Jane married Carl William Maloney on September 22, 1950 in Prairie Grove, Arkansas. They raised 5 children at Cane Hill and Dutch Mills, Arkansas. She was a 4-H leader for many years while her children were growing up.

Carl and Jane owned Maloney Feed and Supply for several years in Lincoln. Jane took a Wilton cake decorating class and fell in love with decorating cakes. That started her career as a cake decorator. She pursued more classes from Wilton and achieved Master Cake Decorator which led Jane to open La Petite Bakery in Lincoln. She trained more people on the Wilton method than anyone else in the state of Arkansas and was inducted into the Wilton Cake Decorating Hall of Fame.

Jane was passionate about helping others and volunteered with the local Emergency Medical Service for many years. The group raised money to support local women fighting breast cancer by providing food and transportation during treatment. She was also a supporter of the Susan G. Komen Foundation raising money and promoting breast cancer prevention and awareness.
