you today

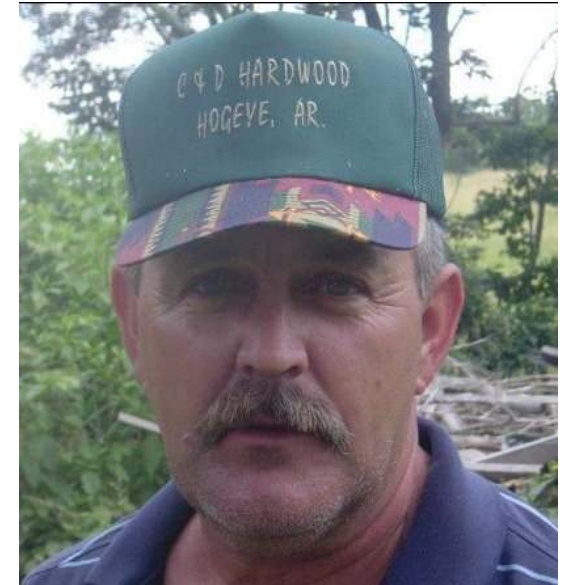

Charles “Charlie” Franklin Lockhart, 70, of West Fork, Arkansas, passed away peacefully and surrounded by family on June 12, 2025, in the region he called home his entire life.
