (Figure 12.82).

In addition to the coats of arms around the tomb, there were two large stone shields on either side of the canopy, that in the dexter spandril being for Northwood, the one in the sinister spandril for Picot. Their daughter, Joannah de Northwood, conveyed the manor to her husband. Sir Roger de Scales, whose arms we found on the ancient baptismal font. Looking up at the roof of the church, we saw six coats of arms, and again Northwood was one of them.


This church has a beautiful five-light east window, which the Vicar informed us was commemorative to Catherine Picot. This window embodies nine coats of arms, richly executed in stained glass and representing (Figure 12.55):

- 1. Ross (or Roose): Gu., three lions rampant.
- 2. Northwoode of Shalford: Er. a cross engrailed gu. (the boar's head which was in the dexter chief has now disappeared).
- 3. Valoines (or Valence): Paly wavy of six, or and gu.
- 4. Picot: Sa. billetty or Griffin seg. arg.

- 5. Poynings: Barry of six vert and or a bend gu.
- 6. Northwood of Kent: Erm. a cross eng. gu.
- 7. Fitz Bernard: Vair, on a chief gu. two mullets of six points.
- 8. Sackville: Quarterly, or and gu. a bend vair.
- 9. Northwood of Shalford: Erm. a cross eng. gu. in dexter chief a boar's head couped or.

I was most interested in the connection of the two families Poynings and Northwood, especially when I found a further association in the east window of the south aisle, where the coats of arms are (Figure 12.56):

1. Valoines; 2. Northwood; 3. Poynings; 4. Sackville.

With research work one discovery often leads on to the next. Long after we had left the quiet church of St. Andrews, Shalford, I was thinking about the Poynings connection. Later, I learned that there is a coat of arms showing Poynings impaled with Norwood in the Cloisters of Canterbury Cathedral.

If you have ever walked around these cloisters and looked up at the wonderful roof patterned with hundreds of coats of arms, you will realize what a formidable task awaited us to try to pick out one specific shield. Probably I was very much attuned to seeing the red engrailed cross, and my Shalford visit had given me the clue to the Poynings arms, so perhaps that was why it almost shouted to me from the ceiling. By placing the camera on the ground immediately beneath it, we obtained a picture which shows the impaled coat of arms, and its relation to those around it (Figure 12.61).



A subsequent study of The Heraldry of Canterbury Cathedral by Messenger shows that all the Valence arms in the cloisters are impaled with Poynings, which, as they are also shown with Northwood at Shalford, proves an early family connection. Page 106 also states that these arms in the cloisters "Poynings impaling Northwood, 27/37 (579)" represent Joan, coheir of Thomas de Northwood who married a Poynings. In the Pedigree of Poynings at the end of the book the only male whose wife's name is not given is no. 21 Thomas, 3rd Lord Poynings who died 1375. Therefore the conclusion is that this is the Thomas who married Joan Northwood co-heir of Thomas Northwood. The only Thomas Northwood of this date was the son of Henry, Rector of Staplehurst who resigned that office in 1288, and the conclusion is that Thomas had two children of whom Joan was one.

While we were in Canterbury, we visited St. Mildred's Church which we knew housed the Norwood arms, impaled with those of Cranmer, as William Norwood's eldest son Alexander Norwood of Nash Court, had married Elizabeth Cranmer, daughter of Thomas Cranmer of Canterbury in the year 1592.

Here we almost met with disappointment, as the arms were not to be found in any of the usual places. We searched windows, tombs and font in vain, and were just turning to leave when a gleam of light touched a familiar red cross on the left-hand pillar of the canopy above the pulpit—our search was again rewarded (Figure 12.59).




In one of the very quiet by-ways in Kent between Sittingboume on the north and Boughton Malherbe on the south, we came across a farm named Norwood in the village of Wormsell. It was a long rectangular building, full of old timber, beautifully restored and cared for by its present owner, Mr. Gordon Webb. In the reign of Henry III the manor of Wormsell and that of Boughton Malherbe, was owned by Robert de Gatton "whose grandson, Hamo,

dying without male issue, Elizabeth his daughter and co-heir carried both these estates in marriage to William de Dene ... Margery, the other daughter of Hamo married Simon de Northwood and possessed all her father's lands in Surry". Hasted Vol. V. p. 562.

According to the Harleian MSS Knights of Ed. I p. 272, "Sir John (Simon's father) had custody of two-thirds of the lands of late Hamo de Gatton in minority of heirs (except Gatton Park) with Kt. fees and marriage of heirs of Wm. de Milksope Kt. having sold same to him 19 April 1305".

While Elizabeth de Gatton entered into Wormsell Manor, her sister Margery and Sir Simon de Northwood took Gatton in Surrey. The region to the west of Gatton Park is known as Norwood Hill, where there is also a farm by the name of Norwood. This Sir Simon was the brother of Sir Humphrey de Northwood of Shalford.



In the obscurely situated village church of Wormsell we came across a memorial window to Simon de Northwood and his wife (Figure 12.60). Here the Norwood arms ermine, a cross engrailed gules, charged with a bendlet azure, impaling Gatton chequy, argent and azure (Arch. Cant. V. p. 222) (Figure 12.60), are in stained glass above the figure of Sir Simon de Northwood in his armor. This is a small single window, which was



probably a factor in its withstanding the bombing of the Second World War, although there has been repair to the fourteenth century figure of the knight (Figure 12.57).

12.5. The Norwood descent from William the Conqueror.

We have followed the Norwood descent from King Harold, and have briefly mentioned the marriage of William Norwood to Elizabeth Lygon which took place at Cheltenham 18 October 1569. By this alliance the Royal lions of England in the Lygon arms argent, 2 lions passant gules became impaled with those of Norwood (Figure 12.58).

To arrive at this point, we must trace the descent of both Elizabeth Lygon and William Norwood from Edward I, who was descended from William the Conqueror. In doing so, we can note the change in the Royal arms from the Golden Dragon of Wessex (Figure 12.3) to the royal lions as we know them today.

As mentioned earlier, William I, William II, Henry I and Stephen used the dragon on their standards, but Henry I may well have been the first Royal Sovereign to use the lion, which he regarded as a symbol of justice for which he stood.

Two lions were used by Henry II (Figure 12.101), and three appeared on the seal of Richard I in 1194 (Figure 12.102). These three "leopards of England" appeared also on the shields of King John, Henry III, Edward I, Edward II, and Edward III who added the fleur-de-lys of France. A very fine quartering of these

arms appears on the tomb of the Black Prince (Figure 12.43).

From Edward I's first marriage to Eleanor of Castile, descended Edward III, whose third son John of Gaunt married Katherine Swynford; their daughter Joan Beaufort married Ralph Neville K.G.; and their grand-daughter Lady Alice Neville married Henry, 5th Lord FitzHugh; and their daughter Elizabeth FitzHugh married Nicholas Lord Vaux; and their daughter Catherine Anna Vaux married Sir George Throckmorton of Coughton Court; and their son Sir Robert Throckmorton married Muriel Berkeley; and their daughter Catherine Throckmorton married Henry Norwood of Leckhampton then of Feckenham 1520-1544; and their son William Norwood of Leckhampton married Elizabeth Lygon, daughter of Earl Beauchamp of Madresfield. (See Figure 12-95 p. 96 for brass of Sir George Throckmorton).




Figure 12.66: The Arms of Norwood and Lygon.

This colorful period of history gives us so many richly emblazoned tombs that only a few can be mentioned. The magnificent tomb of the Black Prince in Canterbury Cathedral (Figure 12.43) is probably the best known. Its particular interest to the Norwoods is that he was brother to John of Gaunt. This memorial with its effigy of the Figure 12.60 The three lions of Richard I son Sir Robert Throckmorton married Muriel Berkeley;

and their daughter Catherine Throckmorton married Henry Norwood of Leckhampton then of Feckenham 1520-1544; and their son William

This colorful period of history gives us so many richly emblazoned tombs that only a few can be mentioned. The magnificent tomb of the Black Prince in Canterbury Cathedral (Figure 12.43) is probably the best known. Its particular interest to the Norwoods is that he was brother to John of Gaunt. This memorial with its effigy of the Prince as a knight in full armor bearing the Royal Arms,

the three lions of England quartered with the fleur-de-lys of France on his surcoat, also carries shields on its four sides. They show the Royal arms, and his shield for war alternated with the ostrich feathers from his mother Queen Phillippa of Hainault, which was his shield for peace.

A similar tomb to this, elaborately emblazoned, but set in the quiet village church of King's Langley in Hertfordshire, is a memorial to another of John of Gaunt's brothers, Edmund Langley. A remarkably fine stained glass window immediately above the tomb adds a wealth of royal heraldic coats of arms, for here, closely connected to the church, stood King Edward Ill's Palace of Langley.

Mention must also be made of the armorial bearings on the tomb of Thomas Chaucer in Ewelrne Church in Oxfordshire (The Norwoods I, p. 26). The connection here again is with John of Gaunt who married Katherine de Roet (relict of Sir Hugh Swynford) whose sister Phillippa married Geoffrey Chaucer, son of Thomas Chaucer, Speaker of the House of Commons. The three Catherine wheels on a red shield denoting the de Roet family are seen in Phillippa's and Katherine's coats of arms, on the illuminated pedigree which stands on top of a black marble slab.

John of Gaunt and Katherine were not only the ancestors of William Norwood and thence the main United States lines, but they were also the ancestors of Henry VII who, by his marriage to Elizabeth of York united the rival houses of Lancaster and York. From their son Henry VIII our own Royal Family has descended.

Katherine was buried in Lincoln Cathedral, where she was also married officially to John of Gaunt, and here her tomb is richly emblazoned with Catherine wheels and the Royal arms of England, relieving the sombreness of the dark stone casing.

In contrast to the richness of Lincoln Abbey, the ruined Abbey of Wykeham built in the thirteenth century is open to the sky. Little remains of the chapel that Tyringham Norwood restored in 1625, but above the doorway, carved in stone, are the Norwood arms (Figure 12.52). It was Tyringham's son John Norwood who went to Virginia in 1643 and became Sheriff of Arundel County.

To piece together the story of the Norwoods, their lines of descent, their inter-marriages, their coats of arms and memorials has taken ten years of research. So often a reference book has given a place name without naming its county—and again, if a county is given the village may be so small that only by careful search on an Ordnance Map has its exact location been found. Even in the case of Leckhampton, now so familiar to us after many visits, when I first heard of its connection with the Norwoods I had no county reference. When I discovered it was in Gloucestershire, I still did not know its whereabouts, and Gloucestershire is a large county. We set out towards Gloucester on our first journey of discovery and, while passing through Cheltenham we saw workmen painting the exterior of an Inn. The sign, freshly painted, attracted our attention. It was the familiar red cross, and the Inn—The Norwood Arms (Figure 12.53). The workmen directed us to Leckhampton Court only a mile or two away.

Most people know the famous hostelry in Broadway, Worcestershire, which proudly displays the sign of the Lygon Arms (Figure 12.51). Besides the connection with the family of Lygon, it is in Broadway Church that Myles Norwood and his son John were buried, the latter in 1525, although I failed to locate the actual tomb.

There are other inns known as The Lygon Arms, one quite near to Broadway in the picturesque village of Chipping Campden; and another in Feckenham, Worcestershire, near the Manor where Henry Norwood and Catherine Throckmorton lived.

When we were on the way to Berkeley Castle, home of Anne Berkeley, grandmother of Elizabeth Lygon, we became aware of being in its vicinity when we passed the Berkeley Arms Hotel in the main street of Berkeley village (Figure 12.41).

In the magnificent mediaeval castle itself we saw priceless tapestries, into which were woven the arms of the Berkeley family. This famous coat of arms appeared continually in the Great Hall, in the Long Drawing Room, in the great fireplaces, on the massive paneled doors and in the rich, scintillating colors of the stained glass windows.

An English line of descent from Edward Norwood b. 1551, younger brother of William who married Elizabeth Lygon, is through his grandson John Norwood born c. 1600 who is often confused with the John Norwood (b. 1605) who went to Virginia in 1643. (See The Norwoods I, p. 48). This John Norwood of Boughton-under-Blean, Kent married Sarah Shrubsol on 27 November 1627, and was buried at Boughton on 13 March 1661. His descent has been the subject of speculation, but, after eliminating all the impossible places of descent, I have come to the same conclusion as Mr. Charles Brandon Trye of Leckhampton, with whom I discussed the subject at great length. It appears that he is the son of Richard Norwood born c. 1575 who is mentioned in the will of his father Edward in 1638.

My reason for this conclusion is as follows:

After the death of Elizabeth Lygon, William Norwood married Anne Sackville whose first husband Richard Fogge of Danes Court, Tilmanstone near Chilham, Kent, had also died. This Anne Norwood is shown in the Fogge Pedigree (Arch. Cant. V. p. 124) and referred to by Richard Fogge the grandson (p. 116), "This Pedigree was drawn by my



Grandmother Anne Norwood for the Benefit of those of her Family that intend to place their Children in All Souls College".

Anne Sackville Norwood was buried in St. Sepulchre's Church in London, where her brother-in-law Edward Norwood was also buried, suggesting a close association between William Norwood and his second wife, and his brother Edward. This also brings the Leckhampton family into close contact with Kent again, and although the point has yet to be proved, the facts indicate that John Norwood is indeed the grandson of this said Edward. This is in conformity with Burke's Landed Gentry 1871 which states that "John Norwood is collaterally descended from John de Northwood who married Elizabeth daughter and co-heiress of Thomas Frogenhall."

The English descent from John Norwood and Sarah Shrubsoll is proved by the Ashford Norwoods to whom I am indebted. According to Berry's Kent Pedigrees their crest is on waves of the sea ppr. a lion sejant holding between the paws an anchor flukes upward. Their quartered arms show Norwood: a cross eng. gu. in the dexter chief point; Weller: Sable, 2 chevronets arg., 3 roses arg. (as in St. Mary of Charity, Faversham) in the sinister chief point; Young: per saltire gules 2 fleur-delys and purpure, a lion or passant guardant in the dexter base; and Norwood again in the sinister base (Figure 12.64).

The Rev. H. Knock showed us several large Norwood memorial tablets on the right-hand side high up on the wall on entering the beautiful church of St. Mary the Virgin at Ashford, Kent, with coats of arms thereon. Although disappointed about the inaccessibility of these tablets, we were rewarded by finding the brass to Thomas Fogge, his wife Eleanor and two daughters Anne and Alice, on the floor of the same church (Figure 12.65). Eleanor married, secondly Sir William Kempe, whose daughter Margaret married George Fogge, father of Richard, Anne Sackville Norwood's first husband.

Perhaps sufficient has been said of this fascinating story of heraldry to show how most of the families and great houses of mediaeval times were connected by inter-marriage. The field of interest thus revealed is infinite. For instance, in the reign of King John twenty-five Barons were chosen as "Sureties" for the King, supervising the execution of the Magna Carta signed at Runnymede. Sixteen of the Barons have living descendants, from whom the Norwood family's various branches can be traced.

It has been one of my most interesting projects to portray pictorially a chart of descent from these Barons. I commenced with the Surety Geoffrey de Say, as I knew that his great-grand-daughter, Juliana de Say married Roger de Northwoode in 1320, and that Roger is the ancestor of all the Norwood branches. Then,

gradually, as I traced the descendants of the other Sureties, I found that first one and then another line joined the Norwoods, until by an exciting criss-cross of inter-marriage, all the sixteen lines merged. I then worked out their coats of arms, visited their castles, some intact, some crumbled to ruin, and I added drawings of these to my chart. This has not only given a visual picture of the eleventh and twelfth centuries which is

invaluable when reading the history of England, but it has shown the Norwood descent from the Barons of English liberty right up to the present day. Anyone whose ancestors are among these Barons may trace their descent by diligent searching.

The picture is too large to reproduce here, but the names of the Barons and the description of their coats of arms are given.

ABRIDGED GLOSSARY OF HERALDIC TERMS

ARGENT—silver, arg. often shown as white.

AZURE—blue, az. BARS—a number of horizontal bands, each formed by two lines usually narrower than a fess (barry). BASTON—a narrow band either dexter or sinister, lying across the other charges on a shield. BATTLED—an ordinary with partition line shaped as battlement. BAND—a band of two diagonal lines running slantwise from the dexter

chief to the sinister fess.

CANTON—in the dexter chief, a rectangular less than a quarter.

CANTON—in the dexter chief, a rectangular less than a quarter. CHARGES—any device or symbol used as a distinguishing mark. CHECKY—a check pattern of squares.

CHEVRON—shaped like the gable of a roof.

CHIEF—the head of the shield cut off horizontally.

CREST—the symbol surmounting the helmet.

CHAPLET—the garland of leaves from the shield around the crest (Fig. 32).

DANCETTE—a fess zig-zagged across the field.

DEXTER—the left side of the shield (to the beholder). ENGRAILED—escalloped.



ERMINE—fur, usually a white ground and black tails and spots. ESCALLOP—a shell.

ESCUTCHEON—a shield on which a man usually bore arms of his wife.

FESS—a broad band formed by two horizontal lines across the shield FIELD—the ground of a shield.

FRETTY—a pattern of narrow interlaced bands.

GEMELL BARS—narrow bars placed in pairs, usually parallel to a fess

GULES-red, gu.

GYRON—triangular pieces usually the lower half of dexter chief. INDENTED—a line representing a series of spikes.

INVERTED—with rounded curves, opposite to engrailed scallops. LOZENGE—a diamond shaped charge—the arms of a woman are on a lozenge.

MANTLING—ornamented foliage adorning helmets on armorial bearings.

MAUNCH—a sleeve with hanging ends.

NEBULY—as the edges of a cloud. OR—gold.

ORDINARY—a general term for the figures which divide the shield geometrically.

ORLE—a broad band parallel to the edges of the shield. PALE—a broad band formed by two vertical lines in the centre of the shield. PARTY—the vertical division of the shield (or per). Other divisions described per fess; per bend, per pale.

PILE—a wedge shaped device.

PROPER—for animals, flowers, etc. in natural colour, ppr. PURPURE—purple, pu.

QUARTERLY—divided into four by party and fess.

ROUNDEL-round in form. SABLE-black, sa.

SHIELD—the part of the achievement that bears the arms. SALTIRE—the diagonal, as a letter "X". SEMEE—strewed with unlimited charges. SINISTER—the right-hand side of the shield (to the beholder).

SURCOAT—a loose coat worn by knights over their armour. TINCTURE—the coloured surfaces of the shield.

VAIR—heraldic fur, shown by rows of small shields, alternately reversed.

VERT—green, v.

VOIDED—with the centre cut out.

WREATH—a garland or chaplet. The wreath on which the crest is borne has two bands of silk twisted together.




Figure 12.71: The Royal Descent of the Arundells & the Calverts.

13.7. Obituary for Emmanuel Harvey Rauch.

Emmanuel Harvey Rauch was born 23 June 1825 in Reading, Berks County, Pennsylvania. (This death date was taken from the Rauch Family Bible, there is a possibility that this might be wrong and is being researched further.) Emmanuel died 15 June 1881 in Prairie Grove, Washington County, Arkansas. (The burial place is in conflict also because no record is shown on the Prairie Grove burial records. There is a possibility he is buried in Robinson, Arkansas. This is being further researched.) Emmanuel H. Rauch's parents are Solomon Rauch and his mother is Susannah (her last name is unknown at this time).

Emmanuel H. Rauch was a citizen of Buchanan County, Missouri for many years. He there married the daughter of Thornton Smith Talbot, Miss Sarah Catherine Talbot on 16 Jan 1851 in Buchanan County, Missouri. Mr. Rauch moved to Arkansas in about 1867, first settling in Benton County, subsequently on Cane Hill, Arkansas and afterwards at this place. While here he had in charge the steam mill at this place, his business relations with this community were exceedingly satisfactory and agreeable--his just, liberal and fair dealing is ever mentioned with his name. He was far from being of that school of businessmen who press the seller to the lowest figure and the buyer to the highest. He



bought and sold at what the commodity was worth in his judgment. His sympathies for the unfortunate and needy were always active, his contributions for building and sustaining our churches were exceedingly liberal. Though a Christian for many years, he had not been baptized nor joined any church. Last summer on a baptismal occasion, after five or six persons had been baptized by Immersion, he astonished and electrified a large multitude in attendance by coming forward already prepared and asking the clergyman to do the same for him, which request was carefully complied with.

In the early part of the past spring Mr. Rauch purchased the Lea & Finley Mills on the Osage River in this county and moved with his family and took charge of them. His health had been bad for some months. The move and change with the excitement and labor completely prostrated him. He died on 15 Jun 1881, aged fifty-six years. He leaves a widow and two children.

In repeated conversations with him a little while before his death, he professed a readiness and even waiting to be signaled across the dark waters. Though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death I will fear no evil, for thou art with me. Thy rod and thy staff, they comfort me.




Figure 13.7: Gary Loyd Hurst, my sister's son.

Although she was an only child, she had more cousins than most of us could count and she kept track of all of them. Her Aunt Juanita has always been very special to her, and spent the last several weeks with Gloria while she was in the hospital.

Gloria also had a second family, the College of Nursing. She has always been a part of the College from the time she received her baccalaureate degree through her tenure on the faculty. She will continually watch over us from her picture on the wall of graduates near the front elevators. Her presence will always be with us because she was such an important part of the College.

Gloria was deeply dedicated to the College and was always a team player. She did what ever she could to move us forward, and actually did it in a variety of roles. She functioned in faculty, as well as administrative positions. She served under more Deans than most of will ever work for. The only job she probably has not done is answering the phones at the front desk. However if she thought it would help, she would give it a try; at the same time sharing her opinion about how it was not the best use of her time, and surely not cost effective.

I only knew Gloria for a short time, a little over three years, and yet it seems I have always known her. Gloria was a friend and would do anything for you. She was a giving person. She was always baking or making things for others. Gloria was always doing needlework because these were the things she really enjoyed.

She also loved nature. Gloria knew the names of every flower, leaf and berry. She knew birds, not only by site, but also by sound. She was a walking encyclopedia of nature.

Gloria had a strong belief system that she lived daily. As we all know she also had no problem expressing her beliefs and opinions. She was one of the strongest people I have ever known. She demonstrated this courage throughout her life and up to the moment of her death last Saturday. Those who were with her saw her handle pain and discomfort with dignity and humor. She fought hard to live, but then with courage accepted death. Gloria was a caring person who really made a difference while she was on this earth.

While here he had in charge the steam mill at this place, his business relations with this community were exceedingly satisfactory and agreeable--his just, liberal and fair dealing is ever mentioned with his name. He was far



from being of that school of businessmen who press the seller to the lowest figure and the buyer to the highest. He bought and sold at what the commodity was worth in his judgment. His sympathies for the unfortunate and needy were always active, his contributions for building and sustaining our churches were exceedingly liberal, though a Christian for many years, he had not been baptized nor joined any church. Last summer on a baptismal occasion, after five or six persons had been baptized by Immersion, he astonished and electrified a large multitude in attendance by coming forward already prepared and asking the clergyman to do the same for him, which request was carefully complied with.

In the early part of the past spring Mr. Rauch purchased the Lea & Finley Mills on Osage River in this county, and moved with his family and took charge of them. His health had been bad for some months; the move and change, with the excitement and labor completely prostrated him. He died on June 15, 1881, aged fifty-six years. He leaves a widow and two children.

In repeated conversations with each of them a little while before their deaths, they professed a readiness and even waiting to be signaled across the dark waters.

Though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death I will fear no evil, for thou art with me, Thy rod and thy staff, they comfort me.

Kitty Koonce, a caregiver who answered the phone at Kelley's home Wednesday evening, said Kelley died about 5:45 p.m. He had battled colon & liver cancer, said two sources close to the Clinton family who



spoke on condition of anonymity because of the sensitivity of the matter.

Kelley ran a food brokerage business for many years in Little Rock before retiring in 1992. He met Clinton's mother at a horse racing track, and they married in 1982. It was his second marriage and her fourth. At the time, Clinton was preparing for a campaign to regain the Arkansas governor's office.

"When you meet the president, he'll just make you feel like you're the most important person in the room," Kelley once told The Associated Press. "He's just a regular guy and if you're playing cards or playing golf with him, you'd see that," he said.

When playing golf with Clinton, "I'm just out there with a friend," Kelley said. "We don't give him any special consideration. Sometimes he hits an extra ball for practice. And we joke, "Well, which one of those are you going to play? Whatever you say, Mr. President."

During Clinton's presidency, Kelley seemed comfortable in

the shadows of his stepson. The Kelleys were married 12 years before she died Jan. 6, 1994, after a battle with breast cancer. Even after her death, Kelley promoted his wife's autobiography, "Leading With My Heart," appearing on national television and autographing books. In a newspaper interview, he said he was content to promote the book for one reason: "I have fond memories of Virginia and I know she'd want me to do this."

The Richard & Virginia were tireless campaigners for Clinton and spent the night of his first inauguration in 1993 in the Queen's Bedroom, the White House room where Winston Churchill always slept.

The former president spoke at Kelley's funeral Saturday, at United Methodist Church in Hot Springs, Arkansas.

The 6-foot-4 Kelley was a salesman. He grew up in Little Rock and attended Central High School, where he played football and basketball and also competed in water polo. He went to Little Rock Junior College, which became the University of Arkansas at Little Rock.

His first job out of college was selling canned and chewing tobacco, then he moved to Gulfport, Miss.., and worked in sales for Pet Milk Co.

Kelley enlisted in the Navy and became an athletics instructor from 1943-1946, teaching enlistees how to swim. After his military service, Kelley's father asked him to join his new business, Kelley Brokerage Company, a Little Rock food brokerage firm.




Figure 13.36: Norwood Family Record. Copy of a page taken from my grandfather William M. Norwood's, Funeral Service Book in 1930.




Figure 14.3: Donald Loyd Norwood.




Figure 14.10: My grandfather William M. Norwood is on the left. This is an old filling station just across the street where I lived in Lincoln, Arkansas.




Figure 14.12: Four Generations of the William M. Norwood Family. From Left to Right: Zella Norwood (Rich), William M. Norwood, Sarah Elizabeth (Holt) Norwood and Edith LaRue Rich.




Figure 14.17: John Norwood, My Great Grand Uncle. He was killed during the Civil War.




Figure 14.19: The Samuel (Sam) Vincent Norwood Family, My Uncle Sam.




Figure 14.21: Samuel Vincent Norwood's Boys. <u>Left to Right:</u>




Figure 14.27: The Norwood Brothers. From Left to Right: Samuel Vincent Norwood (born 1 Dec 1878), Alvin DeKalb Norwood (born 11 Jun 1881), William Lester Norwood (born 7 Sep 1883), Lemuel (Lem) W. Norwood (born 4 Oct 1887), Clyde Clayton Norwood (born 25 Jan 1894), and William Bryan Norwood (born 14 Feb




Figure 14.30: Donald Loyd Norwood.




Figure 14.35: Don L. Norwood as a Baby.




Figure 14.39: Don L. Norwood.




Figure 14.40: Don L. Norwood.




Figure 14.43: L/R. Grandmother Sarah Elizabeth Holt (Norwood) & Grandfather William M. Norwood. Betty Norwood, Lemuel Norwood's daughter.




Figure 14.56: My son. Michael Joseph Norwood.




Figure 14.57: My son. Michael Joseph Norwood.




Figure 14.65: Photograph from Mt. Sequa in Fayetteville, Arkansas.




Figure 14.67: Don L. Norwood.




Figure 14.72: Birthday Party.




Figure 14.73: Our Boat on Lake Texoma.




Figure 14.74: College Rock, near Lincoln, Arkansas. This is what we would do in the old days. Climb rocks.




Figure 14.77: Ola Washington Rich.




Figure 14.80: My Dad, Alvin DeKalb Norwood, is in the Derby Hat on the right. This was when he was in Business School.




Figure 14.93: Rhea's Mill, Arkansas.




Figure 14.110: L/R. Lola Norwood, Beulah Alberty & Eula Norwood.

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


Figure 14.111: Billy Charles Miller and his wife Connie Sue Rouse (Miller).




Figure 14.114: Jim Andrew DeCamp.




Figure 14.136: L/R, Rear, Donald Scott Norwood, Susan Elizabeth Norwood, Michael Joseph Norwood. Front Joan Evelyn Brown Norwood & husband Donald Loyd Norwood.




Figure 14.137: My son-in-law Christopher Beck Dalley and daughter Susan Elizabeth Norwood Dalley.




Figure 14.138: L/R, rear, my grand children. Alexander James, Elizabeth Anne, Nicholas Andrew, Benjamin Joseph, Katherine Nicole Dalley.




Figure 14.141: Joan Evelyn & Don L. Norwood.




Figure 14.144: Uncle Scott & Aunt Aimee Norwood with Alexander, Elizabeth & Nicolas Dalley at Disneyland.




Figure 14.146: Don L. & Son Scott Norwood.





He was betrothed to her according to Danish custom and she became his hand-fast-wife. Harold suffered paralysis soon after their meeting, but managed to recover. To give thanks to God, he built an abbey at Waltham Cross. He would later be laid to rest there after his final battle. Edith Harold's wife was also known as Eadgyth Swan-neck. Reference: G. Marion Norwood Callam Book, Chapter # 2. Wulfgyth's Will (AD 1046 A.S. Cad. Dip 1V No. 782) names Edith as one of the Testatrix's three daughters, and the manors of Ashford and Chart Sutton are bequeathed to her, while to "Godwine eorle and Harald eorle Frithtunes" land to the south of Chart Sutton now known as Frittenden. The Will also names Edith's father Elfwin (Alfwine), who was later made Abbot of New Minster in 1063 and fell at Hastings in 1066. After the Battle of Hastings, Edith went first into the nunnery at Minster in Sheppey, and later to Chaise Diew, Abbey of St. Etienne, Loire, France where she died and is buried. Because of the position Alfwine held in the church, he strongly denounced his daughter's union with Harold II his nephew, and this is depicted in a scene Ubi unus clericus et Aelfgyva in the Bayeux Tapestry. In the tapestry, Aelfgya (Edith or Ealgyth as named in the Will), is being deprived of the recognition of her legal status - on account of the possibility of legal claim to the throne by her children. But, as John Cheesman Norwood points out in Freedom's Romance, although historians for safety's sake persisted in calling Edith Harold's "concubine", and Freeman in his translation of the Doomsday Book entry for Canterbury uses this term, yet: "having in view the social rank of Edith disclosed by the Will, and forty years later, her civic status in the archiepiscopal metropolis, it may safely be taken that she was no concubine" Despite the church's refusal to recognize the marriage, the love of Harold and Edith remains one of the great romances of history. They lived at the manor of Nazeing, a few



miles north of Waltham in Hertfordshire, and there, in Harold's Park, their children Alnod, Godwin, Gytha (who married Vladimar II, Prince of Kiev, from whom King Edward III is descended), Edmund, Gunhilda and Magnus played in the thickets and groves, chased the deer, and fished in the river Lee.



On 4 December 1289 protection with clause "volumus" for master Henry de Northwode, going over seas with master John de Lascy on the king's service for 1 year. Enrolled on the close rolls for 30 January 1292, William de Valoignes, John de Cobbeham, Richard de Grovenhal and Master Henry de Northwode acknowledge they owe William de Valence 200 marks. Collateral to be their land and chattels in Kent -- marked later cancelled as paid off. On November 19, 1298 Robert Winchelsey, Archbishop of Canterbury, issued a commission to the dean of South Mailing to install Robert de Ros to the prebend of South Mailing church, vacated by the resignation of Master Henry de Northwode. In 1303, the abbot of St. Augustine sent a commission of men to negotiate peace between the abbey and the Archbishop of Canterbury. The members were Aymer de Valence, Earl of Pembroke, Sir Richard de Inkepenne, Sir Henry de Apoldrefeld, Sir John Tavy. Archbishop Reynolds was in favor of his chancellor, John de Bruytone, while Lady Badlesmere, an important local magnate, was in favor of Thomas de Northwode. However, on March 22, the monks chose their prior Hamo to be the next Bishop. He was one of the heirs of his father and mother's gavelkind lands in 1319; possibly the Thomas who granted land in Cranbrook in 1324. Whether this was Cranbrook in Newington or Cranbrook parish is unclear. Two fines he engaged in have survived. One made at York, in the quindene of Trinity, 2 Edward III (1328), the other at Westminster, octave of St. Martin, 5 Edward III [Nov. 11, 1331], between Michael, son of Michael de Ponynges, complainant and Master Thomas de Northwode, deforicant. They concerned a rent of 9 quarters of barley in Tenham, Kent, which Agnes, widow of John de Northwode, held for her life. Master Thomas granted that the rental should revert to Michael after her death. Nothing further is known of

Under 15 years old in June 1325 at the death of Lora Peyforer. In December 1327 John Norwode was granted the prebend of Stoke by the Archbishop of York. John Grandison, his uncle, had held the prebend of Stoke, Lincoln diocese, from 1322 to 1327 beforeore he was consecrated the Bishop of Exeter. Confirmation from the Pope, at Avignon January 19, 1327 [28], "To John son of the late John de Northwode, Knight, provision of a canonry and prebend of Lincoln" Two letters dated 9 December 1328 and 12 December 1328 to John from his uncle are recorded in the bishop's register. John studied in Oxford and Paris in 1328-29, received a M.A. by 1334, and a Doctor of Theology. Allowance was given to John, Bishop of Exeter, to grant to his nephew John de Northwood, canon of Lincoln, a canonry in his church and a reservation of a prebend in the same on 5 October 1331. Pope John XXII in October 1332 granted John, Bishop of Exeter, the right to assign a canonry of Exeter to his nephew John de Northwode, then a canon of Lincoln. Pope Benedict XII in January 1335 granted John the prebend of Boseham and on April 2, 1335 granted John, canon of Lincoln, a reservation of a benefice, value 30 marks with cure of souls or 20 without, of the gift of the prior and convent of Lenton. John was made Archdeacon of Totnes, Exeter diocese, on June 13, 1338. Pope Benedict XII in January 1340 issued a mandate to John de Northwode, canon of Lincoln, to carry out apostates in regard to Roger de Worfeld, monk. On the patent rolls for September 9, 1341 is the assignment of master David Maynard to the church of Marteleye, Worcester, which was released by the resignation of master John de Northwode. John de Northwode became Chancellor of Oxford University in 1345. Pope Clement VI at Avignon, on March 2, 1346, granted dispensation at the request of Oueen Philippa, to hold Ilfardicombe church Exeter diocese for John de Northwode, Master of Arts and Theology, Chancellor of Oxford University, in addition to canonries and prebends in Lincoln, Exeter, Wells and Boseham. John died shortly beforeore May 4, 1349, as on that day by petition from the Prince of Wales, Pope Clement VI, granted Peter de Gildesburgh the archdeaconry of Totnes, a canonry and prebend of Exeter, void by the death of John de Northwode. In July 1349 Pope Clement VI granted to John de Holand the canonry and prebend of St. Carantoce, Cornwall, held by John de Northwode, deceased.

Sir William de Northwode was born about 1312, "of tender age" and coheir of his father's share of his grandfather's Kent gavelkind land in June 1319. He was under 15 years old in June 1325 at death of Lora Peyforer. On March 20, 1343 at Westminster, King Edward III had a letter written to the prior of Baroli, Berengar de Aurosio, commissary of the Grand Master of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem. King Edward requested that Berengar admit William de Northwode, Queen's page and cousin of the Earl of Salisbury, to knighthood in the order. He also issued a request to Peter de S. Marcello to speak to the Pope in favor of William. Thereafter, William assumed religious habit and orders at Clerkenwell.

115 iv Magister Thomas²⁹ de Northwood [9540], born about 1313; died before 6 May 1354. Notes: Magister Thomas de Northwode was born about 1314, of "tender age" and coheir of his father's share of his grandfather's Kent gavelkind lands in 1319. Under 15 years old in June 1325 at the death of Lora Peyforer. Thomas was subdean of Weldon Paynshall (Westhall), Lincoln from 14 June 1327 to 1329. On May 18, 1329, he exchanged Welton Paynshall for the prebend of Norton Episcopi, Lincoln diocese. He held Norton until shortly beforeore his death in 1354. He was made Archdeacon of Stow on April 14, 1328, but was succeeded by Walter Maidstone in 1329. While archdeacon of Stow, he became subdean of Lincoln, June 14, 1328. He resigned to become treasurer of Lincoln April 18, 1329 and May 18, 1329. He was a archdeacon of Lincoln from May 26, 1331 until his death. Orders from Pope John 22, at Avignon, February 3, 1333, to Thomas de Northwode, professor of Theology, to provide at the king's request, a canonry and prebend of Chichester, not withstanding he has a canonry, prebend and archdeaconry of Lincoln. He was granted a prebend in Bishophurst in 1339 and 1349. He occurs as Archdeacon of Leicester in 1344 and Chancellor of Cambridge University. He was about to resign his archdeaconry on June 1 1352, but apparently did not. He died shortly beforeore May 14, 1354.

Four years later, at 16, we find a grant by Pope Benedict XII at Avignon, June 2, 1335, to Otho de Northwode, a canonry of Chichester, with reservation of a prebend, not withstanding he has a portion without cure of souls in St. Tethe church, Exeter dicoese. Also granted a prebend of Bracklesham on February 2, 1338 and in 1345. From the papal records: confirmation of a prebend on October 4, 1349 and confirmation by Pope Clement VI on April 6, 1350 to Otho de Northwode, nephew of Bishop of Exeter, bachelor, the archdeaconry, canonry and prebend of Exeter, canonries and prebends of Chichester, Cotton, Walton [-in-] Bosheam, St. Theth, St. Thomas the Martyr at the Collegiate church of Glasney and St. Mary Ottery.



The memory of Colonel Andrew Henderson Norwood constituted a link between the primitive past and the progressive present in Oklahoma. He lived retired in Dewey, Washington County, Oklahoma for a number of years before his death. He was a most honored and representative citizen, for he had left the impress of his individuality and ability upon the history of Oklahoma in many ways. He aided in guiding its material and intellectual advancement and in promoting its political, legal and moral status and his life's story, if told in detail, would be a most interesting one, showing many phases of the development that has led to modern-day conditions. Mr. Norwood was a native of Cleveland, Tennessee. He was born on the 17 November 1850. His parents were Pulaski Wallace and Isabella Ann (Cowan) Norwood, who were also natives of eastern Tennessee, where they resided until 1876. They then became residents of Texas, there remaining until called to the home beyond. Pulaski Wallace, the father devoted his time and efforts to farming throughout his life and while a resident of Tennessee filled several positions of public honor and trust, including both county and state offices. During the Civil war he held the rank of captain and served as provost marshal in the Union army. His wife, Isabella Ann Cowan was a first cousin of Sam Houston, the distinguished Texas statesman, her mother having been Hattie Houston. Andrew Cowan, grandfather of Colonel Norwood, served as an officer in the War of 1812 and in both paternal and maternal lines the ancestors of Colonel Norwood have long resided on this side the Atlantic. He was a direct descendant of John Norwood, who settled at Lyons Mills near Baltimore, Maryland, in colonial days and he and his five sons fought valiantly for independence during the Revolutionary war. He was of Scotch birth and had come to the new world from the north of England. Andrew Henderson Norwood supplemented his early educational privileges by study in the Flint Springs Academy in eastern Tennessee and he also studied law with a member of the bar at Chattanooga. He was the eldest in a family of eight children, six of whom reached adult age and was the only member of the family who did not accompany the parents on their removal to Texas in 1876. Six years prior to that time, or in 1870, he had made his way to the Cherokee Nation of Indian Territory, where he took up the profession of teaching, which he followed at Fort Gibson for a time and then spent three years as a teacher in connection with the Orphan Asylum of the Cherokees. From Fort Gibson he went to the Coowescoowee District, taking up his abode on the present site of Claremore, Oklahoma. There he engaged in the practice of law and also devoted a part of his attention to merchandising. While there residing he established the Claremore post office, and at that time there was only one delivery of mail per week and it was brought in on horseback. Colonel Norwood acted as the first post-master and gave the name of Claremore to the office in honor of an old Osage chief. Broadening the scope of his activities Colonel Norwood became associated, in 1881, with Colonel J. H. Bartles in the lumber and milling business and they had other business relations in common more or less for fifteen years. While Colonel Norwood figured prominently as a teacher, lawyer, newspaper man, merchant and in general business affairs and politics, there was perhaps no one line of his activities more deserving of mention than his labors among the Cherokees and the fact that for about twenty years his sound judgment was a helpful factor in deciding the problems that arose before the national council of the Cherokee Nation. At different periods he served as secretary of both houses of the national legislature and he was one of the Cherokee officials who signed the patent for the lands now owned by the Osage tribes in Oklahoma. As a lawyer and representative of the Cherokee Nation he actively participated in the allotment of land and practiced to a large extent before the interior department in Washington, D. C. His life in this section of the country and his thorough study of the problems that have been and still exist made him an authority upon many matters of vital importance to the Cherokee Nation. He represented the Cherokees at Washington and actively opposed the bill for the original opening of Oklahoma Territory. He afterward became a vigorous antagonist of the separate statehood movement, working ardently for single statehood, which finally prevailed. For many years he was a prominent figure in tribal politics and later became a recognized force in the democratic ranks in Oklahoma. In 1914 and 1915 he was secretary of the county central committee and at one time he served on the governor's staff with the rank of colonel. Federal appointment made him the first mayor of Claremore and by virtue of that office he presided over the courts with jurisdiction similar to that of United States commissioner, a service that long made him known as Judge Norwood. He was also the first mayor of Chelsea, Oklahoma. In the field of journalism Colonel Norwood also figured prominently, having engaged in newspaper publication at Claremore and Chelsea, while subsequently he became owner and editor of the Dewey Globe, a paper which he established. When Colonel Nor-wood was postmaster of Dewey, Oklahoma his wife served as clerk for him. She afterward became postmistress of Dewey. It is said that Colonel Norwood had a wider acquaintance among the people of the Cherokee Nation than any other citizen. By his long residence and associations and also by wide study he became familiar with both the Delaware and Cherokee Indian Tribes, historically and personally, and had personal acquaintance with all the chiefs and officials of the Cherokees since the time of John Ross. He could relate many interesting incidents in connection with the Indian life and their many beautiful customs, traditions and religion. He spoke and understood to some extent the Cherokee language and also had knowledge of the language of some of the other tribes. Always interested in the development of the natural resources of this section of the country he was the first man to organize a company for oil operations in Oklahoma. It was in 1889 that he was instrumental in forming the Cherokee Oil & Development Company, Incorporated under the laws of Illinois and in which a number of St. Louis business men were interested, their first wells being drilled at Chelsea. For ten years Colonel Norwood was the legal representative for the Indian Territory of the Cudahy Oil Company, the first to develop the oil resources of Washington County and he secured many of the leases to the land on which they conducted their operations. While residing at Claremore, Colonel Norwood engaged not only in merchandising but also in buying and shipping stock. His activities were thus many and varied and all were of a character that contributed to the material development, the up-building and the progress of the state The cause of education ever found in Colonel Norwood a stalwart champion and he did much effective work in building educational institutions in the old Cherokee Nation and served on several local school boards. Colonel Norwood had been married three times. In 1872 tie wedded Miss Alice E. Gourd, a daughter of Judge Jackson R. Gourd, a prominent representative of the Cherokee Nation. They have many friends not only in Dewey but throughout eastern Oklahoma, where Colonel Norwood was so widely and prominently known and deep regret was expressed when Colonel Norwood passed away on 28 January 1922. His labors were at all times a most effective force in bringing about the progress and improvement of this section of the country. No good work done m the



name of charity or religion sought his aid in vain. He was a man of wide understanding and of keen sympathy, whose influence was ever on the side of right and advancement and his life work was inseparably interwoven with the annals of Oklahoma.

It never ceases to amaze me of what you will find for sale on the Internet. Both Sir John de Northwode and Lady Elizabeth de Northwode, Minster in Sheppey, Kent, England Brass Plates (Size 68" by 20") c. 1330 were advertised for sale by White Winds Ltd. of England. Sale price for each brass was £225.00 pounds plus 17.5% value added tax. They looked exactly like the brasses shown in the photos below.

These 14th century brasses of our Norwood ancestors were found in the Minster Abbey on the Isle of Sheppey in Kent, England. These life-sized flat brass memorial engravings originals are mounted in the floor of the Abbey and covered by carpet to preserve them. Two duplicates are framed under glass and hung on the walls. A second pair of brass engravings (copies) is mounted on thick planks of wood and available for tourists (and relatives) who want to do crayon rubbings, etc. The rubbings were out of the question for us stated Connie Baseman in 1994 as the pastor had seen an experienced person spend the whole day on just one brass rubbing. My husband and son were allowed to cart these brasses outside into the sunlight for photographing. The photos are shown in Figure 16.1.

The church historian gave us some history behind the symbolism on the brasses of that period. The crossed legs as seen on Sir Roger meant that the person had fought in the crusades. The animals behind the feet were

symbolic, too. A dog (as found behind Lady Joan's feet) meant that the person had died a peaceful, natural death. The small lion, as found behind Sir Roger's feet symbolized a violent death as in battle.

According to notes taken from The History of the Isle of Sheppey from Roman Occupation to King Edward VII by Augustus A. Daly, "Sir John received his knighthood from King Edward I for his gallantry in the Siege of Caeverlock (the same as his neighbor Lord Shurland.) The date on the brasses is about 1330. The whipple or headdress which forms part of the costume of the lady was allowed to be worn only by ladies of title, and the way it was put on indicated the rank of the wearer. As represented on the engraving on the brasses, it shows that Sir John's wife was a nobleman's daughter and a lady in her own right. If she had been a princess, it would have been worn high enough to hide her lips. If she were merely a knight's wife it would have reached her chin."

In this connection it has been a priceless privilege to be able to enter English churches without restriction, and to find therein brass engravings which have provided us with pictures of our ancestors—pictures which show knights in armor as they actually appeared in battle from the Crusades to the time when the invention of gunpowder made armor unnecessary—the time when William Norwood left England for Virginia in the seventeenth century.

Through these brasses of knights and their ladies, we are able to trace the changing pattern of armor and costume through the years, completing it with those to clerics and civilians. The three-dimensional stone effigies also add a realistic portraiture of our ancestors. But when it came to depicting the more intricate and detailed treatment of armor and garments, brass was found to be a better medium, and in the hands of a skillful engraver it gave a more accurate picture. It was also more durable, although its cost made it prohibitive in the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries for the less wealthy families.

In some churches, mainly in the midlands where stone was more plentiful, incised slabs of stone occur more widely than those of brass, but fortunately for us, in Kent, England it was less costly to use brass. This was on account of the proximity of that county to the Continent where the necessary raw materials were found. These were imported into Britain, where they were manufactured into "latten", the name given to the mixture of copper, half its weight of zinc and a small amount of lead and tin. In the melting process the copper turned from its original red to the yellow color of brass. When it was required for use, the latten was placed in a crucible, heated in a furnace, and at the correct temperature poured into a stone mould and allowed to cool. To reduce the brass to the appropriate thickness for engraving, it was placed on a flat surface and hammered to the depth we now see on these memorial brasses.

These flat brass plates were originally inserted in the top of the tomb, and in some cases these have remained in their original position. Unfortunately, in the Tudor period many brasses were destroyed, and through the later centuries many have been stolen, lost or have become badly worn and mutilated. The result has been that comparatively few remain in their original positions, because where a church has realized their value and its own privilege as custodian of such a rich heritage, it has taken steps to safeguard its brasses. This has meant removing them for safety to lesser used parts of churches, protecting them by carpets, or placing them on walls, in some cases though, where they are quite inaccessible. In recent searches, it has been found at least one brass underneath an organ, and several either unprotected or placed under pews or chairs where they are still submitted to constant wear.



Bearing all these points in mind, the preservation of our remaining church brasses is of great importance, and the collections of rubbings in the British Museum, the Victoria and Albert Museum and the Monumental Brass Society, are very valuable. The collection of brasses which we have made, and which are illustrated in this book, may be considered to be unique, because they all relate to one family—they are all to Norwoods or to families connected with them by marriage.

Gertrude Callam states that it has taken many years and much research to discover just where brasses of interest to this particular family are located and the fascination is that we are still coming across brasses which have such a connection.

Gertrude describes how to make rubbings. She says that the first thing to do before visiting a church to make a rubbing is to obtain the necessary permission, which is generally readily given.

When we began to make rubbings, we used an ordinary cobbler's heel-ball, and then we discovered "Yankee Polish", a black wax of German manufacture, made in sticks about 4 in. long and 1 in. square, easy to handle, and giving a really dense black picture. In addition, we took with us rolls of two thicknesses of paper, a thin cartridge and an

architect's detail paper, as we were never sure how deeply etched the brass might be. To make rubbings on the floor, we used weights to keep the paper in position, but on the wall adhesive tape is invaluable. We found it is always best to have two people working on each job; one to see that the paper does not move, and the other to make the rubbing. There is no particular skill required, but firm and even application of the wax to the surface of the paper will produce a satisfactory result.

After making a rubbing, we learned the wisdom of rolling it in a sheet of clean paper, putting two rubber bands round to keep it from unrolling, and adding the name of the church, the date of the brass and to whom it applied, and the date the rubbing was made.

When we were ready to hang our collection, we unrolled the rubbings one at a time, and carefully cut round the figures, keeping any inscriptions in their correct places. Then we pasted these on to large sheets of hardboard, adding full descriptions and dates. Before hanging them, we photographed each one, so that the illustrations used in this book are of the actual brasses, and are not drawings.

Then we screwed these hardboard panels to the walls of our cedar garden studio, placing them as nearly as possible in chronological order, to present a picture of the changing pattern in armor, dress and inscriptions in each period of history. This is how we would like to unfold the story to our readers.

16.2. The Earliest Brasses—Thirteenth to the Early Fourteenth Centuries.

Our first visit was to find the most ancient Norwood brasses extant, which are among the eight oldest in England. These are in the church of St. Mary and St. Sexburga in Minster-in-Sheppey, Kent, and we had permission from the Vicar, Rev. J. B. Alien to make our first rubbing.

We might have had a fruitless journey had not Mrs. Coultrip, of Norwood Manor on the island, told us to roll back the long, heavy carpet in front of the altar, for at that time we had not realized the value of these brasses and the care taken to protect them. It is of utmost importance to replace carefully any coverings and to clean away any pieces of heel-ball that may have flaked off.

I shall never forget the look of wonder on the faces of two people who were standing by us when these remarkable pictures gradually came to light. Here were life-size engravings of our ancestors, Sir John de Northwood and the Lady Joan de Badlesmere A.D. 1319. I believe there are no other brasses in the country about which so much of a controversial nature has been written (See Figure 16.2).

In Archaelogica Cantiana there are three articles on these brasses—Vol. IX p. 148 "On the Brass of Sir John de Northwode and Lady, in Minster Church, Sheppey" by J. G. Waller; Vol. XXII p. 144.

"Minster in Sheppey" by Rev. J. Cave-Browne, M.A.; Vol. XXXVI p. 43 "Minster in Sheppey: Notes on Two Brasses in the Church" by Ralph Griffin, Secretary, S.A.

In the last of these articles, Mr. Griffin, who has made an exhaustive study of these figures, describes the male as a type of effigy "not common in this country. On the head is the steel bascinet attached to the mail below by the lacing seen round the face. Above this the knight would fit on his great helm, which is not shewn, but the chain by which it is attached is seen over the left shoulder, the end being fixed in front to a large hook coming out of an ornamental rosette attached to the



padded surcoat: this is confined by a belt at his waist and comes down behind below the knees, but is cut off in front of the thighs, thus shewing the mail over the thighs, the mail again shewing above the padded under-garment, or pourpoint, with scalloped edges, studded with metal for adornment. The mail is notable, being as it is called "banded" that is made of rings, each band being united by rings to the next. The shield hangs by a broad belt fixed over the right shoulder charged with the arms of Northwood, viz. Ermine, a cross engrailed gules."

In describing the female figure, Mr. Griffin says, "This effigy is quite perfect. The broad treatment of the lady's mantle and the flowing lines are just what is needed for effect, and no more. It is represented as gracefully gathered up on the dexter side under the elbow, and there are slits for the arms to pass through, edged with the same pattern as goes round the bottom of the gown. Through these slits appear the arms in the tight sleeves of the kirtle. The mantle is lined with a fur called vair, as seen just above the dog's head and also in the triangular lappets drawn over the shoulders. But the striking feature of the lady's dress is the extraordinary stiffened wimple which covers her chin and surrounds her head, so as to retain the beautifully plaited hair. Her feet in their pointed boots are on a dog with a collar of bells, which looks up at his mistress as if he did not quite enjoy being trodden on."

All references to the male figure in this and the other articles point out that a piece had been cut out of the middle of the figure and the brass relaid in the sixteenth or seventeenth centuries, and that it remained thus until in 1881. Mr. J. G. Waller, writer of the article in the IXth volume of Cantiana, "restored" the brass to Sir John and re-laid these two figures. He adds this information, "As there are details of workmanship or convention, seen in the faces of both figures, which do not accord with our English examples of the fourteenth century, we may fairly assume that this is the work of a French hand".

I have before me a copy (shown below) of the account for their restoration, which I made from the original loaned to me by Mr. A. W. Jenkins of Folkestone, to whom my thanks are due. I here present this account as being of great significance, showing the care which has been expended to preserve these beautiful brasses.

As it is agreed that these brasses are of Sir John and Lady Joan de Northwood, there must have been an earlier pair in Minster to their parents, Roger and Joan, because, on the occasion of a visitation in 1511, the church wardens of Minster, referring to brasses with this inscription Hie jacet Rogerus de Northwood Miles et Boon ejus sepuiti ante conquestum requested that, as they were "very sore worne and broken, they might take away the pictures ... that the people may make setts and pewys, where they may more quietly serve God, and that it

may less cowmber the rowme". Mr. Griffin points out that they could not have referred to the brasses to John and Joan which were not badly worn. Furthermore, Stothard says that Roger de Northwood who served at Acre with Richard I, and his wife Bona, are buried in Minster, and the inhabitants recall that the brass represents a knight with his sword drawn and raised, his wife kneeling beside him, but that this brass is no longer in existence.

I was quite excited, therefore, when I read in Cantiana IX p. 158 that in a Harleian MS. No. 3917, A Volume of Church Notes by Philipot there were some rough sketches of monuments of the Northwood family. Mr. Waller, the author of the article pointed out that although the name of the church was omitted by Philipot, "it was, without a doubt. Minster in Sheppey".




Figure 16.4: From Philipot, p. 86. Probably Sir Roger and Lady Bona de Northwood, A.D. 1286—Sheppey.




Figure 16.5. From Philpot's p. 85b, which may be Sir John de Northwood, 1320.

On 24th June 1964 we obtained permission to see this original manuscript in the British Museum. We expected to have a large volume brought to us, but when it arrived, it was a tiny green leather bound book about 61/2 in. by 4 in., which Mr. Philipot must have carried in his pocket, and it was filled with notes and drawings in his own hand. Edward made careful copies of these rough sketches—Figures. 16.4, 16.5 and 16.6, which apply to the Norwoods are reproduced here.

Figure 16.4 from page 86 of the Philipot MS shows a knight cross-legged about to draw his sword, his lady by his side. This could be mistaken for a kneeling figure, as the full-length robe almost obscures her feet. There are four escutcheons of arms, Norwood and Valence (or Valoignes) at the head, repeated and reversed at the foot. How I regretted that the name of the church had not been added by Mr. Philipot. He mentioned that the Valence arms paly wavy of six are also to be found in Sittingbourne, Appledore and Lenham Churches, and although Mr. Waller could not explain their connection with the Norwood family, I can confirm this connection, as the Valence arms are shown with Norwood in St. Peters in Thanet (Figure 12.57) and also in Shalford (Figures 12.59 and 12.60). I can only conclude with Mr. Waller that this brass was originally in Minster in Sheppey, and that the epitaph Hie jacet Roger us de Northwood Miles et Boon ejus sepuiti



ante conquestum applied to Roger, grandson of Jordanus whose family ante-dated the conquest.

The Rev. Cave-Browne writes, "The Northwode interest in Minster would seem to have continued for some generations. The eldest son of this Sir John and Joan, also a Sir John, was buried here; again the first wife of his eldest son Sir Roger, and their son a Sir John, too, who died in 1379 found burial here. Will of Sir John Northwode (Archbishop Sudbury's Register, f. 100 b) (1379): 'Volo corpus meum sepeliendum in Ecclesia Monasterii Sancte Sexburge de Menstrye in Scapeya' ".

Of the persons mentioned here, the eldest son of Sir John and Lady Joan, namely Sir John who married Agnes Grandison, bore arms in 1308 in the first Dunstable Tournament, and died in 1320 just prior to his father's decease. The knight on page 85B of Philipot's Notes (Figure 16.5) could be this Sir John in his coif of mail with the Norwood arms and figure of a dove. It could not represent his grandson Sir John, son of Juliana and Roger de Northwood, who died in 1379 because Mr. Waller, relating the

personal history of this Sir John says that his monument "does not seem to have been referred to, or noticed, in any of the notes which I have cited"

This still leaves the third figure on page 85 of Philipot's Notes (Figure 16.6) unaccounted for. The knight is wearing a helmet and dragon's crest, and Mr. Philipot has added this inscription, Hie jacet Walterus Northwood cum quarter filius, verus haeres domini de Northwood. Mr. Waller assigning this to the fourteenth century says "but cannot find this Walter in the Norwood

pedigree". Neither have I found anyone of the name of Walter, and can only put forward the suggestion that Philipot might have made an error in the name, and that the name should have been William. Sir John who died in 1379 had a son William who died in 1416 after fighting at Agincourt with King Henry V. He is known as William of Bredhurst after the church where he is buried, and where his tomb once held a brass to him and his four sons. I have visited this remote little church of Bredhurst which nestles in the countryside to the south of the main road from Rochester to Sittingbourne, and I have seen this stone indent, which, divorced of its brasses, stands upright by the wall on the left-hand side on entering the church.

Drawings of three lost Norwood Brasses, made from Philipots Church Notes, Harleian MS. no. 3917 in The British Museum, to whom the author is indebted. See Figure 16.70, 16.71 and 16.72.

16. 3. Early Fourteenth Century Brasses.

Of the brasses engraved up to the early part of the fourteenth century, there are only about two dozen extant, and these are to persons who occupied important positions in the country. The knights are shown in recumbent postures with their heads resting on pillows usually, and their feet on animals, their hands often joined together as in prayer.

16.4. Later Fourteenth Century Brasses.

During the reign of Edward III (1327-1377) a change came about in the armor of knights; a shorter mail skirt covered the body from the neck to above the knees, while the bascinet of steel with its attached collar or typpet of mail provided protection for the neck. Almost covering the mail skirt a leather coat was worn, plain or emblazoning the coat of arms, below which the mail could be seen. Brasses of this period are particularly fine in workmanship, being strongly engraved, varied in treatment and with deeply incised lines.

In Graveney Church in Kent, we found an excellent example of such a brass to the knight Richard de Faversham, Lord of the Manor of Faversham in 1381. The lettering round the tomb shows him to be the son-in-law of Robert Dodd. We came across this unexpectedly when we were looking for a brass of this period to Richard's son, Thomas de Faversham. This was missing, but we found a pair of civilian brasses to Thomas's first wife Joan (Figure 16.8) who died 1356, and her son John de Faversham (Figure 16.9). These brasses were very interesting being half-effigies—but the double canopy and French inscription around them were also lost. In 1332 Joan de Faversham married secondly Sir Roger de Northwood (grandson of John 1305-1361 and Joan de Badlesmere Figure 16.2—she was his 4th wife—and they had two daughters Beatrice and Margaret de Northwood. Joan died in 1356.




Figure 16.7. Richard de Faversham (slightly mutilated) in Graveney Church, Kent 1381. Size 2 ft 6 in. by 1 ft 4 in.

While I was making these smaller rubbings, Edward was practically lying on the floor, covering the life-size engravings of Judge Martin and his wife Anne Boteler (Figures. 16.10 and 16.11). This was a long job, not made easier by having a group of local children excitedly hopping around thrilled with this novel experience, eager to assist, plying him with questions, and unwittingly hindering operations. We had Rev. R.

A. F. Quay's permission to make these rubbings but on account of the size of the figures, we did not include the double canopy and the lettering which reads. Hie jacet Johannes Martin inflictarius de communi Banco qui ob. 24 October 1436 et Anna uxor ejius. Anne's mother was also buried here, Hie jacet Joanne quondam uxor Johannis Boteler de Graveney suit filia Richardi de Feversham quondam domini de Graveney ob. 3 November 1408 cuius orate .. . Tho. Borgeris, Ar. qui ob. 22 November 1451.



Judge Martin and Anne Boteler were the parents of Margaret Martin who, in 1460 married John de Northwood (1435-1498) the great grandson of the above-named Roger and his first wife Juliana de Say, who had married as his 4th wife Joan de Faversham. These interrelationships are some of the exciting results which develop from making these rubbings with their helpful inscriptions.




Figure 16.8: Joan de Faversham, daughter of Richard and wife of John Boteler, 1360, Graveney. Size 1 ft 3 in. by $8^{1/2}$ in. Figure 16.9: And her son John de Faversham (double canopy lost). Size 1 ft 10 in. by 1 ft 6 in.

I trust 0 God, to see Thy face, to hail Thee as my Lord." Anne Boteler, his wife, is wearing the fine "horned" head-dress of her day, her long dress having wide loose sleeves, gathered in at the wrist.

In Holy Trinity Church, Dartford, Kent, is an equally fine and well preserved brass to the Judge's father and mother, Richard Martyn and his wife 1402, originally on the floor in front of the high altar, but now fixed to the south wall of the high chancel. This is illustrated by a drawing made by Mr. J. G. Waller and re-produced in Archaeological Cantiana Vol. XVIII p. 387. Both figures have their hands joined in prayer, their feet on a row of small flowers, the female having a long robe girdled at the waist with large wide sleeves cuffed at the wrists. In the double canopy are large engraved full-faced roses, and the brass is completed by an inscription in Latin.

16.5. Fifteenth Century Brasses.

It is fortunate for us that Kent is richer in brasses than any other county and that so many of these are in small village churches, tucked well away from towns and main roads. One such church is Teynham at the edge of the hop fields, almost in the marshes to the south of the Swale,

opposite the Isle of Sheppey between Sittingbourne and Faversham.




Figure 16.12: Sir John Frogenall 1400-1444 in Teynham Church, Kent Size 2 ft 11 in. by 9 in.

Here is a fine brass to Sir John Frogenhall, a soldier who died in 1444. In the first half of the fifteenth century smaller full length figures, such as this one, but still of excellent quality became the fashion. Armor was being dropped from the knight's equipment in favor of complete plate. This was very heavy and accounts for the fact that knights are often shown uncovered heads. Sir John is shown in full plate armor, including head-dress, and with the Lancastrian identification Souverayne, introduced by John of Gaunt, shown around his collar by the symbol "S.S." (Figure 16.12) with the following inscription (not show in illustration) Hie jacet Johannes Frogenhall, armiger, qui undecimo die mensis Novem bris, anno

Domini millesimo cccxiiiij, cuis animae propicietur Deus. Amen. (Arch. Cant. 1 pp. 73-93). This rubbing we were able to make with permission from the Vicar, Rev. John W. Markham.

From Sir John descended Elizabeth Frogenall (daughter of Thomas Frogenall) who married Sir John de Northwood (1461-1496), son of John Norwood and Margaret Martin. In Teynham Church there is also a brass to William de Northwood grandson of William of Bredhurst.




Figure 16.13: Son (or retainer) of Sir John Norwood (opposite), Milton Regis Church, Kent 1496 Size 2 ft 7 in. by 10 in.

It was not until our third visit to Milton Regis Church in Kent, where Rev. R. A. F. Parsons is the vicar, that we found the altar tomb bearing the brasses to Sir John de Northwoode and his wife Elizabeth Frogenall (Figures 16.14 and 16.15). It is situated between the Norwood/Norton Chapel and the Nave of the church and is an unusual brass, exceptionally well engraved. It portrays a knight of the period, with



head uncovered showing long, curled hair. The Norwood shield is on the breast and sleeves of his surcoat. His wife is very simply attired in a long plain gown, girdled at the waist, her head covered by a kerchief. A third figure (16.13) shows a man in armor of the same period, which is described in Monumental Brasses by Mill Stevenson as being of the Norwood family. The shields and inscription are lost, which would probably show him to be the son of Sir John, who died before his two sisters.

16.6 The Yorkist Period, the Tyringham Brasses.

Sir John Tyringham, a knight of the Yorkist party, was buried in 1484 in the church of Tyringham-cum-Filgrave, Bucks. He was the great-great-grandfather of Anne, who married John Norwood in the sixteenth century. The brass to Sir John Tyringham (Figure. 16.16) shows him wearing on his head an enormous shell type of helmet known as a salade. He has a tabard with a large chin-piece and a hinged vizor. In addition, he has on his shoulders heavy pauldrons or plates, and large elbow pieces or coudieres. Below him this Latin elegiac or verse elegy:

LATIN TRANSLATION p. 102

Sir John Tyringham's daughter Mary married Anthony Catesby, and her brass gives a small but excellent example of a woman's square headdress of the period with long lappets and an elaborate girdle at the waist (Figure 16.17). The inscription is in English and reads: "Here lyeth Mary Catesby, wife of Antony Catesby, Squire, daughter of John Tyringham, Squire, the which Mary died the xiij daye of September the yere of our Lord God ye Md and viij."

16.7. Sixteenth Century Brasses.

Mary's brother, Sir Thomas Tyringham, who married Anne Catesby, was father to Thomas Tyringham who married Petronilla, daughter of John Goodwin. An effigy of the latter Thomas, his wife and seven children was originally in the pavement of this church. All that now remains is the inscription (Figure 16.18) mutilated on the left-hand side, "Here lyeth buryed Thomas Tyringham Esquire and Parnell (Petronilla) his wife, daughter of John Goodwin of Over Win-chingdon Esquire and syster to Sir John Goodwin, who lived together maryed three score yeres. The said Parnell departed out of this lyfe the xxixth day of December 1594 and the sayd Thomas Tyringham the xxix day of March then next following; he being of the age of LXXX yeres, and she of the age of LXXII yeres; leaving behind them two sons videz Anthony and Thomas and five daughters Elizabeth, Katherine, Mary, Ane & Frances:' This is the Anne who married John Norwood of Astwood, a descendant of the co-lateral line of the Lancastrian John Norwood and Elizabeth Frogenall.

The Vicar, Rev. H. K. Jones was most helpful when we made the rubbings of these four brasses, which have been removed from their original tombs on the floor and placed high on a wall of the church. We had to remove our shoes and balance on the back of two pews, each using one arm to keep the paper in position, and the other for carrying out the rubbing. Afterwards, the Vicar showed me the church register from 1600, and although John Norwood the emigrant was not among the births of 1605, his brother Anthony's burial is entered on 30th October 1662.



It can well be imagined that, in the days of such large families, brasses relevant to a particular family are often discovered in unexpected places. One such discovery came about when we were returning one evening from a day in Leckhampton. Taking the less frequented roads, we found ourselves at the parish church of Fairford in Gloucestershire. This church is well worth a visit for its architectural beauty and above all for its magnificent stained glass windows—reputed to be second to none in Britain.

Our visit was quite unique. On the north wall of the church, rather high above our heads, we saw an unusual brass, and a closer look showed it to commemorate Sir Edmund Tame and his two wives. Alice Greville of Arle Court, near Leckhampton, and Elizabeth Tyringham sister of Mary (Figure 16.17). There was another interesting coincidence here. We had just come from the house of a friend who lived close to what was once Arle Court on the road between Cheltenham and Gloucesteronly a small part of the original Court has been preserved in the building which now occupies this site. We had gone to find Arle Court because it was once owned by Elizabeth Lygon. The complete brass was rather different in character from others we had rubbed. This one showed Sir Edmund Tame in tabard and with the Lancastrian collartwo shields of arms above—on the left Tame impaled with Greville, on the right with Tyringham. Originally these coats of arms were in color, the tinctures having been let into the brass with mastic, but the colored sections had disappeared. The feature which made the women's dress unusual was that, on their mantles they each had emblazoned their own coats of arms, Greville and Tyringham respectively. In addition, a curved inscription was added above each figure. The section illustrated (Figure 16.86) shows Elizabeth Tyringham with her "pedimental" headdress of the year 1534, her coat of arms again repeated below the text "forgive us our trespas".

In this church we did not need to obtain permission to make a rubbing—we simply paid 2s. 6d. into an appropriate box and proceeded to place our paper in position. As we commenced our work a voice behind us said, "Would you like to hold up your activities a little while as we are about to celebrate Evensong." We looked round into the kindly eyes of the Vicar, who invited us to join in the service. As we were not familiar with

this, he handed us large printed cards with the complete words, and we waited for the congregation to arrive. We soon found we were the entire congregation. Not only so, but the Vicar looked to us to conduct the service with him. We commenced by reading aloud alternative verses of the 150th Psalm, followed by the Magnificat, the Nunc Dimitis, the lessons and the gloria, and in the fading evening light we felt a great peace—we three alone in this quiet, ancient church that had witnessed so many Evensongs, but possibly none stranger than this.

And there was a sequel. The day following, my Edward was in London with a small group of people waiting for a meeting to commence, and

he related this episode. The woman next to him remarked quietly that the vicar was her first cousin, a good and conscientious man, a great humanitarian, and with a keen sense of humor. How closely the past is interwoven with the present!

This was certainly true in the finding of the brass to Tyringham Norwood (Figure 16.20), son of Anne Tyringham and John Norwood. I have not found a record of the existence of this brass in subsequent checking in any list of Monumental Brasses—probably because it had disappeared from the tomb in Wykeham Abbey, Lincolnshire, and was considered lost for many years. In 1858, at a sale in Spalding, the purchaser of a bookcase found a small plate imbedded in the cornice, while the bookcase was in a carpenter's workshop for repair. Canon Moore, Vicar of Spalding, happened to see it and recognized this tablet as the missing brass. He purchased it for 2s. 6d. and restored it to its rightful matrix in the floor of the chapel. We learned of its existence from Capt. Philip Welby Everard, the present owner of the chapel, who allowed us to make the rubbing. (See The Norwoods I p. 48).

Because the chapel is roofless, the wind plays strange tricks round the old Abbey walls. The first rubbing we made was taken out of our hands by a great whirlwind which carried it out of our sight. At the second attempt we took a very large sheet of paper so that two of us could kneel on the edge of it while Edward made the rubbing. The brass, which is quite small, only 20 in. by 8 in. reads: Here lyeth the bodie of Tyringham Norwood late of Astwood in ye Countie of Buck Esqur. He repayred this chappel in ye yeare of our Lord God 1625 and left mayntenance for a preaching Minister. Hee departed this Life the 16th of September 1629.


For those Americans who have descended from John Norwood, born 1603, the third son of Anne and Tyringham Norwood, Wykeham Abbey must hold a great fascination, for here is the key by which I established that it was this John Norwood who accompanied Wyatt, to whom he was related, to Virginia, in A.D. 1643. His sister Frances Norwood who married John Harrington of Spalding and pre-deceased him, was buried next to her father, the incised tomb being on the floor of Wykeham Abbey. In 1662, after John Norwood was established in Maryland, he demanded land for transporting his brother-in-law, John Harrington, into this Province—50 acres. (Test. Proc. 7. fol. 123).

* * *

Reference has been made several times to John Norwood and Elizabeth Frogenall, and of their daughter Joan's interesting tomb, where she is buried with her husband Sir John Norton, in Milton Regis. Joan's only sister and co-heir, Elizabeth Norwood married the Sheriff of Essex, John Barley, and their son Henry Barley was a member of the Skinners' Company of London. Henry had a daughter Anne Barley who, in turn, also married a Skinner, namely Philip Gunter, and in the church in Albury, north Hertfordshire, on the wall of the north aisle, you can read their story. By permission of the Vicar Rev. D. E. J. Hodge, we made a rubbing here of these two beautiful brasses to Philip Gunter and Anne

With the discovery of gunpowder and the passing of heavy armor, we find many more civilians pictured on brasses, and more inscriptions with the pictorial image.

The brass picturing John Selyard comes from the lovely old church at Edenbridge in Kent, by permission of Rev. E. A. Graham, and is a fine example of civilian costume of early Tudor style (Figure 16.22). This Cleric is a descendant of Sir Roger de Northwood and Lady Bona Fitz Bernard, who, in addition to their son Sir John who married Lady Joan de Badlesmere, had a daughter Joan de Northwood born c. 1256. It was from this Joan who married Richard de Selyard of Edenbridge that John Selyard has descended, which is the reason for the Norwood arms being displayed in the 12-quartered shield above the figure. His gown is trimmed with fur and he is standing on grass on which are decorative flowers.

The tablet below him reads: "John Selyard, late of Brasted in the Countie of Kent, Gentleman, had issue by his wife three sonnes and one daughter, that is to say John, Francis, William and Mary and being of age Ix years he departed this world the fourth day of Marche in the year of our Lord God 1558 whose bodie resteth here, his soule I trust in heaven whither God brings us all Amen."

John's son William de Selyard is also buried in Edenbridge Church, his brass as a wall mural also bears the Norwood arms. These arms we have placed at the foot of the brass to his father (Figure 16.22). but in the church there is a tablet attached which reads "Here lyeth buried the bodie of William Selyard of Pawlyns in y Parishe of Brasted in Kent, Esquire, who being of the age of 39 years, deceased ye xxjth day of March Ano. 1595. He had issue at y time of his decease by his wife Dorothy Selyard ye daughter of William Crowmer of Tunstall in Kent Esq. VI sons and two daughters viz. Thomas, George, Joel, James, William, Francis, Elizabeth and Ane" It is an interesting point that Thomas's name appears in the Royalist Rising of 1647.

16.8. Sixteenth Century Thanet Brasses.

In vestments similar to those worn by John Selyard, is the figure of Valentine Edward engraved on the brass on the floor of the Bridges Chapel in the church of St. Nicholas-at-Wade, Kent (Figure 16.90). The Vicar, Rev. David Ridley, spoke of the care taken of this large and very fine brass, which is protected by a carpet. It would not, therefore, be seen except by permission. On either side of Valentine Edward stand his two wives, Agnes and Joan are both wearing the horse-shoe style cap of Mary Queen of Scots. Their children are grouped under each wife respectively. The fourth figure is that of Thomas Parramore who later became Joan's second husband. Under these figures is the following quaint inscription (See Archaelogica Cantiana X. p. 23):

Here lyeth buried the bodyes of Valentine Eduard Gentleman who had too wyfes Agnes and Joane. By Agnes he had iiii sons & too daughters & also by Joane his second wyfe Hi sons and vi daughters which Valentine deceased the xxv daye of February in the year of our Lord God 1559 after whose death the ladye Joane maryede iv Thomas Parramore and by him had a sonne and a daughter and the ladye Joane decessed the fourth day of April the yere of our Lord God 1574; whose soules God hath taken to his mercy.

This brass is of major interest to the Norwoods of Kent, because of the inter-marriage between the Paramors and Norwoods. (Note the various ways of spelling "Paramor"). In 1636 Thomas Parramore's son Thomas gave a house and land for a Foundation School at the north-west end of the village.

My grandfather, Thomas David Norwood, married Elizabeth Paramor in 1849, and the youngest of my four brothers bore the name of Arthur Paramor Norwood.

Contemporary with the last described Paramor brass are several to Norwoods in St. John's Church, Margate, Kent.

From Richard Norwood (1420-1485) were two sons, Simon and Richard, from whom descend respectively the two large Norwood families of Nash Court and Dane Court. Unfortunately the pictorial representations are by this time less numerous, and all the brasses to these families consist of inscriptions only.

The first, set in Bethersden marble, with the family shield of arms (not shown in illustration—Figure 16.24), is to Alexander of Dane Court, and the Latin inscription is unique:

"Here is buried Alexander Norwood who died A.D. 1557, and Alexander his son who departed this life A.D. 1583, and Joanna his wife who died in A.D. 1605. Their three sons bury the bones of all three in one tomb, for so their parents wished—nothing remarkable in this—It would be spiteful if thou wert to mutilate her who lived with them, it would be wicked to dig up the bones which lie quietly here."

After the death of Alexander, his wife Joan lived with their son, Manasses at Dane Court. The coats of arms on Manasses's tomb (Figure 16.54) at St. Peters-in-Thanet a few miles south of St. Johns are described in Chapter IV of her book. There is a large circular inscription on the top of this tomb and another underneath which read respectively:

Novi Redemptorem vivere & carno mea me visurum Deum Translated: "I know that my Redeemer liveth and that in my flesh shall I see God".

Depositum Manasses Norwood de Dane Court Armigeri qui LXX major pie in Christo obdormivit quarto idus martii anno salutis humanae 1636.

Translated: "Here is laid Manasses Norwood, soldier, of Dane Court, who at the age of 70 fell piously asleep in Christ on the 12th day of March in the year of man's salvation 1636".

There is a brass in St. John's Church which is of great interest to me, as it was erected by the sons of William Norwood of Nash Court, my paternal ancestor (Figure 16.92), the translation from Latin being:

"William Norwood, born of the ancient family of Norwood, after he had lived piously more than 70 years, died in peace in the month of January 1605 and rests here. By virtue of whose memory, sense of duty and piety this monument was dedicated by Alexander Norwood, the most loving son of a most kind father. We shall go to him, but he will not return to us; so let us run that we may obtain the prize."




Figure 16.26: Brass to Rev. William Norwood and his brother Andrew 1596, in Selling Church, Kent, where the complete memorial now consists of two tablets and two coats of arms. Size 1 ft 8 in. by 2 ft. 6 in.



There came into my possession the copy of a letter written by Rev Matthew Rulton of Selling, Kent, to a member of the Norwood family, who lived at or near Chilham. It was preceded by the Latin inscription (Figure 16.94):

OVEM TOTIES DENSIS PLEBS CIRCV MEVSA CORONIS
MIRATA ELOQVIJ VIMQ SALEMQ TVI
AVDIJT ET VATEM DIVINO NV MINE PLENV
FASSA CELEBRAT V SEMPER ADAS TRATVLIT
HEV TANDE NORWOODDE SILES VOX ILLA RECESSIT,
MVTAQ RELLIQVIAS CORPORIS VRNA CAPIT.
SCILICET HCC ANTHA DEVS EST DIGNAT VS HONORE

Translation:

"So many times the people standing round in close packed circles have wondered at the force of thine eloquence and heard thy shrewd wit and have always extolled thee to the stars, with festive celebration, as a prophet full of divine power—Alas! At last, oh Norwood, thou art silent, that voice has failed and a mute urn receives thy mortal remains. Doubtless thy soul is deemed worthy of this divine honor, that, unconquered, henceforth in eternity it may sing."

And then followed this letter,

Dear Sir,

Behind our altar piece which is now taken down has been discovered a marble monument with ye Norwood arms and the above inscription: it is fixed in the Eastern Wall of the Chancel near to the stone from whence I copied those lines sent to you 2 or 3 months ago, respecting your Relation whose Remains lay under it. What an exalted character! An ornament to your Family! and as such every memento of him must give your Pleasure, and therefore it gives me Pleasure in thinking I can add to yours by sending what, till now, hath been concealed from both of us

When the Altar Piece is put up again that of course will be hidden unless out of Respect to his Memory you may wish it to be taken down and fixed in the South Wall of the Chancel close to which is laid the stone from whence was taken the other inscription you have of him. The expense attending it I should suppose will be trifling. It is with you to determine but it must be done soon as I apprehend the Carpenters will want to replace the Altar Piece before Good Friday.

Yours in haste

Selling. March 22nd. 1804.

I wrote immediately to the Vicar of Selling, Rev. P. W. P. Fennell, who kindly gave me permission to make a rubbing of this brass and the other one referred to in the above letter.

We shall always remember our visit of 5 September 1956 to Selling Church because, all the way through the narrow lanes leading up to the church on the hill, were hop-pickers, mainly women, with children of all ages, making their way on foot to the surrounding hop fields.

The Latin tablet quoted above was not affixed to the wall as had been suggested, but it was placed in the floor in front of the altar rails (Figure

16.94), and that together with the other inscription to which the letter refers and two Norwood coats of arms formed a group all relating to the Rev. William Norwood, grandson of William Norwood of Nash Court. What a happy coincidence it was that the Rev. Matthew Rulton, having discovered the second tablet when the altar was taken down for repairs, was acquainted with a descendant of Rev. William Norwood, who was sufficiently interested to have these inscriptions and coats of arms preserved, protected, and placed together to complete the record of a brilliant career. For these relate to Rev. William Norwood, Bachelor in Divinity, Rector of St. Dunstans in the East, in London, Chaplain to the most Reverend John, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, who died 19th June 1596, as described on the second tablet in these words (Figure 16. 93):

Guilieimo Norwood.

Sa: Theologiae Baccho Rectori eccliae St. Dunstani oriet London, Collegij olum diarumin Oxon: quondam socio, Ministro verbi Dei Docto, diserto, pio, probo; Andreas Norwood Frater, Alexand Norwood Patruelis Pietatis Ergo maerentes posverunt, Obijt E lenta tabe, Admirabilis patientia Fiducia, aequanimitate animi 19 Junij Ano. Dm. 1596 Aetatis suae 47

Translation

"Sacred to William Norwood, Rector of the theological church of St. Dunstan in London, formerly a member of the College in Oxford, sometime a learned Minister of the word of God, shrewed, devout and upright. Andrew Norwood, his brother and Alexander Norwood, his cousin, mourning for his holy life have erected this memorial. He died of a lingering disease; he is to be admired for his endurance, his faith and calmness of mind. 19th June AD 1596 aged 47."

Later on I made a copy of the Will of this Reverend William from Somerset House (59 Drake) and I was interested to learn that the brother Andrew, mentioned on the tablet who is my paternal ancestor, was left "all my lands in Kent and Middlesex [viz. at Teddington, near Kingston-on-Thames] for his life, and after his death to the-eldest male heir of his body".

16.9. Sixteenth Century Brasses at Coughton Church, Warwickshire.

In Chapter V of my book, pages 46 and 47 mention has been made of the Norwood descent from King Edward I through various families, including that of Sir George Throckmorton who built Coughton Court, Warwickshire at the beginning of the sixteenth century. This fine well-preserved mansion has been in the Thockmorton family for five and a half centuries, and as a National Trust property, it continues to be well maintained, with the added privilege that, although its contents are the property of Sir Robert Throckmorton and his heirs, it is open to the public at certain times.

When we first visited Coughton Court to see and photograph this historic home of Norwood ancestors, we wandered into the church which stands in the manor grounds, and there we discovered the altar tomb to Sir George. Unfortunately, on this occasion, we had no materials for making any brass rubbings, nor had we the necessary permit. Later on I wrote to the Vicar for this—but my letter was returned "Gone away". It was only after a second returned letter that I



thought of writing to Miss Thompson, the Custodian of Coughton Court, who graciously replied, assuring me that, as Vicars had always given their consent, I could safely carry out my work.

On 12 August 1964, with the morning before us, we decided to make a rubbing of the complete engraving which consisted of the figure of Sir George Throckmorton in the full armor of a knight, with eight sons beneath him; his wife on his right dressed in a high bodied gown and full skirt, their eleven daughters beneath her; and four coats of arms of Throckmorton, and Throckmorton impaling Vaux (Figure 16.95). There are no Norwood arms because this connection came later when their grand-daughter, Katherine Throckmorton, married Henry Norwood who in turn became parents of William Norwood who married Elizabeth Lygon.

Engraved round the top of the tomb is the inscription to Sir George who died in 1553 and to his wife Katherine who died 1571, one of the daughters of Sir Nicholas Vaux, Knight, Lord Harrowden. Katherine's niece was Katherine Parr, the sixth wife of Henry VIII. When Sir George died in 1553 they had had nineteen children and 112 grandchildren. An interesting link appears here again, in that Katherine Throckmorton's sister Elizabeth married Sir Anthony Tyringham, brother of Anne Tyringham who married John Norwood, so that the Throckmortons who are the forbears of the main Norwood line have also a relationship with John Norwood who emigrated to America 1643.

This was the largest brass we had rubbed, the overall size being 9 feet by 3 feet, and to make this we took a roll of decorator's lining paper which gave us the required length, and by taking two widths of it, we were both able to work at once. Edward took the side of the knight, while I took that of the lady—and we worked to music, too, as the organ was being tuned during the whole of our rubbing.

Two fine marble effigies were on another tomb to the left of the altar, and a very finely engraved reverse brass describing these figures was placed as a wall mural on the right of the altar (Figure 16.96). The lettering on this brass is raised, and appears in the illustration in black, with the background white. The figures are those of Katherine Throckmorton's uncle and aunt, Sir John Throckmorton and Margery Puttenham—Sir John being brother to Katherine's father, Sir Robert Throckmorton who married Muriel Berkeley. Both Sir Robert and Sir John are among the group of eight sons shown on the brass of their father (Figure 16.95).

The wording on the wall mural (Figure 16.96) is interesting, and shows how this Throckmorton family was connected with the Royal household: "Here liethe interrid ye bodie of Sir John Throkmorton knight of Feckenham, the fivethe Sonne of Sir George Throkmorton knight of Coughton, sometime Master of ye Requests unto Queene Marie of happie memorie, who in respect of his faithful service bestowed upon him ye office of Justice of Chester & of her counselle in ye marches of Wales, in which rome he continewed XXIII yeares & supplied wthin ye same time y place of Vice President ye space of III yeares. He had to wife Margerie Puttenham daughter of Robert Puttenham Esquire by whom he had five sons & four daughters, he departed this life ye 22 of May Ao. 1580. His wife Margere who lived and died lies under ye and is here also interred on whose soules God take mercy."

In The Norwoods I Book, Chapter V, page 20 is the story of the fine Elizabethan brass in the church of St. Peter, Leckhampton, and of how we made the rubbing, but no illustration of its was shown.




Figure 16.28: Sir George Throckmorton and Lady Katherine Vaux, their eight sons and eleven daughters on an alter tomb in Coughton Church, Warwickshire A.D. 1535.

There was somewhat of a revival in brasses in the reign of Queen Elizabeth I, and we are fortunate that this brass to the memory of Elizabeth Norwood (Figure 16.97) was engraved during this period, A.D. 1598. I have taken the description of this brass from Monumental Brasses of Gloucestershire page 181.




Figure 16.30: William Norwood & Elizabeth Lygon with their nine sons & two daughters in Leckhampton Church, Gloucestershire, A.D. 1598. Size 2 feet square.

"In the brass William Norwood has his hair closely cropped, but his moustache is allowed to grow. A stiff ruff encircles his neck, a fashion noticed sarcastically by the writers of the period. His cloak covers the rest of his attire, except the top of his doublet and its tight-fitting sleeves. From the shoulders hang long false sleeves, unadorned. Behind him kneel nine sons. Their hair is cut short and they wear ruffs. Their cloaks appear to be sleeveless, and consequently we see more of the long breasted doublet—on the three elder sons, this doublet is

represented as fastened by a row of buttons, but the mode of fastening is not shown on the others. Their cloaks are short, so that the long hose from the knees are shown. By the left of the eldest son hangs a sword.

"Elizabeth Norwood wears a French hood, with a hanging veil, a large ruff like her husband. The over-gown is thrown back a little, to show the plaited partlet. Her costume is marked by extreme simplicity and lack of embroidery work, which so lavishly bedecked the dress at this period. Behind her kneel two daughters somewhat similarly attired, but with no veils to their head dresses. The husband and wife are kneeling to a low fald-stool with a flat desk, on which two open books are lying. The book in front of William Norwood has leather thongs for fastening, and the one before his wife has clasps. Over the fald-stool is their coat of arms, ermine a cross engrailed gules, Norwood, impaling argent, two lions passant gules, Lygon. Above Elizabeth is a scroll Expecto donee venial invitatio mea —I wait until my summons may come. Below is the following translated inscription:

"Elizabeth Norwood, wife of William Norwood Esquire, to whom she bore nine sons, two daughters, having lived fifty years, she piously and peacefully died in Christ, on 16 April 1598.

I who eleven times did multiply

Myself on earth, cannot in one death die, Rather my lively spirit both worlds shall roam.

Heaven is my soul's—earth is my offspring's home: If then I freely range both spheres of space

I perish not in any resting place."

William Norwood lived thirty-four years after his wife's decease, and is buried in the south transcept in the same church, where there is a row of Norwood tombs, marked by stone incised slabs, as shown in Figure 16. 69. The centre one with the smaller circle and with the clearly shown coat of arms is to William, Elizabeth's husband, and the epitaph reads:

"Here was buried ye Body of William Norwood Esquire, who dyed September the 23rd 1632.

As also the body of Henry Norwood Esquire, Ye youngest son of Henry Norwood Esquire, Who departed this life ye 14th day of September Anno Domini 1689".

This Henry Norwood is Col. Henry who in 1649 made the famous Voyage to Virginia, where he was befriended by the Indians (The Norwoods I, p. 34). He gave instructions in his Will that he should be buried by his grandfather. He also gave the bells to the church.

The bottom slab is to William's great-great-grand-son, also of the name William Norwood.

Inserted as a stone in the wall between brass and the row of incised slabs is another incised tablet (Figure 16.98) to the eldest son of William and Elizabeth which reads: "Here lyeth the body of Richard Norwood, the eldest son of William Norwood Esquyer, who deceased the 10th day of January Anno Domini, 1630".

Richard was only one of eleven children with whom William was left when his wife, Elizabeth Lygon died in 1598, and he took a second wife in the person of the kindly Anne Sackville, formerly of Knole, Kent, relict of Richard Fogge of Danes Court, Tilmanstone, near Chilham, Kent. (This Danes Court must not be confused with Dane Court, St. Peters in Thanet). Among the memorials to the Fogges in Ashford Church, Kent, is one to Richard with his arms impaled with those of Sackville. We made a rubbing of the small brass to Richard's



grandfather, Thomas Fogge (Figure 16.65) who was "Lately Sergeant Porter unto the most famous princes, Kings Henry VII and VIII and Eleanor his wyfe decessed the XVI day of August 1512". (Arch. Cant. V. p. 124).

This second Elizabeth also pre-deceased William Norwood, who remained at Leckhampton Manor until his death in 1632. The Manor originally came into the Norwood family in the fifteenth century when Eleanor Giffard (who married John Norwood) received it from her parents. Sir John Giffard and his wife, whose marble effigies lie on their tomb at the south west end of the church at Leckhampton. The photograph of these figures (Figure 16.68) shows the similarity between the three-dimensional sculptured representations and the flat brass engravings.




Figure 16.31: Incised Stone in Leckhampton Church to Richard Norwood, eldest son of William & Elizabeth, 1630 A.D.

16.11. Ink Drawing of Brass of John Northwode & Wife.

While searching on the Internet I came across this interesting ink drawing (34 x 25 cm.) of John Northwode and his wife Elizabeth Frogenall. It was created about 1800 by Fisher. (Figure 16.99).

16.12. Sir John de Northwode's Armor in 1330.




Figure 16.32: Sir John de Northwode.

Sir John de Northwode is shown in his suit of armor in 1330 from the Minster Abbey on the Isle of Sheppey.

Sir John's curious shoulder defenses face to the outside of the shoulder. It is possible that these are ailettes, though they sit rather low compared to most examples of armor and are not often seen by this date in 14th century England history.

This article was written about Sir John in the Arador Armor Library in England.




Figure 16.33: Brass of John Northwode & Wife Elizabeth Frogenall. Ink drawing 34 x 25 cm. Creator: Fisher. Created: About 1800. Ref no: KD2-092.

Note: The above brass is located in "The Parish Church of Holy Trinity Milton Regis", Sittingbourne, Kent, England. A photograph of the Brass of John Northwode & Wife Elizabeth Frogenall are shown in Figure 16.34 on the next page.

There is a good Decorated sedilia with Purbeck marble shafts. The sedilia left arch contains fragments of a brass to Thomas Ayleff (now unfortunately missing) and his wife Margaret Ayleff, owners of Coleshall in the early 1500s; in the right arch now hangs an oak board set with brasses (original site unknown) to Sir John and Lady Norwood (c.1496) with their coat-of-arms.

16.13. Postscript from Gertrude Marion Callam Norwood.

While I have been working out this family story and making these rubbings in quiet village churches, I have reflected upon the amazing way that even these material images in stone and brass have with stood the ravages of centuries. This has only led me to be more conscious than ever before that if these things that pass away can stand so long, how much more certain is the eternality of those things which do not pass away-the greatest of which is Life itself.

17.1. John Cheesman Norwood's "A Kentish Descent."

John Cheesman Norwood was one of the most important early Norwood Historians. Because of his early important genealogical research on the Norwood Family I have decided to include in this book one of his most important works, "A Kentish Descent" which was published in "The Gentleman's Magazine" in 1900.

"A KENTISH DESCENT." By John Cheesman Norwood

[Page 320]

"AD. 855. In this year heathen men first took up their quarters over winter in Sheppey." So runs the chronicler's brief record of an event which marks the commencement of an era wherein—on that dark day at Hastings when the Kentish bodyguard to a man fell with its great Earl and King—the fortunes of Englishmen declined to their lowest. Other eras succeeded and a thousand years have passed, yet the concerns of the men of the little "sheep isle" at the mouth of the Medway are still chiefly of ships and sheep, warfare and wool.

For the rest- all doth suffer change.

Even the ancient Minster church on the cliff east of Sheerness, a landmark to the seafarer and of interest to readers of "Ingoldsby Legends," cannot with absolute certainty be identified with the great Saxon monastery of St. Sexburga, which for two hundred years was the school of the Princesses of Kent, although it is known to stand within the precincts. Across the Swale River upon the mainland, Milton, once the "King's middle ton," with its palace of ancient Kentish royalty, has for long centuries been but a suburb of Sittngbourne, England.

In the olden time, near Milton, lay a tract of wooded country which probably extended southward into the Stockbury valleys, where the chalk ridge yet shelters copses of indigenous chestnut, and merged northward in tangles of marsh covert about the low lands on either side the Swale. This was royal domain, the "Sylva Regis" of Domesday. And, doubtless, it was of this same woodland that, in the twelfth century, Stephen, son of the lord of Sheppey and thence-forth designated "de Northwood," parked a chase, well stocked with deer and wild boars, which as Northwood Chasteners, or Northwood "without and within Sheppey," was for three centuries the baronial domain of his descendants. Of good service in their day upon the bench and in the field, their names are to be found in many an old court record and roll of arms. Roger (died A.D. 1285), [Page 321] a baron of exchequer, besides exercising minor judicial commissions in Kent, was constable of Dover Castle and warden of the Cinque Ports. A great benefactor to the monastery ("he is to-day called the restorer of that house," a fourteenth century roll in the Surrenden library says of him), he served with King Edward in Scotland, his son and grandson being in arms there with him. The son, John (died A.D. 1319), who, as well as in Scotland, served in France and Flanders, was successively sheriff of Kent in 1292, 1293, 1300, 1305, and 1306.

Later a William is a Knight Hospitaller. A yet later William—probably a second son to whom Northwood Chasteners subsequently passed—did signal service in the battle of Agincourt; while John, "esquire" at the -Red Lion" in Sittingbourne received and entertained King Henry V and his retinue in their triumphal progress to London after the battle. The wine bill is said to have amounted to 9s. 9L, and seems to have been regarded as extravagant. It was probably this John who died without

male heirs in 1416, the title then falling into abeyance. But the family name is not yet extinct in the county, and down to the present century a pride of descent was cherished by a line of yeomen Norwoods in the Weald—not, indeed, so far as can now be recalled, as from major barons of England, but, more significantly, from great "men of Kent."

Much conjecture upon the precise signification of the term "Man of Kent" has been ventured, but with no conclusive result. The distinction is popularly supposed to belong to those of the county born east of Rochester Bridge," and by common consent is allowed to relate to some concession by the Conqueror of the customs of Kent or laws of gavelkind. A monkish story of East Kent men marching against William under arms, and so compelling a grant, is now generally discredited. What remains beyond question is that some how and at some time Kent received the ratification of its ancient custumal; that this still remains to the county as common law; and that the customs which it secures, consisting as they do of provisions for personal liberty, the assurance and equity of inheritance, freedom [Page 322] in the conveyance of land, and special protection to women and younger children, are of a sort most honorable, in the Middle Age, to any race or community which could of right lay claim to such a code.

Note 1: It is surprising to observe that in the several memoranda upon the subject which have appeared in Notes and Queries no mention has been made of Rochester Bridge. I can well remember that when living with him on the right bank of the upper Medway, and I, a lad, endeavoring to argue that we were "therefore "Men of Kent," my stepfather insisted that the river had nothing to do with the matter; the bridge was the true point of division. A Medway waterman himself, descended from a line of watermen, he was an acknowledged authority on river lore, and as such was once called as a witness before the House of Lords upon a question of use and wont. I do not think there could have been sounder testimony to oral tradition than his.

Poets have celebrated the achievement, Old Drayton in his "Polyolbion," paraphrasing Verstegan, thus sings:—

"O noble Kent," quoth he, " this praise doth thee belong, The hardest to be controlled, impatient test of wrong, Who when the Norman first with pride and horror swayed, Threw'st off the servile yoke upon the English laid; And with a high resolve most bravely didst restore That liberty so long enjoyed by thee before. Not suffering foreign laws should thy free customs bind, Thou only show'd'st thyself of the ancient Saxon kind. Of all the English shires be thou surnamed the Free, And foremost ever placed, when they shall reckoned be."

Wordsworth, too, in one of his patriotic sonnets, invokes the Vanguard of liberty, ye men of Kent!

And Tennyson, by the mouth of his Sir Thomas Wyatt, calls the men of Kent, "England of England; you that have kept your old customs upright, while all the rest of England bowed theirs to the Norman."

Notwithstanding all this, the history of the commons of Kent is yet to write, and it must be admitted that little is at present known of the general operation of their custumal prior to the reign of Edward I. To us the code only becomes tangible and exact in the version preserved in the black-letter text of Lambarde, the antiquary, which, in form the confirmatory charter of Edward I, is the usual authority in law today. It commences with a general declaration—



"that all the bodies of Kentishmen be free, as well as the other free bodies of Englande."

This, however derived, is the glory of Kent; this royal recognition in the thirteenth century of the unreserved birthright freedom of the natives of an entire territory, essentially greater than any provision of Magna Charta; for it records a constitutional defense of common individual liberty, such as since has been esteemed the Briton's proudest privilege, as customary under the White Horse rampant long ere it became general beneath the Union Jack or the Red Cross of St. George. The charter next proceeds—and the order is of importance in the present consideration—with an abrogation of the royal escheat or relief of land—the exemption, that is, from reversion to the Crown:— [Page 323]

"That they may their lands and their tenements give and sell without license asked of their Lordes. They claim also, that if any tenant in gavelkind die that all his sons shall part that inheritance in equal portions."

Among other provisions, most curious is that concerning the "right of astre," by which the "harth for fire shall remain to the youngest sonne or daughter," to whom also belongs the "covert of the astre." Lambaide, in reference to this, observes: "Astre, that is to say the stocke, harth, or chimney for fire; which word, as I think, was derived of the Latin astrum, a starre," because, he adds, "the fire shineth in the house, as the starre thereof." The astre, indeed, appears to have been the conventional point from which the parceners' measurements for division of gavelkind tenements were taken, the virtual centre of the house, and if the octagonal hearth-stones which yet remain in the centre of the floors of some old halls may be regarded as conventional, it can be suggested that their form is of itself sufficiently star-like. (In this connection the tradition of an octagonal "John O' Groat's house," so planned for equal division among sons, comes pointedly to mind.)

Other careful and, to us at the present time, curious provisions follow. It is, however, with the last two sections of Lambarde's translation that this paper is more particularly concerned, viz.:—

"XXI Moreover they claim by an especial deede of king Henry III, father of King Edward which now is (whom God save), that of the tenements which are holden in gavelkinde, there shall no battail be joined, nor graund assise be taken by xij knights, as it is used in other places of the realme: that is to weet, where the tenant and demaundant hold by Gavelkinde; but in place of these graund assises, let juries be taken by xij men, being tenants in Gavelkinde; so that foure tenants of Gavelkinde choose xij tenants of Gavelkinde to be jurors. And the Chartre of the king of this especialitie, is in the custodie of Sir John of Norwood, the day of S. Alphey in Canterburie, the yeere of king Edward, the sonne of king Henrie, the XXI.

"XXII. These be the usages of Gavelkinde, and of Gavelkinde men in Kent, which were before the Conquest, and at the Conquest, and ever since till now."

It is in this particular association of Sir John de Northwood with Henry's charter, considered along with certain antecedent circumstances recorded in Domesday, that there perhaps may be seen to exist a clue—slender and romantic it may be, but not wild or [Page 324] improbable—to the reputed affirmation by the Conqueror himself.

When it is borne in mind that the Domesday survey was not a report drawn up in the unsettled transitional moment of conquest but that it was carefully compiled years after that event, it is difficult to assume that any effectual affirmation could have been made of which no trace is to be found in that venerable document. Such a trace may be discerned in its very outset, introductory to the survey of Kent:—

"When an allodial tenant dies the King has relief from the land except the land of the Holy Trinity, St. Augustine, and St. Martin, Godric of Bourne, and Godric Cariesone, and Alnod Cilt, and Sbern Commissary, and Siret of Chilham, and Turgis, and Norman, and Azor. Of these the King at present participates only of the forfeitures relative to capital offences. . . .

"From the lands before recited of Alnod Cilt and his peers the Sovereign is guarded six days at Canterbury or at Sandwich; and the men receive provisions and liquor at the monarch's charge. Should these not be supplied they may return without forfeiture."

Most probably in these exceptional landholders, "Alnod Cilt and his peers"—group apparently of eight individuals supported by powerful ecclesiastical influence—we have before us the patriotic party, the original "men of Kent." In Domesday, Alnod's manors in Kent are numerous; and in regard to the "Sylva Regis" of Milton it is recorded:—

"Of the King's woods, Wadard has as much as pay sixteen pence per annum, and holds half a denne, which, in the time of King Edward the Confessor, a certain villein held; and Alnod Cilt took away two parts by force from a certain villein."

It does not appear that Alnod possessed other land in Milton; his appropriation of a portion of the royal forest is therefore the more remarkable.

Turning now to the ratified custumal, it is to be observed that its apparent date is suggestive in two particulars, viz., that on the one hand the day is that dedicated in the calendar to the Saxon martyr, Archbishop Alphege, who three centuries before had strenuously opposed the traffic in slaves with the heathen, is peculiarly significant. Finally falling a victim to Danish fury Alphege was buried with all honor at Canterbury by King Canute, and afterwards canonized; it is quite probable that the selection [Page 325] his holy day for the formal ratification of the county customs was intentionally in accordance with the Kentish patriotic feeling, and it perhaps implies a that public function. That the year, on the other hand, is one falling at the commencement of that period in which de Northwood intermittently served as Sheriff of Kent—a year in which his office was held jointly with one "John de Bourne"—is no less notable.

It is not stated into whose hands the ratified custumal was delivered, but the custumal itself states that the incidental charter of King Henry (analogous, by the way, in its provisions to de Montfort's parliamentary reformation of 1258, whereby the "commonalty" was to elect" twelve honest men who shall come to the Parliaments," &c.) was then in the custody of de Northwood. The custody may have been incidental to the shrievalty, or vise versa, in either case it is noticeable that in the persons of these co-sheriffs, one is found to be the inheritor of that King's wood of which Alnod by force took two parts, while the other bears the territorial surname of one of Alnod's peers. Is it not reasonable to suppose that the English Justinian thus formally associated with the Kentish liberties the representatives of its first champions? In the consideration of this question it will be well to recall that the somewhat mysterious personalities of the two men mentioned in Domesday in connection with the King's wood, both engaged the careful attention of the late Professor Freeman. He cites the passage quoted above in a note to his "Norman Conquest;" apparently, however, without finding any significance in the association of the names of Wadard and Alnod.



Wadard, he concludes, was an obscure retainer of Odo, Bishop of Bayeux and Earl of Kent, of no importance in general history, and whose only distinction is the insertion of his portrait with "hic est Wadard" in the Bayeux tapestry. Regarding Alnod Cild—or "Alnod the Kentishman," as he is significantly styled in Domesday accounts of other counties—he questions the assumption that he was a son of Earl Godwin, but more confidently inclines to identify him as the Kentish thegn who, in company with Edgar Atheling and the three Earls, Edwin, Morcar, and Waltheof, was in the train of William's first visit to Normandy after the Conquest, and who, according to Florence of Worcester, was with others given freedom by the Conqueror before the latter's death. (The list runs: Odo, Morcar, Siward, Barn, Wulfhoth. A subsequent passage mentions Wulf and the hostage Duncan, the son of Malcolm.) A still later notice of Alnod or Wulfhoth exists in the satirical poems of Prior Godfry, also cited by Freeman.—• [Page 326]

Exilium, carcer, tenebrae, clausars, catense, Acipiunt purum destituuntque senens, Nexibus humanis vinctus pantienter agebat Divinis vinctus strictius obsequlis

from which it is to be inferred that in some character or another became a servant of the Church.

Passing to the traditional origin of the Norwoods — as given in Hasted's history of the county, it will appear not unreasonable to suppose some line of descent from Alnod the Kentishman to John de Northwood, the sheriff. It is said that at an early period, probably in the first half of the twelfth century, Jordan de Sheppey gave the lands of Northwood to his son Stephen, who parked them as before mentioned, and built within them a house, near to Milton. The use of the Christian name "Jordan" at so early a period is singular, and may be thought to relate to a pilgrimage and baptism in the river Jordan —a very possible incident in the life of a Saxon thegn after the Conquest.

Broadly reviewing the foregoing data in regard to Alnod or Wulfnoth, Wadard, Jordan de Sheppey, and John de Northwood, the following inferences seem proper:—

Inference I. That the Alnod who in the vicinity of Milton (appropriately "east of" and not far distant from Rochester Bridge) seized by force part of the King's wood formally held by Wadard at the time of Domesday—who was permitted to hold his manors in Kent by a tenure less feudal than was then general, but which more resembled the tenure of the custumal, and who was subsequently made free by the King—was at the time of Domesday a prisoner to the King in the ward of Wadard.

Inference II. That Alnod had some special interest in the King's wood of Milton

Inference III. That either he or some one of his posterity became Jordan de Sheppey, acquiring the domain and transmitting it, together with the Saxon traditions of his race, to a line of descendants, who, though barons of exchequer at an early period, and major barons in the Plantagenet Parliaments, play no prominent part in English history, yet are of much account in Kentish affairs.

Some material memorials of the Norwoods, from whom Northwood Chasteners passed by the marriage of an heiress in the fifteenth century, remain. In the chancel of Minster church a handsome pair of brasses commemorate either Roger the Constable and his wife Bona, or John the Sheriff and his wife Joan. Here also is the unique figure of a knight

in Purbeck marble, with a [Page 327] little symbol of a soul in prayer sculptured in a mystic oval, supposed to be for Jordan de Sheppey.




Figure 17.1: An effigy, whose clasped hands still hold between their fingers a little symbol of a soul in prayer sculptured in a mystic oval that is supposed to represent the soul of Jordanus de Sheppey.

The monument shown in Figure 17.1 was found buried five feet deep in the Minster-in-Sheppey churchyard, on the Isle of Sheppey in 1833.

In Milton, the chantry founded by some early Norwood and endowed for the offering up of prayers for ever for repose of the soul of Kings Richard I, and John, is now the south aisle of the parish church; it contains a pair of brasses, a Bethersden marble tomb, and an ancient helmet--within living memory a pair of gauntlets and a scabbard accompanied it, but these are now fallen to dusk. In the seventeenth century the castellated mansion itself was acquired by Manasses Norwood, of Dane Court, Thanet, descended from a collateral branch, but after a brief possession was resold at his death. Long since demolished the line of its moat can still be traced, part of it traversing an orchard. Not inappropriately, the present lord of the manor is a nobleman who for long upheld the honor of the county in the cricket field. At his charge the Norwood chantry has lately been repaired and the helmet protected from decay. The Norwood blazon, "Ermine, a cross gules engrailed," old as the "Roll of Acre," appears to have been adopted, disposed saltire wise, by Barham as the quasi "Ingoldsby arms" displayed in the familiar frontispiece to the "Legends."

Submerged in the changes of the fifteenth century, Kentish Norwoods appear no more in high places. If, however, we turn to another insular corner of the county—one broadcast with history, the region of the great landings, reminiscent of Caesar and St. Augustine, of Hengist and Thokill the Tall—we may discover them resurgent and active in the strife of the Great Rebellion. In records pertaining to Thanet the surname appears in the fourteenth century. In Tudor and Stuart times it is prolific in the isle, borne by husbandmen, craftsmen, and mariners. An Alexander Norwood is bailiff, and a William Norwood portreeve of



Margate in the sixteenth century. A brass in the church of St. John there, to the memory of the latter, was inscribed "ex antiqua Norwooddorum iamilia oriundus," etc. Dane Court, in the parish of St. Peter's, was, in the reign of Edward IV. and onwards, in possession of Norwoods, who obtain a grant of the ancient coat armor just now referred to, with a charge for a difference. A Valentine Norwood is among the early Brethren of the East India Company; a later Valentine, "gent," lies in the chancel of a Sandwich church. Masters of the name command sundry vessels; ranging in importance from lighters to men-of-war. In an extant Elizabethan muster roll of a Thanet company of a Cinque Ports "rear or general band"—[Page 328] an early volunteer force—there appear, respectively, a lieutenant and an "auncient" Norwood.

To this Thanet group probably belong three persons worthy of remembrance: a Royalist officer instrumental in the bringing about of the Restoration, almost certainly identical with Richard Norwood of Dane Court, Esquire; Richard Norwood, the mathematician; Robert Norwood, Parliamentarian officer, Arminian—or perhaps Deist—and coadjutor of Bradshaw in the trial of the participators in the Kentish rising of 1648. Widely as their paths diverge, some gleam of the old Kentish constitutional spirit shines vital in the lives of each of the three.

It is difficult to assign a date to the inception of the Restoration. Monck's own chaplain credits the General with the idea as early as July 1659. But Clarendon as distinctly denies him the least contributory thought or purpose at that time. In November, however, Monck told Clarges that he intended to re-admit the "sçcluded members," the first necessary overt act towards the Restoration.

On January 21 following John Boys, of Hoad Court, presented to the Mayor of Canterbury a declaration in favor of a free Parliament. Purporting to have been drawn up by Boys himself, Somner, the antiquary and historian of gavelkind, is believed to have been its true author. But that it was in any case suspected of inspiration from the Court of Charles is apparent in the following paragraph from the pen of a Sandwich correspondent of the "Rump" news-sheet of the day, Mercurius Políticas:— "

Here was lately brought into this town a paper called A Declaration of the Nobility, Gentry, Ministry, and Commonalty of the County of Kent; the sum whereof was, after many touches and reflections couched therein to the diminution of the present Parliament, in as good English as if it had been penned at Brussels—the old Cavaliers in this country have been very active in putting this Paper about for Subscriptions, etc."

At Canterbury the Declaration was unfavorably received, and Boys only escaped imprisonment by hiding. Nevertheless, in the month of February he, accompanied by his kinsman, Sir John Boys of Bonnington, went up to London and presented a letter of thanks drafted, it was said, by himself, "according to the order and advice of the gentlemen of East Kent," to General Monck. In the following month, March, a Colonel Henry Pyne writes to Secretary Nicholas in Brussels a letter, extant in the Record Orfice, partly in cipher, from which an extract is thus to be translated:—

[Page 329]

"I enclose letters for the King and Duke of York, which I missed sending by Major Norwood."

A month later, on April 21, Samuel Pepys makes the following important entry in his Diary;—

"This day dined with Sir John Boys and some other gentlemen, formerly great Cavaliers, and among the rest one Mr. Norwood, for whom my Lord gave a convoy to carry him to the Brill, but he is

certainly going to the King. For my lord commanded me that I should not enter his name in my book. My Lord do show them and that sort of people great civility. All their discourse and others are of the King's coming, and we begin to speak of it freely; and heard how in many churches in London, and upon many signs here and upon merchant's ships in the river, they had set up the King's arms."²

Note 2: "A Major Norwood had been Governor of Dunkirk; and a person of that name occurs as one of the esquires of the body at the coronation of King Charles II, Richard Norwood of Dane Court, in the Isle of Thanet." Note to Pepys's Diary (April 21, 1660), Wheatly's edition, 1893. (Captain Henry Norwood's commission to be Deputy Governor of Dunkirk is recorded in Cal. of State Papers at a date considerably later than (that of the Restoration.) Vol. CCLXXXVII. No. 2032.

Again, on May 3, he records:-

"My Lord . . . showed me a private letter of the King's to him and another from the Duke of York, in such familiar style as their common friend, with all kindness imaginable. And I found by the letters . . . that there had been many letters passed between them for a great while, and I perceive unknown to Monck. Among the rest that carried these letters Sir John Boys is one, and Mr. Norwood, which had a ship to carry him over the other day, when my Lord would not have me put his name in the book."

From the foregoing it is apparent that a nobleman who, though not of Kentish blood, was shortly afterwards called to the peerage as first Earl of Sandwich, and three East Kent gentlemen, two of them well in years, were together secretly engaged in the proceedings leading up to the Restoration. Not impossibly they were backed by a wider East Kent conspiracy than here appears. As to the "Mr. Norwood" in particular. Lord Braybrooke's identification, in his note to the entries in the diaries cited above, is probably correct; he, however, confounds him, in the same note, with the subsequent governor of Dunkirk and Tangier, Henry Norwood, of Lechampton, [Page 330] of the Gloucester branch of the old Norwoods. At Dane Court the tradition that State papers were carried between there and Breda survives; while evidence of Richard's royalist activity is to be found in earlier circumstances of his life. Born about the end of the sixteenth century, heir to that Manasses Norwood, of Dane Court, who, as above mentioned, acquired Northwood Chasteners in 1620, Richard resold the latter at his fathers death in 1636 and bought another estate, Chilston lying at between Maidstone and Ashford, to the south of the chalk ridge; it is today the county seat of the present First Commissioner of Works. Here he seems to have resided, probably leaving Dane Court to his mother's use. In 1638 his brother-inlaw, Thomas Stanley, of Hamptons in the Wood, some of whose correspondence has been published with Proceedings of the Kent Archaeological Society, makes the following interesting note:-

My brother sent his man from the Welles to see how we doe; I told him I wondered he should send such a message to them he hates. I bid him del' this message back againe, that I was 100L the worse for him for he forced his mother to give a younger sister 100L which she intended to us, that I take him to be the greatest enemy I have or ever had.

And in the August following Stanley writes his "mother Norwood":—

"The last time I was in Thanet you did promise and undertake that he should give his bond to doe it, and that he hath above 200L a yeare of your estate which he hath most injuriously wrested from you, yet it seems that (doe what you can) neither your authority over him, your



desert from him, nor your importunity to him can move him to p'forme what you have undertaken, and now being thus disabled you would pinch and spare out of your small allowance to give us content. Certainly your sonne doe lay the foundac'an of his family in the sandes of such iniquity, he must needes drawe downe the wrath of God uppon the building, and it will never p'sper or receive p'fec'on."

Nevertheless, in May 1643, the recalcitrant Stanley, himself a moderate Royalist, can appeal to the Lady Sedley on behalf of his brother-in-law, for her influence to obtain release of the Chilston Castle which are then under arrest at the instance of Parliament. Three months previously, the letter states, "horses and arms to the [Page 331] value of 80L" had been taken away. At the time of writing Richard is declared to be "lying sick 30 miles from home"—that is, no doubt, in hiding. That he was in need of money three years earlier, when he sold Chilston tithes, is also likely. In 1650 his eldest son, Alexander, is imprisoned in Leeds Castle upon some charge not stated, for which he compounds in a fine of 150L in 1651. In 1652 father and son are again under arrest, two Council orders on this occasion throw some light upon the ultimate charge against the father:—

- (i) "April 9, 1652. C.O.S. To examine Capt. Norwood sent up prisoner from Kent, to send him back to the Sheriff of Kent with a letter not to set him at liberty after he is discharged from the arrest now upon him, until further order."
- (ii.) "May 20, 1652. C.O.S. To write the Sheriff of Kent to take bond of Capt. Norwood for 6 months in 500L to appear before Council when summoned, to answer matters laid to his charge as to being privy to the death of Dr. Dorislaus."

Dr. Dorislaus, as Evelyn puts it, "the villain who managed the trial against his Sacred Majesty," was assassinated at the Hague in 1649 by a party of Scottish Royalists. On the return of Charles II, Richard seems to have served as an esquire of the body at the coronation. At his death six years later Chilston passed to his eldest son, Alexander, and Dane Court to a younger son, Paul. Both properties were then promptly sold, and the Thanet Norwoods, as Kentish gentry, found no later representatives. The surname, however, has lingered on in the isle; the last to bear it in the parish of St. Peter was buried by the late vicar at the parish charge.

Richard, who is possibly guilty of having raised the pretentious carved tomb to his father, "Manasses Norwoode, de Dane Court et Norwoode," in the north aisle of St. Peter's church—the tomb and the helmet hung above it are but too obviously in imitation of those in the Norwood Chantry at Milton—has there no monument to himself. Neither does any utterance of his come down to us, nor even the scratch of a pen in retort to the exercitations of his brother-in-law Stanley. Yet the Kentish squire, who is suspect of part in the avenging of one king and the restoring of another, is to be held memorable. Not an amiable man, perhaps, but one with a set purpose—a mainspring concealed within his golden gift of silence— which wrought to its fulfillment

The squire's namesake, contemporary, and possible kinsman, Richard Norwood, the mathematician, is more vocal and plaintive. Page 332] His greatest claim to remembrance lies in his having, in 1635—precisely the while Galileo lay in prison—between London and York, or, according to John Aubrey, somewhere upon the road between Berwick-on-Tweed and Christchurch in Hampshire, properly measured the quantity of a degree of the meridian by triangulation; "at his own charge," it is stated by Aubrey. A century earlier Fernellius, by a computation which can be regarded but as haphazard, had arrived at a degree of 68.76 miles. In 1620 Snellius, by imperfect trigonometry,

produced a result of 66.91. Although Norwood's degree of 69.54 is thought to have been unknown to Newton, it can, therefore, be regarded as the earliest reliable gauge of the earth on record. It is about 600 yards longer than the accepted degree.

The mathematician's probable Kentish origin is indicated by his marriage, of which the register is cited by Mr. Alex Brown, of Norwood, Virginia, in his "Genesis of the United States," to the daughter of a Sandwich merchant in 1622. Most probably he was that Richard, son of William Norwood, of Nash Court, portreeve of Margate as before mentioned, whose baptism on February 11, 1592-3. is recorded in the parish register of St. John's Church there. His death in Bermuda in the year 1675, aged "about 85," is also Mr. Brown's discovery. The Earl of Thanet,³ however, in an undated letter to Aubrey,

speaks of him as "lately dead" and "aged above 90." Soldier ("in my youth, though not for long, and seen some experience of these things, though not much; yet that little with some observations of riper years which I since made in the Netherlands, &c., "he says in his work on fortification); Surveyor of the Bermudas to the Virginia Company in 1616; in April 1623 a colonist in Virginia, where he had patented lands; between 1630 and 1640 for the most part resident in London in pursuit of his calling as a "reader of the mathematics;" in the next decade, and probably for the most of his remaining years, self-exiled (" by reason of many innovations of religion brought in by the Bishops . . . in danger myself to have been called in question, which occasioned me to move the Honorable Company for this place") a schoolmaster in Bermuda in the employ of the Company of Adventurers to the Somers Islands; a pamphleteer-writing from Bermuda "for the reconciliation of his native country;" patentee, in 1632, of a "diving machine invented by himself;" author of standard works on Trigonometry, Navigation, and Fortification; a person of influence for [Page 333] the Crown⁴ in the Bermudas, where in 1656 the inhabitants met, declared the King's execution to have been " bloody, traitorous, and rebellious," proclaimed Charles II. King, enforced the oath of supremacy, and banished some Independents—the varied uses of his long life appear to have been chequered with many a cross.

Note 4: This is inferred. The partisanship of individual colonists is not, in all cases, to be easily discerned from the records. But the council in the Bermudas, of which Norwood was a prominent member, had, at least until 1647, been mainly Royalist. In 1649 a ship arrived from England bringing—it is to be supposed—word of the sentence of death upon Charles I. By it came also a commission to Appoint, in the place of the former Governor, Norwood and one Wilkinson (a strong Independent) joint Governors. The majority of the council refused to accept Wilkinson, on which Norwood declined to act alone; he appears to have then retired, for a while at least, into private life. In 1650 the London committee of the company with all civility—" wee understand that he is willing to quit him of his charge, &c."—removed him from his post of schoolmaster to the colony; and in 1655, the year before the Royalist revolution, his successor as counselor of the Devon "tribe" is appointed. These circumstances point to Norwood's commission as cogovernor having been intended to appease the Royalists in the islands. A moderate man, his strong attachment to the Church of England did not prevent him ultimately accepting the Independent form of religion—but this was as the less of two evils, to avoid Presbyterianism. During the period of his probable sequestration he seems to have taken to botanical observation and concerned himself in the whale industry.



In Bermuda his particular opponent seems to have been one Nathaniel White, an Independent minister, to whom he occasionally refers in his long letters to his "Honorable Company." A pamphlet, "Truth gloriously appearing," by White, in reply to some writings of Norwood's, contains a curious narration of the circumstances in which the two came first into opposition. Whilst going out together in the same ship in 1638, accompanied by their wives and children, a difference of opinion, quite in the modem manner, arose between their good ladies upon a question of precedence in regard to cabin accommodation.

The husbands do not appear to have taken active part in this, but the little rift marred future harmony. Norwood's effusions, viz.," a. petition, an advertisement, and a postscript," which had been sent to "Mr. Prin" for publication, are, however, the actual objects of White's retorts. These had contained some fine flamboyant phrases, such as "come, ye Scripturians, you Scripture men, that must have Scripture for what you will doe, come, I will give you Scripture enough to overthrow your Religion; turn to Ezekiel, &c., &c." "These," asks the Roundhead, aghast at such malignancy," doe they relish but of a spirit of Antichrist?

"All the same, it is pleasing to observe White seems to have felt some personal regard for his enemy, and to have looked upon his malignancy [Page 334] as technical and impersonal. On the other hand, Norwood's complaints against Calvinistic ministers in his letters sent home to his employers are uneasing.

A dispatch of May 1645 is pregnant with his misfortunes. Unfounded charges have been brought against him. His daughter has during his absence from home been forced into; a secret marriage with one Winter, an Irish surgeon -- said to have another wife and two sons--abetted by Capt. Wood, Capt. Cromwell, and others who used his house. He speaks of "my eldest son going to Barbados and afterward to sea without my leave or knowledge. My youngest son, a sweet and hopeful child, stated that he departed next day, through in a sweet and hopeful manner."

Earlier in life, too, some of his scientific works had been pirated and published in Amsterdam, a misfeasance of which he complains bitterly. His work as a cartographer, says Mr. Brown, was excellent. As about the time of his measurement of the meridian degree he held a commission to measure the Royal Forrest of Galures, Yorkshire. While a schoolmaster in Bermuda his salary appears to have been paid upon account to his "kinsman, Mr. Robert Norwood," a person with a captain's command, probably naval, in 1645.

It is possible, through not fully evident, that this 'kinsman" is the same Captain Robert Norwood who under Bradshaw's presidency was one of the judges in the proceedings against the leaders of the Kentish rising, and also who, in 1651, at the instance of Lord Mayor Andrews, was charged at the Old Bailey with, inier alia, holding "that the soul of man is of the essence of God," and "that there is neither heaven nor hell but what is here." Found guilty, Norwood was excommunicated by "Sydrack Simpson, head of one of the schools of learning at Cambridge." That he had some part in the accusation of the King seems probable from his published defense, in which he says: "I was plain in the King's time, plain with him and his Council at the then Council board, by whom, and for my non-compliance with his illegal, unjust, destructive proceedings to Himself and the Nation or Commonwealth, my sufferings were not small." And, "when I fought against the King's Army I fought not against the King," &c. In his defense he describes himself "Captain Robert Norwood, a member of the High Court of Justice," but as dismissed by Parliament from "that weighty place...for which I in all seriousness give you unfeigned thanks." Like his presumed kinsman the mathematician he finds the source of trouble in

ministers" the cleric hath preached us into blood, and hath brought gospel for justification of each party." Yet his feeling is reverently profound: "Brethren, consider and know, yea, the whole [Page 335] Creation is but & dark mystery, Riddle, Parable, or Sealed Book unto us until the Spirit of light from God open, unfold, unriddle, or unseal the same." Another passage is memorable: "I confess myself an Englishman, born unto and under the protection of the English law, bred up in England: and that what I have and am, I have and am by virtue of English laws left and bequeathed unto me by my Fathers, who were also Englishmen: by them only have I been many times kept and preserved from ruine and destruction." By the voice of the Englishman spoke the man of Kent; his sense of authority less responsive to the abstractions of philosophy or to the specialties of revelation than to natural order and succession. Now, as then, to some minds his position will appear illogical, his propensity unintellectual—a, mere brute expression of racial persistence. But these were in accord with that which the living historian of the Rebellion has called "the great precedent of all, from which all worthy precedents received their value, the tradition of a healthy national life handed down by father to son from the remotest days, guarded in the heart of the English nation." Yet in 1651 the immediate result of such a position was an indictment which ran-

"Robert Norwood being one most monstrous in his opinion, loose, wicked, and abominable in his practices, not only to the notorious corrupting and disordering, but even to the dissolution of all human society, rejecting the use of any gospel ordinances, doth deny the necessity of civil and moral righteousness among men."

Upon this he was convicted.

When the Thanet branches of Dane Court and Nash Court had followed the way of the Sheppey stem a later offshoot kept green its county tradition over in a West Kent parish which today enjoys some repute as one advanced in hop culture. Life here is in marked contrast to that on the breezy downs of Sheppey and the North Foreland. Visited in autumn, before the gathering time, when the tendrils and flowers of the Kentish vine hang motionless in the sunlight, and the still air over all the valley of the Medway is heavy with their scent, it is hard to imagine the neighborhood as ever stirred by any greater excitement than the fluctuations of the "Borough" market Yet Cade found a following here, and here—as appears by the DC Grammont Memoirs—drawn hot foot from the gay Court by the charms of a lady "property called a beauty, made up of lilies .and roses, of snow and milk," came no less a gallant than Count [Page 336] George Hamilton to the "melancholy, retired situation" of Hextal Court in East Peckham. And in the great national struggle East Peckham and four other parishes lying contiguous failed not to send each a man into the thick of the strife. These, taken in order from east to west as they lie under the shelter of the Hurst ridge, the scarpment which here runs along the northern verge of the Weald, are Wateringbury, where dwelt Sir Thornas Styles, member of Parliament for Hull, East Peckham, with Roydon Hall, the seat of the member for the county in the Short Parliament; West Peckham, in which was Hampton's, the seat of "Richard Norwood's brother-in-law Stanley, who as Royalist Mayor of Maidstone, and one of the promoters of the Kentish petition to the House of Commons—that for the presenting of which the young Captain Lovelace was sent to the Gatehouse, there to write "Stonewalls doe not a prison make"—was attached and heavily fined Hadlow, birthplace of the elder Vane; Shipboume, where, at Fair lawn, then dwelt the younger Vane-whose headless corpse was, buried a few years later, to be brought home here for burial in the parish church. Chiefest of these five men in Kentish esteem would be Sir Roger Twysden, of Roydon HalL Of ancient Kentish stock, his family was eminently of the county by virtue of its marriage connections. In the present relation it is worthy of note that the elder Vane's mother was



a Twysden, while by a later marriage alliance with the Hamptons' household Twysdens were subsequently brought into connection with Stanley, Norwood, Boys, and Styles. Sir Roger himself was closely related to the Derings of Sunenden, probably the most ancient of Kentish gentry yet surviving. His grandfather had been Sheriff of Kent A refined gentleman and scholar—himself an author on old English law, and collaborator with Somner, the antiquary, in the publication of an Anglo-Saxon glossary—his constitutional character moved him, at the beginning of tError! Hyperlink reference not valid, he quarrel between King and Parliament, to sympathize with the latter; but soon mistrusting the tendency of events he, in 1640, stood for the county as a Royalist, and was returned against the opposition of his cousin. Sir Edward Dering. The Kentish petition of 1642, above referred to, is believed to have been drafted by him. For his part in the proceedings he, like his neighbor Stanley, was heavily fined.

For eight years a refugee, Sir Roger returned to Roydon Hall in 1650, where he died in 1672.

Two miles below the Hall, on the bank of the Medway, the Twysdens held a small manor called Stilstead, farmed in the early part of the last century by one Richard Norwood, and later, by [Page 337] copyhold, passing into his procession. That he came here out of East Kent, and was of the Dane Court family is all in regard to him that tradition has handed down. But his descendants held themselves to be in some special sense "men of Kent" their very nomenclature, as an instance of racial persistence, is remarkable, for of seventeen males in all, down to the present time, no less than twelve have borne one or the other of the two Christian names of Richard and John. One of these, as late as 1800, was summoned to the grand jury of Kent, apparently as the householder of the ancient but invisible borough of Stockenbury, mentioned in Domesday, since as a copyholder he was presumably, ineligible for service. His son, the last to possess Stilstead, remained a typical yeoman as distinguished from either the gentleman farmer or the modern hop grower. Renting other lands besides Stilstead, he farmed in all from 500 to 600 acres, yet he and his wife rose at five and breakfasted at seven with their men and maidservants, at eight his saddle horse was at the door. His farming was of the "all-around" sort - a husbandry of corn. hops, fruit, sheep, and cattle, upholding the tradition of that varied abundance so; long an attribute of the estate of a veoman of Kent. His flocks passed to and from Romney Marsh, while on his lush pastures by the Medway he raised some of the heavy horned beasts for which this locality was once notable. In or about 1824 he sent up to the Smithfield Show a bullock 2,920 lbs. live weight, said to have been the heaviest of its year. In the previous year he had received the Horticultural Society's medal for an exhibit of apples. He pressed his own cider, brewed his own beer, and was one of the last in the district to make cheese. For his sport he kept greyhounds and fighting cocks, and would upon occasion view a cricket match from one of his own wagons drawn into the fields in lieu of the modern stand. Once, when a young man, he rode off in the early morning on the back of a favorite mare, reaching London for his breakfast--to be precise, pork chops and apple sauce at the "Nag's Head" in the Borough. Proceeding thence to Bamet Fair. He transacted some business and rode back to the "Nag's Head" to lodge for the night. Here, however, he found a neighbor of his own having upon him a sum of money which was urgently needed at home in the Weald. Highway robbery was prevalent, the neighbor would not start alone, and so at his request the young man saddled again and bore him company, finally reaching home within twenty-four hours of his leaving. The mare had carried him ninety-six miles. A big man—he and his two brothers were the tallest in their yeomanry troop his father told him [Page 338] angrily he ought to be ashamed to mount her again. His tacit reply, the next day, was to ride her to his farm in Sussex and back, about thirty miles. Late in the "twenties" times were hard among the farmers; the yeoman

had sisters' marriage portions to provide; and while his estate was yet solvent, he sold Stilstead ("like an honest man," says one who remembers him) and became manager of a farm to his sister-in-law. At her death he became the tenant of an alehouse, for which he then obtained an innkeeper's license. His sign, under which he thereafter lived and died, was "The Man of Kent," hung upon the gable of a wayside inn of such mean dimensions that its host could neither stand upright in his kitchen nor, as he increased in breadth, pass from it through the passage leading to the taproom.

In the year 1820 there chanced to be ordained to the curacy of the parish the Rev. Lambert Larking, a son of a former sheriff of Kent, and, later in life, the first honorary secretary to the Kent Archaeological Society, of which he ultimately became a vice-president. His wife was a Twysden, by whom he came into possession of the papers and documents of the Roydon Hall family. Prominent among his contributions to his Society are the "Diary of the pious, learned, patriotic, and loyal Sir Roger Twysden," and those "Genealogical Notices of the Northwoods " from which many of the above data regarding the baronial family have been drawn.

Ere long a time came when no smoke rose from the tall red Tudor chimneys with the fretted ornament up thrust from the park trees on the slope of Peckham Hill; a time when the transomed windows were boarded up, when the grass grew rank on the terrace and in the garden walks, until at last the old Hall, which had been so well loved by one of the most lovable of all the Cavalier gentlemen, bore, like that other of Hood's poem, "no sign of home," but was soon to pass, as the farm below by the Medway had already passed, to aliens. Manners, no less than men, were changing, and when the Kentish yeoman had laid aside his whip crop and rode no more in force to the hustings on Penenden Heath in the excellent faith that to himself, as a freeholder, he owed service as a keeper of the peace, the sceptre departed from Judah. Countyism was dead, killed by the economic and industrial changes which, passing over England, were quenching that sense of responsible power derived, in the premier county even more than in the shires, from customs of ownership in land. "Land with the German race," says J. R. Green." seems everywhere to be the accompaniment of full freedom. The freeman was strictly the freeholder, and the exercise of his full rights a free member of the community was inseparable from the possession of his holding." It may be safely asserted that the ideal of the tribesman by the Elbe and the Baltic, persisting through eras of political and social change down to the present century, found full expression in the lives of the Kentish yeoman and squire. Surely it was by the irony of fate that at the last a Norwood of the farm and a Twysden of the Hall each sought employment in the construction of the South Eastern Railway.

18.1. Colonel Henry Norwood's "Voyage to Virginia" in 1649.

Colonel Henry Norwood and Donald Loyd Norwood are 1st cousins 9 times removed. Our common ancestors are William Norwood and Elizabeth Lygon. Henry was born in England in 1615 and he died 14 Sep 1689. Henry was active in the Royalist cause at the outbreak of civil war in England. In 1649, after the beheading of Charles I, Henry fled with friends to Virginia where his cousin, Sir William Berkeley, was governor. He was author of "A Vovage to Virginia," describing their trip. In 1658 Henry returned to Holland, then to England and was active in the efforts to restore the STUARTS to power. At the Restoration in 1660, Henry took part in the coronation ceremony of King Charles II as Esquire of the Body. Henry was made treasurer of Virginia from 1661-1673 (apparently an absentee position which consisted mainly in being the recipient of the "Quitrents") Henry was appointed governor to Tangier, an active post, and lived there for some time. He was never married; he returned to England and bought Leckhampton from his cousin, Francis Norwood.

Colonel Henry Norwood son of Henry Norwood and brother of Charles is one of the most colorful figures in Norwood history and certainly the one who has left the most authenticated records during his lifetime. He is mentioned many times in "Samuel Pepys' Diary" and he has left his own diary, "A Voyage to Virginia 1649," a copy of which is in the British Museum today. His diary was first published in Volume 6 of "Churchill's Voyage" in the year 1732. I remember Gertrude Marion Callam Norwood saying how she had to hand copy this story.

Some 20 years later after his voyage to Virginia, Henry Norwood wrote the exciting story of the crossing of the Atlantic to America, the abandoned of his party, their experiences with the Indians and finally their arrival at Jamestown in America. The story captured in a 50-page essay is a detailed description of their very exciting and fearsome trials from England to the West Indies, and then on to the present eastern coast of Delaware and Maryland in the Delmarva Peninsula area. They landed on Fenwick Island, Delaware and Assateague Island, just off the east coast of Maryland where they were deserted by the ships crew, after they had gone ashore in search of food and water.

Of course, not all voyagers from Europe experienced the hardships of the colonel and his friends, but his voyage, although the extreme, gives an insight into the experiences of our ancestors in settling this great land of America.

Colonel Henry Norwood was a Cavalier and a Royalist who decided after the death of King Charles I to immigrate to Virginia, where he had friends and relatives. This document describes his voyage to Virginia, in which he visited many different colonies and survived a massive storm which nearly wrecked his ship.

Although Henry Norwood and his brother Charles fought in the early part of the English Civil War, they did not take part in what is termed the "Second Civil War" of 1648. Henry Norwood, Bishampton County, Worcester, England discovers himself and begs to compound for delinquency. He was never sequestered nor engaged in the last war [i.e. the Colchester Campaign of 1648] 8 June 1649. Fine £15.3.

In actual fact, in 1648 Henry was in Holland with his friends Major Francis Morrison and Major Richard Fox. There they agreed to meet in London, England the following year to plan an expedition to Virginia in America, where Henry's second cousin Sir William Berkeley, was Governor. His first cousin William Norwood was already in Virginia at that time. According to my genealogy records my 7th great grandfather Capt. John Norwood, the first Sheriff of Maryland was living near Annapolis, Maryland at this time.

Their plans were accelerated because on 30 January 1649 as King Charles I was executed outside his Palace Banqueting Hall at Whitehall and the country was unsafe for any of his close supporters. As mentioned earlier, Capt. Thomas Norwood, William's brother and cousin of Col. Henry, had also fought in the Civil War and was killed at Taunton, Devon in 1645. The unrest in the country caused Thomas's son Francis Norwood to seek asylum in America. Such, then, was the state of the country when Henry Norwood, Major Francis Morrison and Major Richard Fox met in London in August 1649 to complete their plans to sail to Virginia. Henry was armed with his majesties gracious



letter of recommendation given to Henry by the exiled King Charles II. The letter recommended Henry to Governor Berkeley's particular care. Major Morrison had the Kings Commission to be captain of the fort, and Major Fox was to share in our good or bad success.

Colonel Norwood supported both Kings Charles I and Charles II in the English Civil War against the Cromwellians. When Norwood's side was out of favor, he sought out the still loyal crown colony of Virginia for a safe haven.

After a storm tossed voyage across the Atlantic, several of his party were stranded near present-day Fenwick Island, Delaware. Alone in winter, his starving band was saved by friendly Indians who treated his party with kindness even though both sides could not communicate with each other.

Norwood and several of his group journeyed on foot with the aid of a local Indian guide and English settler who was brought to them by an Indian messenger. He finally made his way to Jamestown, Virginia and safety.

Henry Norwood, by then only 35 years old, would go on to many more life adventures, including finally serving King Charles II upon his restoration to the crown.

Henry Norwood's story fascinates, it is rich in detail. He describes in his own language of his time excellent accounts of what it was like to be a voyager on those early trans-Atlantic crossings and experience the white-knuckle fright of being taken apart by a vicious storm while still out to sea. Norwood's true adventure of survival after being abandoned by his party on the Eastern Shore islands is gripping. Most interesting also is the account of Indian life and habits while his party recuperated with the friendly band of King Kickotank and his band -- surely among the most accommodating and welcoming Indians found in the history of our settlement of America.

18.2. Colonel Henry Norwood's "Voyage to Virginia" in 1649, in his own words.

It is the month of August, Anno 1649, being the time I engaged to meet my two comrades, Major Francis Morrison, and Major Richard Fox, at London, in order to a full accomplishment of our purpose to seek our fortunes in Virginia, (pursuant to our agreement the year before in Holland) all parties very punctually appeared at the time and place assigned, and were all still in the same mind, fully bent to put in practice what we had so solemnly agreed upon, our inclinations that way being nothing abated, but were rather quickened, by the new changes that we saw in the state of things, and that very much for the worse. For if our spirits were somewhat depressed in contemplation of a barbarous restraint upon the person of our king in the Isle of Wight; to what horrors and despairs must our minds be reduced at the bloody and bitter stroke of his assassination, at his palace of Whitehall?

This unparalleled butchery made the rebels cast away the scabbards of their swords with both their hands, in full resolution never to let them meet again, either by submission or capitulation; so that the sad prospect of affairs in this juncture, gave such a damp to all the royal party who had resolved to persevere in the principle which engaged them in the war, that a very considerable number of nobility, clergy, and gentry, so circumstanced, did fly from their native country, as from a place infected with the plague, and did betake themselves to travel any where to shun so hot a contagion, there being no point on the compass

that would not suit with some of our tempers and circumstances, for transportation into foreign lands. [Page 4 of his story].

Of the number who chose to steer their course for America, such or them as inclined to try their fortunes at Surinam, Barbados, Antigua, and the Leeward Islands, were to be men of the first rate, who wanted not money or credit to balance the expense necessary to the carrying on the sugar works. This consideration alone was enough to determine our choice for Virginia, had we wanted other arguments to engage us in the voyage. The honor I had of being related to Sir William Berkeley the Governor of Colonial Virginia; was no small incitation to encourage me with a little stock to this adventure. Major Morrison had the king's commission to be captain of the fort in Virginia; and Mr. Fox was to share in our good or bad success. But my best cargaroon was his majesty's gracious letter in my favor, which took effect beyond my expectation, because it recommended me (above whatever I had or could deserve) to the governor's particular care.

To proceed then without any further exordium to the subject of this narrative. It fell out to be about the **1 September 1649**, that we grew acquainted on the Royal Exchange with Capt. John Locker, whose bills upon the posts made us know he was master of a good ship, (untruly so called) "**The Virginia Merchant**," burden three hundred tons, of force thirty guns, or more. We were not long in treaty with the captain, but agreed with him for ourselves and servants at six pounds a head, to be transported into James River, Virginia; our goods to be paid for at the current price.

About the fifteenth day, we were ordered to meet the ship at Gravesend, England where the captain was to clear with his merchants, and we to make our several payments; which when we had performed, we staid not for the ship, but took post for the Downs, where, with some impatience, we expected her coming there. About the sixteenth ditto, we could see the whole fleet under sail, with a south-west wind; which having brought them to that road, kept them there at anchor, until our money was almost spent at Deal.

On 23 September 1649, they sailed for America. The wind veered to the east, and we were summoned by signs and guns to repair on board. We had a fresh large gale three days, which cleared us of the English



Channel, and put us out of soundings. With this propitious beginning we pursued our course for about twenty days, desiring to make the western islands; at which time the cooper began to complain, that our water-cask was almost empty, alleging, that there was not enough in hold, for our great family (about three hundred and thirty souls) to serve a month. [Page 5].

15th CENTURY VOYAGE CONTRACT

We the undersigned, I______Captain of the ship_____on the one hand and we the passengers on the other hand, agree to the terms of this contract and promise to deport ourselves gentlemanly.

To make the voyage with the captain an agreeable one, we the passengers, promise to conduct ourselves decently, to remain perfectly satisfied with the terms stipulated herein, to follow any rules the captain may have to lay down, and, if the journey be prolonged by adverse winds, etc., to accept smaller rations of water and food.

We agree, furthermore, to pay for our transportation on the following conditions:

Those who are able to pay for their voyage in Amsterdam pay 170 fl.

Children under four years are free. Children from four to fourteen pay 85 fl. Children from fourteen and over pay 170 fl.

Those who are unable to pay for their transportation in Amsterdam pay 190 fl.

Those who pay for their transportation in America must do so ten days after arrival. No passenger, especially not he who has not yet paid for his voyage shall be allowed to leave the ship in America without the knowledge of the captain. Should one of the passengers die at sea after the ship has completed more than half of her trip, then his family must pay for the passage; should the passenger die before less than half the trip is completed then the captain shall be responsible for the loss.

I, the Capitan, promise, if God grant me a happy voyage, to transport the undersigned passengers to_______ in North America; to offer them the necessary comforts aboard ship; to provide them with the food listed below. In return I am to receive the above-mentioned fare.

Daily the following food will be distributed (those paying in full, to receive in full; those paying half, to receive half; and children who are free, to receive nothing).

Sunday -1 lb. beef with barley, 2 dishes: for 5 passengers.

Monday - 1 lb. flour and 1 lb. butter for the whole week.

Tuesday – ½ lb. bacon with peas, 3 dishes for 5 passengers.

Wednesday – 1 lb. Flour.

Thursday - 1 lb, beef with potatoes, 3 dishes for 5 passengers. (Sir Walter Raleigh introduced the potato from America into Europe in the XVI Century. The Palatines started its cultivation early in the XVIII Century),

Friday – ½ lb, rice.

Saturday - 1/2 lb. bacon with peas, 3 dishes for 5 passengers.

1 lb, cheese and 6 lbs. bread for the whole week.

One mass (1-2 quarts) beer and one mass of water per day. As beer turns sour before the end of a voyage, we shall take along only enough for half the way and when this is used up, we shall handout a double portion of water, half of which, however, must be over to be used for cooking purposes. Vinegar is to be taken along, too, not only to be used for cleansing the ship so that the air stays good and fresh, but also to serve as refreshment.

Note: This document is only a copy, not a real document.

Our early want of water gave the master an alarm, and an occasion to consult with his officers for a remedy to so important an evil as that might be, if not timely helped. We were now, by all accounts, very near the western islands. Fyall Island was that we were likely first to see, and our captain resolved to touch there to supply this defect, as the most commodious port for our purpose; and this was good news to the passengers, who are always glad at sight of land.

The day-break of **14 October 1649**, showed us the peek of that island, the highest and most conspicuous land of any I have heard the seamen mention for land-marks, except that of the Teneriff. We stood directly for the harbor, which is also a good road, land-locked by the peek, which stands easterly about a mile distant from the town.

As soon as we had saluted the castle, and returned thanks for being civilly answered, Captain John Tatum, our countryman, did the same from aboard his goodly ship "The John." He was newly returned from Brazil, in the kingdom of Portugal's service, and now bound for Lisbon, with a rich freight, and some lady of great note, who with her family took passage with him.

The English merchants from the town came soon on board our ship, and gave us a very civil welcome. Of them, one Mr. Andrews invited me, with my two comrades, to refresh ourselves with fruit and meat such as the island produced. Our captain dined with us at his house, and so did captain Tatum, who in like courteous manner engaged us all to dine on board his ship the next day. We visited the peach trees for our desert, of which I took at least a double share, and did not fail to visit and revisit them in the dead of night, to satisfy a ravenous appetite nature has too prodigally given me for that species.

The next morning we surveyed the island, and thought the castle well fortified, especially on the sea-barred parts. The governor very civilly declared, he had lately received command from his majesty the king of Portugal, to treat all ships that belonged and were faithful to the king of Great Britain, with more than common courtesy, as he, for his part, did in all we could desire.

A little before the time of dinner captain Tatum had sent his boats to bring us on board his ship; and it was well for us he did so, our ship's long-boat having been staved in pieces the night before, by the seamen's neglect, who had all tasted so liberally of new wine, by the commodiousness of the vintage, that they lay up and down dead drunk in all quarters, in a sad pickle. [Page 6].

The loss of our long-boat, as it was likely to make our watering tedious, and chargeable to the owners, so did it expose us to the hazard of many inconveniencies and perils in the whole course of our voyage, wherein frequent occasions occur that render that boat necessary to preserve the whole fabric and lives of the ship and company; but to this breach no



other reparation was applicable, but by recourse to that great stock of patience we were to be furnished withal for our support in the mighty straights we must encounter before we come to safe port.

Our captain disabled hereby to take the best course for our dispatch, made choice of the next best way to affect it, by the island boats; and having ordered his officers to use all diligence, and greater care than before, he led the van into Tatum's boat, which brought us safe on board the John.

At our arrival we were welcomed with a whole tyre of guns, and with a very kind aspect in the captain. He gave us excellent wines to drink before dinner, and at our meat as good of other sorts for concoction. There was a handsome plenty of fish and fowl, several ways cooked, to relish the Portuguese's and the English palates; and, which made our entertainment more complete, he had prevailed with that great lady, with her pretty son of about twelve years old (though' contrary to the custom even of the meaner sort at land) to sit at the table with us. She was taller than the ordinary stature of that nation, finely shaped, had a very clear skin; her eyes and hair vying for the blackness and beauty of the jet; her modesty served, without any other art, to put a tincture of red upon her face; for when she saw herself environed with a company of strange faces, that had or might have had beards upon them, her blushes raised in her face a delicate complexion of red and white.

The captain was our interpreter to tell her how much we esteemed our selves honored with her presence, which (for her better justification) she was in a manner forced to grant us, the ship affording her no other place fit for her retreat whilst we were there. Her young son sat by her, on whom all our eyes were fixed; and our minds united with one opinion, that the air and lineaments of his face, full of sweetness, made him so like our king when he was of that age, that, every one whispering his thoughts to his neighbor, we all broke out at length in an open admiration of so great resemblance.

The health's of the two kings were passing about with thundering peals of cannon; the youth was permitted by his mother to kiss the cup, and drink a small portion to that of our king; and she was in so pleasant an humor at this honor done to her son, that, to close our feast, she ordered the table to be covered anew, and a handsome banquet placed upon it, which we must partake of before we parted. To conclude this rare treat,

she repeated the health of our king in a sort of choice rich wine that they make in Brazil, and drank the proportion she would take, without the allay of water, which till then she drank with little or no wine. [Page 7].

The approaching night made us take leave sooner than our inclinations would have led us ashore, the merchants having told us, there was no safe walking the streets in the night, for fear the Pycaroes (a sort of land-pirates) should snatch away our hats and looser garments, as they use to treat strangers.

When we had paid our thanks to the captain, we desired his best language to make our compliments to the lady and her son, which she returned with her wishes for our happy voyage.

Whilst we were caressed in this manner on shipboard, the seamen on shore continued in their debauchery, with very little advance of our dispatch; the getting water was so tedious in itself for lack of our boat, and so full of delays by drunken contests of ours with the islanders, and with themselves, that, after some days stay upon the island, when our captain resolved to sail away, he found the ship in worse condition for liquors, than when we came on shore; for if we got a new supply of water, the proportion was hardly enough to balance the expense of beer that was spent in the time we got it.

Some days before we parted, we saw the John under sail, bound for Lisbon; where the captain no sooner arrived and discharged his ship, but he listed himself as a man of war in a squadron of ships then there, under command of the prince Rupert: which I mention for his honor, because I have heard the prince acknowledge in his favor, that he did his duty very well when there was like to be an occasion of trying his valor.

It was about the **22 October 1649** that we took leave of our landlord and Fayall, Island. We had store of black pigs for fresh meat, and I carried peaches without number. We parted with an easterly wind a topsail gate, which soon brought us into a trade-wind that favored us at fifty or sixty leagues in twenty-four hours, till we came to the height of Bermuda Islands. In that latitude it is the general observation of seamen, that the seas are rough, and the weather stormy. It was my fortune to have a curiosity to look out, when the officer on the watch showed me a more than ordinary agitation of the sea in one particular place above the rest; which was the effect of what they call a spout, a raging in the bowels of the sea, (like a violent birth) striving to break out, and at last springs up like a mine at land, with weight and force enough to have hoisted our ship out of her proper element, into the air (had the helm been for it) and to have made her do the supersalt; but God's providence secured us from that danger. [Page 8].

The sight of the island was welcome to all; the mariners learned thereby our true distance from Cape Hatteras off the coast of America; and the passengers were relieved with hopes to be soon at shore from a hungry pestered ship and company. The Bermuda Islands are approximately 625 miles to Cape Hatteras off the coast of America.

The gale continued fair till **8 November 1649**: then we observed the water changed; and having the lead, we had thirty-five fathom of water, which was joyful news; our want of all things necessary for human life, made it so.

Towards break of day, weary of my lodging, I visited mate Putts on the watch, and would have treated him with brandy, but he refused that offer, unless I could also give him tobacco, which I had not. He said, it was near break of day, and he would look out to see what change there



was in the water. No sooner were his feet upon the deck, but with stamps and noise he calls up the seamen, crying out. All hands aloft! Breaches, breaches on both sides! All hands aloft!

The seamen were soon on deck with this dismal alarm, and saw the cause thereof; but instead of applying their hands for their preservation (through a general despondency) they fell on their knees, commending their souls as at the last gasp. The captain came out at the noise to rectify what was amiss; but seeing how the case stood, his courage failed. Mate Putts (a stout seaman) took heart again, and cried out, is there no good fellow that will stand to the helm, and loose a sail? But of all the ship's crew there were but two foremast men that would be persuaded to obey commands, namely, Thomas Reasin and John Smith, men of innate courage, who, for their good resolution on that and divers other occasions in the various traverses of this voyage, deserve to have their names kept in lasting remembrance.




Figure 18.6: Ship's sketch & description similar to those of Henry Norwood's Ship.

One of them got up and loosed the fore top-sail, to put the ship (if possible) in steerage way, and under command; the other stood to the helm, and he shifted it in a nick of time; for the ship was at the point of dashing on the starboard breach: and although', in the rest of the voyage, she was wont to be blamed for the ill quality of not feeling the helm, she did, in this important instance, redeem her credit, and fell round off for our rescue from that danger. But the sense of this escape lasted but a moment; for no sooner was she fallen from that breach, but another on the larboard-bow was ready to receive her. The ship's crew, by this time (reproached by the courage of Reasin and Smith) were all at work; and the helm shifting opportunely, she fell off again as before. The light of the day (which now broke forth) did discover our condition to be altogether as perilous as possible; for we now saw our selves surrounded with breaches; scarce any water like a channel appeared for a way to shun them. [Page 9].

In this sad condition the ship struck ground, and raised such a war of water and sand together, which fell on the main-chains, that now all hopes of safety were laid aside; but the ship being still afloat, and the seamen all of them now under command, nothing was omitted for our preservation that was in their power.

Tom Reasin, seeing the ship go ahead in the likeliest water for a channel, and ordering the helm accordingly, heaved the lead; and after a

little further advance into that new channel, wholly against his hopes, he had a good deal of water more than the ship drew, which soon mended upon us, the next cast of the lead affording eighteen or twenty foot. We stood to this channel, and the light of the morning enabling the quarter-masters to con the ship, we were by this miraculous mercy of God, soon clear of the breaches at Cape Hatteras, and got out to sea.

No sooner was the ship freed of this danger, and gotten a little into the offing, but the seamen (like so many spirits) surveyed each other, as if they doubted the reality of the thing, and shook hands like strangers, or men risen from the other world, and did scarce believe they were, what they seemed to be, men of flesh and blood. As they recovered force, they made what sail they could to stand to seaward.

The gale came fresh at north-west, and this fresh gale did soon grow up to a violent storm, which increased to so great a rigor, separating us from the land at the rate of eight leagues a watch, merely with our forecourses, insomuch that the master thought it necessary to stop that career; and, in order thereunto, he did advise with his officers to bring the ship about, to furl all sails, and to try with the mizzen mast.

The mountainous towering north-west seas that this storm made were so unruly, that the seamen knew not how to work the ship about. We were already at a great distance from land, and something must be done to hinder our running off at that excessive rate. The first thing they did was to lower the mainyard, to give some ease to that mast, by laying it on the ship's waste. Our great difficulty was how to deal so with the foresails that the ship might work about with safety, or at least with as little hazard as possible. All hands were too little to hale the sheet close, in order to bring the ship about. Many great seas were shipp'd as she came to work through the trough of the sea: amongst the rest one chanced to break upon the poop (where we were quartered) and that with so sad a weight, that we guessed a ton of water (at the least) did enter the tarpaulin, and set us all on float who were in the round-house. The noise it made by discharging itself in that manner, was like the report of a great gun, and did put us all into a horrible fright, which we could not soon shake off. This shock being past, the ship about, and our fore-sail handled, we now lay trying with our mizzen. [Page 10].

I cannot forget the prodigious number of porpoises that did that evening appear about the ship, to the astonishment of the oldest seamen in her. They seemed to cover the surface of the sea as far as our eyes could discern; insomuch that a musket bullet, shot at random, could hardly fail to do execution on some of them. Thus the seamen would look upon as of bad portent, predicting ill weather; but in our cases, which were in present possession of a storm, they appeared too late to gain the credit of foretelling what should come upon us in that kind.

The seas thus enraged, and all in foam, the gale still increasing upon us, the officers on the watch made frequent visits to the round-house, to prepare the captain for some evil encounter which this mighty tempest must bring forth: and their fears proved reasonable; for, about the hours of ten or eleven, our new disasters did begin with a crash from aloft. All hands were summoned up with loud cries, that the fore-topmast was come by the board, not alone, but in conjunction with the fore-mast head broken short off, just under the cap.

This was a sore business, and put all to their wits end to recover to any competent condition; what could be done was done to prevent further mischief's; but the whole trim and rigging of a ship depending much upon stays and tackle fixed to that mast, we had reason to expect greater ruins to follow, than what had already befallen us. Mate Putt was then on the watch, and did not want his apprehension of what did soon



ensue, which in all likelihood was to end in our utter perdition; for about the hours of twelve or one at night, we heard and felt a mighty sea break on our fore-ship, which made such an inundation on the deck where the mate was walking, that he retired back with all diligence up to his knees in water, with short ejaculations of prayers in his mouth, supposing the ship was foundering, and at the last gasp. This looked like a stroke of death in every seaman's opinion: the ship stood stock still, with her head under water, seeming to bore her way into the sea. My two comrades and I lay on our platform, sharing liberally in the general consternation. We took a short leave of each other, men, women, and children. All assaulted with the fresh terror of death, made a most dolorous outcry throughout the ship, whilst mate Putts perceiving the deck almost freed of water, called out aloud for hands to pump. This we

thought a lightning before death, but gave me occasion (as having the best sea legs) to look and learn the subject of this astonishing alarm, which proved to arise from no less cause than the loss of our forecastle, with six guns, and our anchors (all but one that was fastened to a cable) together with our two cooks, whereof one was recovered by a strange providence. [Page 11].

This great gap, made by want of our forecastle, did open a passage into the hold for other seas that should break there before a remedy was found out to carry them off, and this made our danger almost insuperable; but it fell out propitiously, that there were divers landcarpenter passengers, who were very helpful in this distress; and, in a little time, a slight platform of deal was tacked to the timbers, to carry




Figure 18.7: Cross-Section of a ship's description similar to those of Henry Norwood's Ship.

off any ordinary sea in the present straight we were in; every moment of this growing tempest cutting out new work to employ all hands to labor.

The bowsprit, too top-heavy in itself, having lost all stays and rigging that should keep it steady, swayed to and fro with such bangs on the bows, that at no less rate than the cutting it close off, could the ship subsist.

All things were in miserable disorder, and it was evident our danger increased upon us: the stays of all the masts were gone, the shrouds that remained were loose and useless, and it was easy to foretell, our maintopmast would soon come by the board. Tom Reasin (who was always ready to expose himself) with an ax in his hand, ran up with speed to prevent that evil, hoping thereby to ease the main-mast and preserve it; but the danger of his person in the enterprise, was so manifest, that he was called down amain; and no sooner was his foot upon the deck, but what was feared came to pass with a witness, both main and topmast all came down together, and, in one shock, fell all to the windward clear into the sea, without hurt to any man's person.

Our main-mast thus fallen to the broadside, was like to incommode us more in the sea, than in her proper station; for the shrouds and rigging not losing the hold they had of the ship, every surge did so check the mast (whose but-end lay charged to fall perpendicular on the ship's side) that it became a ram to batter and force the plank, and was doing the last execution upon us, if not prevented in time by edge-tools, which freed the ship from that unexpected assault and battery.

Abandoned in this manner to the fury of the raging sea, tossed up and down without any rigging to keep the ship steady, our seamen frequently fell overboard, without any one regarding the loss of another, every man expecting the same fate, though' in a different manner. The ceilings of this hulk (for it was no better) were for the same cause so uneasy, that, in many tumbles, the deck would touch the sea, and there stand still as if she would never make another. Our mizzen mast only remained, by which we hoped to bring the ship about in proper season, which now lay stemming to the east. [Page 12].

In this posture did we pass the tenth and eleventh days of November 1649; the twelfth in the morning we saw an English merchant ship, who showed his ensign, but would not speak with us, though' the storm was abated, and the season more fit for communication. We imagined the reason was, because he would not be compelled to be civil to us: he thought our condition desperate, and we had more guns than he could

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resist, which might enable us to take what he would not sell or give. He shot a gun to leeward, stood his course, and turned his poop upon us.

Before we attempted to bring the ship about, it was necessary to refresh the seamen, who were almost worn out with toil and want of rest, having had no leisure of eating set meals for many days. The passengers overcharged with excessive fears, had no appetite to eat; and (which was worst of all) both seamen and passengers were in a deplorable state as to the remaining victuals, all like to fall under extreme want; for the storm, by taking away the forecastle, having thrown much water into the hold, our stock of bread (the staff of life) was greatly damnified; and there remained no way to dress our meat, now that the cook-room was gone; the incessant tumbling of the ship (as has been observed) made all such cookery wholly impracticable. The only expedient to make fire betwixt decks, was, by sawing a cask in the middle, and filling it with ballast, which made a hearth to parch peas, and broil salt beef; nor could this be done but with great attendance, which was many times frustrated by being thrown topsy-turvy in spite of all circumspection, to the great defeat of empty stomachs.

The seas were much appeased the seventeenth day, and divers English ships saw, and were seen by us, but would not speak with us; only one, who kept the pump always going, for having tasted too liberally of the storm, he was so kind as to accost us. He lay by till our wherry (the only surviving boat that was left us) made him a visit. The master showed our men his leaks, and proposed that ours would spare him hands to pump in lieu of any thing he could spare for our relief. He promised however to keep us company, and give us a tow to help to weather the cape, if occasion offered; but that was only a copy of his countenance; for in the night we lost each other, and we never heard more of him, though' he was bound to our port. [Page 13].

The weather now invited us to get the ship about with our mizzen; and having done so, the next consideration was how to make sail. The fore mast, all this while (as much as was of it) stood its ground: and as it was without dispute, that a yard must in the first place be fixed to it, so was it a matter of no small difficulty how to advance to the top of that greasy slippery stump, since he that would attempt it, could take no hold himself, nor receive any help for his rise, by other hands. This was a case that put all the ship's crew to a nonplus, but Tom Reasin (a constant friend at need, that would not be baffled by any difficulty) showed by his countenance, he had a mind to try his skill to bring us out of this unhappy crisis. To encourage him the more, all passengers did promise and subscribe to reward his service, in Virginia, by tobacco, when God should enable us so to do. The proportions being set down, many were the more generous, because they never thought to see the place of payment, but expected to anticipate that by the payment of a greater debt to nature, which was like to be exacted every hour by an arrest of the merciless sea, which made small show of taking bail for our appearance in Virginia.

The manner of Tom Reasin's ascent to this important work was thus. Among the scattered parcels of the ship's stores he had the luck to find about half a dozen iron spikes fit for his purpose. His first onset was to drive one of them into the mast, almost to the head, as high as he could reach; which being done, he took a rope of about ten foot long, and having threaded the same in a block or pulley, so as to divide it in the middle, he made both ends meet in a knot upon the spike, on both sides of the mast; so that the block falling on the contrary side, became a stirrup to mount upon for driving another spike in the same manner: and thus from step to step, observing the best advantage of striking with his hammer in the smoothest sea, he got aloft, drove cleats for shrouds, to rest upon, and was soon in a posture of receiving help from his

comrades, who got a yard and sails (with other accommodation) such as could be had, and thus we were enabled, in few hours time, to make some sail for our port.

The main-yard, that in the storm had been lowered to the waist to lie out of harm's way, was now preferred to the place of a main mast, and was accordingly fitted and accoutered, and grafted into the stump of what was left in the storm, some eight or ten foot from the deck. It was a hard matter to find out rigging answerable to that new-fashioned mast and yard; top-gallant sails and yards were most agreeable to this equipage, and was the best part of our remaining stores. The seas grew every moment smoother, and the weather more comfortable; so that for a while we began to shake off the visage of utter despair, as hoping ere long to see our selves in some capacity to fetch the cape. [Page 14].

We discovered another ship bound to Virginia, who as frankly promised to stand by us, the wind at North-North-West. We did what could be done by a ship so mangled, to get the weather-gage of the Cape Henry, conceiving our selves to the southward of Cape Hatteras. However by taking an observation on a sun-shine day, we found our selves carried by a current we knew not of, to the windward, much beyond all our dead reckonings and allowances for sailing, insomuch that when we thought we had been to the southward of the cape, we found our selves considerably shot to the north of Achomat, and that in the opinion of mate Putts, who was as our north star.

We passed this night with greater alacrity than we had done any other since we had left Fyall, Island; for mate Putts, our trusty pilot, did confidently affirm, that, if the gale stood, there would be no question of our dining the next day within the capes. This was seasonable news, our water being long since spent, our meat spoiled (or useless) no kind of victuals remaining to sustain life, but a bisket cake a day for a man; at which allowance there was not a quantity to hold out many days. In the dark time of the night, in tacking about, we lost our new comrade, and with much impatience we expected the approaching day; the wind North West.

The morning appeared foggy, as the wind veered to the east, and that did cover and conceal the land from our clearer sight; howbeit we concluded by mate Putts's computation, we were well to the northward of the capes. Many times he would mount the mizzen top for discovery, as the weather seemed to clear up, and would espy and point at certain hum-works of trees that used to be his several land-marks in most of the twenty-two voyages he had made to that plantation. Under this confidence he made more sail, the day-light confirming him in what he thought was right.

All the forenoon we lost the sight of land and marks by trees, by reason of the dark fogs and mists that were not yet dispelled; but as soon as the sun, with a north-west gale, had cleared all the coast (which was about the hours of two or three o'clock) mate Putts perceived his error from the deck, and was convinced, that the hum-works of trees he had seen and relied on for sure landmarks, had counter points to the south cape, which had misguided him; and that it was the opening of the bay which made the land at distance out of sight.

This fatal disappointment (which was now past human help) might have met an easy remedy, had our sails and rigging been in any tolerable condition to keep the windward gage (for we had both the capes in our sight) but under our circumstances it was vain to endeavor such a thing; all our equipage, from stem to stern, being no better than that of a western barge, and we could not lie within eleven or twelve points of the wind. [Page 15].



Defeated thus of lively hopes we had the night before entertained to sleep in warm beds with our friends in Virginia, it was a heavy spectacle to see our selves running at a round rate from it, notwithstanding all that could be done to the contrary. Nothing was now to be heard but sighs and groans through all that wretched family, which must be soon reduced to so short allowance, as would just keep life and soul together. Half a bisket cake a day to each (of which five whole ones made a pound) was all we had to trust to. Of liquors there remained none to quench thirst. Malaga sack was given plentifully to every one, which served rather to inflame and increase thirst, than to extinguish it.

The gale blew fresh (as it uses to do) towards night, and made a western sea that carried us off at a great rate. Mate Putts, extremely abashed to see his confidence so miserably deluded, grew sad and contemplative, even to the moving compassion in those whom his unhappy mistake had reduced to this misery. We cherished him the best we could, and would not have him so profoundly sad, for what was rather his misfortune than his fault.

The wind continued many days and nights to send us out into the ocean, insomuch that until we thought our selves at least an hundred leagues from the capes, the north-west gale gave us no truce to consider what was best to do. All little helps were used by top-gallant sails, and masts placed where they could be fixed, to keep the windward gage; but, for lack of borolins and other tackle to keep them stiff to draw, every great head-sea would check them in the wind, and rend and tear them in pieces; so that it was an ordinary exercise with us to lie tumbling in the sea a watch or two together, driving to leeward, whilst the broken sails were in hand to be repaired.

It would be too great a trial of the reader's patience to be entertained with every circumstance of our sufferings in the remaining part of this voyage, which continued in great extremity for at least forty days from the time we left the land, our miseries increasing every hour: I shall therefore omit the greatest number of our ill encounters, which were frequently repeated on us, and remember only what has in my thoughts been most remarkable, and have made the deepest impression in my memory.

To give us a little breathing, about the nineteenth day the wind shifted to the east, but so little to our avail (the gale so gentle, and the seas made against us like a strong current) that, with the sail we were able to make, we could hardly reckon the ship shortened the way, but that she rather lost ground. In less than two watches the gale faced about; and if we saved our own by the change, it was all we could pretend unto. [Page 16].

Our mortal enemy, the north-west gale, began afresh to send us out to sea, and to raise our terrors to a higher pitch. One of our pumps grew so unfixed, that it could not be repaired; the other was kept in perpetual motion; no man was excused to take his turn that had strength to perform it. Amongst the manifold perils that threatened every hour to be our last, we were in mortal apprehension, that the guns which were all aloft, would show us a slippery trick, and some of them break loose, the tackle that held them being grown very rotten: and it was another providence they held so long, considering how immoderately the ship rolled, especially when the sails were mending that should keep them steady, which was very near a third part of our time, whilst we played to the windward with a contrary gale.

To prevent this danger which must befall when any one gun should get loose, mate Putts found an expedient by a more than ordinary smooth water; and by placing timber on the hatchway, to supply the place of shrouds, he got them safe in hold; which tended much to our good, not only in removing the present danger, but by making the ship (as seamen say) more wholesome, by having so great weight removed from her upper works into her centre, where ballast was much wanted.

But the intolerable want of all provisions, both of meat and drink, jostled the sense of this happiness soon out of our minds. And to aggravate our misery yet the more, it was now our interest to pray, that the contrary gale might stand; for whilst the westerly wind held, we had rain water to drink, whereas at east the wind blew dry.

In this miserable posture of ship and provision, we reckoned our selves driven to the east, in less than a week's time, at least two hundred leagues, which we despaired ever to recover without a miracle of divine mercy. The storm continued so fresh against us, that it confounded the most knowing of our ship's company in advising what course to take. Some reckoned the ship had made her way most southerly, and therefore counseled we should put our selves in quest of the Bermudas islands, as to the nearest land we could hope to make: but that motion had great opposition in regard of the winter season, which would daily produce insuperable difficulties, and give greater puzzle in the discovery of it, than our circumstances would admit. [Page 17].

Others would say, The furthest way about, in our case, would prove the nearest way home; and judged it best to take advantage of the westerly winds, and impetuous seas made to our hands, to attempt returning back to the western islands, as a thing more likely to succeed (though' at a great distance) than thus to strive against the stream without any hopeful prospect of gaining the capes. But that motion met with a more general aversion, because the run was so long, that, though' the gale had been in our own power to continue it, we could not have subsisted. Backwards we could not go, nor forwards in the course we desired; it followed then of consequence, that we must take the middle way; and it was resolved, that, without further persisting in endeavoring to gain our port by a close hale, we should raise our tackle, and sail tardy for the first American land we could fetch, though' we ran to the leeward as far as the coast of New England.

Whilst this determination was agreed and put in practice, the famine grew sharp upon us. Women and children made dismal cries and grievous complaints. The infinite number of rats that all the voyage had been our plague, we now were glad to make our prey to feed on; and as they were insnared and taken, a well grown rat was sold for sixteen shillings as a market rate. Nay, before the voyage did end (as I was credibly informed) a woman great with child offered twenty shillings for a rat, which the proprietor refusing, the woman died.

Many sorrowful days and nights we spun out in this manner, till **the blessed feast of Christmas came upon us**, which we began with a very melancholy solemnity; and yet, to make some distinction of times, the scrapings of the meal-tubs were all amassed together to compose a pudding. Malaga sack, sea water, with fruit and spice, all well fried in oil, were the ingredients of this regale which raised some envy in the spectators; but allowing some privilege to the captain's mess, we met no obstruction, but did peaceably enjoy our Christmas pudding.

My greatest impatience was of thirst, and my dreams were all of cellars, and taps running down my throat, which made my waking much the worse by that tantalizing fancy. Some relief I found very real by the captain's favor in allowing me a share of some butts of small claret he



had concealed in a private cellar for a dead lift. It wanted a mixture of water for qualifying it to quench thirst; however, it was a present remedy, and great refreshment to me. [Page 18].

I cannot forget another instance of the captain's kindness to me, of a like obligation. He singled me out one day to go with him into the hold to seek fresh water in the bottoms of the empty casks. With much ado we got a quantity to satisfy our longing though' for the thickness thereof it was not palatable. We were now each of us astride on a butt of Malaga, which gave the captain occasion to taste of their contents. We tasted and tasted it again; and though' the total we drank was not considerable, yet it had an effect on our heads that made us suspend (though' we could not forget) our wants of water. The operation this little debauch had upon the captain, was very different from what it wrought on me, who felt myself refreshed as with a cordial; but the poor captain fell to contemplate (as it better became him) our sad condition; and being troubled in mind for having brought so many wretched souls into misery, by a false confidence he gave them of his having a good ship, which he now thought would prove their ruin; and being conscious, that their loss would lie all at his door, it was no easy matter to appease his troubled thoughts. He made me a particular compliment for having engaged me and my friends in the same bottom, and upon that burst into tears. I comforted him the best I could, and told him, we must all submit to the hand of God, and rely on his goodness, hoping, that the same providence which had hitherto so miraculously preserved us, would still be continued in our favor till we were in safety. We retired obscurely to our friends, who had been wondering at our absence.

The westerly wind continued to shorten our way to the shore, though' very distant from our port; but this did not at all incline us to change our resolution of sailing large for the first land; it did rather animate and support us in our present disasters of hunger and thirst, toil and fatigue. The hope of touching land was food and raiment to us.

In this wearisome expectation we passed our time for eight or nine days and nights, and then we saw the water change color, and had soundings. We approached the shore the night of **3 January 1650**, with little sail; and, as the morning of the fourth day gave us light, we saw the land; but in what latitude we could not tell, for that the officers, whose duty it was to keep the reckoning of the ship, had for many days past totally omitted that part; nor had we seen the sun a great while, to take observations, which (though' a lame excuse) was all they had to say for that omission. But in truth it was evident, that the desperate estate of the ship, and hourly jeopardy of life did make them careless of keeping either log or journal; the thoughts of another account they feared to be at hand, did make them neglect that of the ship as inconsiderable. [Page 19].

About the hours of three or four in the afternoon of the twelfth eve, we were shot in fair to the shore. The evening was clear and calm, the water smooth; the land we saw nearest was some six or seven English miles distant from us, our soundings twenty-five fathoms in good ground for anchor-hold.

These invitations were all attractive to encourage the generality (especially the passengers) to execute what we had resolved on for the shore: but one old officer who was husband for the ship's stores whilst there were any, would not consent on any terms to trust the only anchor that was left us for preservation, out of his sight at sea. His arguments to back his opinion were plausible; as, first, the hazard of losing that only anchor by any sudden storm, bringing with it a necessity to cut or slip, on which every life depended. 2dly. The shortness of the cable, very unfit for anchorage in the ocean: And 3dly. The weakness of the ship's

crew, many dead and fallen over board, and the passengers weakened by hunger, dying every day on the decks, or at the pump, which with great difficulty was kept going, but must not rest.

Against the old man's reasoning was urged the very small remains of bisket, at our short allowance, which would hardly hold a week; the assurance of our loss by famine if we should be forced to sea again by a north-west storm, and the great possibility of finding a harbor to save our ship, with our lives and goods, in some creek on the coast. These last reasons prevailed upon the majority against all negatives: and when the anchor was let loose, mate Putts was ordered to make the first discovery of what we might expect from the nearest land. He took with him twelve sickly passengers, who fancied the shore would cure them; and he carried major Morrison on shore with him in pursuit of such adventures as are next in course to be related; for according to the intelligence that could be got from land, we were to take our measures at sea, either to proceed on in our voyage in that sad condition that has been in some proportion set forth, or to land ourselves, and unload the ship, and try our fortunes amongst the Indians.

In four or five hours time we could discover the boat returning with mate Putts alone for a setter, which we looked upon as a signal of happy success. When he came on board his mouth was full of good tidings, as namely, that he discovered a creek that would harbor our ship and that there was a depth of water on the bar, sufficient for her draught when she was light. That there was excellent fresh water, (a taste whereof Major Morrison had sent me in a bottle.) That the shore swarmed with fowl and that major Morrison stayed behind in expectation of the whole ship's company to follow. [Page 20].

I opened mine ears wide to the motion, and promoted the design of our landing there with all the rhetoric and interest I had. The captain was no less forward for it, hoping thereby to save the lives of the passengers that remained: and that he might not wholly rely on mate Putts's judgment in a matter wherein he was most concerned, he embarked with me in the wherry, with a kinsman of his, and some others; and the seamen were glad of my help to put the boat to shore, my hands having been very well seasoned at the pump, by taking my turn for many weeks at the rate of three hours in twenty four. My passionate desires to be on shore at the fountain head to drink without stint, did not a little quicken me, insomuch that the six or seven miles I rowed on this occasion, were no more than the breadth of the Thames at London, at another time, would have been toilsome to me.

In our passage to the shore, the darkness of the evening made us glad to see the fires of our friends at land, which were not only our beacons to direct us to their company, but were also a comfortable relief to our chill bodies when we come near them, the weather being very cold (as it ever is) the wind north-west on that coast.

As soon as I had set my foot on land, and had rendered thanks to almighty God for opening this door of deliverance to us, after so many rescues even from the jaws of death at sea, major Morrison was pleased to oblige me beyond all requital, in conducting me to the running stream of water, where, without any limitation of short allowance, I might drink my fill. I was glad of so great liberty, and made use of it accordingly, by prostrating myself on my belly, and setting my mouth against the stream, that it might run into my thirsty stomach without stop. The rest of the company was at liberty to use their own methods to quench their thirst; but this I thought the greatest pleasure I ever enjoyed on earth.



After this sweet refreshment, the captain, myself and his kinsman crossed the creek in our wherry, invited thither by the cackling of wild-fowl. The captain had a gun charged, and the moon shining bright in his favor, he killed one duck of the flock that flew over us, which was roasted on a stick out of hand by the seamen, whilst we walked on the shore of the creek for further discovery.

In passing a small gullet we trod on an oyster bank that did happily furnish us with a good addition to our duck. When the cooks had done their parts, we were not long about ours, but fell on without using the ceremony of calling the rest of our company, which would have been no entertainment to so many, the proverb telling us, The fewer the better cheer. The bones, head, legs, and inwards were agreed to be the cook's fees; so we gave God thanks, and returned, to our friends, without making boast of our good fortunes. [Page 21].

Fortified with this repast, we informed our selves of the depth of water at the bar of the creek, in which the captain seemed satisfied, and made shows in all his deportment, of his resolution to discharge the ship there in order to our safety. Towards break of day he asked me in my ear, if I would go back with him on board the ship? I told him, No, because it would be labor lost, in case he would persist in his resolution to do what he pretended, which he ratified again by protestations, and so went off with his kinsman, who had a large coarse cloth gown I borrowed of him to shelter me from the sharpest cold I ever felt. That which had sometimes been a paradox to me, was by this experience made demonstrable, (viz.) That the land on the continent is much colder than that of islands, though' in the same latitude; and the reason is evident to any who shall consider the many accidents on the continent that cool the air by winds that come from the land; as in those parts of America, the mighty towering mountains to the north-west, covered all the year with snow, which does refrigerate the air even in the heat of summer; whereas winds coming from the sea are generally warm: and this hath proved a fatal truth to the inhabitants of Virginia, who, in the south-east winds, have gone to bed in sultry heat and sweat, without any covering, and have awaked in the night stiff and benumbed with cold, without the use of their limbs, occasioned by a shifting of the wind in the night from sea to land.

No sooner had the captain cleared himself of the shore but the daybreak made me see my error in not closing with his motion in my ear. The first object we saw at sea was the ship under sail, standing for the capes with what canvass could be made to serve the turn. It was a very heavy prospect to us who remained (we knew not where) on shore, to see our selves thus abandoned by the ship, and more, to be forsaken by the boat, so contrary to our mutual agreement. Many hours of hard labor and toil were spent before the boat could fetch the ship: and the seamen (whose act it was to set sail without the captain's order, as we were told after) cared not for the boat whilst the wind was large to carry them to the capes. But mate Putts, who was more sober and better natured, discovering the boat from the mizzen-top, lay by till she came with the captain on board. [Page 22].

In this amazement and confusion of mind that no words can express, did our miserable distressed party condole with each other our being so cruelly abandoned and left to the last despairs of human help, or indeed of ever seeing more the face of man. We entered into a sad consultation what course to take; and having, in the first place, by united prayers, implored the protection of Almighty God, and recommended our miserable estate to the same providence which, in so many instances of mercy, had been propitious to us at sea; the whole party desired me to be as it were the father of this distressed family, to advise and conduct them in all things I thought might most tend to our preservation. This

way of government we agreed must necessarily, reside in one, to avoid disputes, and variety of contradictory humours, which would render our deliverance the more impracticable; and it, was thought most reasonable to be placed in me, for the health and strength it had pleased God to preserve unto me above my fellows, more than for any other qualification.

At the time I quitted the ship my servant Thomas Harman, a Dutchman, did, at parting, advertise me (for I left him on board to look to my goods) that, in the bundle I ordered to be carried with me on shore, I should find about thirty bisket cakes which he, by unparalleled frugality, had saved out of his own belly in the great dearth and scarcity we lived in. The thoughts of these biskets entering upon me at the time I was pressed to accept this charge, I thought myself obliged, in Christian equity, to let every one partake of what I had; and so dividing the bread into nineteen parts (which was our number) perhaps I added the fraction to my own share.

It was, to be best of my remembrance, upon the fifth day of January that we entered into this method of life, or rather into an orderly way unto our graves, since nothing but the image of death was represented to us: but that we might use our outmost endeavors to extract all the good we could out of those evil symptoms that did every way seem to confound us, I made a muster of the most able bodies for arms and labor; and, in the first place, I put a fowling-piece into every man's hand that could tell how to use it. Amongst the rest, a young gentleman, Mr. Francis Cary by name, was very helpful to me in the fatigue and active part of this undertaking. He was strong and healthy, and was very ready for any employment I could put upon him. He came recommended to me by Sir Edward Thurlan, his genius leading him rather to a planter's life abroad, than to any course his friends could propose to him in England; and this rough entrance was like to let him know the worst at first. [Page 23].

All our woodmen and fowlers had powder and shot given them, and some geese were killed for supper. Evening came on apace, and our resolution being taken to stay one night more in these quarters, I sent my cousin Cary to head the creek, and make what discovery he could as he passed along the shore, whether of Indians or any other living creatures that were likely to relieve our wants, or end our days. To prepare like men for the latter, we resolved to die fighting, if that should be the case; or if, on the contrary, the Indians should accost us in a mein of amity, then to meet them with all imaginable courtesy, and please them with such trivial presents as they love to deal in, and so engage them into a friendship with us.

My cousin Cary was not absent much above an hour, when we saw him return in a contrary point to that he sallied out upon. His face was clouded with ill news he had to tell us, namely, that we were now residing on an island without any inhabitant, and that he had seen its whole extent, surrounded (as he believed) with water deeper than his head; that he had not seen any native, or any thing in human shape, in all his round, nor any other creature besides the fowls of the air, which he would, but could not, bring unto us.

This dismal success of so unexpected a nature, did startle us more than any single misfortune that had befallen us, and was like to plunge us into utter despair. We beheld each other as miserable wretches sentenced to a lingering death, no man knowing what to propose for prolonging life any longer than he was able to fast. My cousin Cary was gone from us without notice, and we had reason, (for what followed) to believe he was under the conduct of an angel; for we soon saw him return with a cheerful look, his hands carrying something we could not distinguish by any name at a distance; but by nearer approach we were



able to descry they were a parcel of oysters, which, in crossing the island, as he stepped over a small current of water, he trode upon to his hurt; but laying hands on what he felt with his feet, and pulling it with all his force, he found himself possessed of this booty of oysters, which grew in clusters, and were contiguous to a large bank of the same species, that was our staple subsistence whilst we remained there.

Whilst this very cold season continued, great flights of fowl frequented the island, geese, ducks, curlieus, and some of every sort we killed and roasted on sticks, eating all but the feathers. It was the only perquisite belonging to my place of preference to the rest, that the right of carving was annexed to it, wherein, if I was partial to my own interest, it was in cutting the wing as large and full of meat as possible; whereas the rest was measured out as it were with scale and compass.

But as the wind veered to the south-ward, we had greater warmth and fewer fowl, for they would then be gone to colder climates. In their absence we were confined to the oyster bank, and a sort of weed some four inches long, as thick as houseleek, and the only green (except pines) that the island afforded. It was very insipid on the palate; but being boiled with a little pepper (of which one had brought a pound on shore) and helped with five or six oysters, it became a regale for every one in turn. [Page 24].

In quartering our family we did observe the decency of distinguishing sexes: we made a small hut for the poor weak women to be by themselves; our cabin for men was of the same fashion, but much more spacious, as our numbers were. One morning, in walking on the shore by the sea side, with a long gun in my hand loaded with small shot, I fired at a great flight of small birds called Oxeyes, and made great slaughter among them, which gave refreshment to all our company.

But this harvest had a short end; and as the weather by its warmth, chased the fowl to the north, our hunger grew sharper upon us. And in fine, all the strength that remained onto us was employed in a heartless struggling, to spin out life a little longer; for we still deemed our selves doomed to die by famine, from whose sharpest and most immediate darts though' we seemed to be rescued for a small time, by meeting these contingent helps on shore, yet still we apprehended (and that on too great probability) they only served to reprieve us for a little longer day of execution, with all the dreadful circumstances of a lingering death.

For the south-west winds that had carried away the fowl, brought store of rain; which meeting with a spring-tide, our chief magazine, the oyster bank, was overflowing; and as they became more accessible, our bodies also decayed so sensibly, that we could hardly pull them out of their muddy beds they grew on. And from this time forward we rarely saw the fowl; they now grew shy and kept aloof when they saw as contriving against their lives.

Add to this, our guns most of them unfixed and out of order, and our powder much decayed, insomuch that nothing did now remain to prolong life, but what is counted rather sauce to whet, than substance to satisfy the appetite; I mean the oysters, which were not easily gotten by our crazy bodies after the quantity was spent that lay most commodious to be reached, and which had fed us for the first six days we had been on the island. And thus we wished every day to be the last of our lives (if God had so pleased) so hopeless and desperate was our condition, all expectation of human succour being vanished and gone. [Page 25].

Of the three weak women before-mentioned, one had the envied happiness to die about this time; and it was my advice to the survivors, who were following her apace, to endeavor their own preservation by converting, her dead carcass into food, as they did to good effect. The same counsel was embraced by those of our sex: the living fed upon the dead; four of our company having the happiness to end their miserable lives on Sunday night the ______ day of January. Their chief distemper, 'tis true, was hunger; but it pleased God to hasten their exit by an immoderate access of cold, caused by a most terrible storm of hail and snow at north-west, on the Sunday aforesaid, which did not only dispatch those four to their long homes, but did sorely threaten all that remained alive, to perish by the same fate.

Great was the toil that lay on my hands (as the strongest to labor) to get fuel together sufficient for our preservation. In the first place I divested myself of my great gown, which I spread at large, and extended against the wind in nature of a screen, having first shifted our quarters to the calmest commodious place that could be found to keep us, as much as possible, from the inclemency of that prodigious storm.

Under the shelter of this traverse I took as many of my comrades as could be comprehended in so small a space; whereas those who could not partake of that accommodation, and were enabled to make provision for them, were forced to suffer for it. And it was remarkable, that notwithstanding all the provision that could possibly be made against the sharpness of this cold, either by a well-burning fire consisting of two or three loads of wood, or shelter of this great gown to the windward, we could not be warm. That side of our wearing cloths was singed and burnt which lay towards the flames, whilst the other side that was from the fire, became frozen and congealed. Those who lay to the leeward of the flame, could not stay long to enjoy the warmth so necessary to life, but were forced to quit and be gone to avoid suffocation by the smoke and flame.

When the day appeared, and the sun got up to dissipate the clouds, with downcast looks and dejected, the survivors of us entered into a final deliberation of what remained to be done on our parts (besides our prayers to Almighty God) to spin out a little longer time of life, and wait a further providence from heaven for our better relief. There were still some hands that retained vigor, though' not in proportion to those difficulties we were to encounter, which humanly did seem insuperable. The unhappy circumstance of our being cooped up in an island, was that which took from us all probable hopes of escaping this terrible death that did threaten us every hour. Major Morrison, on whose counsel I had reason to rely most, was extremely decayed in his strength, his legs not being able to support him. It was a wonderful mercy that mine remained in competent strength, for our common good, which I resolved, by God's help, to employ for that end to the last gasp. [Page 26].

In this last resolution we had to make, I could not think on any thing worthy my proposal, but by an attempt to cross the creek, and swim to the main (which was not above an hundred yards over) and being there to coast along the woods to the southwest (which was the bearing of Virginia) until I should meet Indians, who would either relieve or destroy us. I fancied the former would be our lot when they should see our conditions, and that no hurt was intended to them; or if they should prove inhuman, and of a bloody nature, and would not give us quarter, why even in that case it would be worth this labor of mine to procure a sudden period to all our miseries.

I opened my thoughts to this purpose to the company, who were sadly surprised at the motion; but being fully convinced in their judgment, that this was the only course that could be depended on (humanly speaking) for our relief, they all agreed it must be done.



To fortify me for this expedition, it was necessary that some provision should be made for a daily support to me in this my peregrination. Our choice was small; our only friend the oyster bank was all we had to rely on; which being well stewed in their own liquor, and put up into bottles, I made no doubt, by God's blessing, but that two of them well filled, would suffice to prolong my life in moderate strength, until I had obtained my end. To accomplish this design, my cousin Cary labored hard for oysters, hoping to make one in the adventure.

About the ninth day of our being in the island, I fell to my oyster-cookery, and made a good progress that very day; when in the heat of my labor my cousin Cary brought me word, that he had just in that instant seen Indians walking on the main. I suspended my cookery out of hand, and hastened with all possible speed to be an eye-witness of that happy intelligence; but with all the haste I could make I could see no such thing, but judged it a chimera that proceeded from some operation in my cousin's fancy, who was more than ordinary of a sanguine nature, which made him see (as it were by enchantment) things that were not, having many times been deluded (as I judged) by the same deception.

Defeated in this manner of my hopes to see Indians without the pains of seeking them, I returned to my work, and continued at it till one bottle was full, and myself tired: wherefore, that I might be a little recreated, I took a gun in my hand; and hearing the noise of geese on our shore, I approached them privately, and had the good hap to be the death of one. This goose, now in my possession without witnesses, I resolved to eat alone (deducting the head, bones, guts, &c. which were the cook's fees) hoping thereby to be much the better enabled to swim the creek, and perform the work I had upon my hand. I hung my goose upon the twist of a tree in a shrubby part of the wood, whilst I went to call aside our cook with his broach, and a coal of fire to begin the roast. But when we came to the place of execution, my goose was gone all but the head, the body stolen by wolves, which the Indians told us after, do abound greatly in that island. [Page 27].

The loss of this goose, which my empty stomach looked for with no small hopes of satisfaction, did vex me heartily. I wished I could have taken the thief of my goose to have served him in the same kind, and to have taken my revenge in the law of retaliation. But that which troubled me more, was an apprehension that came into my mind, that this loss had been the effect of divine justice on me, for designing to deal unequally with the rest of my fellow-sufferers; which I thought, at first blush, looked like a breach of trust: but then again when I considered the equity of the thing, that I did it merely to enable myself to attain their preservation, and which otherwise I could not have done, I found I could absolve myself from any guilt of that kind. Whatever I suffered in this disappointment, the cook lost not all his fees; the head and neck remained for him on the tree.

Being thus over-reached by the wolf, it was time to return to my cookery, in order to my sally out of the island; for I had little confidence in the notice frequently brought me of more and more Indians seen on the other side, since my own eyes could never bear witness of their being there.

The next morning, being the ninth or tenth of our being there, I fell to work afresh, hoping to be ready to begin my journey that day; and being very busy, intelligence was brought, that a canoe was seen to lie on the broken ground to the south of our island, which was not discovered till now, since our being there: but this I thought might be a mistake cast in the same mould of many others that had deceived those discoverers, who fancied all things real according to their own wishes. But when it

was told me, That Indians had been at the poor women's cabin in the night, and had given them shellfish to eat, that was a demonstration of reality beyond all suspicion. I went immediately to be informed from themselves, and they both avowed it for truth, showing the shells (the like whereof I ne'er had seen) and this I took for proof of what they said. [Page 28].

The further account these women gave of the Indians, was, that they pointed to the south-east with their hands, which they know not how to interpret, but did imagine by their several gestures, they would be with them again tomorrow. Their pointing to the south-east was like to be the time they would come, meaning nine o'clock to be their hour, where the sun will be at that time. Had the women understood their language they could not have learned the time of the day by any other computation than pointing at the sun. It is all the clock they have for the day, as the coming and going of the Cabuncks (the geese) is their almanack or prognostick for the winter and summer seasons.

This news gave us all new life, almost working miracles amongst us, by making those who desponded, and totally yielded themselves up to the weight of despair, and lay down with intent never more to rise again, to take up their beds and walk. This friendly charitable visit of the Indians did also put a stop to my preparations to seek them, who had so humanely prevented me, by their seeking ways to preserve and save our lives.

Instead of those preparations for my march which had cost me so much pains, I passed my time now in contriving the fittest posture our present condition would allow us to put on when these angels of light should appear again with the glad tidings of our relief; and the result was, that every able man should have his gun lying by his side, laden with shot, and as fit for use as possible, but not to be handled unless the Indians came to us like enemies (which was very unlikely, the premises considered) and then to sell our lives at as dear a rate as we could; but if they came in an amicable posture, then would we meet them unarmed, cheerfully, which the Indians like, and hate to see a melancholy face.

In these joyful hopes of unexpected deliverance by these Indians, did we pass the interval of their absence? Every eye looked sharply out when the sun was at south-east, to peep thro' the avenues of the wood to discover the approaches of our new friends. When the sun came to the south we thought our selves forgotten by them, and began to doubt the worst, as losing gamesters, at play for their last estate, suspect some stabcast to defeat the hopes of the fairest game. We feared some miscarriage, either from their inconstancy by change of their mind, or that some unlooked-for misfortune that our evil fates reserved for us, had interposed for our ruin.

Scouts were sent out to the right and left hands, without discovery of any body all the forenoon: and then, considering our case admitted no delay, I began to resume my former resolution of swimming to them that would not come to us. But how wholesome so ever this counsel might seem in itself, it was most difficult to be put in practice, in regard of the cold time. [Page 29].

The northerly wind that in these climates does blow very cold in the heat of summer, does much more distemper the air in the winter season (as our poor comrades felt that Sunday night to their cost) and did send so cold a gale upon the surface of the water in the creek I was to pass, that, in the general opinion of all the concerned, it was not a thing to be attempted; and that if I did, I must surely perish in the act. I was easily persuaded to forbear an action so dangerous, and the rather, because I



verily believed the Indians would bring us off, if our patience would hold out.

About the hours of two or three o'clock it pleased God to change the face of our condition for the best; for whilst I was busy at the fire in preparations to wait on them, the Indians, who had placed themselves behind a very great tree, discovered their faces with most cheerful smiles, without any kind of arms, or appearance of evil design; the whole number of them (perhaps twenty or thirty in all) consisting of men, women and children; all that could speak accosting us with joyful countenances, shaking hands with every one they met. The words Ny Top, often repeated by them, made us believe they bore a friendly signification, as they were soon interpreted to signify my friend.

After many salutations and Ny Tops interchanged, the night approaching, we fell to parley with each other; but performed it in signs more confounded and unintelligible than any other conversation I ever met withal; as hard to be interpreted as if they had expressed their thoughts in the Hebrew or Chaldean tongues.

They did me the honor to make all applications to me, as being of largest dimensions, and equipped in a camlet coat glittering with galoon lace of gold and silver, it being generally true, that where knowledge informs not, the habit qualifies.

The ears of Indian corn they gave us for present sustenance, needed no other interpreter to let them know how much more acceptable it was to us than the sight of dead and living corpses, which raised great compassion in them, especially in the women, who are observed to be of a soft tender nature.

One of them made me a present of the leg of a swan, which I eat as privately as it was given me, and thought it so much the more excellent, by how much it was larger than the greatest limb of any fowl I ever saw.

The Indians stayed with us about two hours, and parted not without a new appointment to see us again the next day: and the hour we were to expect them by their pointing to the sun, was to be at two o'clock in the afternoon. I made the chief of them presents of ribbon and other slight trade, which they loved, designing, by mutual endearment, to let them see, it would gratify their interest as well as their charity, to treat us well. Ha-na Haw was their parting word, which is farewell, pointing again at the place where the sun would be at our next meeting. We took leave in their own words Ha-na Haw. [Page 30].

The going away of the Indians, and leaving us behind, was a separation hard to be born by our hungry company, who nevertheless had received a competent quantity of corn and bread to keep us till they returned to do better things for our relief; we did not fail to give glory to God for our approaching deliverance, and the joy we conceived in our minds in the sense of so great a mercy, kept us awake all the night, and was a cordial to the sick and weak to recover their health and strength.

The delay of the Indians coming next day, beyond their set time, we thought an age of tedious years: At two o'clock we had no news of them, but by attending their own time with a little patience, we might see a considerable number of them, men, women, and children, all about our huts, with recruits of bread and corn to stop every mouth. Many of them desired beads and little truck they use to deal in, as exchange for what they gave us; and we as freely gave them what we had brought on shore; but to such of us as gave them nothing, the Indians failed not however to give them bread for nothing.

One old man or their company, who seemed, by the preference they gave him, to be the most considerable of the party, applied himself to me by gestures and signs, to learn something, (if possible) of our country, and occasion of the sad posture he saw us in, to the end that he might inform his master, the king of Kickotamk, (on whose territories we stood) and dispose him to succor us, as we had need.

I made return to him in many vain words, and in as many insignificant signs as himself had made to me, and neither of us one jot the wiser. The several nonplus's we both were at in striving to be better understood, afforded so little of edification to either party, that our time was almost spent in vain. It came at last into my head, that I had long since read Mr. Smith's travels thro' those parts of America, and that the word Werowance (a word frequently pronounced by the old man) was in English the king. That word, spoken by me, with strong emphasis, together with the motions of my body, speaking my desire of going to him, was very pleasing to the old man, who thereupon embraced me with more than common kindness, and by all demonstrations of satisfaction, did show that he understood my meaning. This one word was all the Indian I could speak, which (like a little armor well placed) contributed to the saving of our lives. [Page 31].

In order to what was next to be done, he took me by the hand and led me to the sea side, where I embarked with himself and one more Indian in a canoe, that had brought him there, which the third man rowed over to that broken ground, where, not long before, we made discovery of a canoe newly laid there, and (as they told us) was lodged there on purpose to be ready for our transport, at such time as they thought fit to fetch us off; and the reason of their taking me with them was to help launch this weighty embarkation, which was very heavy for its proportion, as being made of the body of an oak or pine, some twenty-two foot in length, hollowed like a pig-trough, which is the true description of a canoe. The manner of its being put into motion is very particular; the laborers with long booms place their feet on the starboard and larboard sides of the boat, and with this fickle footing do they heave it forward.




Figure 18.8: Indians building a burn-out canoe.

I cannot omit a passage of one Major Stephens, who had been an officer in the late civil war, under Sir William Waller, and was now one of our fellow-sufferers. He could not be persuaded by any means to give his vote for prosecuting the way we were in for our relief, but differed as much in judgment with us, in this our design of going to the king of this



country, as he had done in England, by engaging against his natural sovereign; he cried out these rogues would draw us into their power, and take away our lives, advising, rather than to put our trust in this king, we should put ourselves into one of these canoes, and taking advantage of the calm time, we should try to get the north cape.

His fears and objections were so unreasonable, that they were not worth an answer, and his project of going thus by sea was so ridiculous, that it did exceed all chimera's of knight-errantry, and his apprehending the king would ensnare us, we all esteemed vain, as nothing could be more childish: We had been in the king's power (though we knew it not) ever since we set foot on that ground, so that had his mind been that way bent, he need use no other stratagem to end our lives, than to have forborn the sending us relief; every one dissented to the main project, and I did unfeigned profess, for my own part, that I would much rather expose my life to the honor of a king (though' never so mean) than to the billows of the sea, in such a bottom; which would be to tempt God to destroy us, and punish our presumption by his justice, at the same time that he was saving us by a miracle of his mercy.

I should not have remembered this passage of Major Stephens, had he only showed his antipathy in this single instance, but because he repeated the rancor of his mind, in two other very small occasions, which will follow, 'tis just that the malignity of so ill an humor should suffer some reprimand. [Page 32].

The canoes being fitted to take us in and waft us to the main, I made a fair muster of the remnant we had to carry off, and found we wanted six of the number we brought on shore (viz.) four men and two women: five of those six we knew were dead, but missing one of our living women, we made the Indians understand the same, who as readily made us know that she was in their thoughts, and should be cared for as soon as we were settled in our quarters.

In passing the creek that was to lead us to an honest fisherman's house, we entered a branch of it to the southward, which was the road-way to it. The tide was going out, and the water very shoal, which gave occasion to any one that, had a knife, to treat him with oysters all the way. At the head of that branch we were able in a short time to discover that heaven of happiness where our most courteous host did, with a cheerful countenance, receive and entertain us. Several fires were kindled out of hand, our arms and powder were laid up in safety, and divers earthen pipkins were put to boil with such varieties as the season would afford. Every body had something or other to defend and save them from the cold; and my obligation to him, by a peculiar care that he had of me, exceeded all the rest. I had one entire side of the fire, with a large platform to repose on, to myself; furs and deer skins to cover my body, and support my head, with a priority of respect and friendly usage, which, to my great trouble, I was not able to deserve at his hands, by any requital then in my power to return.

Our kind entertainment in the house of this poor fisherman, had so many circumstances of hearty compassion and tenderness in every part of it, that as it ought to be a perpetual motive to engage all of us who enjoyed the benefit of it, to a daily acknowledgement of the Almighty's goodness for conducting us in this manner by his immediate hand, out of our afflictions, so may it ever be looked upon as a just reproach to Christians, who, on all our sea-coasts, are so far from affording succor to those who, by shipwreck and misfortunes of the sea, do fall into their power, that they treat with all inhuman savage barbarity, those unhappy souls whom God hath thus afflicted, seizing on their goods as their proper perquisites, which the waves of the sea (by divine providence) would cast upon the shore for the true proprietors; and many times

dispatching them out of the world to silence complaints, and to prevent all after-reckonings. And the better to entitle themselves to what they get in this way of rapine, they wickedly call such devilish acquests by the sacred name of God's good, prophaning and blaspheming at the same time that holy name, as they violate all the laws of hospitality: [Page 33] and human society: whereas, on the contrary, our charitable host, influenced only by natural law, without the least show of coveting any thing we had, or prospect of requital in the future, did not only treat in this manner our persons, but did also, with as much honesty, secure for us our small stores of guns, powder, &c. as if he had read and understood the duty of the gospel, or had given his only child as a hostage to secure his dealing justly with us; so that I can never sufficiently applaud the humanity of this Indian, nor express the high contentment that I enjoyed in this poor man's cottage, which was made of nothing but mat and reeds, and bark of trees fixed to poles. It had a loveliness and symmetry in the air of it, so pleasing to the eye, and refreshing to the mind, that neither the splendor of the Escurial, nor the glorious appearance of Versailles were able to stand in competition with it. We had a boiled swan for supper, which gave plentiful repasts to all our upper mess.

Our bodies thus refreshed with meat and sleep, comforted with fires, and secured from all the changes and inclemencies of that sharp piercing cold season, we thought the morning (though' clad in sunshine) did come too fast upon us. Breakfast was liberally provided and set before us, our arms faithfully delivered up to my order for carriage; and thus in readiness to set forward; we put our selves in a posture to proceed to the place where the king resided. The woman left behind at the island, had been well looked to, and was now brought off to the care of her comrade that came with us; neither of them in a condition to take a journey, but they were carefully attended and nourished in this poor man's house, till such time as boats came to fetch them to Virginia, where they did soon arrive in perfect health, and lived (one or both of them) to be well married, and to bear children, and to subsist in as plentiful a condition as they could wish.

In beginning our journey through the woods, we had not advanced half a mile till we heard a great noise of men's voices, directed to meet and stop our further passage. These were several Indians sent by the king to order us back to our quarters. Major Stephens (not cured of his jealous humor by the experience of what he felt the night before) took this alarm in a very bad sense, and as much different from the rest of the company as in his former fit. He was again deluded with a strong fancy, that these violent motions in the Indians who approached us, were the effect of some sudden change in their counsels to our detriment, and that nothing less than our perdition could be the consequence thereof, which he feared would immediately be put in practice by the clamorous men that made such haste to meet us, and (as he would apprehend) to kill and destroy us. [Page 34].

This passion of Major Stephens, cast in the same mould with that other he discovered in the island, had not (as we all thought and told him) whereon to raise the least foundation of terror to affright a child; for besides the earnest we had received of their good intentions the night before, these men who came so fast upon us, were all unarmed; nor was it likely, that king would now possibly imbrew his hands in our blood, and provoke he knew not how powerful a nation to destroy him, after such kind caresses, and voluntary expressions of a temper very contrary to such cruelty. In fine, we saw no cause in all the carriage of the Indians on which I could ground any fear, and therefore I longed with all impatience to see this king, and to enjoy the plenty of his table, as we quickly did.



When these Indians came up to us, this doubt was soon cleared. The good-natured king being informed of our bodily weakness, and inability to walk thro' the woods in his house, on foot (which might be about four miles distant from our setting out) had a real tenderness for us, and sent canoes to carry us to the place nearest his house, by the favor of another branch of the same creek; and to the end we might take no vain steps (as we were going to do) and exhaust our strength to no purpose, these Indians made this noise to stop us.

We entered the canoes that were manned, and lay ready to receive us. We had a pleasant passage in the shallow water, eat oysters all the way: for although' the breakfast we had newly made, might well excuse a longer abstinence than we were like to be put to, our arrear to our stomachs was so great, that all we swallowed was soon concocted, and our appetite still fresh and craving more.

Having passed this new course for some three English miles in another branch of the creek, our landing place was contrived to be near the house of the queen then in waiting. She was a very plain lady to see to, not young, nor yet ill-favored. Her complexion was of a sad white: but the measures of beauty in those parts where they are exposed to the scorching sun from their infancy are not taken from red and white, but from colors that will better lie upon their tawny skins, as hereafter will be seen.

The beauty of this queen's mind (which is more permanent than that of color) was conspicuous in her charity and generosity to us poor starved weather-beaten creatures, who were the object of it. A mat was spread without the house, upon the ground, furnished with Pone, Hominy, oysters, and other things. The queen made us sit down and eat, with gestures that showed more of courtesy than majesty, but did speak as hearty welcome as could in silence be expected: and these were the graces that, in our opinion, transcended all other beauties in the world, and did abundantly supply all defects of outward appearance in the person and garb of the queen. The southerly wind made the season tolerable; but that lasted but little, the north-west gale coming violently on us again. [Page 35].

When this collation of the queen was at an end, we took leave of her majesty with all the shows of gratitude that silence knew how to utter. We were now within half an hour's walk of the king's mansion, which we soon discovered by the smoke, and saw it was made of the same stuff with the other houses from which we had newly parted, namely, of mat and reed. Locust posts sunk in the ground at corners and partitions was the strength of the whole fabric. The roof was tied fast to the body with a sort of strong rushes that grow there, which supplied the place of nails and pins, mortises and tenants.

The breadth of this palace was about eighteen or twenty foot, the length about twenty yards. The only furniture was several platforms for lodging, each about two yards long and more, placed on both sides of the house, distant from each other about five foot; the space in the middle was the chimney, which had a hole in the roof over it, to receive as much of the smoke as would naturally repair to it; the rest we shared amongst us, which was the greatest part; and the sitters divided to each side, as our soldiers do in their corps de guarde.

Fourteen great fires, thus situated, were burning all at once. The king's apartment had a distinction from the rest; it was twice as long, and the bank he sat on was adorned with deer skins finely dressed, and the best furs of otter and beaver that the country did produce.

The fire assigned to us was suitable to our number, to which we were conducted, without intermixture of any Indian but such as came to do us offices of friendship. There we were permitted to take our rest until the king pleased to enter into communication with us. Previous to which he sent his daughter, a well-favored young girl of about ten or twelve years old, with a great wooden bowl full of hominy (which is the corn of that country, beat and boiled to mash). She did in a most obliging manner give me the first taste of it, which I would have handed to my next neighbor after I had eaten, but the young princess interposed her hand, and taking the bowl out of mine, delivered it to the same party I aimed to give it, and so to all the rest in order. Instead of a spoon there was a well-shaped muscle-shell that accompanied the bowl. [Page 36].

The linen of that country grows ready made on the branches of oak trees (or pine) the English call it moss. It is like the threads of unwhited cotton-yarn raveled, and hangs in parcels on the lower boughs, divine providence having so ordered it for the conveniency and sustenance of the deer, which is all the food they can get in times of snow. It is very soft, sweet and cleanly, and fit for the purpose of wiping clean the hands, and doing the duty of napkins.

About three hours after this meal was ended the king sent to have me come to him. He called me Ny a Mutt, which is to say, my brother, and compelled me to sit down on the same bank with himself, which I had reason to look upon as a mighty favor. After I had sat there about half an hour, and taken notice of many earnest discourses and repartees betwixt the king and his crotemen (so the Indians call the king's council) I could plainly discover, that the debate they held was concerning our adventure and coming there. To make it more clear, the king addressed himself to me with many gestures of his body, his arms displayed in various postures, to explain what he had in his mind to utter for my better under standing. By all which motions I was not edified in the least, nor could imagine what return to make by voice or sign, to satisfy the king's demands in any thing that related to the present straights of our condition. In fine, I admired their patient sufferance of my dullness to comprehend what they meant, and showed myself to be troubled at it; which being perceived by the king, he turned all into mirth and jollity, and never left till he made me laugh with him, though' I knew not why.

I took that occasion to present the king with a sword and long shoulderbelt, which he received very kindly; and to witness his gracious acceptance, he threw off his Mach coat (or upper covering of skin) stood upright on his bank, and, with my aid, did accoutre his naked body with his new harness, which had no other apparel to adorn it, besides a few skins about his loins to cover his nakedness. In this dress he seemed to be much delighted; but to me he appeared a figure of such extraordinary shape, with sword and belt to set it off, that he needed now no other art to stir me up to laughter and mirth, than the sight of his own proper person. [Page 37].

Having made this short acquaintance with the king, I took leave, and returned to my comrades. In passing the spaces betwixt fire and fire, one space amongst the rest was blinded with a traverse of mat; and by the noise I heard from thence, like the beating of hemp, I took it to be some kind of elaboratory. To satisfy a curiosity I had to be more particularly informed, I edged close to the mat; and, by standing on tiptoe for a full discovery, I saw a sight that gave me no small trouble. The same specifically queen (whose courtesy for our kind usage the other day, can never be enough applauded) was now employed in the hard servile labor of beating corn for the king's dinner, which raised the noise that made me thus inquisitive. I wished myself in her place for her ease: but the queens of that country do esteem it a privilege to serve



their husbands in all kind of cookery, which they would be as loath to lose, as any Christian queen would be to take it from them.

Several Indians of the first rank followed me to our quarters, and used their best endeavors to sift something from us that might give them light into knowing what we were. They sought many ways to make their thoughts intelligible to us, but still we parted without knowing what to fix upon, or how to steer our course in advance of our way to Virginia.

In this doubtful condition we thought it reasonable to fall upon a speedy resolution what was next to be done on our parts, in order to the accomplishment of our voyage by land, which we hoped (by the divine aid) we might be able to effect after a little more refreshment by the plenty of victuals allowed us by the king, who was no less indulgent and careful to feed and caress us, than if we had been his children.

Towards morning we were treated with a new regale brought to us by the same fair hand again. It was a sort of spoon-meat, in color and taste not unlike to almond-milk tempered and mixed with boiled rice. The ground still was Indian corn boiled to a pap, which they call Hominy, but the ingredient which performed the milky part, was nothing but dry pokickery nuts, beaten shells and all to powder, and they are like our walnuts, but thicker shelled, and the kernel sweeter; but being beaten in a mortar, and put into a tray, hollowed in the middle to make place for fair water, no sooner is the water poured into the powder, but it rises again white and creamish; and after a little ferment it does partake so much of the delicate taste of the kernel of that nut, that it becomes a rarity to a miracle.

Major Morrison, who had been almost at death's door, found himself abundantly refreshed and comforted with this delicacy; he wished the bowl had been a fathom deep, and would say, when his stomach called on him for fresh supplies, that if this princess royal would give him his fill of that food, he should soon recover his strength. [Page 38].

Our bodies growing vigorous with this plenty, we took new courage, and resolved (as many as were able) to attempt the finding out of Virginia. We guessed the distance could not be great, and that it bore from us South by West to South West. Our ignorance of the latitude we were in was some discouragement to us; but we were confident, from what the seamen discoursed; we were to the southward of the Menados, then a Dutch plantation, now New York: Fair weather and full stomachs made us willing to be gone. To that end we laid out for a quantity of pone; and for our surer conduct we resolved to procure an Indian to be our pilot through the wilderness, for we were to expect many remora's in our way, by swamps and creeks, with which all those sea-coasts do abound.

The king remarking our more than ordinary care to procure more bread than amounted to our usual expense gathered thence our design to leave him, and shift for ourselves. To prevent the rashness and folly of such attempt, he made use of all his silent rhetoric to put us out of conceit of such design, and made us understand the peril and difficulty of it by many obstacles we must meet with. He showed us the danger we should expose ourselves unto, by rain and cold, swamps and darkness, unless we were conducted by other skill than we could pretend to: He pointed to his fires and shocks of corn, of which he had enough, and made it legible to us in his countenance, that we were welcome to it. All the signs the king made upon this occasion, we were content to understand in the best sense; and taking for granted our sojourning there was renewed to another day, we retired to our quarters.

About midnight following, the king sent to invite me to his fire. He placed me near him as before, and in the first place showing me quarters of a lean doe, new brought in. He gave me a knife to cut what part of it I pleased, and then pointing to the fire, I inferred, I was left to my own discretion for the dressing of it. I could not readily tell how to show my skill in the cookery of it, with no better ingredients then appeared in sight; and so did no more but cut a collop and cast it on the coals. His majesty laughed at my ignorance, and to instruct me better, he broached the collop on a long skewer, thrust the sharp end into the ground (for there was no hearth but what nature made) and turning sometimes one side, sometimes the other, to the fire, it became fit in short time to be served up, had there been a dining-room of state such as that excellent king deserved.

I made tender of it first to the king, and then to his nobles, but all refused, and left all to me, who gave God and the king thanks for that great meal. The rest of the doe was cut in pieces, stewed in a pipkin, and then put into my hands to dispose of amongst my company. [Page 39].

As soon as I had dispatched this midnight venison feast, and sent the rest to my comrades, the king was greatly desirous to make me comprehend, by our common dialect of signs and motions the ingenious stratagem by which they use to take their deer in the winter season, especially when the surface of the earth is covered with snow. He showed me in the first place a small leather thong, in which (said he) any kind of deer should be invited to hamper himself and he fast tied on his back, until the engineer (or some body else for him) should take quiet possession of him. I could not conceive the particular structure of this machine, so as to direct the making of it elsewhere; but thus much in the general I did understand; they would fasten a pine green branch at the end of a pole (such as hops grow upon) which should lie athwart an oak, like the pole of a turner's lath, and the green hanging dingle-dangle at the pole end, fastened by a string; it should be set at a height for a deer to reach, but not without mounting and resting on his hinder legs, that so in pulling the branch, as at a trigger, the machine discharging, his heels are struck up to fly in the air, and there he remains on his back so straightly hampered, that the least child may approach to touch and take him.

Before I parted, the king attacked me again, with reiterated attempts to be understood, and I thought by this three or four day's conversation, I had the air of his expression much more clear and intelligible than at first. His chief drift for the first essay seemed to be a desire to know which way we were bound, whether north or south; to which I pointed to the south. This gave him much satisfaction, and there-upon steps in the little grotman before described, who by the motion of his hand seemed to crave my regard to what he was going about. He took up a stick, with which he made divers circles by the fire-side, and then holding up his finger to procure my attention, he gave to every hole a name; and it was not hard to conceive that the several holes were to supply the place of a sea-chart, showing the situation of all the most noted Indian territories that lay to the southward of Kickotank.

That circle that was most southerly, he called Accomack, which, though' he pronounced with a different accent from us, I laid hold on that word with all demonstrations of satisfaction I could express, giving them to understand, that was the place to which I had a desire to be conducted. [Page 40].

The poor king was in a strange transport of joy to see me receive satisfaction, and did forthwith cause a lusty young man to be called to him, to whom, by the earnestness of his motions, he seemed to give ample instructions to do something for our service, but what it was we



were not yet able to resolve. In two or three days time, seeing no effect of what he had so seriously said, we began again to despond, and did therefore resume our former thoughts of putting ourselves in posture to be gone; but the king seeing us thus ready at every turn to leave him, showed in his looks a more than ordinary resentment; still describing (as he could) the care he had taken for us, and impossibility of accomplishing our ends by ourselves, and that we should surely faint in the way and die without help, if we would not be ruled by him.

He showed me again his stores of corn, and made such reiterated signs, by the cheerfulness of his countenance, that we should not want, whilst he had such a plenty, as made us lay aside all thoughts of stirring till he said the word. But as oft as he looked or pointed to the coast of Accomack, he would shake his head, with abundance of grimaces, in dislike of our design to go that way till he saw it good we should do so. I was abundantly convinced of our folly in the resolution we were ready to take of going away without better information of the distance from Accomack, and way that led to it; and having so frank a welcome where we were, we resolved to stay till the king should approve of our departure, which be was not able to determine till the messenger came back, that he had sent to Accomack, who, it now seemed more plainly, was dispatched upon my owning that place to be our home, though' we knew it not from any cause we could rely upon, before we saw the effect.

While we lived in this suspense, the king had a great mind to see our fire-arms, and to be acquainted with the use and nature of them. That which best did please his eye I presented to him, and showed him how to load and discharge it. He was very shy at first essay, fearing it might hurt him, but I made him stand upon his lodging place, and putting him in a posture to give fire, he presented the mouth of his gun to the chimney hole, and so let fly. The combustible nature of the king's palace not well considered, the fabric was endangered by the king's own hand, for the flashing of the powder having taken hold of the roof at the smoke-hole, all was in a flame; but a nimble lad or two ran up to quench it, and did soon extinguish it without considerable damage to the building, which was of mat and boughs of oak as aforesaid. [Page 41].

The king's eldest son, of about eighteen years of age, was hugely enamored with our guns, and looked so wistfully on me, when he saw what wonders they would do, that I could not forbear presenting him with a birding-piece. Some of our company, who knew that by the laws of Virginia, it was criminal to furnish the Indians with fire-arms, gave me caution in this case, but I resolved, for once, to borrow a point of that law; for though' it might be of excellent use in the general, yet as our condition was, I esteemed it a much greater crime to deny those Indians any thing that was in our power, than the penalty of that law could amount to.

Father and son abundantly gratified in this manner, the king thought himself largely requited for the cost we put him to in our entertainment. I taught his son to shoot at fowls, to charge his gun and clean it, insomuch that in a few minutes, he went among the flocks of geese, and firing at random he did execution on one of them to his great joy, and returned to his father with the game in his hand, with such celerity, as if he had borrowed wings of the wind.

About three o'clock this afternoon, the king was pleased in great condescension to honor me with a visit, a favor which I may (without vanity) assume to myself, and my better habit, from the many particular applications that he made to me, exclusive of the rest of the company. He thought I was too melancholy, (for the Indians, as has been observed, are great enemies to that temper) and showed me by his own

cheerful looks, what humor he would have put me on; he would not have me in the least apprehensive of wanting any thing his country afforded, as his mien and gesture witnessed; and for the higher proof of his reality, he found me out a divertissement, that was very extraordinary. He came at this time attended by his young daughter, who had done us the good offices before mentioned, and having first by kind words and pleasant gestures given us renewed assurance of hearty welcome, he singled me out, and pointed with his hand to a way he would have me take, but whither, or to what end, I was at liberty to guess; upon that he produced his little daughter for my conductrix to the place to which I should go, and showed his desire that I should follow her where-ever she should lead me.

Major Stephens, not yet enough convinced of the Indians fidelity, would have discouraged me from leaving the company in that manner, unreasonably fancying that this was a contrivance in the king to take away my life in a private way; but this I thought did so much out-strip all his other senseless jealousies, that after I had acknowledged the obligation I had to his care of my person, his needless caution had no other effect on me than to turn it into ridicule. These inordinate fears of this major in three foregoing instances, might (I confess) have been very well omitted, as not worthy the mention, and so they should have been, had his humor and constitution in prosperous times been any way suitable to this wary temper; but because his habits on shore were scandalously vicious his mouth always belching oaths, and his tongue proving him the vainest hector I had seen, I thought it was pity to lose such a strong confirmation of that known truth, (viz.) That true innate courage does seldom reside in the heart of a quarrelling and talking hector. [Page 42].

The weather (as I have said) was excessive cold, with frost, and the winds blowing very fresh upon my face, it almost stopped my breath. The late condition I had been in, under a roof, with great fires, and much smoke, did conduce to make me the more sensible of the cold air: but in less than half an hour that pain was over; we were now in sight of the house whereto we were bound, and the lady of the place was ready to receive us, (who proved to be the mother of my conductrix) and to show me my apartment in the middle of her house, which had the same accommodation to sit and rest upon, as before has been described in other instances.

The lusty rousing fire, prepared to warm me, would have been noble entertainment of itself, but attended (as it was quickly) with good food for the belly, made it to be that complete good cheer, I only aimed at; a wild turkey boiled, with oysters, was preparing for my supper, which, when it was ready, was served up in the same pot that boiled it. It was a very savory mess, stewed with muscles, and I believe would have passed for a delicacy at any great table in England, by palates more competent to make a judgment than mine, which was now more gratified with the quantity than the quality of what was before me.

This queen was also of the same mould of her majesty whom we first met at our landing place, somewhat ancient (in proportion to the king's age) but so gentle and compassionate, as did very bountifully requite all defects of nature; she passed some hours at my fire, and was very desirous to know the occasion that brought us there (as her motion and the emphasis of her words did show) but I had small hopes to satisfy her curiosity therein, after so many vain attempts to inform the king in that matter. In fine, I grew sleepy, and about nine o'clock every one retired to their quarters, separated from each other by traverses of mat, which (besides their proper virtue) kept the ladies from any immodest attempts, as secure as if they had been bars of iron.



As soon as the day peeped in, I went out and felt the same cold as yesterday, with the same wind, N. W. I was not forward to quit a warm quarter, and a frank entertainment, but my young governess, who had her father's orders for direction, knew better than myself what I was to do: she put herself in a posture to lead the way back from whence we came, after a very good repast of stewed muscles, together with a very hearty welcome plainly appearing in the queen's looks. [Page 43].

My nimble pilot led me away with great swiftness, and it was necessary so to do; the weather still continuing in that violent sharpness, nothing but a violent motion could make our limbs useful. No sooner had I set my foot in the king's house to visit my comrades, but a wonderful surprise appeared to me in the change of every countenance, and as every face did plainly speak a general satisfaction, so did they with one voice explain the cause thereof, in telling me the messengers of our delivery were arrived, and now with the king.

I hastened to see those angels, and addressing myself to one of them in English habit, asked him the occasion of his coming there? He told me his business was to trade for furs, and no more; but as soon as I had told him my name, and the accidents of our being there, he acknowledged he came under the guidance of the Kickotank Indian (which I imagined, but was not sure the king had sent) in quest of me and those that were left on shore, sent by the governor's order of Virginia to enquire after us, but knew not where to find us till that Indian came to his house; he gave me a large account of the ship's arrival, and the many dangers and difficulties she encountered before she could come into James river, where she ran ashore, resolving there to lay her bones. His name was Jenkin Price, he had brought an Indian of his neighborhood with him that was very well acquainted in those parts, for our conduct back to Accomack, which Indian was called Jack.

The king was very glad of this happy success to us, and was impatient to learn something more of our history than hitherto he had been able to extract from signs and grimaces. Jenkin Price, with his broken Indian, could make a shift to instruct Jack to say any thing he pleased, and Jack was the more capable to understand his meaning by some sprinklings of English, that he had learnt at our plantations. Betwixt them both they were able to satisfy the king in what he pleased to know. Jack told them of himself what a mighty nation we were in that country, and gave them caution not to embezzle any goods we had brought with us, for fear of an after-reckoning. I wondered, upon this serious discourse he had with the king, to see guns and stockings, and whatever trifles we had given, offered to be returned, and being told the reason of it by Jenkin Price, I was very much ashamed of Jack's too great zeal in our service, which, though' it did proceed from a principle of honesty, and good morality in him, we were to consider that our dearest lives, and all we could enjoy in this world, was (next to divine providence) owing to the virtue and charity of this king, and therefore not only what they had in possession, but whatever else he should desire that was in my power, would be too mean an acknowledgment for so high obligations. I took care to let them know that I had no hand in the menace by which Jack brought them to refund what they had got of us; the right understanding whereof increased our good intelligence, and became a new endearment of affection betwixt us. [Page 43].

By better acquaintance with these our deliverers, we learned that we were about fifty English miles from Virginia: That part of it where Jenkin did govern, was called Littleton's Plantation, and was the first English ground we did expect to see. He gave me great encouragement to endure the length of the way, by assuring me I should not find either stone or shrub to hurt my feet thorough my thin-soled boots, for the whole colony had neither stone nor underwood; and having thus

satisfied my curiosity in the knowledge of what Jenkin Price could communicate, we deferred no longer to resolve how and when to begin our journey to Accomack.

The Indian he brought with him (who afterwards lived and died my servant) was very expert, and a most incomparable guide in the woods we were to pass, being a native of those parts, so that he was as our sheet-anchor in this our peregrination. The king was loath to let us go till the weather was better tempered for our bodies; but when he saw we were fully resolved, and had pitched upon the next morning to begin our journey, he found himself much defeated in a purpose he had taken to call together all the flower of his kingdom to entertain us with a dance, to the end that nothing might be omitted on his part for our divertissement, as well as our nourishment, which his small territory could produce. Most of our company would gladly have deferred our march a day longer, to see this masquerade, but I was wholly bent for Accomack, to which place I was to dance almost on my bare feet, the thoughts of which took off the edge I might otherwise have had to novelties of that kind.

When the good old king saw we were fully determined to be gone the next day, he desired as a pledge of my affection to him, that I would give him my camblet coat, which he vowed to wear whilst he lived for my sake; I shook hands to show my willingness to please him in that or in any other thing he would command, and was the more willing to do myself the honor of compliance in this particular, because he was the first king I could call to mind that had ever showed any inclinations to wear my old clothes. [Page 45].

To the young princess, that had so signally obliged me, I presented a piece of two-penny scarlet ribbon, and a French tweezers, that I had in my pocket, which made her skip for joy, and to show how little she fancied our way of carrying them concealed, she retired apart for some time, and taking out every individual piece of which it was furnished, she tied a snip of ribbon to each, and so came back with scissors, knives and bodkins hanging at her ears, neck and hair. The case itself was not excused, but bore a part in this new dress: and to the end we might not part without leaving deep impressions of her beauty in our minds, she had prepared on her forefingers, a lick of paint on each, the colors (to my best remembrance) green and yellow, which at one motion she discharged on her face, beginning upon her temples, and continuing it in an oval line downwards as far as it would hold out. I could have wished this young princess would have contented herself with what nature had none for her, without this addition of paint (which, I thought, made her more fulsome than handsome); but I had reason to imagine the royal family were only to use this ornament exclusive of all others, for that I saw none other of her sex so set off; and this conceit made it turn again, and appear lovely, as all things should do that are honor's with the royal

I was not furnished with any thing upon the place, fit to make a return to the two queens for the great charity they used to feed and warm me; but when I came into a place where I could be supplied, I was not wanting that way, according to my power.

Early next morning we put our selves in posture to be gone, (viz.) major Stephens, myself, and three or four more, whose names are worn out of my mind. Major Morrison was so far recovered as to be heart-whole, but he wanted strength to go thro' so great a labor as this was like to prove. We left him with some others to be brought in boats that the governor had ordered for their accommodation; and with them the two weak women, who were much recovered by the good care and nourishment they received in the poor fisherman's house.



Breakfast being done, and our pilot Jack ready to set out, we took a solemn leave of the good king. He enclosed me in his arms with kind embraces, not without expressions of sorrow to part, beyond the common rate of new acquaintance. I made Jack pump up his best compliments, which at present was all I was capable to return to the king's kindness; and so, after many Hana haes, we parted. [Page 45].

We were not gone far till the fatigue and tediousness of the journey discovered itself in the many creeks we were forced to head, and swamps to pass (like Irish bogs) which made the way at least double to what it would have amounted to in a strait line: and it was our wonder to see our guide Jack lead on the way with the same confidence of going right, as if he had had a London road to keep him from straying. Howbeit he would many times stand still and look about for landmarks; and when on one hand and the other his marks bore right for his direction, he would show himself greatly satisfied. As to the purpose, an old deformed tree that lay north-west, opposite to a small hammock of pines to the southeast, would evidence his going right in all weathers. It is true, they know not the compass by the loadstone, but, which is equivalent, they never are ignorant of the north-west point, which gives them the rest; and that they know by the weather-beaten moss that grows on that side of every oak, different from the rest of the tree, which is their compass. Towards evening we saw smoke (an infallible sign of an Indian town) which Jack knew to arise from Gingo Teague. We went boldly into the king's house (by advice of his brother of Kickotank) who was also a very humane prince. What the place and season produced was set before us with all convenient speed, which was enough to satisfy hunger, and to fit us for repose.

I was extremely tired with this tedious journey; and it was the more irksome to me, because I performed it in boots (my shoes being worn out) which at that time were commonly worn to walk in; so that I was much more sleepy than I had been hungry. The alliance I had newly made at Kickotank did already stand me in some stead, for that it qualified me to a lodging apart, and gave me a first taste of all we had to eat, though' the variety was not as great as I had seen in other courts.

And yet (as we see in all worldly honors) this grandeur of mine was not without its allay; for as it gave me accommodation of eating and sleeping in preference to my comrades, so did it raise the hopes of the royal progeny of gifts and presents, beyond what I was either able or willing to afford them: for when I would have taken my rest, I was troubled beyond measure with their visits, and saw by their carriage what they would be at; wherefore, to free myself of further disturbance, and to put myself out of the pain of denials, I resolved to comply with the necessities of nature, which pressed me hard to sleep; and to that end I took the freedom by Jack, to desire they would all withdraw until I found myself refreshed. [Page 47].

I passed the night till almost day-break in one entire sleep; and when I did awake (not suddenly able to collect who, or where I was) I found myself strangely confounded, to see a damsel placed close to my side, of no meaner extract than the king's eldest daughter, who had completely finished the rape of all the gold and silver buttons that adorned the king of Kickotank's coat, yet on my back. When I was broad awake, and saw this was no enchantment (like those trances knights-errant use to be in) but that I was really despoiled of what was not in my power to dispense withal, I called for Jack, and made him declare my resentment and much dislike of this princess's too great liberty upon so small acquaintance, which made me have a mean opinion of her. Jack showed more anger than myself to see such usage

by any of his country, and much more was he scandalized, that one of the blood royal should purloin.

But the king, upon notice of the fact and party concerned in it, immediately caused the buttons to be found out and returned, with no slight reprimand to his daughter, and then all was well, and so much the better by the gift of such small presents as I was able to make to the king and princess. Breakfast was given us, and we hastened to proceed in our journey to Accomack.

The uneasiness of boots to travel in, made me by much the wearier of the former day's journey, and caused me to enter very unwillingly upon this second day's work. We reckoned our selves about twenty-five miles distant from Jenkin's house. It pleased God to send us dry weather, and not excessive cold. We had made provision of Pone to bait on by the way, and we found good water to refresh us; but all this did not hinder my being tired and spent almost to the last degree. Jack very kindly offered his service to carry me on his shoulders (for I was brought to a moderate weight by the strict diet I had been in) but that would have been more uneasy to me, in contemplation of his more than double pains, and so I resolved to try my utmost strength, without placing so great a weight on his shoulders.

The hopes of seeing English ground in America, and that in so short a time as they made us expect, did animate my spirits to the utmost point. Jack fearing the worst was of opinion, which we should call at his aunt's town, the queen of Pomumkin, not far out of the way: but Jenkin Price opposed that motion, and did assure me our journey's end was at hand. His words and my own inclination carried the question, and I resolved, by God's help, that night to sleep at Jenkin's house.

But the distance proving yet greater than had been described, and my boots trashing me almost beyond all sufferance, I became desperate, and ready to sink and lie down. Jenkin lulled me on still with words that spurred me to the quick; and would demonstrate the little distance betwixt us and his plantation, by the sight of hogs and cattle, of which species the Indians were not masters. I was fully convinced of what he said, but would however have consented to a motion of lying without doors on the ground, within two or three flights shot of the place, to save the labor of so small a remainder. [Page 48].

The close of the evening, and a little more patience (thro' the infinite goodness of the Almighty) did put a happy period to our cross adventure. A large bed of sweet straw was spread ready in Jenkin's house for our reception, upon which I did hasten to extend and stretch my wearied limbs. And being thus brought into safe harbor by the many miracles of divine mercy, from all the storms and fatigues, perils and necessities to which we had been exposed by sea and land for almost the space of four months, I cannot conclude this voyage in more proper terms, than the words that are the burthen of that psalm of providence, that men would therefore praise the Lord for his goodness, and for his wondrous works unto the children of men!

Our landlord Jenkin Price, and conductor Jack took great care to provide meat for us; and there being a dairy and hens, we could not want. As for our stomachs, they were open at all hours to eat whatever was set before us, as soon as our wearied bodies were refreshed with sleep. It was on Saturday the _____ day of January, that we ended this our wearisome pilgrimage, and entered into our king's dominions at Achomat, called by the English, Northampton county, which is the only county on that side of the bay belonging to the colony of Virginia, and is the best of the whole for all sorts of necessaries for human life.



Having been thus refreshed in Jenkin's house this night with all our hearts could wish, on the next morning, being Sunday, we would have been glad to have found a church for the performance of our duty to God, and to have rendered our hearty thanks to him in the public assembly, for his unspeakable mercies vouchsafed to us; but we were not yet arrived to the heart of the country where there were churches, and ministry performed as our laws direct, but were glad to continue our own chaplains, as formerly. As we advanced into the plantations that lay thicker together, we had our choice of hosts for our entertainment, without money or its value; in which we did not begin any novelty, for there are no inns in the colony; nor do they take other payment for what they furnish to coasters, but by requital of such courtesies in the same way, as occasions offer.

When I came to the house of one Stephen Charlton, he did not only outdo all that I had visited before him, in variety of dishes at his table, which was very well ordered in the kitchen, but would also oblige me to put on a good farmer-like suit of his own wearing clothes, for exchange of my dirty habit; and this gave me opportunity to deliver my camlet coat to Jack, for the use of my brother of Kickotank, with other things to make it worth his acceptance. [Page 49].

Having been thus frankly entertained at Mr. Charlton's, our company was in condition to take care for themselves. We took leave of each other, and my next stage was to esquire Yardly, a gentleman of good name, whose father had sometimes been governor of Virginia. There I was received and treated as if I had in truth and reality been that man of honor my brother of Kickotank had created me. It fell out very luckily for my better welcome that he had not long before brought over a wife from Rotterdam, which I had known almost from a child. Her father (Custis by name) kept a victualling house in that town, lived in good repute, and was the general host of our nation there. The esquire knowing I had the honor to be the governor's kinsman, and his wife knowing my conversation in Holland, I was received and caressed more like a domestic and near relation, than a man in misery, and a stranger. I stayed there for a passage over the bay, about ten days, welcomed and feasted not only by the esquire and his wife, but by many neighbors that were not too remote.

About the midst of February, I had an opportunity to cross the bay in a sloop, and with much ado landed in York River, at esquire Ludlow's plantation, a most pleasant situation. I was civilly received by him, who presently ordered an accommodation for me in a most obliging manner. But it fell out at that time, that captain Wormly (of his majesty's council) had guests in his house (not a furlong distant from Mr. Ludlow's) feasting and carousing, that were lately come from England, and most of them my intimate acquaintance. I took a sudden leave of Mr. Ludlow, thanked him for his kind intentions to me, and using the common freedom of the country, I thrust myself amongst Captain Wormly's guests in crossing the creek, and had a kind reception from them all, which answered (if not exceeded) my expectation.

Sir Thomas Lundsford, Sir Henry Chickly, Sir Philip Honywood, and Colonel Hamond were the persons I met there, and enjoyed that night with very good cheer, but left them early the next morning, out of a passionate desire I had to see the governor, whose care for my preservation had been so full of kindness. [Page 50].

Captain Wormly mounted me for Jamestown, Virginia where the governor was pleased to receive and take me to his house at Greenspring, and there I passed my hours (as at mine own house) until May following; at which time he sent me for Holland to find out the king, and to solicit his majesty for the treasurer's place of Virginia,

which the governor took to be void by the delinquency of Claybourne, who had long enjoyed it. He furnished me with a sum of money to bear the charge of this solicitation; which took effect, though the king was then in Scotland. He was not only thus kind to me (who had a more than ordinary pretence to his favor by our near affinity in blood) but, on many occasions, he showed great respect to all the royal party, who made that colony their refuge. His house and purse were open to all that were so qualified. To one of my comrades (Major Fox) who had no friend at all to subsist on, he showed a generosity that was like himself; and to my other (Major Morrison) he was more kind, for he did not only place him in the command of the fort, which was profitable to him whilst it held under the king, but did advance him after to the government of the country, wherein he got a competent estate.




Figure 18.9: Green Spring is the 17th century plantation of Virginia's Colonial Governor, Sir William Berkeley.

And thus (by the good providence of a gracious God, who helped us in our low estate, and caused his angels to pitch tents round about them that trust in him) have I given as faithful an account of this signal instance of his goodness to the miserable objects of his mercy in this voyage, as I have been able to call to a clear remembrance.

18.3. Epilog to Henry Norwood's Journey.

18.3.1. What Happen to Henry Norwood's Ship, "The Virginia Merchant"?

Source: Page 385 "Tennessee Cousins" "Colonel Mainwaring Hammond was one of the 'Cavalier' Companions of Captain Henry Norwood, whose vessel, the Virginia Merchant ran ashore on what is now the coast of the old Somerset County, Maryland in 1649, and their

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rescue was effected through the efforts of a young man named William Stevens - who settled in the community."

Source: Page 258 - Jan 28, 1652: Depositions re: the voyage of William and Ralph, Mr. John Lockyer, to Virginia in 1649. Her passengers suffered great hardship and mortality and, when the ship was driven onto the rocks at Cape Hatteras seven months after her departure from England, they were obliged to continue to Virginia overland. Captain John Lockyer was tried on a charge of starving his passengers.

18.4. After the Journey, Life goes on for Henry Norwood.

Gertrude Marion Callam Norwood shares her knowledge of Henry Norwood life after his journey to Virginia. On 22 September 1650 King Charles II sealed at Fort Johnstone in Scotland a patent to Henry Norwood, to be "Escheater, Treasurer and Receiver of Quit Rents of Virginia".

Conway Robinson's notes show record of this patent in Virginia on 15 May 1661 with a power of attorney to Sir. William Berkeley to designate resident deputies, followed by Berkeley's designation of Francis Moryson and T. Ludwell as deputies.

Henry Norwood was allowed to retain the Quit Rents for his own use until 1672 as is seen by Governor William Berkeley's report: "There is no revenue arising to His Majesty but out of Quit Rents; and this he has given to a deserving servant Col. Henry Norwood."

Col. Henry was sent to Amsterdam in 1651, thence to England and back again to Virginia, before the Colony surrendered on 12 March 1652.

The following year he was implicated in a Royalist plot for the distribution of arms in Worcestershire, Leicestershire, Staffordshire and Derbyshire, for which he was arrested but set at liberty.

On 5 January 1655 he was again arrested and put in the Tower, where he was in great poverty, so that by 23 September 1657 a grant of 10/- a week was allowed to the Capital Warden of the Tower for his maintenance. Oliver Cromwell had already given orders to the Governor of Jersey to receive into his charge Robert Overton, Col. Norwood, Thomas Armstrong and John Weston, but for some reason Col. Norwood was not transferred until 8 February 1658, when his safe delivery to the island in the ship "Elias" was reported by Capt. W. Ledguard. The question was raised in the House of Commons on 16 March 1658 as to whether it was right to place prisoners in Jersey where they were beyond reach of Habeas Corpus. It was eventually held to be illegal. On 20 January 1659 a Council ordered Col. Henry's release on security of a Bond for £500, entered into him by him to the Lord Protector on the condition that he did not come back to England without leave, or do anything for the future against the Commonwealth abroad.

His fortunes now having changed, the next we read of Col. Henry is from Samuel Pepys' Diary of 21 April 1659:-

This day dined Sir John Boys and some other gentlemen, formerly great cavaliers, and among the rest one Mr. Norwood, for whom my lord give a convoy to carry him to the Brill, but he is certainly going to the King; for my Lord commanded me that I should not enter his name in my book. My Lord do show them and that sort of people great civility, and we begin to speak of it very freely.

The reason they could now speak freely of the Royalists was the approaching restoration of King Charles II. This took place on the 3rd May, when Samuel Pepys read the proclamation and vote for the King's restoration from the quarter deck and the seamen did all of them cry out "God bless King Charles" with the greatest joy imaginable. After that I returned to the Nazeby, where my Lord was much pleased to hear how all the fleet took it in a transport of joy, showed me a private letter of the King's to him, and another from the Duke of York, in such a familiar style as their common friend. And among the rest that had carried these letters Sir John Boys is one, and Mr. Norwood, which had a ship to carry him over the other, when my Lord would not have me put his name in the book.

The following year on 24 March 1660, King Charles II signed a warrant at Brussels to admit Henry Norwood as an Esquire of the Body in order to escort the king from the continent. For this great service King Charles gave him a silver porringer.

I have not been able to discover the full history of this porringer, which could have provided us with the proof we need to establish the link between the Ashford Norwoods and the Leckhampton line.

However, where there is no proof, deduction is the next best thing. We know this porringer became the property of Sarah Ann Norwood, a descendant of John Norwood 1597-1661 and Sarah Shrubsell, and I have placed this John as great grandson of William Norwood and Benedict of Nash Court, Kent. This appears to be the only place where the dates fit correctly.

How the porringer could have come into the possession of this Norwood line I do not know, but there are connections with Col. Henry. For instance, the Sir John Boys mentioned above as accompanying Col. Henry was of Hode Court, Harbledown, Kent. He was connected with the Nash Court family by marriage, of which family Richard Norwood was a notable Royalist Captain in the Civil War. He lived at Chilton Manor in Boughton Malherbe, Kent and was married to Anna Claybrook.

The Leckhampton family had connections with Kent when William Norwood, after the death of his wife Elizabeth Lygon, married Anne Sackville of Danes Court, Tilmanstone, Kent. William died before his second wife Anne, who in her will bequeathed £10 to her Goddaughter Anne Tyringham, wife of John Norwood. This shows how greatly the families of Tyringham, Norwood of Leckhampton and Norwood of Kent were linked by marriage, especially bearing in mind that Elizabeth Lygon's sister Margaret Lygon married Sir Henry Berkeley of Bruton, Somerset, the adjoining village to Rodney where Col. Henry was born, and Sir Henry Berkeley's son Maurice was the father of Sir. William Berkeley, Governor of Virginia 1642-1654 and 1661-1676.

Sarah Ann Norwood married Rev. Thomas Perkins, Rector of Fonthill, Wiltshire circa 1843, and he bequeathed the porringer to his son Rev. Thomas Norwood Perkins, who married Emily Lane Tossuill in 1869. He allowed the porringer to be exhibited at the British Museum for some time, but by 1892 he desperately needed money to pay for the education of his son Thomas Norwood Perkins and he sold it at Christies for £430. When the said Thomas died in 1947 he left a son, Christopher Ensor Norwood Perkins, who had a preparatory school at Basingstoke, Hampshire.



Only two porringers of this particular kind exist, the other one belonging to the Earl of Denbigh. We know what this porringer looked like because the artist Stanhope Forbes used it in a painting showing it being saved during the fire of London by being handed into a waiting barge. This painting was in the possession of Rev. T. Norwood Perkins.

King Charles was crowned on 23 April 1661, and Col. Henry attended him as an Esquire of the Body. In July he was made Captain for life of Sandown Castle, Deal, in September he was Col. in Lord Rutherford's regiment at Dunkirk, and the following year he took Lord Rutherford's place as Deputy Governor of Dunkirk until its evacuation in 1662.

In the following April Lord Rutherford was created Lord Teviot and ordered with his garrison to Tangier, and Col. Norwood became Lieutenant Governor of Tangier in 1664. That year the Earl of Teviot was killed by the Moors and Col. Norwood returned to England and joined Col. Richard Nicholl's expedition against New Amsterdam. On the 8th September Col. Henry was present at the capitulation of New Amsterdam, after which its name was changed to New York.

Col. Nicholl actually recommended Col. Henry Norwood to succeed him as Governor of New York, describing him as a man "Whose temper would be acceptable both to the Soldiers and the Country", but this did not materialize. Instead, according to the diary of Samuel Pepys, Henry was appointed Lt. Governor of Tangier on 21 February 1666. A present of a horse, a camel and a young lion was given to Henry by Ben Ali Gayland, Prince of West Barbary, who addressed Col. Henry as: "Esquire of the Body of His Majesty, Treasurer of the Colony of Virginia, Col. of a Regiment, Lt. Governor of the City and Garrison of Tangier and [later] Commander in Chief of all His Majesty's Forces in Africa."

Col. Henry remained in Tangier until the end of December 1669. He then returned to England and purchased the Estate of Leckhampton from his cousin Francis Norwood, who had married Judith Gates of Cleve and apparently moved to Cleve. Col. Henry left the Estate to Francis' son Rev. Thomas Norwood. Col. Henry now settled down to the life of a country squire, being made a Justice of the Peace for Gloucestershire in 1670, a councilor the City of Gloucester in 1671 and alderman for life in 1672, being elected Mayor of Gloucester in October of that year. He sat as a member of Parliament in Charles II's Parliament of 1675-1678.

There are many more references to Col. Henry in Pepys' Diary, perhaps the most interesting is a letter written by Henry to Samuel Pepys: -

To Samuel Pepys [about his house in Parson's Green] Parsons] Greene June 2d. 1679

Sir

On Saturday I received your discharge of the little cell (which shall ever be at your devotion) and that with no small trouble to see you otherwise divertised from the use of it at present by the most unreasonable occasion in the world. I hope when this comes to your hands, you will have weathered that storm which Sathan-Scott10 has so unskillfully conjured to alarm you; and I make no doubt but your virtues will so improve this affliction to your spiritual as well as your secular advantage that in the same time you rejoice in your Tribulation, you will open those Eyes to behold your innocence with shame and confusion upon themselves, who have been so vile promoters of the market piece of malice towards you.

I am at the point of leaving this place and do expect by the first to hear you are disentangled of this vexation. I wish everything may succeed as you desire as being most truly

Your most assured faithful Servant

Henry Norwood

My humble service to Sir Anthony Deane,

For my much valued friend Samuel Pepys Esquire.

On 4 September 1689 Col. Henry Norwood made his Will:-

Will of Colonel Henry Norwood of Leckhampton, County Gloucester Esquire

P.C.C. Entry 143. Will dated 4 Sep 1689, Proved 23 Oct 1689.

To be buried in the burying place of my ancestors in the parish of Leckhampton without pomp, near where my dear grandfather William Norwood was buried, covered with a flat stone by order of my executors on which shall be engraven "here was buried the body of William Norwood Esquire who died 23 Sept 1632, as also the body of Henry the youngest son of Henry Norwood who died (blank) 16 (blank)" William Lawrence the elder of Shemngton County Gloucestershire Esquire, Capt. William Norwood one of the sons of Francis Norwood late of Leckhampton aforesaid Esquire deceased, Thomas Norwood (another of the sons of said Francis Norwood) Clerk, and Edward Wraughton of St. Martin in the Fields Middlesex Gentleman to be executors.

I confirm settlement of Manor of Leckhampton etc. Gloucestershire which I made by Indres. of Lease & Rele. date 23/24 Mar 1686 All real estate to said executors in fee in trust as by this will etc.

To my brother Charles Norwood for life £50 annuity. To ds. Capt. William Norwood to his own use £100 yearly until he be in possession of Manor of Leckhampton aforesaid under said settlement, but if he die before so that his wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Norwood shall not by his death enjoy jointure by me settled, then I devise to her £100 a year from her husband's death till she get said jointure. To said executors £10 each. To ds. E. Wraughton £10 yearly so long as he act in trust.

Rest of estate to benefit of said Capt. William Norwood & Thomas Norwood & Survivor. Wrtns. William Swindell, William Prangnell, Edward Porter.

Codicil dated 5 Sept. 1689. To Andrew Newport Esquire my collash and my picture called the "Rape of the Sabines" at the end of Parsons Green Parlor, also his nephew Bromeleyes picture and any three other pictures, as a mean acknowledgement of the greatest friendship I ever knew. To him his own picture being now at Leckhampton. The great Landskipp on the stairs at Parsons Green etc. to Edward Rumbold Esquire. To Mr. James Halsall my old black table given me by my Lady Morant which means as it is may give him occasion to remember two old friends. My gold pocket clock to Sir Anthony Kirk, one of the Lord's Commr. of the Great Seal of England. To Henry, son of my cousin Capt. Anthony Rodney, £200 two years from my death. To my goddaughter Mrs. Elizabeth Fortescue £200. To my nephew Seymour Kirton, a minister in Devon £100. To Honorable Mrs. Jane Berkeley of Beaufort Street £100 etc. to Mrs. Jane Davis of Twittenham £50. To Mr. William Longeville of Inner Temple £40. To Mr. William Lawrence of Sherrington £20 and to his wife £20. To my cousin Francis Norwood £50. To my cousin Thomas Norwood one of my executors all my



books. To Mr. Cornelius Norwood, a Fellow of New College Oxford £10 to buy him books I promised him. When Dr. Thomas Tennison, Minister of St. Martins demands of my trustees £100, this to be paid to him, same to be disposed of as I have given directions; & £100 more a year after To Mr. Bennet, my surgeon, £40. To Mr. Edward Wroughton one of my executors rents of my house in Warwick Street, during my estate therein. To Mr. Briggs £10, he to have each £1 for all moneys he pays to my executors as due from the Fleete. To the poor of Leckhampton £15. To Mr. Richards and his wife £5 between them. I release to Honorable Mrs. Charlotte Mordant the £50 she owes me. I release to Sir Henry Sheers £100 he owes me. I release to my cousin George Rodney what he owes me. I release to Ralph Groomfs what he owes me. To my surviving alms women at Leckhampton 40s. apiece and 40s. for mourning. To Mr. Jones, Minister 40s. and to his wife 20s. as to tithes that have been in dispute between us, I desire he may have satisfaction as he desires. £5 to my cousin Roger Hanslipp. To John Oldhams & his wife £6 between them. To poor of parrish of St. James Westmoreland £10 as Dr. Tennison thinks fit. To my servant Mrs. Lewis £10 etc. To Mr. McGee my servant clothes. To Samuel Sharwell of Chariton 40s. To John Clarke, a porter plying about the New Exchange 50s. Wins. William Swindell, William Prangell, Edward

Memorandum: Pratio obliqua. Name of Mr. Phineas Bowles was razed and name of Dr. Thomas Tennison put in for a trust and then codicil was signed anew. Witnesses: Thomas Bennet, John Molins, Edward Porter

Proved by William Lawrence, Senior Esquire & Edward Wraughton Gentleman 2 of the executors Power reserved to the other executors (sic tarn registro libro actorum). Clerk, Leckhampton Court

After the Second World War, when Leckhampton Court was used as a hospital, the Manor gradually deteriorated, having passed out of the Trye family to Mrs. Elwes. Her Executors put it up for sale through Jackson-Stops, who kindly sent me the auction catalogue and gave me permission to view this property, which Edward and I did first on 2nd June 1956. The Estate Agent told me that many old photographs had been found in the loft of the stables. I tried to obtain a loan of these but they went to the executors and I was unable to trace them.

In 1957 the Manor and lands were purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Paul L. Lawrence Saunders for transfer of their Keynsham Priors School. An article appeared in the Gloucestershire Echo of 2nd March which told how the Norwood Family had lived at Leckhampton Court for over three hundred years in great pomp, but that the Norwood line had died out, and the estate had passed to Charles Brandon Trye, whose grandmother had been a Norwood. Towards the end of the last century it had passed into the Hargreaves family (the last family to use it as a family home), who lived there entertaining lavishly. Lord Fitzhardinge, the great huntsman, visited them for long periods, and King Edward VII also enjoyed the hospitality of this ancient house. During the present century it had been used as a reserve base for government requirements during the two world wars. The article also mentioned the one or two ghosts who were supposed to haunt the premises.

My letter in reply to this appeared in the Gloucestershire Echo of 8th March 1957.1 pointed out that the Norwood Family did not die out when Mary Norwood, who inherited Leckhampton, married Thomas Trye in 1727. Her great uncle William Norwood, born at Leckhampton in 1615 had emigrated to the United States of America where he

married Lydia Jordan, from whom a long line of Norwoods and many branches there has descended. There are also several collateral lines of Norwoods living in England today.

I received several letters in reply to this, one of which was certainly unusual, and deserves recording for its connection with Col. Henry. It was dated 14 March 1957 and came from Mr. T. Bellingham-Carter of Fulsham Lodge, Christchurch Road, Cheltenham, who said that my letter had thrown considerable light on a subject that had intrigued him for over forty years: -

As a child of seven I used to attend St. Peters Church, Leckhampton, with my governess. I occupied a front pew almost immediately under the pulpit. One Sunday morning I looked round the congregation and saw a "Red Indian" in full headdress on the west side of the aisle. I pointed him out to my governess who could not see him. I was greatly frightened and became so distressed that I had to be taken from the church. No one else could see this figure - and that fact alone seemed to increase my fear.

Mr. Carter went on to say that the following Sunday others accompanied him to the church, and although he again saw the figure, no one else did, so that his mother decided he should not go there to church again. He continued:-

Perhaps the Norwood who emigrated to America or one of his descendants returned to the old home bringing with him an Indian quite possibly a convert to Christianity.... If I were an artist I could sit down now and draw a likeness of the Indian. The face was of great nobility, the most striking feature being the piercing black eyes, and extremely long fingers. The headdress was not of the usual eagle feathers. They were smaller and marked more like those of pheasant feathers only much longer. During the service and indeed all the time I had the ghost under observation - it never handled a hymn book, it did however stand up and sit down when the congregation did so.

The interesting point to me was that I had only mentioned William the Emigrant in my letter to the Echo - I had not spoken of his second cousin Col. Henry Norwood.

Indeed, at that time I had not even read Col. Henry's A Voyage to Virginia. This was not lent to me until February 1958. Therefore, in my reply to Mr. Bellingham Carter I told him more about the life of William Norwood and how his great grandson John Wall Norwood had had many encounters with Indians. Mr. Carter seemed happy with my explanations and our correspondence closed.

When I eventually read A Voyage to Virginia a year later, telling how Col. Henry had been rescued by the Indians, to whose King he gave his sword, belt, gun and camlet coat, and how the King had given him an Indian servant. Jack, who not only guided him to his cousin Governor Berkeley of Virginia, but who had returned to England with him, remaining his servant till he died, there seemed some explanation for the child's consciousness of the Indian by Col. Henry's grave in Leckhampton Church.

After he died on 14 September 1689, in accordance with Col. Henry Norwood's wish, he was buried alongside his grandfather William and his brother Charles. The stone slabs on the floor of the aisle in front of the pews tell the story.

After allowing time for Mr. and Mrs. Saunders to settle in Leckhampton Court I wrote to them on 25 May 1957 I said how grateful I was that



they had taken the house for use as a school and that we would appreciate coming to see them and to take some photographs. Mr. Saunders replied most cordially, but asked us to defer our visit until they had restored the building ready for their Speech Day on 13 July, when they would be delighted to see us. A photograph of them on this Speech Day subsequently appeared in the Cheltenham Chronicle. We called at 11 a.m. on Thursday 18th July as arranged. Although we had telephoned them on 8th July to make sure our visit would be welcome there was not a soul to be seen in the School.

A small boy walked up the long drive and explained that everyone was out, taking part in their Sports Day, but that we could have a look around the Court. After taking photographs, we entered by the door at the end of the courtyard, and, as the inside was still being repaired and re-decorated, we contented ourselves with a ramble through the various rooms including the great hall and banqueting hall, but did not take any internal photographs.

The following year, Mr. Saunders kindly sent us an invitation to their Speech Day on Monday 14 July 1958 but we were unable to attend. It was not until Thursday 20 April 1964 that we made our next visit. It looked as if history would repeat itself as no one was to be seen. We had our picnic lunch in the car, made brass rubbings in the church and returned to the manor, just as a small boy appeared from the outbuildings asking if he could help us. I said we would like to meet the Headmaster and soon Mr. Saunders appeared.

He was most friendly and courteous, and showed us all over the school. The library was a magnificent room, and a grand piano at one end looked but a pin point. The room was stocked with books and had some good furniture, and the fireplaces had been restored. Otherwise, much repair was still needed. In a comer of the hall stood a pile of pikes which were actually used by the Norwood family - some of these had been kept by the Rector during the war for safety when the Court was taken over by the military.

Mr. Saunders told us that King Henry VII was a frequent visitor and often stayed at the Court. In more recent years King Edward VII stayed there with Lilly Langtry.

As he walked down the worn front steps into the courtyard with us, he told us that the indentations had been made by the knight's armor and footwear, which gave me the opportunity to ask him if they had any ghosts.

"Good heavens, yes" he said. A master came up to him one day and asked if he might have some brandy. As he wasn't given to drinking, Mr. Saunders asked the reason. He said he had gone up the stairs that we had just left, and ahead of him he had seen a pair of cavalier's legs with the tops of the boots turned down. He was a foreigner, not normally scared, and not given to hallucinations. On another occasion a boy, the brother of a well-known swimmer, also saw the cavalier's legs. Being much upset, he reported the incident.

Mr. Saunders told us of a third incident. While the school was still in Cheltenham and the Manor was being made habitable, he sent one of his staff up to the Court to see how the builder's work was progressing. Arriving at the Manor the master found the builders had all gone, so he decided to take a final look round to be sure there was no one about. He went up these same stairs to the rooms where the dormer windows overlooked the courtyard and heard footsteps. He stood back into a recess, and although he heard the footsteps he saw no one. Commenting

on this, Mr. Saunders said he had never seen anyone, although he had often heard the footsteps.

I myself do not believe in the reality of ghosts, but apparently these incidents seemed very real to those who told them, as did the Indian to the young Bellingham-Carter.

Mr. Saunders gave us a very sincere invitation to call whenever we were that way.

After publication of The Norwoods I, several Americans visited the Court, and they found that the school had gradually lost pupils. Eventually Mr. Saunders took a flat in Cheltenham because he wanted to be quiet to write his book on the history of Dr. Jenner.

Many Americans felt they would like to see the Manor restored and preserved so that their fellow countrymen might visit their ancestral home, and to this end I tried to negotiate a purchase of the property. My friend in Cheltenham, Mr. W. Gething knew Mr. Saunders and in 1972 he sent him The Norwoods I to read. Mr. Saunders eventually returned the book to Mr. Gething, having enjoyed it and having copied some of the facts from it, which he hoped Mrs. Callam would not mind, saying that he knew nothing about the Norwoods' association with Leckhampton. I therefore took the opportunity of writing to Mr. Saunders on 22 December 1972, reminding him of our visit, and also the wish of Mr. Joseph Norwood of Wilmington, North Carolina to purchase the Court, so that the Norwood family might preserve it and turn it into a museum and guest house where Americans might stay on their visits.

When he came over again in July 1973, Mr. Joseph Norwood contacted the Gloucestershire County Council and the Divisional Planning Officer at Cheltenham He also had a personal chat with Mr. Saunders at his flat. He gathered that Mr. Saunders did not wish to sell the Court and there the matter had to drop. All that any of us really wished was that this historic building should be preserved.

Joseph Norwood was very keen to have a painting of Leckhampton Court. For this purpose we visited it again on 14 May 1975. There we made a sketch and took a photograph from the fields in front of the Manor House. Edward returned to the main road where we had left the car and I went on to the house, but could not find anyone there. It was my intention to tell Mrs. Saunders, who I understood from the Gatehouse occupants lived at the Court, that we would like to take some further photographs, and to enquire how she and Mr. Saunders were keeping. As I walked back down the drive, Mrs. Saunders came through the gate with her bicycle, and I gathered from her that visitors were not welcome. 1 told her that I could quite understand her position and that the privacy of her home was sacred, but at the same time I felt she might try to understand that this was the ancestral home of many Americans, and it was only natural that they should wish to visit it especially as it was scheduled as a building with a preservation order on account of its historical value.

Finally I asked her if she was happy living there She said she loved it, to which I replied: "I am so glad, this is your home, live here in peace, and I will never trouble you again"

Imagine my surprise when, on the 17th June, Joseph Norwood and his wife Rena visited us at Bexhill, England. They told us of their visit to Leckhampton, not knowing of my recent experience. When they saw the picture of the Manor House Joseph said that he would like to have it when the painting was complete. He had not been able to have a



conversation with Mrs. Saunders on the telephone, but he had found that Leckhampton would shortly be coming under the Tewkesbury Council, and he was still of the opinion that, should the house be taken over for public use, he could raise a large sum for its preservation.

Joseph Norwood returned to America, and on 26th July he died We were very grateful that we were able to send the painting to Rena later on, and so, although that appears to be the end of our negotiations regarding Leckhampton Court, the ancient home of the Norwoods is preserved in a painting which I hope will give many generations of Americans much pleasure

Did I say the end? Almost as I had written these words, on 11 November 1977 I received a letter from the secretary of the Cheltenham Society saying that Mr. Saunders had Leckhampton Court on the market for some time and there were three prospective purchasers One of these, the Sue Ryder Foundation had obtained planning permission for a change of use into a home for the chronic sick. Following this, on 16 January 1978 I received a most appreciative letter from Miss Sue Ryder herself, saying that they were taking their courage in both hands and hoped soon to commence the enormous task of restoration. Funds were urgently needed and she wondered whether the Foundation might approach our American Friends to give them an opportunity of helping in this work of restoration.

From our American "cousins" I was able to select about one hundred names of those who 1 felt would really like to be able to have a part in this work, and I sent this list to Miss Ryder, together with a copy of The Norwoods I and any data I could collect on the history of Leckhampton. She seemed as enthusiastic as I was about the project, and I looked forward to seeing this work commence. I was delighted when the Architects' Journal of 17th March 1982 carried eighteen pages on Leckhampton's wonderful restoration under the title "Caring Restored", and the Daily Telegraph of 10 March 1984 covered a visit by the Prince of Wales.
