James Oates received very little education owing to the fact he left home at an early age, remaining on the sea for several years, came to the United States in 1852. He was in the Government employ at Key West, Fla., and there mounted the first gun at that fort. In 1860 he went to Honduras, central America with Gen. Walker and was with him until the close of his compaign. He assisted in storming Truxills and was captured when Gen. Walker surrenerd and heid prisoner for several weeks. In April '61 he enlisted in company. G 7 Ill. Volenteer Infintry and served 3 months, then enlisted in Com. K. 9th Ill. Infintry. In December '61 he was commissioned 2nd lieutenant in June '62 was promoted to 1st lieutenant, and at the close was raised to the rank of Capt. He participated in the battles of Shiloh Corjinth, Resaca, Peach Tree Creek, Ft. Donelson, Nashville and others. During his services he was in 67 engagements, at Pt. Donelson he was wounded by four balls, three taking effect in his left shoulder and breast that, being the side effected by paralysis at the time of his death. He was discharged at Springfield. Ill. in '64 and received a pension as partial compensation.

In '68 he moved to Cincinnati and started a wagon factory which he carried on until '95, when he gave up heavy labor and went into the hardware store with his brother-inlaw, known as the firm of Oates and Spence, which he sold to a man in Stilwell, Okla., after the death of Mr. Spence, eight years ago.

In 72 he was married to his present wife Jennie Spence Maurice of St. Louis Mo., a native of Rochester N. York, who is left to mourn his loss after 36 years of devoted married life together. There were no children of this union. In '86 Mr. Gates was the Republican nominee for representative of Wash. Co. to the State Legislature, in '88 he was Chairman of the Republican Mass
