



give. Your son was admitted to the large American Camp Hospital No. 33, with a severe attack of lobar pneumonia. It was evident from the first that he

was evident from the first that he would have a hard time to pull through. He had the expert care of the best American physicians and the skillful attention of American trained nurses. But in spite of everything that could be done for him, his body was weaker than his fine home and

nurses. But in spite of everything that could be done for him, his body was weaker than his fine brave spirit and he was not able to survive. We did not talk with him unless he wished to talk; he was so weak, we knew it was dangerous to tire him. A nurse was constantly in attendance in case he should want anything, but he did not speak except to ask for water or to have his pillow changed. Miss Annie Borgen was with him when he stopped breathing the 2sth of August He did not suffer, but went to sleep peacefully like a tired child.

He was buried with military honors from the Chapel of the American harracks here. Mr. Conover, the kindly American Bed Cross chaplain who yisited him when he was ill, had charge of the ceremony. An honorary guard of American soldiers marched in advance of the funeral procession from the Chapel to the beautiel Kerfautras French cemetery where so many of our Americans are resting. Chaplain Conover marched hehind theguard and in front of the hearse. Another quard marched about the bearse and Red Cross workers and an old French guard marched about the bearse. Asc guard marched about the bearse Red Cross workers and an old Flady who attends all the Ame-funerals, came behind the flag-o-ed coffin.

ed coffin.

After the beautiful ceremony at the graye, the bugler sounded taps. I took the enclosed flowers from a great bunch sent by the Y. M. C. A., which lay on your boy's coffin, and we all came away, thinking not only of the brave boy who had died for his country here, but also of his family so far away in Americs.

I send you my sympathy for your share of the world's present sorrow. I congratulate you that you had such a boy to give for our country, and I send you my love, because I know he would have been sending his if he had not died like Christ to make the world a better place to live in.



Little Child Meets Death

"One of the sæddest most deplorable and pathetic deaths which has occurred in the county in a long, long time, happened Wednesday evening, when Pearl, the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Molloy, met her untimely fate during the destruction, by fire, of the Molloy home, six miles west of the city.

While Mrs, Molloy was tending to her evening work, feeding the chickens and other small chores. Pearl was taking her afternoon nap and before leaving the house.

After being absent from the house several minutes she heard the child screaming, and, rushing therete, she found the interior a mass of flames. Answering her screams for help, neighbors and school children soon arrived upon the scene but too late to be of any benefit.

After the destruction was After the destruction was wrought a search of the ruins dis-closed the body of little Pearl in an adjoining room from where the fire originated. demonstrating that, while only two years old, she had made an effort to escape but her made an effort to escape but her tiny strength was not sufficient to gain an exit through the window and she succumbed without being located by her mother or neigh-

bors.

While the origin of the fire is unknown, the general conjecture is that it was caused by sparks from the fireplace or that little Pearl had awakened and, child like, in playing with the fire, like, in playing with caused the conflagration.

When found the little body was charred beyond recognition, the lower limbs were burned away and the head was held to the trunk by a slender cord.

Benton County Man Shot From Ambush. Bentonville, Aug. 16.—Joe Morrison, about 45 years of age,

Morrison, about 45 years of age, was shot and killed from ambush by an unknown assassin near the boundary of Carroll County line in Walnut Township, Benton County, late Saturday afternoon.

County, late Saturday afternoon. Mr. Morrison was shot about 5:00 o'clock Saturday afternoon and died at 8:00 o'clock Sunday morning. On Sunday a coroner's jury

ing. On Sunday a coroner's jury returned a verdict that Morrison came to his death as a result of a gunshot by the hand of a party unknown to the jury.

The dead man is survived by a daughter 10 years of age and a son 12 years old. The mother of the children is not living.

Sheriff T. T. Blake, of this city,

was notified of the tragedy early Sunday morning and he and De-

puty Sid Jackson rushed to the scene by auto. No clue as to the identify of the assassin could be learned. Several incidents showing that there had been bad feeling between Morrison and some of his neighbors were developed but the responsibility for the crime could not be fixed.

Before his death Mr. Morrison stated that he was shot from the rear but he did not see the person who did the shooting. He could not account for the deed in any way.

Morrison had been to Mordell.

Morrison had been to Mondell, Carroll County, to do some trading and was on his way home when he was shot. The shooting took place when he was only one quarter of a mile from his house and the shots were heard by his two children who also recognized their father's call for help. On arrival of the coroner, Henry Hollenbeck, of Van Buren, the overcoat was gone, and the watch and chain had disappeared.

It later developed, the officers said, that the overcoat belonged to Wallace, and that he had taken it when he took possession of the watch and chain.

cession. The shooting probably will be investigated by the grand jury, though no arrests have been made on the assumption that the negro was killed by the officers while in the performance of their duty.
